

PRINTING DEADLINES make it impossible for us to comment today on last evening's crucial scheduled match between Swansea and Llanelli in front of live TV cameras at St. Helen's — the West Wales derby that could one way or another determine the ultimate outcome of the Heineken League title. No matter what has happened, however, there are few matches for Cardiff which do not have considerable importance.

There will, then, be no complacency over the visit this afternoon of lowlyplaced but extremely determined Maesteg, to whose officials, players and supporters we once more welcome most warmly to the Arms Park.


The 55 points Cardiff scored against them in the Swalec Cup last month can be forgotten, along with the glut of tries against Pontypridd and Plymouth Albion. Whilst encouraging for the future and spectacular on occasion to behold, these results are now of the past: today is a new challenge and, judging by the impressive fight by Maesteg at Swansea last Saturday — when the home side were still able to field five internationals despite being slimmed down by the absence of seven men at the Welsh training camp in Lanzarote — the Old Parish are bent on keeping First Division status.

They were unfortunate to lose by only 15-11, with full-back Darren Edwards convinced that he had a legitimate try turned down by referee Brian Wallis.

Maesteg, incidentally, have some small reason to be pleased with Cardiff's record-breaking 107-3 win over Plymouth Albion (and you can read more about that achievement in the *Miscellany* column further in the programme). Before that match, the 77 points scored by Cardiff against Maesteg in December 1973 was the club highest.

The Arms Park, indeed, is not a happy venue in general for the Llynfi Valley club. They have won here only once — by 14-10 in 1926. In return, their biggest win over Cardiff was 10 years ago when they beat us at Maesteg by 31-24.

Two points ahead of South Wales Police and three behind Newbridge and Aberavon, they will be looking anxiously also for the results of this afternoon's other games. Aberavon are at home to the Police while Newbridge entertain Pontypridd. The other matches this afternoon are at Newport where Neath, still very much in contention, will seek to beat a team which has not won a league match since October 30, and at Bridgend where Wednesday evening's weather-postponed match against Pontypool has been rearranged.



The emerging Bridgend, under Clive Norling, will also have a major say in the league. They won't win it but both Swansea and Cardiff go to the Brewery Field between now and May 1, matches which could play a major role in the title race.

Next Saturday, of course, it's cup time again with St. Peter's making the short journey into town down Newport Road before Cardiff return to league affairs with a visit to the South Wales Police.

On the subject of fixtures, incidentally, those interested in the affairs of the Under 21s and Youth teams will find at the back of the programme a somewhat revised list for the second half of the season.

Elsewhere this afternoon, the international matches will take priority, with Wales not becoming involved until England come to Cardiff on February 6. By tonight, we will have some idea as to the continuing strength of the England side seeking its third consecutive Grand Slam.

With the Five Nations Championship then in full swing, there is only one league date scheduled for the moment in February with Llanelli coming to the Arms Park on the 13th. But a decision was expected late this week — again, alas, too late for inclusion in the programme — on the new date for the postponed match at Pontypridd.

Either way, these are hectic times for the club and country. Both need vociferous support as we enter what promises to be an enthralling second half of the season.

MISCELLANY... reporting on news and views from CARDIFF ARMS PARK

CERI THOMAS, the quiet and likeable Cardiff Institute student now reading Sport and Human Movement Studies after leaving a post with the Crown Prosecution service, wrote himself into the record books last Saturday with his 37 points against Plymouth Albion.

Made up from three tries and 11 conversions, his score beat the previous highest individual total of 30, consisting of four tries and nine goals by our wing three-quarter and captain R. A. Gibbs against Moseley almost to the day - January 7, 1911 - 72 years ago. The 107 points total was also a Cardiff record.

Curiously, Ceri was not all that surprised. On Boxing day he had amassed 26 points against Pontypridd with two tries, two penalties and four conversions. "I was aware after that, with Cardiff running the ball so much and scoring tries, that someone who kicks well could score a lot of points.

"Even so, it's hard to believe that I have broken a record of more than 80 years, where such great players as Barry John and Gareth Davies had not done so."

Ceri is turning out to be rather more versatile than he had at first appeared to followers, having now played at full-back and centre in addition to the more customary wing. "I felt that in order to compete further for a first team place, I needed more strings to my bow. At the start of the season, I did some kicking and practised hard at it. Then I had a chat with Alex Evans and asked whether I could have a chance in the centre. The two things came together against Pontypridd and then Plymouth."

Clearly because of the time gap, there are unlikely to be any people around who saw the previous record holder in action. Reggie Gibbs retired after his 1910-11 season as captain with the quite remarkable strike record of 90 tries in his 130 club appearances between 1901 and 1911. And, which is more, he performed prodigiously in the Welsh jersey.

