

Chairman's Report for the Year ending 30th April, 1969

Dear Members,

At the conclusion of that section of my last year's report which dealt with the finances I said: "This year has seen the start of a period of reconstruction which obviously will make inroads into the Club's financial resources. The support of all members is essential to the financial well-being of the Club during this period—a period which will be trying in the extreme to the Club as a whole and to its Members as individuals".

A careful study of the Income and Expenditure Account will bring home to Members the fact that your support is vitally necessary to your Club! Very shortly, after the start of the last financial year, it became apparent that the Club faced a loss of £7,500 on its year's working. The Management Committee, together with the Standing Committees, took immediate decisions to remedy the position for the future. Some of these decisions took immediate effect, others did not take effect until 1st May, 1969. I will defer dealing with these decisions until later in this Report.

The Income and Expenditure Account for the year ended 30th April, 1969, reveals a deficit of £6,065--the highest deficit ever recorded. A study of the various items of income shows the far reaching effects of the reconstruction period of the redevelopment scheme. Income from football gates at £7.671 shows a drop of £1,718, brought about in the main by the temporary loss of all covered accommodation in the field, the temporary loss of the floodlights and the poor start to the season by the 1st XV. Very early kick-offs were necessary for certain mid-week matches, and the receipts for the Pontypool and Newbridge games were in tens of pounds instead of hundreds. The Pontypridd and Penarth matches clashed with televised international matches and the gate receipts were only a percentage of the match expenses. In addition, the mid-week Cape Town University game was not the money spinner that was envisaged when the fixture was first made. The income from season tickets shows a drop of £352 and is purely on field seasons again caused by the loss of covered accommodation.

Profit on sale of programmes shows a drop of £321. This is related to the previous two items, but, in addition, the previous year's figures included an amount of £174—the profit on the East Wales v. New Zealand match programmes.

The drop in income from the Snelling Sevens Tournament reflects the loss of stand accommodation and covered field accommodation, as the day of the Tournament was one of the wettest on record.

Car park receipts show a net loss of £530 and were brought about by the loss of the following parking areas:

Park Street, the river bank, the North Stand and the Quay Street entrance. The loss of these areas is only temporary and they will again be available to the Club on the completion of the present building programme. Your Committee did arrange for the construction of temporary car parking areas to the west of the Clubhouse during the re-construction period, but these temporary areas only give us twenty-three per cent. of our previous capacity.

Bar takings show a drop of £5,311 and fruit machines a drop of £478. These losses are related to the small attendances at rugby matches and the inconvenience experienced by the members during the year.

This year the Club did not receive the £1,000 donation from the Greyhound Company. This is because of the future financial arrangements for Cardiff Arms Park. In all, the Club suffered a total drop in income of £9,715. But for certain savings on the expenditure side of the account the loss would have been far greater than it actually was. Certain items of expenditure did increase. The cost of "Upkeep of Grounds and Clubhouse" went up by £578 and the main items of football expenditure also increased, the highest increase being £516 for away match expenses, brought about by the Scottish tour and the Headingly fixture.

Now to the decisions taken by the various committees to improve the finances. Firstly, those that had an immediate effect.

In previous reports I have mentioned that it was necessary to employ two extra groundsmen during the transitional period and that this position would be reviewed in 1970. In the autumn of last year, the Ground Committee considered the purchase of a set of "close cut" gang mowers at a cost of £503, for delivery in the spring of 1969, with a view to making an immediate cut back in the staff. This recommendation was approved by the Management Committee and two groundsmen left our employment—one in October, 1968, the other in February, 1969. This saved the Club £500 in the last financial year and in future years should save the Club between £1,500 and £2,000 per annum. In addition, changes have recently been made to the framework of the part-time staff employed, which will institute a further small saving.

The House Committee spent many hours at the commencement of the year in breaking down individual prices, both for liquid refreshments and food. As from 1st July, 1968, increases in the prices of certain alcoholic refreshments came into effect. As far as the catering was concerned, it was felt that this should no longer be a service to members at no profit to the Club and all prices were therefore increased by fourteen per cent. from the same date. The catering is now making a net profit, but the food served is still excellent value for the prices charged.

In January, 1969, the House Committee decided to increase the charges for the hire of the Top Lounge.

The Rugby Committee was able to cut back on the number of Gatemen, Police and Firemen in attendance at Matches and also discontinue certain items of pre-match advertising.

