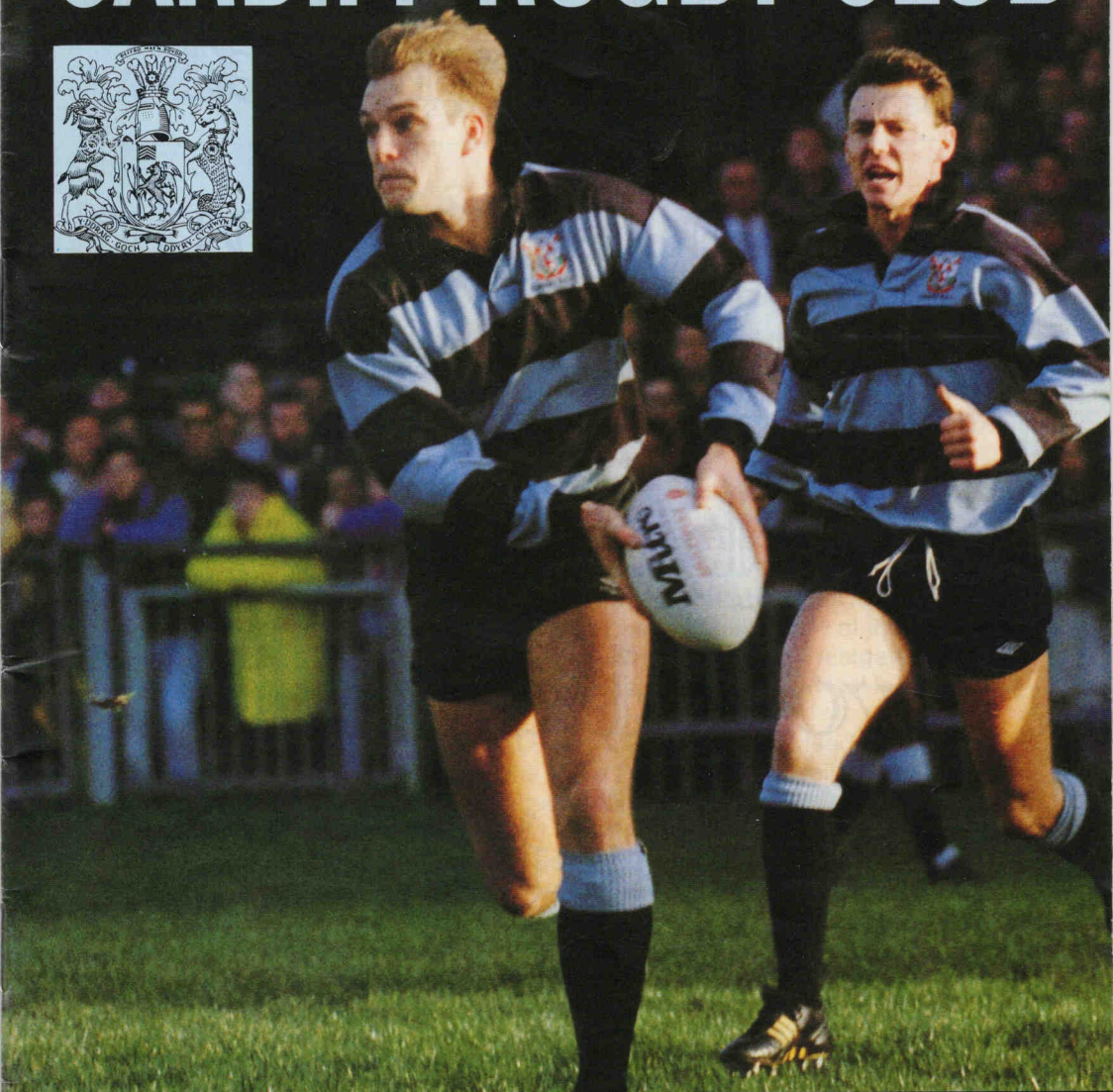
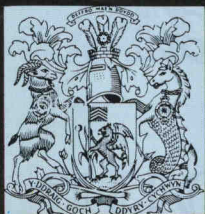

VERY RARELY would it be legitimate to open the notes on a rugby union match with a biblical quotation. This afternoon is the exception and there is nothing blasphemous involved for it is from the gospel according to St. Matthew that today's visitors acquire the nickname by which they are affectionately known: The Rocks.

