



Chairman's Report for the Year ending 30th April, 1971

Dear Members,

In presenting the Financial accounts for the year ended 30th April, 1971, I once again have to state that although we are as usual going forward as a fine Sporting Athletic Club, we are going backwards in our Balance Sheets.

Now that the final accounts for the above period have been audited and finalised, I should like to comment on certain items therein and how they compare with the previous year. I am obliged to the General Secretary, Mr. Ken George for the following points:

I shall commence with those items which produce a surplus of revenue and in which most members participate:

Whilst bar prices in certain cases have been increased it has been done mainly to cope with increased costs in supplies so that I consider increased takings of £4,153 can only be attributed to the Triple Crown win and the Fijian game.

Fruit Machine account

The increase in profit amounting to £104 this year was most disappointing and the machines seemed to have lost a certain appeal during the last few months of the year. However, the House Committee will no doubt be discussing any possible changes necessary to improve the situation.

Membership

Total membership has been declining over the past three years as follows:

1969 2,314 1970 1,993 1971 1,870

These figures are extremely disturbing and have an immense adverse effect on income.

R.F.C. Income

In spite of the rise in cost to run the Rugby Football Section, there is an increase on last year of £1,186, but it must be remembered that the admission prices to the general public for the Enclosure and Stands were increased. Furthermore, 24 Home matches were played in the 1970-71 season as compared with 18 Home matches in season 1969-70.

The decrease in profit on programmes sales is mainly due to the fact that we received a substantial amount for the Cardiff v South Africa match on December 13th, 1969.

Home Matches

The increased cost of £1,233 is mainly due to the following:

- (a) The whole of the cost of the Opening President's XV game (approximately £904) has been charged under this heading.
- (b) Catering for extra matches and bar supplies have accounted for the majority of the balance.

Gatemen, Police and Firemen-Increase [495]

Due to the extra matches and more staff, increased costs for gatemen have amounted to approximately £240 and the balance is due to increased costs for police and firemen.

Share of Gates—Increase £275

The increased cost under this heading is £200 for Liverpool and £75 for St. Luke's College.

General Notes on Expenditure

Salaries, Wages and S.E.T.—Increases £1,117.

Office Increases £149 J. Grubenman £300 Gen. Secretary £210 Ground £790

Wages irrecoverable from Develo'nt Fund Additional charge as a full year's salary was not paid to Mr. D. G. Grant

Including casual labour and overtime for sand slitting, relevelling, fertilising new ground, etc.

Less Reduction £332 House Wages $\frac{£1149}{£1117}$

These increases would include increases in statutory payments for insurance stamps etc.

Cleaning Services Clubhouse and Sophia Gardens

The increase of £1,084 should be reduced by the reduction in House Wages of £332 above as the payment was mainly paid for cleaning services although shown in Salaries in the previous year. Extra cleaning has arisen due to the opening of the Skittle Alley Bar.

Overall Deficiency in Revenue Surplus

Whilst the Income and Expenditure Account only reveals a deficit of £3,381, the true drop in revenue surplus is revealed as follows:

Capital Expenditure (Present and Projected)

Whilst one might say that the loss of income from the Development Funds is not so disastrous, as accumulated funds amount to approximately £29,000, it must be appreciated by members that approximately £17,200 out of these funds is now due for payment for :

- (a) Tip up Seats
- (b) Floodlights.
- (c) Alterations to Committee Boxes, Trainers Box and Score Box.
- (d) Kitchen extension and sundries.
- (e) Laying of tarmacadam surface on ash area at rear of tennis courts.

After paying the aforementioned capital and other expenses amounting in all to approximately £17,200, it means that we shall have £11,800 available in cash from investments.

Future Increases in Expenditure

Since the date of this Balance Sheet we have also paid £1,000 more in the first two months of this current year compared with last year representing redecoration to the Clubhouse and Groundsman's Flat, and the repainting of the Tennis Courts.

Insurances will increase by approximately £400 per annum for insurance of the Rugby Stands, and the rating assessment of the Clubhouse and grounds will also substantially increase.

From the Balance Sheet prepared you will observe that our Current Assets more or less are covered by our Current Liabilities viz. approximately £13,000.

You will realise by the above Report that the future requires more members, more support generally, and some very hard thinking in relation to the costs of running the Club.

We can hope for a larger revenue from car parking and the possibility of the allowing of advertisements on the rugby ground, regrettable as that may be in the eyes of the purists.

It would be of great assistance if the members were able to support the Lottery and 200 Club to a much greater extent to say nothing of another Membership Drive.

The New Ground is now settling down as the Cardiff Rugby Club's home. Most of the finishing touches have been completed—I hope to the satisfaction of members and public,—and with the completion of the Skittle Alley, the promises made in the last Annual Report are mostly kept, such as side sheets to stand, plant and equipment store-room and the floodlighting, have now been completed.