The other Sections have drastically cut back on expenditure and there is far more evidence of "self-help" in operation.

Secondly, the decisions which will take effect during the next financial year. After long discussion, the Management Committee was forced to take the decision to increase the rates of Membership Subscriptions — the first increase since 1962. You will, by now, have realised that this increase will not on its own solve the financial problems that were facing the Club this time last year. In addition, Season-ticket prices have been increased, together with the Prices of Admission for the First XV matches for next season.

The Football Committee has decided to discontinue the running of the Extra XV, although this decision was not taken primarily for financial reasons.

When the Welsh Rugby Union requested the Club to agree to a deferment in the completion of the Club's new facilities, it was pointed out that if the transitional period was extended for a much longer period than was at first envisaged, the Club would be financially crippled and it was therefore necessary for the Welsh Rugby Union to accept financial responsibility for the main stadium at an earlier date than the completion date. The Welsh Rugby Union agreed to accept financial responsibility from the 1st September, 1969. The first XV will continue to play all matches there until such time as the Club's new ground is finally completed. In addition, the Welsh Rugby Union will also be responsible for any extra operating costs falling on the Club due to any extension of the transitional period.

Despite the loss on the year of £6,065, it has been possible to place money on one side for future development. During the year the weekly Lottery made a net profit of £2,871 and the "200" Clubs, instituted for the first time, made a net profit of £1,546. All in all, a total of £4,417, and a sum of £22,970 is now earmarked for future development. The Club's investments only exceed this figure by an amount of £2,556. Ten years ago, at 30th April, 1959, with only £665 standing to the credit of the Development Fund, the Club's investments totalled £10,277.

Subscriptions

The increase in the subscriptions, regretted and reluctantly agreed by the Management Committee has been found necessary by the steady, consistent increase in costs of which S.E.T. is only a part, although the cost of S.E.T. to the Club with the increase now imminent, will be £2,000. With wages and all services and costings on the increase, it was no longer possible to postpone the first increase for seven years.

It has been thought by many people that as big rugby, etc., has now become big business, a purely business approach would solve the problem during the transitional stage and for the future. I would like to point out, however, that as an amateur body concerned chiefly with the Welsh Rugby Union we are unable to accept business sponsors for matches, we are not allowed to increase income by allowing advertisement hoardings, etc., on our ground or take part in any business undertaking that would contravene the strict amateur laws.

Our Clubhouse Licence does not include Public entertainment of any nature, such as Public Dances, Cabaret Shows, Public Bingo, Gambling, etc., so that our only income is that which has been in vogue for many years.

We can, however, continue to offer to old and new members, membership of one of the greatest Rugby Clubs in the World, a seat in the Stand for all Home games on our fixture list unless otherwise stated, and every service possible for tickets for Home International matches. There are four Cricket teams, four Hockey teams, three Rugby teams, Tennis and Bowls, a Golfing Society, Skittle Teams and a very enthusiastic Choir.

In addition, a magnificent ground at Sophia Gardens and a new rugby ground to follow at Cardiff Arms Park.

Also the very good catering for lunches and refreshments for Members' Private parties at a low cost, with the finest sandwiches in Europe, plus the Rugby atmosphere of Bars and Trophy Room. This, plus low cost car parking—with free parking for luncheon members and free car parking during evenings, all day Saturday (during Summer) and Sundays, with, we hope, Squash Courts to follow in the near future as a possible extra Section. All this, in spite of the increased subscription for less than a packet of ten cigarettes per week.

Fifty years ago the subscription was two guineas just to join the Rugby Section without any other amenities whatsoever. There were in 1905-6-7 nearly 2,000 members.

The Management Committee has considered the position of our "Senior Citizen" members and has decided that any of them who so desire, may apply to the Committee for a reduced subscription.

New Ground.

There is little more to report at this moment than there was last year except to comment on the good rate of progress in building the colossus. This will bring nearer the completion of our ground and in the meantime we will continue to play the first team games on the Main Stadium and the new ground at Cardiff Arms Park and Sophia Gardens for our Athletic XV and Junior XV.

As soon as the seating on the portion of the new Stand is completed the Welsh Rugby Union will commence on our South Stand. They hope to use their new North Stand for the Cardiff/South Africa game in December and the Wales/South Africa game in January.

I am pleased to say that members of the Cardiff Athletic Club have, I understand, led the field in the purchase of Debentures.