And while, in these notes, we traditionally and genuinely welcome the officials, players and followers of our opponents it is with particular pleasure that we do so for today's Swalec Cup tie for it is the first ever visit by St. Peter's to the Arms Park in a senior game. The warmest of welcomes indeed.

In outlining the history of one of Cardiff's oldest rugby clubs further in the programme, the St. Peter's secretary Des Childs details a few of the players who have made the short journey from Newport Road to Westgate Street, including many who went on to win Welsh caps from Billy O'Neill in 1904 to, most recently, Steve Blackmore.

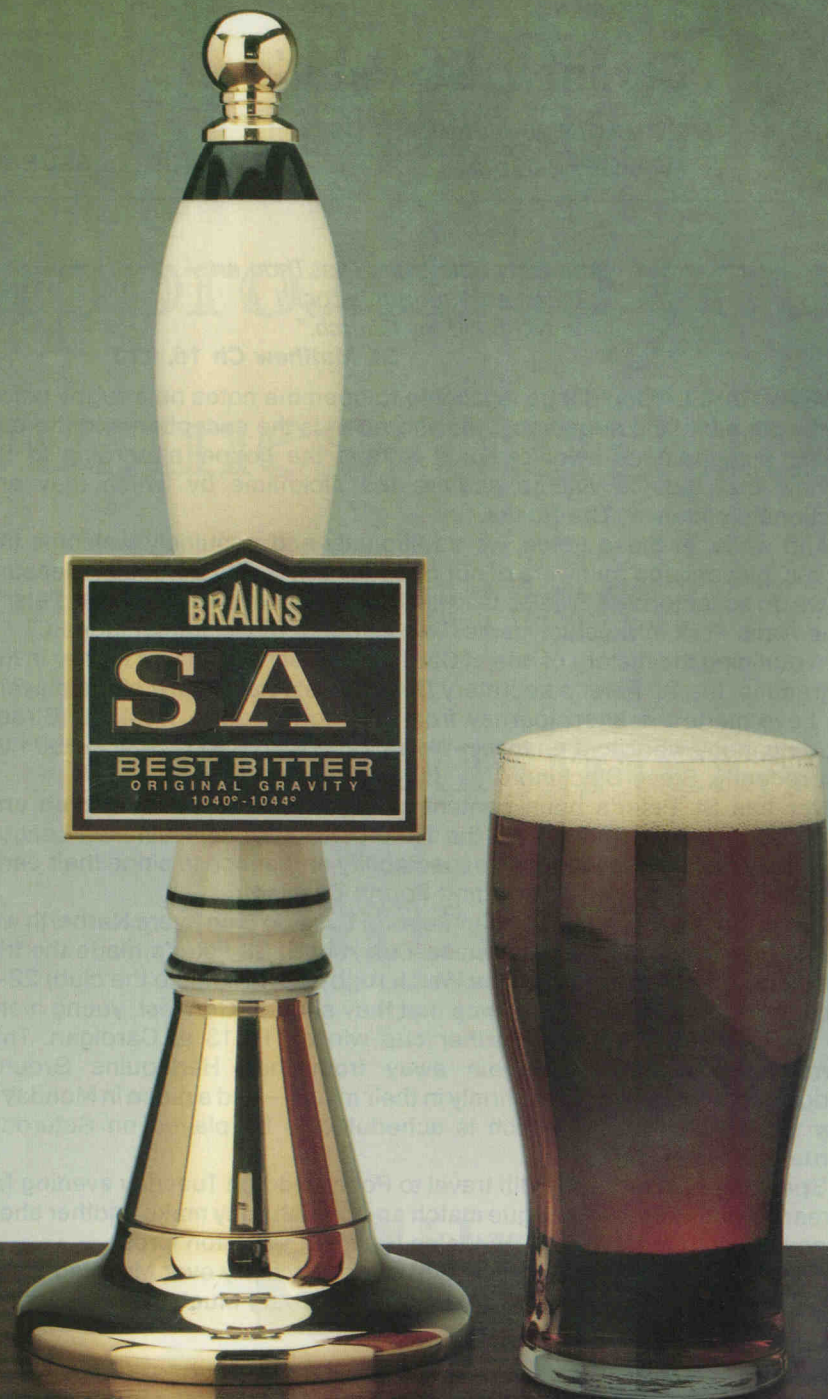
Nor has St. Peter's been content simply to act as a feeder club and currently, of course, they play in the Third Division of the Heineken League where they have achieved both respectability and success since their early promotion from the East District and Fourth Division.

