

Chairman's Report for the year ended 30th April, 1978

Dear Members,

I thought that the year after the euphoria of the Centenary year of the Cardiff Rugby Football Club would be an anti-climax for all concerned. How wrong I was! The Chairmen of the various Standing Committees and their members have done sterling work and have given their unstinted time and energy to the continued smooth running of the club.

A new sub-committee was formed in April this year by the Management Committee called the Planning and Project Sub-Committee. It's terms of reference were to discuss capital projects which sections had in mind and to decide on priorities and recommend to the Management Committee the final result of their meetings and discussions.

It was finally decided by the Management Committee to remove the administration offices to the grey building at the rear of the clubhouse, and the space made available after such removal to be replanned and used as extra lounge accommodation with a larger bar service area. It was also agreed to have a new entrance for Members only and extra toilet facilities for gentlemen.

I apologise on behalf of the Management Committee for any inconvenience to the Members during the alterations which we hope will be completed by early October in time for the "All Blacks" match.

In May this year we received a letter of resignation from Mr. and Mrs. Leworthy because of the continued ill health of Mrs. Leworthy and the need for her to enjoy a complete rest; she was very popular with everyone and the Committee accepted her resignation and wished her a speedy recovery to good health.

Mrs. Gaynor Parsons, who had taken control of rhe bar and catering in the absence of Mr. and Mrs. Leworthy when on holiday, wrote to the Committee requesting to be considered for the appointment as Stewardess.

She was appointed as Stewardess of the Club for a six months trial period and appears to be a very accomplished and dedicated Stewardess.

I wish to thank on behalf of the Management Committee, Mr. Ewan G. Davies, the Club's Hon. Solicitor, Mr. John Riches, member of the Management Committee, also Mr. John Webb, Mr. J. R. Thomas and the two Co-opted members for the priceless advice received from them.

It is very pleasing to see our President, Mr. Hubert Johnson, looking so much better after his treatment and rest in Heath Hospital.

## General Secretary's Report

Dear Mr. Chairman,

Following immediately after the Rugby Centenary Season it is pleasing to note that support by all Members is evident in the financial figures for the year ended 30th April, 1978.

Rising costs are still evident for materials and services and in comparing the Income with 1977 it must be remembered that over £78,000 last year was credited to the Rugby Section Centenary Fund.

If we compare Income with the "normal" year of 1976 Income has increased by approximately 39%

#### General Rates - Decrease £749

Whilst half yearly charges to March, 1978 have increased to £3,986 and will show further increases to September, 1978 of £4,192; 1977 bore several back-dated charges on revised assessments.

## Light and Heat — Increase £5,398

Electricity charges for Cardiff Arms Park and Sophia Gardens have increased by £1,430 whilst oil consumption costs have increased to £3,968.

It may now be necessary to investigate other methods of heating to reduce consumption at such a high rate.

## Insurances — Increase £492

This increase in the main relates to an under reserve in the previous year's Accounts for Insurances relating to the Clubhouse and contents.

## Bar Wages, Equipment and Renewals — Increase £2,456

Costs relating to Bar equipment, taxis, staff adverts and sundries have been reduced by £1,095 but Bar wages in accordance with the Wages Council Act and Staff meals have increased by £3,551.

## Other Expenses

Many increases in costs have been unavoidable due to Suppliers prices and are continuing. However, the previous year's figures relate to the Centenary Year with its higher level of activity on the rugby scene and therefore comparative figures are back to normal. These refer in particular to Advertising, Gatemen, Cleaning and Sundries.

#### INCOME

#### Football Gates and Season Tickets

An excellent result even though compared with approximately £75,000 for the previous Centenary Year. No extra charges were levied for home matches, although Stand Season ticket prices were increased by nearly £3.

## **Profit on Sale of Programmes**

More home matches were played in the Centenary Year with more bumper programmes produced.

## **Membership Subscriptions**

In comparing income with 1977, Ground Membership was introduced this year, the subscription from which included reserved car parking facilities. Normal basic subscriptions were increased by £1 and out of the total income of £61,842 amounted to £34,018, an increase over the previous year of £31,514.

Ground Membership during this current year could be in the region of £30,000.