Staff

With Mr. David Grant still organising, with Mr. John Grubenman, the weekly prize draw and the "200" Club (apart from his other multitudinous duties), I once again have nothing but praise for his efforts on behalf of the Club when it is realised that through these efforts, and offsetting the loss of £6,065 for the year's working, the result is a sum of £4,417 to invest for future development.

It is not just a habit to praise our office staff—they have once again proved efficient, willing and have taken on any extra work with pleasure—so thanks to Miss Anne Davies, the Chief Clerk, Susan Allen and Angela Donovan for their unstinted support.

Cardiff Athletic Club Choir

The Choir's officers are: W. A. Carter, Chairman; Emlyn Thomas, Secretary; Graham Coles, Treasurer.

The Choir entered its third year with the annual outing which was held at the Fontygary Country Club, where all members thoroughly enjoyed a musical evening and supper in a very relaxed atmosphere.

It was decided that the Choir should now have its own distinctive tie and this has been achieved. Each Monday evening it will be noticed in the Club that Choir members are attired in the proper dress, wearing their own tie.

During the past twelve months the Club has chiefly been engaged in building up a repertoire of various items to enable the Choir to hold concerts and perform various functions in the future. Several enjoyable social evenings have been held in the lounge which has given members of the Choir and their wives the opportunity of getting to know one another and these social evenings have also been enjoyed by Club members in general with benefits to bar takings.

One of the highlights of the past year has been a visit from the well known Gentlemen Songsters from Tonyrefail, who spent an enjoyable evening with our Choir rendering items of their own and joining in with our own members in a very pleasing impromptu concert.

One or two charity concerts have been given in the Cardiff district and a contribution was made towards the late Mr. Peter Walsh, the rugby referee.

Among other outdoor engagements have been concerts at the Ty Celyn Secondary Modern School, a social evening and a couple of concerts at the Indoor Bowling Club; the latter one in particular being devoted to the entertainment of the English Ladies International Bowling Team who were delighted with the rendering of the various numbers.

We are still anxious for any new members to join the Choral Section and, at the same time, would draw attention to the fact that the services of the Club Choir are available for any function the sections may wish to hold in the Club, and would be delighted to oblige anyone who would care to contact Mr. Stan Thomas, the present Chairman or the Club Secretary.

Golfing Society

The Society had a very good season last year with three successful meetings at the Royal Porthcawl, Cardiff and Radyr Golf Clubs and concluded the season with a very enjoyable time at the Annual Dinner.

At the General Meeting, Austin C. Thomas was elected Captain and they are in the middle of another good season.

The Golfing Society would be very interested to hear from any members of the Athletic Club who wish to become members. On a personal note, I would like to thank the following members of the club for their services and help in the construction of the above room, in which they helped in the best possible manner, proving their loyalty as club members and giving assistance to myself: John Webb, of Osborne V. Webb and Partners, for his excellent plans and supervision; Mr. Evan G. Jones, Main Contractors; Richard Beer, of Hartlowes Furnishings Ltd.; Don Stokes of Stokes Decorators, for his generosity; S. Shepherd of Welsh Glass Works; and Arran Lermon, for providing the expert services of a window dresser at no cost.

Committees

The President, Mr. N. V. H. Riches, the Management Committee and all Standing Committees once again met regularly, with the three Chairmen of Standing Committees, Mr. J. R. Thomas, Mr. L. M. Spence and Mr. G. L. Porter, on the ball as usual. Mr. G. L. Porter, as Vice-Chairman of the Management Committee, was always in support and available at all times to be called on. I appreciate the support I received from all committees during this last year.

Bar Staff

With the Catering and Bar Staff as ever efficient with smiling service and Miss Filer with her control of Catering and Staff as good as ever, all Members and visitors were given a Cardiff Club welcome.

Ground staff

Extra work and general upheaval did not dismay Les Gerry and his staff, and a great deal of work and improvements were carried out with cheerfulness and success.

Report for Season 1968-69

Cardiff 1st XV

The team got off to a fine start by winning, on 4th September, the first ever Sevens Tournament organised at Twickenham by the Harlequins Club. Our congratulations to Tony Williams and his magnificent six, on this fine achievement. Reports were received from various clubs and spectators that the Sevens display by Cardiff on that day was the finest seen for many years.

September, as far as fifteen-a-side rugby was concerned, was not very encouraging for the first XV. Eight matches were played, resulting in four wins and four defeats. We lost to Bridgend, Coventry, Gloucester and Aberavon. Without a doubt, this was the worst start to a season for many years.