He scored four tries against France at Swansea in 1910 - a Welsh international

record shared to this day with Maurice Richards - in the first championship match in which France ever played. He also had another hat-trick against Scotland the following year as Wales won the Grand Slam. In all, he scored 13 tries in his 16 matches for the country.

CARDIFF'S "ALL BACKS"

STAYING down History Street for a moment, Cardiff in fact provided the full three-quarter line in three of those Grand Slam matches in Gibbs, Billy Spiller, Louis Dyke and J.L. "Johnny" Williams.

In the 32-10 defeat of Scotland, the Cardiff backs scored 29 of the points with both Billy Spiller and Johnny Williams scoring a couple of tries, Louis Dyke kicking two conversions and Billy Spiller being successful with a drop goal.

Johnny Williams, who also once scored a hattrick against Ireland, captained his country on one occasion during his 17 Welsh appearances but he was, alas, to lose his life as an Army Captain in World War 1.

Ironically, his appointment as captain for Wales's first ever championship match in Paris was because of his knowledge of the language.

DUNCAN'S DELIGHT

DUNCAN BROWN, the popular former chairman of Cardiff Rugby Club (1955-56), was born only the year after Reggie Gibbs scored those 30 points.

And Duncan is still very much alive and kicking with the result that a small celebration was held in the Hubert Johnson room after the Pontypridd match on Boxing Day to mark his 80th birthday on December 23.

But there was more to it than the birthday. Duncan and his wife Pat, a regular supporter, have two sons in Tim, who runs an engineering business in Poole, and Peter. who farms in Kettering.

For some weeks Tim had been secretly negotiating with John Nelson, the Cardiff Rugby Club hon. secretary, to provide a

Duncan Brown Trophy for the Cardiff Youth: the secret was kept well and Duncan wondered why his family were ushered into the Hubert Johnson room after the game.

Old friends were waiting for him, including the chairman of Cardiff Athletic Club, Haydn Wilkins, the rugby club's vice-chairman, Brian Mark, Wilf Wooller, Dr. Jack Matthews, C. D. Williams and Bleddyn Williams.

Brian received the Duncan Brown Cup from Tim Brown and he in turn passed it to the chairman of the Youth XV. Jim O'Donnell.

It was then appropriate that Jim should give a current Youth tie to Duncan Brown. Duncan, who made 93 appearances for the club in the six seasons leading to the war, had helped to start the Youth XV in 1948 and was solely responsible for the hard work in the early years. He was able to highlight the fact that Lloyd Williams, a member of the original Youth XV who went on to captain both Cardiff and Wales, was also present.

DISTRICT MAN

TALKING of the Williams family, Tony, the apparently evergreen youngest of the extraordinary brothers, has recently been elected as an East District representative on the Welsh Rugby Union.

Few can be better qualified to know the insand-outs of the game. Starting with Cardiff Juniors, he first appeared with the Rags in 1959-60, played 328 times for the first team and was first elected to the rugby committee in 1975-76.

MIKE STILL SMILES

MIKE GRIFFITHS, back in South Wales this week after fracturing his collar bone in a mountain bike collision during the Welsh warmweather training session in Lanzarote, could still, as usual, see the humorous side of life.

Before reporting to Morriston Hospital for a further dose of treatment under Malcolm Downes, he laughed ruefully as he told how they had just come off the mountain track near the sporting complex when "one of the boys

went down - I think it was Colin Stephens - and Tony Clement and I piled into him.

"But it's never happened to me before - and I do a great deal of training on my bike around the Rhondda where, believe me, there are far more difficult trails than on Lanzarote."

CLUBHOUSE VARIETY

TWO EVENINGS of entertainment in the clubhouse before the end of the month promise to provide huge enjoyment as well as bonhomie.



QUIDNUNC'S COLUMN

IT COMES AS no particular surprise to discover that Charlie Faulkner is named after a horse. A Clydesdale at that, the beloved and hard-working variety of the four-legged genre.

But wait, you may ask? Why after a horse? In fact, our Charlie was christened Anthony George but ploughman Faulkner used to till the land on Farmer Robins's spread on what is now Llanwern Steelworks. The ploughhorse was Charlie and the name stuck.

Well, it's preferable to the "Fatty" Faulkner title bestowed on him by Paul, Chunky, Desperate Dan, Kawulok when Charlie is encouraging the gentle giant to get in some more scrummaging.

Anthony George is, of course, a legend in the game of rugby football as well as being on the Cardiff coaching staff under Alex Evans. Max Boyce, as we are aware, sang about him — and Bobby Windsor and Graham Price of course — as the unbeatable Pontypool front-row. Windsor was already a four cap veteran by the time Charlie and Pricey were named for their debut in Paris almost 28 years to this day. January 18, it was, 1975 — and Wales clobbered the French by 25-10, the last occasion on which Wales has won in Paris.