The playing surface has exceeded expectations and more matches will be played in the coming season, including most Athletic games.

The opening of the new ground was celebrated by a match which proved a very happy and worthy occasion, which has been commented on in the Rugby Report. Many important guests were present, including eighteen Past Captains of the Club and many well wishers of the Athletic Club.

Friday night matches, all things being equal, have proved successful as extra games and as a source of income.

It has been decided to plant conifers on the west bank to give a pleasant background to the ground. This will take place during September and October, 1971. I anticipate help from some members to complete the venture at very little cost to the Club.

Car Parking

This, as always envisaged in the new Scheme, is now beginning to make its presence felt in the income of the Club and, with further organisation, it should prove one of the much needed future incomes of the Club. Committee is in negotiation with outside bodies to rent off a portion of the parking areas which will, in no way, interfere with the parking amenities for members, unless the membership should increase to a very desirable number.

Committees

I would like on your behalf, and of course, my own, to once again repeat the remarks I have so often made, that this Club owes a great deal to the Honorary Officers and Committee of the various Sections. They devote a great deal of their leisure time, allied with their ability and experience, on behalf of the Club they so willingly serve.

From the President, Mr. N. V. H. Riches, Standing Committee Chairmen, Messrs. J. R. Thomas (Finance). G. L. Porter (House), and L. M. Spence (Ground), right through to the newest elected Committee member, you are assured of their service and loyalty.

My appreciation of the work and support of my Vice-Chairman, Mr. G. L. Porter, who, at all times, has been available to assist.

Our thanks and appreciation to that great Club stalwart, our Honorary Solicitor, Mr. Ewan G. Davies, for his ever ready and welcome advice during the many times we are in need of it.

Our thanks to Mr. Ken George, the General Secretary, who is now settling in to combat all the troubles and tribulations that beset any General Secretary of such a complex Club as ours. He has many meetings to attend apart from normal duties and the problem of pleasing all concerned is a difficult one. All strength to his elbow.

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CARDIFF RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

Report for Season 1970-71

1st XV.

For a Chairman to attempt to write a report on the Club's past season's activities without the statistical help from that Historian Extraordinary, Mr. Danny (Massa) Davies, would be like sailing a boat in a desert, so I am grateful for his help and remarks many of which I have included in this Report.


The most notable feature of the Rugby Club's 1970-71 season was the Opening of the Welsh National Stadium on 17th October, 1976 and our New Club Ground on 31st October, 1970. The former was commemorated by a match between Wales and the R.F.U. President's XV, and the latter between Cardiff and the W.R.U. President's XV. These events were the culmination of long drawn out negotiations between many bodies, but in the main between the Welsh Rugby Union, the Cardiff Athletic Club, the Cardiff City Corporation and the Glamorgan County Cricket Club.

So far as the Rugby Club was concerned, these events created a further and notable landmark in its history since 1876.

In fact, it has been said that it was the next great step in the life of the City of Cardiff since Cathays Park was laid out and when Cardiff became a City in 1905.

The great occasion of the Opening of the New Ground was not blessed by fine weather although the rain held off during the game. It was blessed, however, by many Rugby Guests, including Mr. Kenneth Harris who was kind enough to provide the opposition with a President's Team, selected by Mr. Cliff Jones, Chairman of the Welsh 'Big Five.'

The match was preceded by a Trampoline display by the students of the Cardiff Training College, with a bevy of very attractive young girls in Cardiff jerseys selling programmes to the willing and not so willing members and spectators. The lovely programme sellers provided one difficulty because they all wanted to wear the No. 10 jersey.

My apologies to Peter Goodfellow and Lloyd Williams for excluding their names in the Rugby Report circulated to members.


The Lord Mayor, Alderman T. E. Merrells, kicked off. with rugby aplomb, but just failed to land the ball through the posts into the Flats.

The game that followed was a happy and entertaining one. Cardiff failed to be the perfect hosts and ran out winners by 17 points to 8.

A Celebration Dinner was held at the Park Hotel in the evening, followed by a Dance, which, I believe, was a very happy and successful occasion.

The playing surface has justified the expensive work it received and has provided, judging by the Players' opinion. one of the best playing areas in our long playing history, in its first year. With more work this summer we can be assured of our playing future.

The First Team's playing record revealed that we made somewhat of an indifferent start, and had lost six and drawn three by the end of November, but the most bitter cross to bear was the defeat of the Club in France at the hands of Provence d'Auvergne on November 11th by the biggest defeat in our history by 41 points to 6. I am sure, with the knowledge of our strong fixture list in mind (hardest in the country?) and the calls on Players, our Committee will in future investigate the strength of the opposition before sending teams to France to play Representative, Provincial and other very strong French combinations and so avoid damage to our reputation. They are very serious encounters these days.