One fact emerged from our opening months: we were badly affected by injuries. Surely the time is very near when substitutes must be brought in for injured players in club matches. Three matches during September resulted in us being reduced to fourteen men before half-time.

The opening months also saw us lose to the professional ranks, two wingers, Keri Jones (recently returned from the Lions tour to South Africa) and Frank Wilson. We were sorry to see them go, but wish them well "up North".

October and November proved to be better months for the club, and only two defeats resulted, both against our old rivals, Newport. We had some excellent victories, particularly against Cambridge and Oxford Universities. We also accepted an invitation to play the Provence of Auvergne, in France, on their "National Heroes Day", 11th November. A fine victory was achieved here by 20-6, which compensated somewhat for our tour in France at the end of last season, when we lost two of the three matches played.

The French were very impressed by our play, and are endeavouring to make this an annual fixture each "Heroes Day", which is a national holiday in France.

In December, we lost our first match, somewhat surprisingly, against Swansea. Some fine victories followed against the South African Universities Touring Side, Galashiels and Liverpool.

The final game in 1968 saw us win an excellent match against London Welsh. This game was one of the very few played in Wales on that day, and full credit must go to both sides for agreeing to play on a surface which was hard in parts. Thanks must also be extended to the crowd of volunteers who assisted the ground staff and committee in getting the pitch firstly covered, and then, just prior to kick-off, removing the straw.


This victory gave us the double over the London Welsh, as we had won earlier in the season in London.

A short tour to Scotland at the New Year saw two good victories over Galashiels and Watsonians. The Watsonians were very pleased to see us again in Scotland—the last match between our clubs in Scotland being in 1957.

We had a tremendous game at Coventry on 11th January, losing finally by 14-11. Our team received great acclaim from the Press for their excellent performance, particularly for the clean play in what is usually a "rough and tough" battle. We were also honoured by a letter received, shortly afterwards, from the Coventry committee, expressing their greatest respect for our team performance and behaviour on the field in what could easily have been a "blood bath".

February gave us three games and three victories over Pontypridd, Bristol and Llanelli. The Llanelli match, played away in almost monsoon conditions, gave us a notable double over the Scarlets. Gareth Edwards kicked two penalties out of the mud, for our 6-nil victory.

The 1st March saw us lose our third game of the season to Newport, when a penalty in the last minute, from in front of the posts, could have given us a 6-6 draw. This kick, unfortunately, just missed and the stage was then set for Newport's effort to beat us, for the first time ever, four times in a season.



Three victories followed in March, including a game against Swansea, which was won 27-11. Barry John made history by being the first player to wear a microphone during part of the game. This was used for a documentary film which was later seen on television.

Easter Saturday saw again the visit of the Barbarians. One of the best games took place before one of our biggest gates, and we ran out worthy winners by 20-16. The lead changed hands several times, until Howard Norris scored one of his rare tries, just when it was needed, to put the issue fairly safe. Gareth Edwards was unable to play, and Billy Hullin was in the Barbarians side. We were rather apprehensive about the scrum half position, but Gary Samuels (Sambo) played one of his best games ever for the club. This bears out the statement, made many years ago, by one of our old captains, Haydn Tanner, who said: "The strength of the first fifteen, lies in the strength of its reserves". We are extremely grateful for the players who turn out each week for the "Rags", when many of them could easily be playing first class rugby with other clubs.

Wednesday, 16th April arrived—our last home match of the season. Our opponents—Newport, three up and one to play, hoping for that elusive four wins in a season over us.

We had easily the biggest gate of the season, and at half time were leading by 9 points to 3. Two penalties and a try from Gareth Edwards made up our score. Within minutes of the restart, Newport, now with a very strong wind behind them, scored a try. After fifteen minutes they had levelled the scores to 9-9, and for the last twenty minutes or so seemed to be camped permanently in our twenty-five.

The team tackled and covered like men possessed: at one time it seemed that Newport had thirty players on the field, and the pressure they exerted was continuous. The minutes ticked slowly by, and after what seemed like hours of nailbiting, the final whistle went, and that was that, a 9-all draw, and the record still intact. Poor Newport, who seemed to have achieved their final ambition, were thwarted right at the very end.