If references were needed, then Second Division high flyers Narberth will provide them: in the previous Swalec Cup round, St. Peter's made the trip down west to win a surprise (to the Welsh rugby world if not to the club) 22-8 success. The cup draw's insistence that they should "Go West, young men" had earlier born fruit with a further cup win by 19-13 at Cardigan. This afternoon sees them yet again away from their Harlequins Ground headquarters with giant-killing firmly in their minds – and a place in Monday's draw for the sixth round which is scheduled to be played on Saturday, February 27th.

Speaking of fixtures, Cardiff travel to Pontypridd on Tuesday evening for the rearranged Heineken League match and on Saturday make another short journey away to meet the South Wales Police at Waterton Cross.

After Llanelli's win at Swansea, and our own victory over Maesteg at the Arms Park last Saturday, the Heineken title is still very much available for the side with most skill and stamina.

Stamina — and in-depth resources — will be a crucial part of the equation as the country's leading players have so many pressures on them until the end of the season. Cardiff, for example, have eight players in the squad from whom the Welsh teams will be chosen for both the senior international against England and the "B" match against Holland on February 6th.

Congratulations, then, to skipper Mike Hall, Adrian Davies, Paul Kawulok, Mike Rayer, Stuart Roy and Nigel Walker — and, perhaps more poignantly, to Stevie Ford, whose season had gone away to such an unhappy start, and to Howard Stone, arguably playing now his best rugby and a true "Corinthian" who could by now have started to think of withdrawing gracefully from the scene.

Good on them! And commiserations to one or two others in our squad we could name but who on this occasion at least have been overlooked.

Back in the league, Adrian Davies's two penalties and four conversions last Saturday helped him to maintain his lead at the top of the top-scoring list. He now has 191 in league points, 44 ahead of Aled Williams (Swansea) and Paul Parry of Builth Wells and 46 ahead of Llanharan's Jimmy Morris. Nigel Walker, who was missing last week, is second in the try-scoring list with 12, two behind Ieuan Evans of Llanelli.

For the moment, however, statistics mean nothing: it is all about the Swalec Cup and the first visit of St. Peter's. Once more a welcome to them — and to all at the Arms Park this afternoon.

BOOKING THE POLICE

"TRADITION HAS it that the first Welsh police rugby team was that of the Swansea Borough Police, and was founded in 1882."

This quotation is taken from a new book on rugby which has just been published and is mentioned for a couple of topical reasons.

Firstly, because next Saturday Cardiff make the short journey to Waterton Cross to play the South Wales Police in a Heineken League fixture.

And secondly, "A Century on the Rugby Beat", the new book, brought together by Gordon Westcott and including highly readable contributions by such people as D. Howell Rees, Arthur Bassett, Durbar Lawrie and journalists Steve Bale and John Billot, is now on sale at £5.

Cardiff, of course, has long had associations with the police, well before the various Glamorgan forces became amalgamated in 1969 to form the South Wales Constabulary.

Danny Davies's "Cardiff Rugby Club" includes nearly three pages of policemen who had played with the club up to centenary year in 1975, including internationals such as Alec Finlayson, Gwyn Evans, Mike Knill, Bill Tamplin, Archie Skym and many others. More recently, we have had such as Richie Collins.

It's a good read and, incidentally, was produced by Provincial Printing who do our programme. Rugby fans will enjoy it.

SKETCH ON THE ROCKS

ST. PETER'S RFC began as the parish club of St. Peter's Roman Catholic Church in Roath and retains its links to this day. St. Peter's was the second Catholic church to be built in the city to cater for the rapidly rising population in the second half of the nineteenth century and the rugby club made its first appearance in 1886. Its connections with the Cardiff club itself go back at least a century.

The Rocks (for the origin of the nickname see the introductory programme notes) did well from the start and dominated the new Cardiff and District competitions in the 1890s. They supplied a series of players to Cardiff RFC, among them Billy O'Neill, a line-out expert who became the first St. Peter's man to win a Welsh cap in 1904, winning 11 in all. In 1907 another Cardiff player, Jack Brown, joined Billy in the Welsh team for the first of 7 caps to become the second St. Peter's international.