Car parking receipts now only refer to Member's parking at lunch-time and early evening and these charges have not yet been increased this year.

## **Investment Income**

Capital expenditure of approximately £16,000 has been spent during the year to 30th April, 1978 with a resultant drop in investment income. In addition Bank rates have been lower.

Profit from Sales has been achieved for only part of the year, from 1st August, 1977, before which it was included in the Centenary Accounts. Our grateful thanks are due to Mr. and Mrs. Eddie John who run the Shop as a labour of love and have no thoughts of retiring.

## **Future Planning and Projects**

Excesses of Income over Expenditure for 1977 and 1978 are encouraging in that they total £38,400 with only £8,500 put aside for further maintenance, etc. Out of the surplus it has cost the Club £25,343 for capital expenditure at the Arms Park and Sophia Gardens.

Since the 30th April of this year, the Management Committee has adopted proposals by the Planning and Projects Sub-Committee to provide better facilities for Members in the Bottom Lounge. By October, 1978, therefore, our Investments will disappear.

To those Members who earnestly read the Annual Reports, I would apologise for pointing out obvious facts. To those, hopefully only a few, who always query any slight increases in Subscriptions or Bar Prices, I can only say that surpluses in the region of £20,000 per annum are imperative if we are to make any headway in building up funds again to provide so many more worthwhile indoor and outdoor facilities for young and elderly Members.

## CARDIFF RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

#### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Season 1977-78

In June 1977 there occurred one of the greatest moments of my life when I was elected Chairman of the "Greatest" Rugby Club in the world. This was for me an even higher accolade than having been made Cardiff captain in season 1955-56. I also regarded it as a tremendous challenge following our successful centenary year. My reliance on the guidance and assistance of the Hon. Secretary, Mr. Alun Priday, was immediate and my administrative responsibilities were soon efficiently organised. In retrospect, it would appear that the Club's victory in August 1977 in the Aberavon Sevens, over the select "Inn on the River" side, augured well for the rest of the season.

An encouraging start to the season was made in September with notable victories over Maesteg, Neath, Bristol, Aberavon, Coventry and Pontypool. The latter two victories were particularly gratifying, hard earned as they were.

On October 1st we were due to play the "old enemy"-Newport—who had made an inauspicious start to their season. Notwithstanding, as in all Cardiff-Newport games, our selfconfidence and cocksuredness was destroyed by an efficient Newport team who beat us 27-10. Our next game was at Pontypridd and again we were outplayed and lost 24-11. I well remember touch judge Peter Nyhan, flag raised, standing like a Welsh Guardsman, signalling a Cardiff foot in touch in the Cardiff half, whilst a vital Cardiff score was being made under the Pontypridd posts; and back to the first infringement both teams went! At this juncture the sense of despondency and alarm which appeared in the Cardiff camp was dispelled by Gerald Davies' positive assertion that these were temporary set-backs and that the team would recover to play entertaining, enjoyable, fifteen-man rugby-which they straight away did, as witnessed in the wins over Northampton, Penarth, Cambridge University and Harlequins. The game against the unbeaten Moseley side away was lost in an exciting tussle 18-9, owing mainly to Moseley's defence and place kicking abilities.


November arrived and brought good wins against Oxford University and Ebbw Vale. The commencement of our W.R.U.

Cup programme began with a first round draw against Garndiffaith (away), the proud Gwent club perched on a windswept hill just north of Pontypool. An exciting game was witnessed, with the "Garn" team tackling and chasing like heroes, and Cardiff were ucky to win by three penalty kicks to nil. Thence westward to Llanelli, where we had not won in nine years. Positive attacking rugby produced a convincing win for Cardiff by 20 to 10, which personally eradicated memories of my last visit to Stradey in season 1974-75 when we lost 37-10.