From December there was an improvement, and only four more matches were lost up to the end of the season and but for two of these, against Gloucester and the Barbarians in early April, we might have finished third in the un-official Championship table. We lacked the services of our two great players, Barry John and Gareth Edwards for more than half of our matches, but by the end of the season, young players began to show signs of maturity and we can expect much in the future from Gary Samuel, Neil Collins, Alex Finlayson, not forgetting young Martin Pengilley and Steve McCann from our Junior XV amongst the backs. Brian Neck and David Hoyle, if available, will be assets. We also have experienced forwards in the Captain elect, John H. James (who played in three Varsity games for Cambridge), Mervyn John, Mike Knill and Roger Lane who may catch the eyes of the Welsh Selectors next season.

In spite of our indifferent start, we had the best of things against the Welsh Champions Bridgend, Llanelli and our friendly rivals Newport, as the table of results show. The most extraordinary feature of the latter being the amazing feat of Barry John dropping four goals against his former team Llanelli on 28th November, with an obvious hesitation to drop an almost certain fifth he changed his mind and just failed by inches to score near the posts.

The table of results showed that we Played 44, Won 29, Lost 10 and Drew 5 with 699 points For (Oh! for one more to have made 700) and 429 Against. There were a large number of penalty goals against us, 46—some of which can be attributed to the variation in the Laws in recent seasons.

Barry John was top scorer with 114 points (David Hoyle got 83 in 19 matches) and the top try scorers were: P. L. Jones 15, N. Collins and R. Lane 13 each and John Bevan's 11 tries in 10 matches. Roger Lane's 13 equalled that for a forward which was set up by Mervyn John in 1968-69.

Ian Robinson played in all matches except one, 43 in all. Our hard working Captain ran him very close until he suffered injury late in the season, nevertheless, John Hickey played

in 36 and no player could have tried harder for his team, showing a great example in fitness and leadership. Others who played more than 30 games were Roger Lane with 38, Tony Williams 36, Mervyn John and Mike Knill 32 and Meirion Davies 31. Tony Williams was only one short of 300 for his Club, but our most unlucky player must surely be Howard Norris, who, requiring only four 1st team games to beat Alun Priday's record of 410, suffered a long injury in the carly part of the season, but failed to get the Selector's support later, and only played two more games, although having played 15 times for the Athletic and acting as Captain during the long injury of John Davies.

An innovation with the future in mind was to play Bective Rangers under floodlights on the Friday night prior to the Wales-Ireland game, and the Wasps on the morning of the Wales-Fiji game.

The team re-visited Cornwall after many years' absence, winning the three games in fine style and scoring 86 points.

In our 'Sevens' encounters we survived only one round in the Harlequins Tournament and only two in the 'Snelling', being knocked out by Newport in the semi-final. This latter, however, meant that we would take part in the National Sevens next August. The Press reported generally on 'Sevens', that Cardiff had rarely put their best teams into the Sevens Field leaving, shall I say, the Club's policy makers with food for thought.

The Club's heartiest congratulations go to John Bevan, Gareth Edwards and Barry John, not only for their successful participation in Wales' Triple Crown Season, but on their successful selection for the forthcoming British Lions Tour to Australia and New Zealand.

New Caps were awarded to: Neil Collins, Meirion Davies, Gareth Edwards, Mike Knill, Roger Lane, Gary Samuel and Gerald Wallace.

CARDIFF ATHLETIC XV

The final record for the season was: Played 31, Won 22, Lost 6; Drawn 3. Points for, 541; Against, 254.

This is a very similar record to that of 1969-70 when only 6 matches were lost, but John Davies' team of 1969-70 scored more points *i.e.* 656.

Three matches were won by more than 40 points scored. Old Penarthians 41-6, Barry 52-0 and Cwmgwrach 41-3.

John Uzzell was top scorer with 65 points from goals and tries, including 8 goals in the match against Barry, and Lyn Jones and Nick Williams achieved the rare distinction of scoring 6 tries in a match, the former against Cwmgwrach and the latter against Llanelli Wanderers.

The top try scorers were Neil Collins with 11, Nick Williams, 10, Stuart Watkins with 8 and P. Lyn Jones with 7. J. H. James, D. Ken Jones, Ian Lewis and John Regan each scored 5 tries.