He won 19 caps in all during the years which included two Welsh Grand Slams as well as two other Five Nation Championship titles.

So how does such a deeply committed Pontypool man and ex-Gwent ploughboy come to be a coach at Cardiff? "I had a phone call from Stan Thomas one day asking whether I would be interested in meeting Alex Evans. I knew his reputation and I thought 'Well, I've nothing to lose' and Alex and I had a couple of hours chat after which he asked me to join him. He explained the setup and there could be only one decision. Primarily, I'm in charge of the front five, and the front-row especially."

Charlie bristles at the suggestion that he himself was never the world's best trainer. "As far as propping is concerned, there is not much difference now than in my day — and our fitness standards compared very favourably with today's." Mind you, he does recall one Irish prop who, in an international, revealed at half-time that he had a book of matches in his pocket in case there was a chance of a quick drag. And Charlie is fit enough to play a bit himself still: in the Golden Oldies tournament in Bermuda, for example, and for Morgan's Bar in Newport High Street.

Talking of breweries, Charlie Faulkner works for Whitbread, covering the Newport, Caerleon and Western Valley area. Predictably then, he likes a pint or two, but, curiously, is not a huge meat eater, preferring fish.

He is married — to Jill — and they have three children, Jane, who is 21, Jason, 19, and little Laura, who is 11. He enjoys good action films — Dirty Harry is his favourite but include also all spaghetti westerns — but watches little television, with the exception of the news and anything about rugby.

Educated at St. Mary's, Newport, and at Father Hill's, he played first with Newport Saracens before joining Cross Keys for a couple of seasons. Thence to Pontypool, where he came under the influence of the redoubtable Ray Prosser.



"Pross was a whimsical character," says Charlie, "a real character and I have a lot to thank him for." He has indeed. Charlie not only won the Welsh caps but was also a British Lion.

He was called out as a replacement in the 1977 Lions tour to New Zealand — and was very nearly sent home again. "There was a little incident over a fire at a hotel. It was all Bobby Windsor's fault and everyone ran. I stayed to put out the fire and was caught by George Burrell, the Scottish manager, who thought it must have all been my fault. He was going to send me home but reversed his decision."

Like all rugby stars, he has travelled the world through the game. Apart from the New Zealand visit, he has toured Australia, Japan, Italy, the USA and Canada as well as the usual European countries — and also, with Crawshay's — to Berlin.

His age has to be one of the game's best-kept secrets. Certainly you won't find it in the normal record books — and he merely smiles when you ask for his date of birth.

But then, Charlie Faulkner smiles very readily. One of the great performances during the days of the Welsh golden era was to hear him singing "There's a hole in my bucket", accompanied by Geoff Wheel on the banjo and he was acknowledged as an asset to any touring party.

Only once was he found lacking. On being called out by the Lions to New Zealand, he undertook a lengthy journey from Aberystwyth to New Zealand, arriving completely exhausted. He got there to find the boys enjoying a party. "I had a couple of drinks but the travel caught up with me and I fell asleep there and then," he recalls. "When I awoke, I found I'd missed an orgy!"

KNOW THE LAWS

J. E. MALCOLM THOMAS explains and interprets the laws of Rugby Football in his regular series.

This afternoon, Malcolm gets to the heart of the maul.



LAW 22 - THE MAUL

A. The Experimental Variation

Introduced and effective from the beginning of this season states that:

"When the ball in a maul becomes *unplayable or* a maul becomes *stationary*, a scrummage shall be ordered and the ball shall be put in by the team *NOT* in possession at the commencement of the maul".

There are TWO IMPORTANT POINTS to note, i.e.

- 1. When the maul becomes stationary the time allowable for the ball to emerge is the equivalent of the time currently allowable for the emergence of the ball from a collapsed maul.
- 2. In Law the ball must emerge from a stationary maul. A second drive is not permissible.

A scrummage should be awarded.

B. The Maul and the Scrum Half

If the ball is emerging from a maul, the scrum half must be allowed to place his hands on the ball without interference from the opposition. The scrum half is not part of the maul; he is not bound in and he is not in possession of the ball as is his team mate who is part of the maul. The scrum half should be allowed, *unhindered by the opposition* to dictate the tactics from that position, i.e. by kicking, running or passing.

He should have the right to play at his option. The same would apply to the ruck where the scrum half would not be deemed to be putting his hands into the ruck to receive the ball when it was emerging. Again this action should be unhindered by the opposition or penalised accordingly.

C. The Maul and In-goal

If the ball in a maul is on or over the goal-line the maul is ended. If a maul moves from the field of play into in-goal and the ball does not emerge, then in-goal law takes precedence over maul law, and the decision is a scrum 5 metres, attacking ball, even if the attacking team took the ball into the maul originally.