Early December saw a good win against Swansea, mainly ensured by "lady luck" and the kind bounce of the ball for us. The game against renowned Pontypool on a cold, rainy, windy night produced a large partisan Wednesday crowd, a superb 80 minute demonstration of forward power-play and a thrilling late rally by Cardiff, thereby ensuring an honourable draw. The London Welsh game was a personal triumph for ex-Wanderers centre Pat Daniels, who amassed a tally of five tries in an outstanding game which we comfortably won. Our second W.R.U. Cup game was played on the Arms Park against Cwmavon who, although they played enthusiastically, could not match us for power, speed and skill and we won 27-6. A good win 18-6 was also achieved against Bridgend on the Brewery Field despite a second half onslaught by the Bridgend pack. It was good to have the tactical control of Varsity Blue Gareth Davies, back in harness, after his two months with Oxford University.

No Christmas spirit was evident at the Arms Park on Boxing Day, when Pontypridd achieved a notable double against us in a well-deserved victory 13-9. The end of 1977 saw a tremendous struggle against Coventry when, having built up a commanding lead, Coventry almost overhauled us in a nailbiting finish, and we ended up victors 24-22. So ended 1977 on a high water mark of success with a long run of victories, four losses and one drawn game. But could we sustain Club and Cup performances into 1978?

The New Year began in superb fashion with the game against London Scottish, in which both sides excelled in open play and counter-attack, producing in the end a good win for us by 31-21. Bedford's scalp fell to us next in an unrelenting, dour game. Then came our W.R.U. Cup visit to Pontypool Park, where our chances of success against the famed "Pooler Eight" were nationally advertised as "minimal". As predicted, Pontypool dominated the game up front, but Cardiff's rock-like defence held firm and

Gerald Davies capitalised on four good movements to score four magnificent tries, in so doing emulating his Lions' Hawkes Bay performance, to steal the game for us 16-11.

February brought heavy frost, ice and bad ground conditions, causing us to cancel the games against Bristol and Heriots F.P., but the inclement weather did not stop us inflicting defeats on London Welsh and Llanelli. Our W.R.U. Cup game at Ebbw Vale, the third Cup game we had been drawn away in Gwent saw us 10-4 down at the interval, but following a stern half-time lecture, a transformed Cardiff became a decisive attacking machine to win the game 29-10.

March arrived with a rearranged game against Newport which was won 12-3 although the Black and Ambers had the greater share of ball possession. The game against Bridgend on the Arms Park followed its now familiar pattern and again we narrowly lost 7-6 in a game in which J. P. R. Williams was undoubtedly Bridgend's "saviour"! Our next visitors were the Lancashire side, Orrell, who played superb Jubilee rugby against us in a game in which we finally ran out good winners.

On Easter Saturday, in front of the largest crowd of the season, Cardiff's initial surge and momentum against the Barbarians was blunted, and then overcome, by a Baa Baas pack well led by England captain Billy Beaumont and a speedy, competent back line. We lost 20-8.

On Easter Monday, a changed Cardiff side, containing many challengers seeking places against Swansea in the next round of the Cup, comfortably disposed of Harlequins 22-6.

Our Cup game against Swansea at Aberavon arrived with the "All Whites" firm favourites after an immense forward carve-up of the Baa Baas on Easter Monday. Swansea dominated up to the last quarter of the game and led 15-3, only to be pressured by a frantic Cardiff blitzkreig in which two magnificent length of the field tries were scored. But at the end of the game it was 18-13 to Swansea, and we wish them well in the Cup Final.

An opportunity to redress the balance occurred in the following week when we disposed of the two Cup Finalist teams. Newport were well beaten 29-8 on Cardiff Arms Park by a rejuvenated pack and some incisive three-quarter play; and Swansea were defeated 16-12 at St. Helen's in a game punctuated by injuries and replacements.

Messrs. Bowes and Nyhan, and others, avidly looked forward to the Cornish Tour, where we stayed in Penzance; and were not disappointed. The Cornish champions were thrust aside in a 46-3 blitz as the Club ran in ten superb tries. Following the traditional Sunday visit to Sennen Cove, a St. Ives side was beaten by 37-0 in driving wind and rain on Monday.

Unfortunately the Club had to send a much depleted side to Neath for the last game of the season and subsequently lost 31-13.