The general opinion was that we were very lucky to come out of that final game with a draw. True, perhaps, but let us not forget the magnificent effort of the whole fifteen

players, who tackled and covered in a great rear-guard action, never flinching against the tremendous pressure put on by Newport.

A very successful tour of Merseyside took place at the end of the season, and three fine wins were obtained at the expense of Liverpool, Birkenhead Park and Chester.

The Snelling Sevens Competition on 26th April proved to be one of the highlights of the season. The conditions were difficult owing to heavy rain, and the competition started off in heavy rain. During the afternoon conditions improved somewhat and the sun shone brightly for the latter part of the event.

The "Magnificent Seven" were in tremendous form, and swept through to the final, beating Llanelli in a thrill-packed game by 17 points to 13. The "seven" deserve special mention—Tony Williams to be an excellent captain, with a special knowledge of sevens technique; Barry John, scoring a record number of points and the worthy winner of the Everson Trophy award; Billy Hullin for consistently clever running and getting the winning try just before the final whistle; Nick Williams for some great running and covering and collecting four tries; the three forwards, Lyn Baxter, Meirion Davies and Tony Pender, for getting plenty of the ball for the "backs", and running and covering like three-quarters.

The following Saturday saw us take part in the Welsh National Sevens. Tony Williams leading the team again, but without Barry John, Nick Williams and Billy Hullin, who were replaced by Alex Finlayson, Brian Coles and Gary Samuels. Again Tony Williams, a superb "Sevens" general, led the team right through to the final, and accounted for Neath by 11-3 to be trophy winners on our own ground on the first occasion for the National Sevens to be staged at the Arms Park.

Thus Tony Williams completed a great hat-trick of sevena-side rugby victories for the season: the Harlequins Sevens in September, the Snelling Sevens and, finally, the National W.R.U. Sevens, to take over the mantle as undisputed Sevens Champions in Wales.



At the National Sevens Tony Williams earned the accolade of "Sevens Player of the Year" from W.R.U. President, Mr. Ivor Jones—a thoroughly deserved distinction which is likely to lead to the award of a special trophy.

After a poor start to the 1968-69 season, the Club finished up on a very high note, having only two defeats after Christmas, and both these away from home.

Howard Norris, as Captain, can feel justly proud of a great team, with a great "general", Tony Williams, as his secondin-command. The team finished up in the unofficial Welsh Championship as runners-up to our great friends and rivals, Newport.

Hon. Secretary's Report

By comparison with the 1967 Centenary Year the report for the 1968 season may well be read as an anti-climax.

You will recall that it was forecast, not without obvious reason, that 1968 might well prove to be a crisis season so far as playing strength would be concerned. The club captain and the second XI captain will make it clear that ready and adequate replacement of lost and retired players was not fully or consistently achieved. Recruitment of new players was about average and once the pre-season surge of would be new members at net practice had sorted itself out we were left with the notable and valuable addition of Peter Sparkes, Robert Laycock, David Edwards, Tom Oldknow and Ivor Thompson.

If 1968 was not the exciting and momentous season that 1967 had been it saw, at least, the establishing of ourselves at Sophia Gardens. When one sees the desecration at the Arms Park the more one appreciates the amenities which are now at our disposal at our new head-quarters. Operations there ran smoothly and prompt starts were made to most matches. The wickets provided were of a better standard than some would have us believe, although Sunday wickets were often prepared too early. We were also aware, on a number of occasions, of the absence of co-operation on the part of certain members of the ground staff. This is no criticism of Les, Gerry, who always proved most helpful, but is merely a reflection on the quality of the labour sometimes at his disposal. The net wickets were generally very good and well patronised in the early season. The ground is beginning to acquire its own atmosphere, although much remains to be done by way of improvement. The provision of a secondary square is one of extreme urgency.

The operating of the bar was more equitably shared and one hopes that any problem in this direction may be avoided by the more ready volunteering of services by all members.

The Ladies' Committee was, of course, magnificent and its continued service to the section was priceless. One feels that it would be tempting fate to say more of this most highly satisfactory state of affairs.

Peter Gatehouse, in his report last year, said that he considered that some of the fixtures on the list had not been worthy of the club. It has to be appreciated, of course, that this Club, with its own peculiar problems so far as the accommodation of Glamorgan County Cricket Club is concerned, is very often placed in the invidious position of Hobson and his choice. However, 1968 saw a significant improvement in the list. 1969 will see our entry into the *Cricketer* National Knockout Competition, when we are drawn against Panteg. It will be interesting to see how this venture develops.