By 1900 the Rocks were playing Bridgend, Maesteg and Tredegar but hopes of further progress were shattered in 1900/01 when, after a major row, most of the prominent players had transferred to other clubs by the end of the season.

The club continued to be a force in District circles until the First World War but hopes of further advancement were not rekindled.

Among the early post-war players were C.M.S. Jones and William Cummins who became internationals and Jim Sullivan who joined Wigan Rugby League, after a brief spell with Cardiff RFC, to become a legend in the northern code. Others were the Turnbull brothers, Bernard, Kevin and Maurice, all prominent Cardiff players. Bernard and Maurice were capped but the latter was even more famous as one of Wales' greatest cricketers as well as being a hockey international. The Turnbells retained their St. Peter's connections throughout the inter-war years but their support did not prevent dissensions.

St. Peter's secretary DES CHILDS summarises the history of one of Cardiff's oldest rugby clubs

By the late 1920s there were three separate St. Peter's rugby clubs! In the 1930s they had combined again and immediately began to dominate the District competitions. This reign came to a colourful end in 1933/34 in the later stages of the Mallett Cup when St. Peter's met Grange Baptists, who included a well known local character at outside half, Jack Cookley, who had been a rugby league professional a year or two before. After a protest, both clubs were barred sine die by the District Committee. The Baptists, a prominent club of the time, were never to play again and St. Peter's had to wait until after the Second World War before reappearing.

The Rocks prospered after the War and by the early 1960s a strong team of officials were in place most of whom are still serving. After a long campaign, the club became a full member of the W.R.U. in 1970. Steve Blackmore became the club's seventh international via the usual Cardiff route and Chris Camilleri threatened to become another before turning professional. In 1980 the old Harlequins Ground in Roath was reopened for sporting use following an agreement between St. Peter's and South Glamorgan Council. In 1982 a nearby clubhouse in Newport Road was opened. In recent years the co-operation between the Council and the club has resulted in a series of improvements at the Harlequins Ground and plans for further progress are in hand.

The arrival of the Heineken National Leagues in Welsh rugby allowed St. Peter's to confirm their prominence in East District circles by securing a place in the League last season and then winning promotion to the Third Division. The club has ignored the trend to fewer teams and continues to organise five senior sides as well as Youth and Under 16 XV's. Thus, one of the City's oldest rugby clubs is flourishing and will take particular pleasure in travelling to the Arms Park in the footsteps of so many of its prominent past players.