Our brand of running rugby has totalled 152 tries and happily is in keeping with the traditional standards of the Cardiff Club. Leading try scorers are: Pat Daniels (21), T. G. Davies (18), C. Camilleri (15). Highest points scorers are: David Barry (170 pts.), Gareth Davies (99 pts. in 14 games). Certain players have naturally, in consequence of the team's success, attained national honours. On the eve of the Baa Baas game it was announced that Cardiff R.F.C. had six representatives in the Welsh squad to tour Australia in May 1978, namely T. G. Davies, Pat Daniels, Gareth Davies, Terry Holmes, Mike Watkins and Stuart Lane. We offer sincere congratulations, good wishes and "bon voyage" to them all. Likewise again, to Gerald Davies on equalling Ken Jones' record number of caps and to Gareth Edwards on reaching 53 Welsh caps not out. To Barry Nelmes, who deservedly regained his England position, to Mike Watkins and Stuart Lane, who were chosen for Wales B v. France B, we also offer sincere congratulations. In this respect, too, we offer congratulations to our good friend Brynmor Williams, now with Newport. In season 1977-78 to date, seven new first XV caps, reflecting the team's youthful emphasis, have been won by Pat Daniels, Don Llewellyn, David Barry, Terry Holmes, Peter Rawlins, Terry Charles and Glyn Davies.

My personal thanks go to John Davies, my Vice-Chairman, who has supported me wholeheartedly; to Alun Priday, whose expertise has helped me considerably; to Peter Nyhan, Assistant Hon. Secretary, who has proved an able successor in charge of programmes to David Hayward; to Brian Mark, Fixture Secretary, "l'extraordinaire"; to Keith Rowlands, who has represented East District and us so capably; to the Rugby Committee, good men

and true, and in particular to our hard working Selection Committee, and to our Club Coaches John Evans, Chris Padfield and Roger Beard; to Ken George and his conscientious and cooperative office staff; to the Ground Manager, Albert Francis, and all his staff, together with Bill Hardiman; to Mr. Harold Richards, the Club doctors, physios and Club masseurs for their medical expertise; to our Steward and Stewardess, Norman Leworthy and wife, and their bar staff for their wholehearted efforts on our behalf; to the Supporters Club, led by Ted John, for their loyalty and support; to the St. Alban's Band and their conductor, John Williams; to Don Davies and all the Club Stewards; and to all loyal Club members everywhere.

## CARDIFF CRICKET CLUB

#### 1st XI REPORT-SEASON 1976-1977

My season as captain started in October 1976 at the AGM in what can at best be described as an unhappy club.

Some Members called it a revolution, a take-over by the youngsters. It amounted to a new Chairman, a Club Captain who some considered not worthy of a first team place, a secretary who only months before had been unwilling to stand for election, and a committee which had some experienced members but on the whole was young and green.

So what came out of the chaos: A side in which the players enjoyed their cricket and a season in which the Club tasted its first measure of success for a number of years.

There were bad times, which side doesn't have them, but looking back the side found an identity, a Club spirit which carried it through the second half of the season on the crest of a wave, until the final match, when we were brought back to earth with a big bump.

The year started with our first indoor net on Jan 1st. There was a large attendance and things looked rosey. However few first XI players were present and it was decided that those players who did not attend the indoor nets and the numerous outdoor nets before the beginning of the season would not be selected for the first XI. Hence the first match away to Cheltenham saw a side of average age less than 25 take the field. We were defeated as we were in the following 5 fixtures and murmurings were heard from within. However the policy had been made and was carried out and in those 6 matches team spirit was established and the casual players were made to play 2nd and 3rd team cricket.

From that period to the end of the year only one more League fixture was lost, to Brislington, the bottom club, and we finished winning 7 and losing 7 and were placed halfway in the table.

Not a tremendous achievement but what could have happened if we had started as we finished; and let the lessons be learnt, practice is essential, availability is vital and team spirit is paramount.

Performance—wise batting was probably our weakest facet although everybody responded well; John Solanky and Ken Siddle at Clifton in a game we narrowly lost; John Solanky, Howard Slade, Ken Siddle and Brian Pleass at Downend (also a game lost, but 226 to 215 is no disgrace especially against the eventual League Champions); the Captain against St Fagans throwing away a hundred—but great personal satisfaction after being 2 for 2—and then seeing it rain at tea; Ken Williams and and Howard Slades opening stand against Malmesbury; and Brian Pleass winning the game at Chippenham when we were dead and buried.