John Davies, Captain of the 'Rags' for the third season in succession, was injured in the match with Bridgend Sports on February 6th and C. H. Norris most adequately took over and indeed, was leader of the 'Rags' pack for most of the Matches in which he played. Howard was therefore a most loyal deputy for the Captain and played 15 matches for the Athletic team after he had recovered from a bad leg injury when playing for the Premiers in the Opening Match against the South Wales Police on 5th September.

Elwyn Williams (who has played more than 300 matches for the 1st team) had 21 games, and the next in numbers were Bill Atwill 17, John Davies 16, John Harding 16, Carl Smith 16, John Uzzell 16 and Howard Norris 15.

It is pleasing to note that at least six of our Junior Team played for the Athletic team, they were: Paul Jones, Roger Harris, Steve McCann, Alan Price, Martin Pengilley and Steve Solman. We wish them well in their future seasons with Cardiff. Martin Pengilley scored 11 points for the 1st XV on his debut against Aberavon in the last month of the season.

One of the most interesting items of the 'Rags' season was the very hurriedly arranged match with the French Club Stade Clermontoise on 28th December, 1970, the morning of the Cardiff-Bath match. The Athletic won

11 points to 9. It was almost a last minute arrangement as the French Club had been let down with another Welsh Club. The French party were made Honorary members of the Club for their stay in Cardiff and I am sure they enjoyed their first visit to Cardiff under the guidance of Lucien Picquet.

Roy Bish turned out for the 'Rags' against Barry in the last match of the season.

Athletic Caps were awarded to Peter Davies, David Hoyle, Ian Lewis, John Regan and Stuart Watkins.

After 3 years of meritorious Captaincy, John Davies announced his retirement. He will be missed on and off the field for his sincerity, enthusiasm and sportsmanship. The Club needs men of his integrity and we wish him all good fortune and convey our thanks for his loyalty and efforts on behalf of the 'Rags'.

Merrells, his colleagues and the many high ranking Civil servants who have helped, and I am sure will continue to help this fine History making Club in the centre of this Capital City.

Chairman's Report (Mr. J. D. H. Riches)

The year has seen certain changes in the administration of the section, there being a new Hon. Secretary, Mr. Alun Jones, and the Committee having elected me as their Chairman for the year, following the retirement of Mr. Jack Evans. Another change, to which I have reluctantly agreed, is that it is more fitting that the Report of the Committee should be given by the Chairman rather than by the Hon Secretary, and for this reason I am making this Report.

The Captains of the various teams in their respective Reports have dealt with the performances of their sides on the field during the past season and in this Report I therefore propose to deal largely with the administrative side of the section and the work done by the Committee during the past year.

The General Committee met on ten occasions during the year and the meetings were always well attended. In addition the Equipment Committee met once in the autumn to view the state of the equipment and to decide what was needed for the coming season. The Selection Committee met regularly once a week during the season and the members of this Committee spent many hours deliberating to decide the best teams to represent the club. At their first meeting the General Committee decided that there should be no separate Social Committee, but that future social functions should be organised by the General Committee as a whole. It is, perhaps fitting to report that at their first meeting the Committee took action with regard to the matter raised by Mr. Ossie Herbert at the last Annual General Meeting with regard to the danger of the boards forming the surround of the balcony of the Pavilion and it will have been noted that the boards have been filled in so that it is not possible for small children to climb up the surround.

The Committee have been considering actively the question of entry to a league. This club is in a difficult position, since there are four Saturdays in the year when our ground is not available to us because it is being used by Glamorgan for a championship match. There is, therefore, the problem of not being able to give home and away matches to all clubs who might enter a league, but a possible solution is that the Second XI would play both their matches against certain clubs away, where the opposing clubs have two grounds available, such as Bristol Imperial. Any entry to a league must not weaken our fixture list, if this can be avoided, and members will have noted that our fixture list has been strengthened gradually over the past few years. The fixture list for 1971 is probably even stronger than before and reflects great credit on our Hon. Secretary and his predecessors. However, with so many other clubs in the area joining leagues and alliances, it may well be

that in order to keep a fixture list of the required strength, we shall be forced to enter a league before very long. Representations have recently been made by the Newport Club to meet them to discuss the possible formation of a new league and it is hoped that representatives of your new Committee will meet representatives of the Newport Cricket Committee during November.