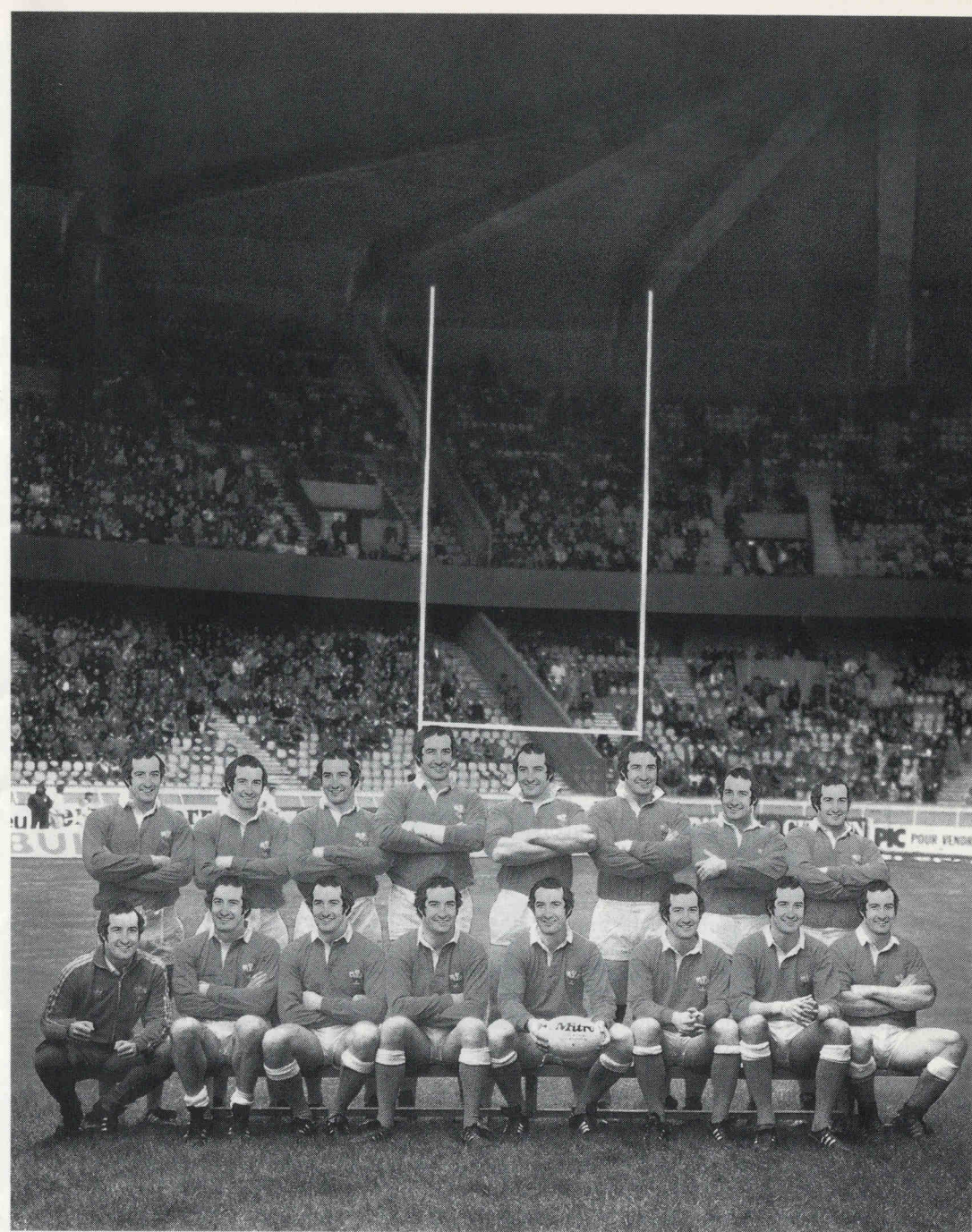
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GWYNNE GRIFFITHS & MALCOLM CHILDS

QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

INEVITABLY, much of the back-room spotlight at the Arms Park has fallen upon Cardiff's Australian coaching organiser Alec Evans. Quite right, too, but Quidnunc, always ready to give praise as well as being curious about the people behind the faces, thought it time he investigated others who chased our heroes up hill, down dale and around the training pitch.

Last Saturday, we dealt with the life and times of Mr. Charlie Faulkner. Today, it's a double act in Mr. David Gwynne Griffiths and Mr. Malcolm Edward Childs.

It would be unfair, possibly, to compare this duo with, say, Laurel and Hardy or Abbott and Costello or Little and Large but, to see them walking together away from you, there is a marked difference in build and shape. But then, that's the difference between the ex-British international sprinter (Gwynne Griffiths wore the British vest on 21 occasions, including the European and Commonwealth Games) and the archetypal forward (Malcolm Childs scrummaged redoubtably for Ebbw Vale and had a brief flirtation with Gloucester).

Let us first look at the affairs of Gwynne Griffiths, our fitness coach whose jobs include making certain that such dilatory stars as Chunky Kawulok, Fat Eddie and Stuart Roy the Galloping Hairpin can get from point A on the pitch to point B more quickly than they did last week. And more athletically.

More crucial aspects of his role involve programmed weight-training for such members of the veterans side as Ian "Robbo" Robinson, who has suddenly become vitally interested in improving his press-ups to increase staying power, preparing Bobby Newman for this year's Mr. Universe contest and acting as Hemi Taylor's interpreter.

But seriously, Gwynne's background in PE — he took the subject at Trinity College, Carmarthen, after going to Llandovery College, taught PE in the Midlands, became manager at the Cwmbran Stadium before becoming Principal of the Welsh Institute of Sports — fits him ideally for a position such as his at Cardiff. "Scientific testing of players' fitness — and I have helped with the Welsh squad — is a crucial help to make players realise their potential. The preparation and tabulation and compilation of targets assists them in constant improvement. It is something which is objective, down on paper, whereas an opinion of playing ability may be objective."

Born in Carmarthen in 1945, a winger with Welsh public schools and Welsh Colleges who hit 46.74 over 400 metres from the blocks and 45.2 in a relay, Gwynne nevertheless has his lighter moments.