The administration of the Club ran quite smoothly, although we would have wished that a more conscientious approach to the duty of signing-up had been observed by certain members. The help of the

Hon. Assistant Secretary, Hugh Williams, is gratefully acknowledged and his attendance at Selection Committee was a particular relief to the Hon. Secretary.

The Chairman was his ever-present self and has come to be relied on as a tower of strength. Whether in the committee chair or the scorer's chair, Jack Evans' efforts were always motivated by a keen interest, and a deep loyalty to, the Cardiff Cricket Club.

The Committee attended to its duties wisely and conscientiously, as is indicated by the high average attendance figures. Their directions and instructions to the Hon. Secretary were always clear and prevented him from wandering too far from the paths of responsibility.

The Club captain was zealous in his off-the-field duties and attended all committee and selection meetings. He is to be congratulated and thanked for what was a very happy season.

John Riches combined his duties as second XI Captain with those as a member of the Management Committee of the Cardiff Athletic Club. To each he gave his earnest devotion and loyalty and we can be assured that the interests of the Cardiff Cricket Club are jealously guarded by him at the highest level.

Peter Sweetnam's equanimity as Reserve XI Captain remained undisturbed despite the plunderings of his carefully nursed team by his senior captains. He gives zest and selfless enthusiasm to this most difficult of jobs.

Hugh Williams' flair for making the Sunday XI matches interesting was a notable achievement. But it is only fair to add that he suffered from inconsistent team selection, indifferent performances, and inconsiderate opponents. However, his devotion to his duties as captain were unimpaired by these hazards.

The Youth XI was looked after almost solely by Ken Williams and his application to this task was exemplary. A number of new players were found who, if not prodigies, were of encouraging promise. We cannot afford to neglect this very lifeline of recruitment to the club, but help and support is needed.

The Cricket Club continued to enjoy the services and support of the office staff at the Arms Park and our thanks are due to Miss Anne Davies and Miss Susan Allen.

This report cannot be concluded without reference to the departure of a great stalwart of the Club. Brian Corbett has taken up a new appointment in Carmarthen and in offering our congratulations to him on his promotion we commend the service rendered by him in his many years with the Club. Brian was not the man to accept a selectorial difference of opinion without question and many a captain will testify to his reproofs of what he considered were their glaring underestimations of his ability as a player. But wherever he found himself in the next match his loyalty to the game of cricket was never in question.

Cricket Club Captain's Report

Having got off to a fine start the 1st XI flattered to deceive. The first five games were won quite easily, and of these the victories over Bath and Bristol Imperial were excellent. Our Whitsun tour to Gloucester and Stroud was indeed disappointing, although we came back extremely well in both games. Some pathetic batting displays resulted in our losing on each occasion by three wickets with only minutes left for play. Our ficl ling at Stroud was a credit to the Club and backed up some fine bowling by D. W. Lewis and L. Robirson.

The next four games were against Winget, Cowbridge, St. Fagens and Exeter University, the last game being the most interesting. The University scored 189 for 4 wickets and after a continual chase we were bowled out at the stroke of time 24 runs short. If our fielding at Stroud was a credit then our fielding on this occasion was a disgrace.

On then to Newport, in my opinion the strongest side in South Wales. In the hope of an early break through with the new ball we put them in. However, they slowly but very surely amassed a total of 190-4. Despite an excellent start by K. D. Williams and P. Stimpson the batting again collapsed and it was left to D. W. Lewis and L. Robinson to play out time at 130 for 9.

Our matches with Lydney and Wiltshire Moonrakers were won easily and our batting improved somewhat with R. Thomas making 72 n.o. in the latter game. Widnes, St. Fagans and Brislington all produced results. We lost heavily to Widnes where dropped catches and a lack of runs let us down. A win against St. Fagans is always pleasing and we defeated Brislington by 7 wickets.

We then entertained Ebbw Vale, Neath and Stroud over the Bank Holiday and all three matches were drawn, although we went very near in two of them, requiring only one and two wickets in the Ebbw Vale and Stroud games.

A very low score had been on the cards all season but it was not until we played at Cheltenham that this actually came about. We were out for 80 and they lost only two wickets in getting them. This, incidentally, was our only Saturday defeat.