Your Committee have been particularly exercised during the year with regard to the use of Sophia Gardens for rugby. The position of the rugby section was made most difficult owing to the troubles which occurred in connection with the new Cardiff rugby ground at the Arms Park. The rugby section was forced to decide that only first XV matches could be played at the Arms Park and, accordingly, all Athletic XV and Youth matches are to be played at Sophia Gardens. Numerous meetings and discussions took place to decide the best position for the rugby pitch, having regard to all interests involved, and, after much heart-searching, your Committee agreed that the rugby pitch at Sophia Gardens for the Season 1970/71 should be in approximately the same position as for the previous season. While this means that rugby is played across the second cricket square, the main cricket ground including the outfield, is left untouched. This was considered the best alternative, having regard to the claims of County cricket and our 1st XI on the ground. Your Committee has also agreed, in view of the special circumstances, that rugby should be played at Sophia Gardens until the end of April. For this reason there will not be two cricket matches at Sophia Gardens in 1971 on the same day until June to allow the ground staff the whole of May to repair the second square after the rugby season. Your Committee have asked the Management Committee that the groundsmen should be given special instructions to give priority to the second square during May of next year so that it will be fit for play in June.

During last winter Mr. Hugh Williams acted as our representative on the Sub-Committee, with a member of the hockey section and the head groundsman, to decide on the fitness for play of the hockey ground at Sophia Gardens when there was any doubt. Apart from one occasion when Mr. Williams was not consulted and hockey was played on an unfit ground the arrangements worked well. The Ground Committee of the Athletic Club took the necessary action to reduce the number of hockey matches played in the immediate future after one pitch had been damaged, and the outfield recovered well for the cricket season.

It has disturbed your Committee to see the amount of press publicity which is given to the Saturday leagues and the local midweek leagues, whereas little or no publicity is given to clubs such as ourselves, who play only friendly matches. Representatives of your Committee have spoken to representatives of the press on the matter, but the answer made is always that priority will be given to the reporting of competitive cricket. However, your Committee will strive to obtain the maximum press coverage for our matches next season.

The club scoreboard has been a great cause of concern and the cannibalisation of the score box has not helped the position. Your Committee are now hopeful that the whole of the club's score box can be made mobile by being placed on a caravan chassis so that the score box can be placed nearer the field of play when the pitch is sited at the far end of the square from the pavilion. Your Committee are also investigating a change in the system of numbering so that this can be worked readily by the scorers from the inside of the score box which is not now possible except by a contortionist. During the year plates have been obtained for the second score board for use when two games are being played at Sophia Gardens. The thanks of the Committee are due to Mr. Harry Shewring for obtaining the steel plates and to Mr. K. D. Williams for arranging the painting of the plates. The plates were not received until the latter part of the season, but they have proved most satisfactory since they have been in use. The cost of the purchase of the plates and the painting thereof has been borne by our cricket section fund. Earlier in the season the Glamorgan County Cricket Club had kindly allowed us to use their number plates, when there were two games on the ground, and we are most grateful.

Your Committee also considered whether it would be possible and advisable to hold a cricket week in 1971 on similar lines to the cricket week held during the Centenary Year. In view of the difficulty in raising truly representative teams for midweek matches, it was decided that no cricket week would be held next season. During the past season the number of midweek games has been greatly reduced and this has eased the strain, not only on the captain of the 1st XI in trying to raise teams of sufficient strength, but also on our ladies who provide the catering.

Recently your Hon. Secretary and myself attended the first General Meeting of the Welsh Cricket Association at Llandrindod Wells. Mr. Alun Jones was appointed to the Executive Committee which will mean that this club will be kept in close touch with the activities of the Association. The Association is at the present time in its infancy and I do not see this club deriving any benefit from the Association in the immediate future. However, as the Association becomes more firmly established, it will be eligible to receive Government Grants either through the National Cricket Association or direct, presumably, from the Welsh Office. When this stage is reached it appears that it will be possible for this club to obtain Grants for youth coaching and other facilities for young cricketers. I, therefore, feel that this club, and all clubs in Wales, should take an active interest in the affairs of the Association.

Although I have said that I do not propose to deal with the playing aspect of the season in this report, I must record the pleasure of the Committee that the 1st XI won its first three matches in the National Club Knock-out Competition before being beaten by Cheltenham, who were the eventual winners of the Competition. The captain and his team are to be congratulated on doing so well and the club will be

taking part in this Competition again next year. I feel that with plenty of determination and a little luck there is no reason why the club should not go even further in the Competition next year.

On Friday evenings, during the season, the youth practice section was held and the Committee are most grateful to Mr. K. D. Williams for his unflagging zeal in connection with youth matters. We were also fortunate to obtain the services of Mr. Stan Montgomery as coach on some occasions and his wise counsel was greatly valued. The benefit which the club derives from fostering young players is being shown by the progress of junior members recently in the youth side who have played during the past season in the 1st and 2nd XIs.