His transformation to Dracula for the club's fancy dress night was spectacular (see him without his glasses), and his rendition of a vicar telling the story of Daniel in the Lion's Den could certainly never be given in any church. He claims to like Indian food and fish (you may find him in the Bengal Brasserie or Le Monde) but drinks little. His son Davvey — watch him on the weights — grins at this. "He drinks only twice a week," he says of the man nicknamed 90-90 because of the sprint action, "once for three days and once for four".

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He was also, long-term readers of this column may be interested to know, part of the Phantom Fish Filleter scandal, along with Dai Evans, in the long-running soap opera of Cardiff players finding fish in their bedrooms.

But you can't talk to Gwynne without asking further about his athletics. He also chases Chunky Kawulok round the training park.

And the pupils at the school where he teaches — the controversial Cwmarn, they who, horror of horrors, wanted to go private in Neil Kinnock's constituency — have nicknamed him Oh-eight-nine-eight because they see him on the telephone the whole time through the glass partition of his office.

The chances are that Big Mal will be talking rugby to someone. He's always watching or talking sport. This weekend, for example, he could watch elder son Mark (with Newport Under 21s), younger son Andrew play for Pontypool and Cwmbran in the Dewar Shield (Under 15) against the Vale of Glamorgan, come to the Arms Park and then again watch Andrew play soccer tomorrow.

He lives — apart from the steak — on sandwiches, supplied by his long-suffering wife Barbara. He has sandwiches at work, sandwiches await him when he returns late after Cardiff coaching and training nights and sandwiches whenever. But then he loves to eat at the Village Green at Trellech for a special occasion.

Big Mal (or 0-8-9-8 if you prefer) was born in Caerphilly on September 16, 1951, went to Bedwellty Grammar School and on to the Cardiff College of Education. From college he joined Ebbw Vale and played also for the Welsh Accies, Monmouthshire and the Public School Wanderers.

He enjoys a sing-song — try his sweet Caroline — and claims to be proficient in playing the Cd machine. A sore point in his life is his somewhat elderly Sierra. Whereas Gwynne Griffiths has a habit of losing keys, Big Mal has a habit of not being able to get into his car with his. And, when he does, of the car not starting. A familiar sight on the roads of Gwent is the Childsmachine being towed home by vehicles with flashing lights.

Quidnunc has related before of the problems he caused Mike Hall and Andy Booth on holiday in Turkey, involving boats, tavernas and other hair-raising activities but he still manages to exert some discipline when training night comes round — a discipline which also shows itself in the fact that he took an Open University course in the Humanities.

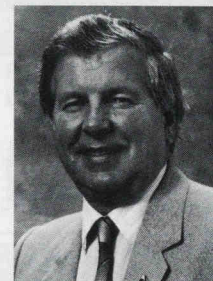

KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS

explains and interprets the laws of Rugby Football in his regular series. This afternoon, Malcolm conducts a question-and-answer session.



Question 1: At a quick throw in taken nearer the team's goal line, foul play takes place. *Where is the penalty awarded?*

Answer: The referee should award the penalty 15 metres in along the line of touch *where the line out would have taken place.*

Question 2: A wheeling scrum accidentally collapses before it goes beyond 90°. *Which team puts the ball in to the reformed scrumage?*

Answer: *The same team, regardless of the ball being taken against the head. Referees should be aware, however, that a side losing the ball against the head often wilfully collapses the scrum.*

Question 3: How many *coaches* are allowed onto the playing area at half-time?

Answer: *Two coaches from either side may be allowed. The referee may, at his discretion, shorten the 5 minute half-time interval.*