The bowlers did well enough considering the number of runs they very often had to bowl at! D. W. Lewis and L. Robinson were the most effective and both had some fine figures. David's 7 for 35 against Lydney was his best and Liam's best was 6 for 40 also against Lydney later in the season.

Other bowlers contributed good figures from time to time, but it was Robert Laycock who impressed later in the season and I believe he has a fine future in club cricket.

Derek Pask was his usual competent self behind the stumps, whilst Nigel Rees, when deputising, did all that was asked of him.

I sympathise with those who were in and out of the side and thank them for accepting the situation. My thanks also go to Jack Evans for his consistent attendance as a scorer, Neil Baddeley for his devotion to duty as umpire and to Brian Kempson in his able capacity as Hon. Secretary. I would also express the gratitude of the Club to the Ladies' Committee for their not-insignificant contribution to what was a very happy season.

SECOND XI

It would indeed be a red letter day if a report of this nature could make no mention of the vagaries of the British climate. Alas, this is not to be such an occasion. Of the 23 matches which were arranged for the team this season no less than eight were totally abandoned owing to rain and the condition of the ground.

The playing record was rather less successful than in recent previous seasons, eight matches being won, three drawn and four lost. However, having regard to the fact that a number of senior and experienced cricketers had retired or left the area after the 1967 season it was to be expected that the Second XI would be rather less experienced than in former years and that the playing record would correspondingly suffer. Nevertheless, new younger players were introduced into the second XI and gained experience. There is no reason to think that the second XI will not go from strength to strength in future seasons.

As might be expected from the opening remarks in this report, the first match of the season was cancelled owing to rain. The first match in May against Lydney second XI saw the team make the highest score of the season, 221 for 4 wickets declared. Wynne Jones made a very good 115 not out and David Bailey 51. Together they put on over 100

for the second wicket. The weather deteriorated at teatime and the game was played in slight rain for the last hour. Handicapped by a wet ball, the bowlers were unable to bowl out the Lydney side and the match ended in a draw. Nick Edwards celebrated his return to the Club after several years' absence by taking 5 wickets.

After another game abandoned, owing to rain, the Club made the trip to Bath for the first time for many years with disastrous results. The weather could not have been more unsuitable for cricket and it was a day on which polar bears would have been hard pressed to keep warm. A total of 77 all out, of which Reggie Shah made 30, was not nearly sufficient and Bath won by 9 wickets.

A further blank Saturday followed but with the arrival of June came sunshine and Malcolm Page emerged from hibernation having shed his winter coat. The game against Cardiff University was won quite comfortably and Malcolm celebrated his return to the cricket field by taking 5 wickets.

Another win followed in the match against Miskin Manor on the Spring Bank Holiday Monday. This victory by 6 wickets was noteworthy for promising innings by Paul Baddeley and Chris Bird, the former making 42.

In June a new venture was the journey to Oxford to play University College in an all day game. Owing to early morning rain the game did not start until about 12.10 p.m. but the weather then cleared and the players who took part in the game thoroughly enjoyed the day. While the students bowled steadily their batting was not very strong and the game resulted in a comfortable win for the Club. The outstanding performance of this game was a fine innings of 45 not out by Peter Sparkes.

Then followed the usual enjoyable game against Crickhowell. No batsman made many runs but most players made a useful contribution to a score of 154 for 9 wickets declared. Although never in any danger of defeat the team were unable to force a victory, Crickhowell being some 35 runs behind with 3 wickets to fall at the close of play.

Then came the first of the season's two games against St. Fagans. Thanks to a powerful attacking innings by Wynne Jones, who made 74, a total of 152 for 8 wickets declared was reached. St Fagans batted poorly on this occasion and a comfortable victory was achieved. Robert Laycock played for the first time in this match and took 2 wickets, showing considerable promise.

It was unfortunate that it was necessary to play two games at Sophia Gardens when Newport were the opposition. Although it made for greater safety that the boundaries of the two games did not over ap, the result was that there was a ridiculously short boundary on one side of the field. A total of 181, of which Reggie Shah made a very good 73, proved insufficient in these conditions and Newport won by 2 wickets after they had lost their first 7 wickets for 99 runs, thanks to a fine spell of bowling by Reggie Shah who took 5 wickets to complete an excellent all round display.

The next match was at Lydney and Eddie Donovan, having temporarily cast aside his golf clubs for a cricket bat, played his first game of the season for the Second XI scoring a very useful 38. David Edwards made 44 in a score of 150 for 7 wickets declared and, after Lydney had scored 65 for the first wicket in about 45 minutes, they were all out for 98. Malcolm Page again was the most successful bowler, taking 5 wickets.