The social activities of the section started with a dance at the Athletic Club last November. While those who attended had an enjovable evening, the attendance was disappointingly small. There seemed to be a lack of interest on the part of members; also the timing of the dance was probably ill-advised following closely on the Annual Dinner and the Annual General Meeting. A cocktail party was held in March at Ty Maeth, as in recent previous years, and this again proved to be a great social and financial success. During the winter the House Committee of the Athletic Club organised an inter-section sports quiz in which we took part. After winning one round our team were beaten by the golf section, thanks to the skill of a former playing member of the cricket section, Mr. Ken Osment. At the request of members of the Athletic Club at the Annual General Meeting, held in September. 1969, the Management Committee set up an Entertainment Committee of the club on which two members of each section serve. Your Committee appointed Mr. David Herbert and Mr. Gwyn Stone to be the representatives of the cricket section on this Committee and their efforts to provide entertainment of a greater variety for the members of the club in general are much appreciated.

Finally, our Annual Dinner again proved a success and was enjoyed by all who attended. We heard speeches from visiting speakers, Mr. David Parry Jones and Mr. Don Shepherd, in addition to the speeches of the club captain, Mr. K. D. Williams and Mr. Wyndham Lewis, who proposed the health of the guests with his usual skill and fluency.

Your Committee are still concerned that there is not sufficient regular attendance at practice and the Committee hope that all playing members will make a special effort next season to attend at practice at least one night a week. The question of bar duty is also a continuing problem and it is apparent that the duties are being left to a small minority of members. Although the social functions were successful, there is an impression of apathy generally in the section. It is being left to a few willing and enthusiastic members to carry the burden and, if all members will make a greater effort to enter fully into the activities and work of the section, I feel sure that this will result not only in a more even distribution of labour, but also in greater success on the field.

During the summer a new General Secretary of the Athletic Club, Mr. Ken George, was appointed and we welcome him to the club. We thank him for his work for the section so far and the Committee also thank the head groundsman and his staff for their efforts on our behalf. I thank the Committee for their hard work and diligent attendance at meetings throughout the year and special mention must be made of our Hon. Secretary, Mr. Alun Jones. It is inevitable, that however much work other members of the Committee and the section may do, the bulk of the administration of the section must fall on the Hon. Secretary and we much appreciate his efforts on our behalf. Our ladies have again contributed greatly to our well being by serving delicious teas and on behalf of the Committee I thank all those members of the cricket section and others who during the past year, to a greater or lesser extent, have helped to keep the club flourishing.

Cricket Club Captain's Report

Played 27. Won 9. Lost 5. Drawn 12. Abandoned 1.

A large number of games were played with nearly half resulting in draws. This situation will certainly change with the formation of a new league and cricket played on an overs basis.

As many as 35 players represented the 1st XI. Without a settled side it must be difficult to be successful at all times. Only five members played in two thirds of the games or more. Thus a settled batting order was impossible with serious effects on individual batsmen. It may well be a more sensible policy to select those players who are available on all occasions.

It might be worth mentioning that net practice was very poorly attended — some first eleven players not even attending half a dozen nets throughout the summer. If selection depended on attendance at nets on either Monday or Thursday, then results might improve rapidly.

Five matches were lost, four of them on consecutive weekends to Newport, Bristol Imperial and Cheltenham (twice). On each occasion the batting was not good enough and the opposition was able to make the runs, batting second.

The second Cheltenham defeat was our exit from the National Knock-out Competition and they must be congratulated on their

success in the final at Lord's. We were a little unlucky to lose, but the opposition, who at one time barely expected to win, were a better equipped side.

The fifth defeat was a mid-week match against Wiltshire Moonrakers who were able to bowl us out for only 93, in spite of the fact that eight fairly regular players were available.

One reason for the large number of draws may have been the new opposition. In the case of Lansdown, Chippenham and Westbury, a cautious approach was adopted by both sides almost testing the opposition out and draws were inevitable.

It was only in the last four matches that easy wins were obtained against Ebbw Vale, Neath, Stroud and Hereford. In each case the wicket was worn and turned considerably. Cardiff were able to make runs in each case, but of the four sides mentioned only one could reach 100.

The outstanding individual player was again G. B. Shaw who took 26 wickets for 151 runs in the last four matches. On nine occasions in 27 games he took five or more wickets and only once in two years has he failed to take a wicket in a match. His total of 91 wickets was an outstanding achievement.

Of the other bowlers, Alan Priday bowled steadily with less success than in 1969. Ken Brown provided a welcome variation to the attack as a slow left armer and although not available often, he had two or three successful matches. John Solanky took time to settle down but a very good spell in the abandoned game with Newport showed his ability — 12 overs, 5 maidens, four wickets for 8 runs.

The batting averages show that the runs were well shared, but special mention must be made of PeterStimpson who earned a contract with Worcestershire and his brother Alan who replaced him so ably.

John Solanky had a series of disappointing innings, but made three fifties in his last four innings. Seven players reached individual fifties, a great improvement on last year.