The bowling was consistent throughout and could not be faulted even in the defeats at the beginning of the season. John Solanky and Dave Cooper bowled well throughout the season, Bob Phipps started well but then faded and David Lewis bowled interestingly and picked up a load of wickets as opposed to Howard Slade who bowled with little luck.

Martin Gallivan also kept wicket consistently throughout.

Overall it was a good balanced side for the first time for many years and gained in confidence as the season progressed.

The highlights of the season were for me the tremendous improvement in fielding thus giving confidence to the bowlers, and this was shown to best effect in the two Cup competitions,

At Barry in the Arthur Patterson Cup we were victorious beating St Fagans in the final in a game which proved we were superior in every aspect of the game and turned out to be a surprisingly easy win.

In the Welsh K.O. Cup we won the area final for the second year running and progressed to the final beating Newtown in the semi final.

We were opposed to Maesteg Celtic on our own ground and whereas the Arthur Patterson final went just as we had planned, in this one nothing went right and we were beaten by a far better side on the day.

However Semi Finals last year Final this year next year who knows, but a little good fortune is required and this must be worked for.

A number of mid week games were played during the season notably against a very strong Old Collegians side and Barbados Wanderers both of whom proved too strong. Good games were had against Melbourne University, Kidderminster, Hutton and the MCC. It was not always possible to field a representative first XI against these sides and it should be put to the players whether they want these plum fixtures and to make themselves available.

Finally a mention must be made of the contribution of John Solanky who rejoined us this year. We did not fire his excitement in the opening games but I know that he enjoyed his cricket towards the end and helped me tremendously as did David Lewis when he returned. I hope David will forgive me for saying that he probably did not bowl his best last year but his enthusiasm and drive had a lot to do with our successes in the latter half of the season.

So to sum up the side had some success, a lot of enjoyment and developed into a well balanced team. We had our critics, I respect those who told me to my face and I ignored the knockers, but I feel we made progress and I hope that this will be carried through to next year and that we will win the Western League and the Welsh Cup and to that end I wish next years captain every success.

My special thanks are due to Ken Siddle who took over as vice captain mid way through the season, to Dave Connors for umpiring so ably and arranging substitutes for our extra games, to Chris Foolkes for keeping an immaculate scorebook through every game and finally to the Ladies for providing the best teas in the League.

#### RESERVE XI REPORT—SEASON 1977

In 1977 the Reserve XI ventured temporarily into League Cricket, alas the Glamorgan Alliance disbanded at the end of the Season. The blooding given to many young players will benefit the club in years ahead but regrettably not in a South Wales League.

Indeed many who played during the year also performed with success in the Firsts and Seconds—very often they found the wickets of the West Country easier to cope with than those of South Wales.

Because the XI was weekly ravaged because of late cry offs by the two senior sides, it was not surprising that teams originally selected rarely appeared, had this been possible results would have been more favourable. As it was the team accounted for itself well, even though the final results do not reflect the ability and expertise of the young players who frequently were facing players of far greater experience. By the end of the Season the experience gained was evident, however, this was seen at Bath and Bristol for the Seconds in the Western League rather than with the Reserves.

It is inevitable when only three teams are run, the third will rarely be able to field a consistent team. During the year 57 players turned out in

League games, the age range was somewhat variable, going from 13 and 14 year olds, such as Chris Day, Richard Lewis, Neil Slater, Gary Hibbert, to somewhat more aged performers such as J. D. H. For the future I would like to see the fixture list strengthened even further and a few more 1st XI players making themselves available for the strong fixtures, such as the Nomads. One realizes the difficulties presented by regular Sunday Cup Matches, but players of the calibre of Roger Davies (not to mention Howard Slade) are worthy of better than 16-year old 3rd XI bowlers. Many Clubs manage to play regular Sunday league Matches.

Finally, this report cannot close without reference to Peter Ford's outstanding feat in smashing his own Club record sandwich aggregate for one Season.

Thanks to all who played and I hope it was as enjoyable for you all to play on a Sunday as it was for me to have the privilege to captain you.