The following game against Ebbw Vale at Cardiff was the least interesting of the season since Ebbw Vale, who were apparently unbeaten, made no attempt to win the match but were content to play for a draw. The match was notable only for another good innings of 44 by David Edwards and for an outstanding bowling performance again by Malcolm Page who took 5 wickets for 8 runs in 13 overs. The next game against the Choristers was another occasion on which two matches were played at Sophia Gardens and this was particularly unfortunate since it was the first time that the Choristers had played the Second XI on a Saturday. Once again the team did not make sufficient runs, having regard to the short boundary, and the Choristers won an interesting game by 3 wickets. It is certainly to be hoped that in future seasons the practice of playing two games on the same day at Sophia Gardens can be avoided until such time as a second square has been laid near the rugby ground to enable two full sized fields to be available.

The return match against St Fagans at Cardiff resulted in another win by 3 wickets. It is always a source of pleasure to beat old frienc's such as St. Fagans twice in a season. On this occasion Harry Shewring took 4 wickets and David Edwards had another very good innings of 64 ably assisted by Peter Sparkes who made 33.

The second match against Newport was cancelled owing to rain as had been both games against Bristol Imperial. On the second occasion the weather was fine but the Bristol ground had not recovered from the West Country floods when the Pavilion at Bristol had itself been flooded.

There followed a home game against Brislington which produced the most exciting finish of the season. After a most interesting game Brislington won by 3 wickets off the last ball of the last over of the match. The team returned to winning form when Abercarn were beaten at the end of August, Reggie Shah making 40 and Wynne Jones 34. This game produced the best bowling performances of the season to date, Ivor Thompson taking 6 wickets for 18 runs. The team was not at full strength for this game and, without detracting in any way from the performance of Ivor Thompson, Abercarn hardly seemed strong enough to be a Second XI fixture.

The annual game against Neath, which was due to be played on the Bank Holiday Sunday rather than the Monday, was unfortunately another victim of the wet summer and the game was cancelled before the team left Cardiff. There followed a match against Cheltenham which provided another victory. Following good innings of 52 not out by Harry Shewring and 38 by Eddie Donovan the best bowling performance of the season came inevitably from Malcolm Page. Cheltenham seemed to have no answer to his many varieties and he ended with 8 wickets for 23 runs to give the team a handsome victory.

Taking the season as a whole there is no doubt that the batting was not as consistent as in recent previous years. This was not surprising owing to the retirement of various senior players and the fact that a total of 27 players represented the team in the fifteen games which were played. Of the four matches which were lost, three were lost by quite narrow margins and it is reasonably arguable that the team should have scored sufficient runs in each of these three matches to have avoided defeat. The leading batsmen were Wynne Jones (337 runs), David Edwards (243 runs) and Reggie Shah (187 runs) but useful middle order innings were played from time to time by Ian McLean, John Herbert, Paul Baddeley and Iqbal Asim.

The bowling was not particularly penetrative but, for the most part, it was capable of dealing with the tasks which it was set. The bulk of the bowling was done by senior members of the side, the leading wicket takers being Nick Edwards (20 wickets), Malcolm Page (28 wickets) and John Riches (30 wickets), while Tom Oldknow (10 wickets) made useful contributions from time to time.

The fielding was probably rather less stately than in previous seasons as a result of the introduction of some younger players. Certainly this was the case in the final match against Cheltenham when the bowlers were aided considerably by the taking of no less than seven catches with hardly a chance missed. The wicket-keeping duties were shared by David Bailey, Eddie Donovan and Paul Baddeley and it is a measure of Eddie Donovan's ability to take the majority of chances which came his way that he claimed ten victims in four matches.

It is not possible to end this report without thanking the various umpires and scorers who were with the team during the season and particular mention must be made of Alan Jones who was seldom absent from his post as umpire. It is only when the umpire or the scorer are missing that they are fully appreciated and the thanks of the whole team are most gratefully given to all who umpired and scored throughout the year. Mention must also be made of the Honorary Secretary, Brian Kempson, the captains of the other elevens and the ground staff for their assistance and co-operation throughout the season.

Lastly, but certainly by no means least, the grateful thanks of the whole team go out to the charming members of the ladies committee who served so delightfully such excellent teas throughout the season.