The fielding was no more than adequate, but Derek Pask, especially in the dry weather, seemed to keep better than in any of his seven years with the club.

The youth eleven has begun to make itself felt in the first team with Nigel Diggins and Alan Wilkins playing in several matches and performing creditably. Many others represented the other club sides with good results. Providing this side is allowed to play it can provide our first eleven with a regular supply of players.

An almost ever present umpire, Neil Baddeley and scorers Jack Evans, Alun Jones and Martyn Gallivan must be thanked for their services. The Ladies Committee deserve special mention for the teas they prepare so expertly. Finally, to the Vice-Captain David Herbert, Secretary, Alun Jones and most of all our Chairman, John Riches, many thanks for their help throughout the year.

SECOND XI

The playing record reads:- games played 19; won 7; drawn 8; lost 3; abandoned 1; and it is true to say that 1970 turned out to be a season where the second eleven flattered only to deceive. Of the first eight games we recorded six victories and were very much on the right end of the two fixtures that were drawn, whereas in the final eleven games we managed only one victory, a number of boring draws and three losses. It is worth noting that so far as the drawn games were concerned, without our making any mammoth totals, on average we bowled nine overs less per fixture than our opponents, due primarily to the fact that we just did not score our runs at a quick enough pace whilst we were at the wicket, Our bowling, while being quite steady, unfortunately, usually lacked the penetration to dismiss the opposition in the shortened time available, with the inevitable inconclusive result.

We commenced the season with three successive eight wicket victories against Lydney, Chippenham and Bath. The combination of early season damp wickets coupled with the seam attack of Nick Billing,



Paul Griffiths and Malcolm Page proved too much for the opposition, and our batsmen had little trouble in scoring the runs required.

Against Bristol Imperial we played an overs game and with the runs and wickets being shared about we recorded a 108 run victory. Thanks to a good bowling performance by John Riches, who took 6-47, we bowled out Bristol University for 155, who, up until the last ball, were chasing our score of 181 for 4 wickets. Our main run getters in this game were Iqbal Azim and David Edwards who both passed fifty.

Between the two Bristol games draws were recorded at Lansdown, where we had half an hour against their last pair without being able to separate them, Eddie Donovan having scored 70. At St. Fagans, in a endeavour to let Iqbal Azim score a century (97 not out), our declaration was delayed too long and again we were unable to dismiss their last man. My thanks should be recorded to our other nameless colonial, who for reasons best known to himself, decided to monopolise the strike in the final twenty minutes of our innings with Iqbal needing about a dozen runs to obtain his ton. A seven wicket victory ensued against Keynshan where we passed their score of 146, thanks mainly to a solid fifty from Nigel Rees.

Drawn matches then took place against Newport, Bristol Imperial, Choristers, St. Fagans and Westbury-on-Trym. In these games Eddie Donovan, David Edwards and Iqbal Azim were among the runs, and Steven Cotter, John Riches and Brian Corbett picked up wickets when they were somewhat as a premium.

In the latter part of the season we seemed to run out of steam and lost aginst St. Fagans by 39 runs, Ebbw Vale by seven wickets and Hereford by six wickets where our batting was just not good enough. The only bright spot at this stage in the season was a nine wicket victory at Winget, where our openers Malcolm Page and Eddie Donovan only just failed to pass their total of 107 in just over the hour. It was a real pleasure to see the bat thrown at the ball in anger.

Of the people who represented the side regularly, the main run getters were Iqbal Azim (who averaged over 50 per innings), Eddie Donovan, David Edwards and Malcolm Page. The principal wicket takers were Nick Billing, John Riches, Paul Griffiths and Malcolm Page. It was especially pleasing to see Nick Billing as a leading wicket taker as he is a new young member of the side and it should be recorded that two others of the younger generation, Alan Stimpson and Nigel Diggins, were very soon lost by us in favour of the 1st XI.

My thanks to our umpire and scorer Peter Child and Jack Edwards for their 100% attendance and I know that on behalf of the side as a whole I must record a very hearty vote of thanks to the ladies for their unstinting efforts in preparing what is, without doubt, the best tea in South Wales club cricket.


Obituary





The club had a magnificent start to the season with all four teams winning most of their matches. In fact, at one stage, the fourth team had the best playing record which caused good spirited embarrassment to the other captains. Older members tried to cast their minds back to previous seasons in an effort to remember such a good start to a season but all were agreed this season must have been the best.