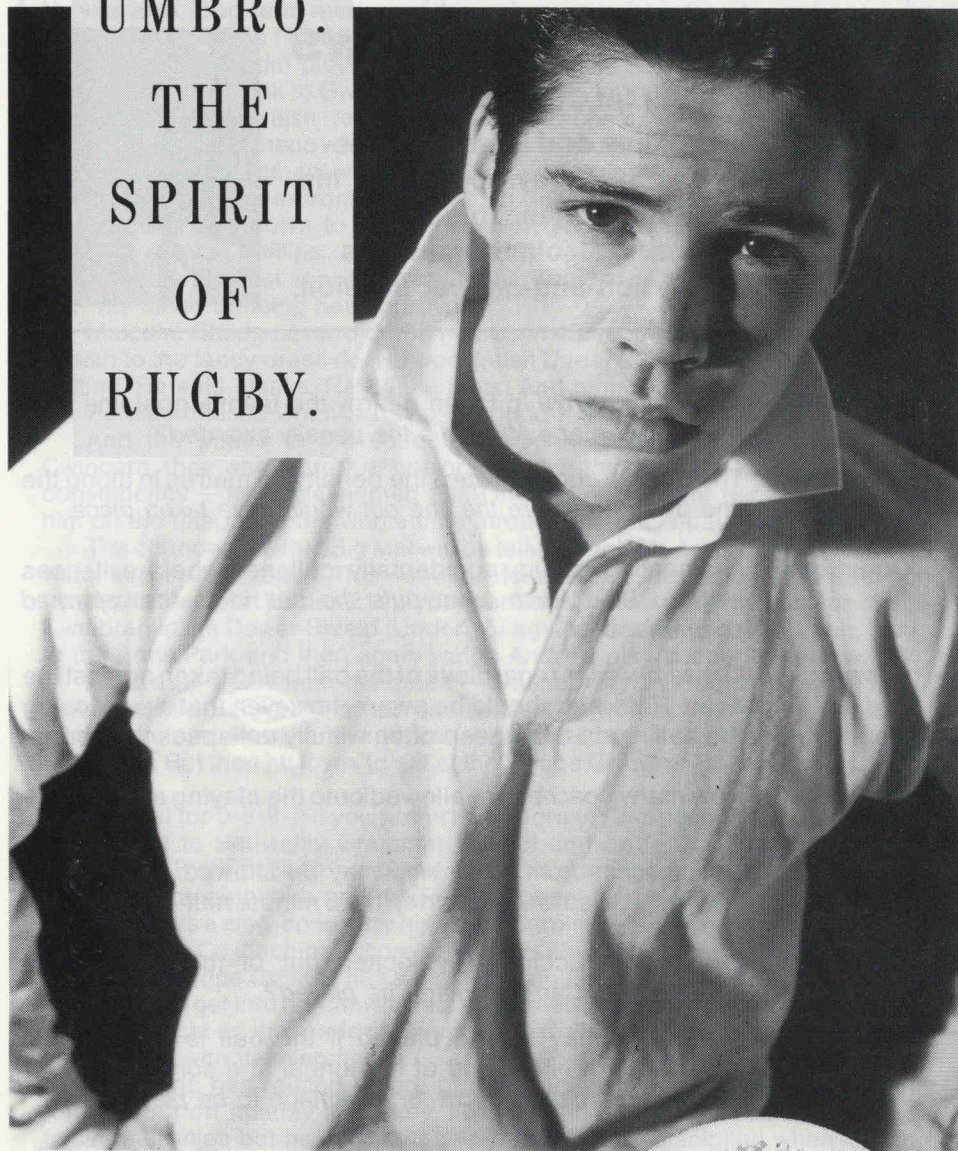
Question 4: The ball is accidentally kicked out of the tunnel at a scrumage. *Can advantage be played?*

Answer: *Advantage may not be played if the ball is accidentally kicked out of either end of the tunnel at a scrumage. An infringement has to occur for advantage to be played.*

Question 5: A number 8 unbinds from the scrumage with the ball at his feet and then rebinds. *What is the correct decision?*

Answer: *The number 8 should not be penalised for returning the ball to the scrum for the scrum has ended. The decision is accidental offside; therefore, a scrum, with the put in given to the other side, should be awarded.*

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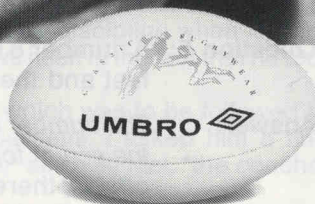


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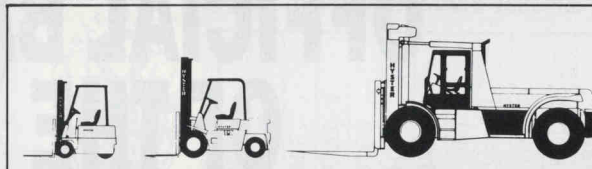
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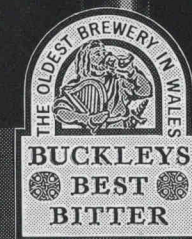