Unfortunately this successful playing record was not maintained after early November for two reasons. Firstly, the weather during this month and the month of January was so bad that many matches, both home and away, had to be cancelled. The continuous non-playing of matches Saturday after Saturday caused disinterest and lowering of playing standards. Secondly, by the end of December we lost, mainly through transfers of employment, thirteen active playing members. This year, they did, but lost narrowly 1-2 to Lisnargarvey, the Club Champions of Ireland, who were placed fifth in the European Club Championship of last season. The play of the team was all the more commendable and praiseworthy because at the eleventh hour, Michael Giddy, one of the fullbacks, had to withdraw through being detained in London on a business conference and Graham Clark, the other full-back,

I feel we should all congratulate Chris Glenny on gaining his first international cap. This is all the more meritorious when one remembers that Chris did not go to a hockey playing school. He learnt the rudiments of the game through his father, himself an ex England trialist, teaching his son in their back garden followed by learning more about the game through playing with the lower sides of the club. From then on he graduated into the higher class sides which eventually led him to play for Wales v Poland last May.

Under 22 XI

Before the season started it was decided by the committee to form an under 22 XI and to choose its captain. This idea was prompted by the number of schoolboys attending training and practice and being available for the odd game with any of the club sides. Owing to the inclement weather we can experience during the winter months, which sometimes necessitates matches having to be cancelled, also to preserve the cricket outfield during the second half of our season, the committee has decided to reserve the all weather pitch at the National Sports Centre for every Saturday during the months of January, February and March. This will enable at least one of our two home matches to be played if Sophia Gardens is unfit for play, but if the ground is fit one of our home teams will still play on the all weather pitch. This, we are sure, will help in not over-using the ground and thereby help the ground staff in their work.

Social Functions

A Cocktail Party was held at the beginning of the season at Sophia Gardens. Whilst it was not successful numerically, those that did attend enjoyed themselves very much.

Our Christmas Dance was even more successful than in recent past years. I feel sure this was partly due to the fact we had a band instead of a group which enabled us to have a more party atmosphere. This was confirmed by the comments that were made afterwards. The occasion offered an opportunity to say farewell to Dick Osborne who returned to Australia a few days later after being a member for exactly one year. During this time he made himself most popular very quickly, and we thank him for the kind words he said about us at the end of the evening.

We thank Roger Freeman and his sub-committee for all their efforts in organising these two functions.

Our appreciation goes without saying to the Chairman, the General Secretary and the Management Committee for all their work for and support of our section. Also, our thanks are due to the ground staff for their efforts in providing even better pitches than hitherto.

To Miss 'Babs' Filer and her staff our grateful thanks for the most enjoyable buffet supper provided at our dance, also for their considerate and courteous service.

Finally, but by no means least, I should like to thank the section committee of R. Goddard, J. Marshall, N. Pallot and J. Roberts and in particular our Secretary, A. Rhys-Jones and Fixture Secretary P. Sparkes for all their industriousness throughout the season.

FIRST TEAM CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The Club's First XI had a very successful season, both in record and enjoyment of the game.

As well as the successes in other competitions, already mentioned by the Chairman, we won the Penarth six-a-side tournament and were runners-up in the Imperial six-a-side competition. This competition is probably the biggest and most important in the West Country.

But success in amateur sport is not necessarily commensurate with the number of pots a team has won. This year the First XI was successful in other ways. At times the team played hockey of such a high calibre that one elder statesman of the club said that it was the best Cardiff team he had ever seen. Certainly, the emphasis was on teamwork; the simple direct hockey we played brought all the ten field players into positions of consequence. There was no hiding of weak links because there were none; and there was no relying on two or

three stars because even the former weak links became stars in the context of our teamwork. It was not always like this, but when the team clicked into top gear it earned praise from even the most hardened English critics.

Greater even than this, was the reputation won for sportsmanship on and off the field. Our recently tarnished reputation has been refurbished. All this from a team whose average age was 24.

There were several matches in which the team played above themselves. The first was at Hounslow, one of the best and most formidable clubs in Great Britain. In a great rear-guard action, Cardiff defended bravely to earn a draw. Against Newport later in the season, we slipped into overdrive to win 7-0, always a cause of joy for any section of the Athletic Club. The victory over Bath by five goals to one really confirmed the class of the side.

After Christmas the team's record is not so impressive. The rain, snow and ice of winter do not make for uniform conditions, nor regular match practice. No two weeks were alike, and consequently the teamwork, the foundation of success, was dissipated by inaction and subsequently lack of confidence. Nevertheless, we managed to win several important games but the manner of these victories was less satisfying than those of the heady pre-Christmas games. Ultimately, in amateur sport it must be this satisfaction of winning by playing well that is all important.

SECOND TEAM CAPTAIN'S REPORT

At the beginning of the season, some very good results were achieved against some very good opposition. Unfortunately the weather just before Christmas created havoc with our fixtures, more than the other sides after which we lost several key men who had either stepped up to the 1st XI or had left the area. From lack of match practice we lost our momentum.
