

Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee

Dear Members,

It would be very pleasant to be able to write about the sporting activities of the Club's many sections but that is being done very adequately by the Officials of the various sections.

Once again, then, I will start with the report of the accounts for which I am greatly indebted to Mr. David Grant, the General Secretary, for his assistance.

#### Financial Report.

The excess of Income over Expenditure this year of  $\pounds 2,112$  shows a drop of  $\pounds 1,737$  on the preceding year's figures and, as the accounts reveal, has been brought about mainly by rising costs. Rising costs appear to be an everpresent problem in this day and age and I will deal with this particular matter later in this report.

The Revenue from Football Gates showed a decrease of £704 on the previous season, but it is pleasing to record that the average gate this season was higher than the previous season. This statement is proved when one takes into account that the previous season's figures included the figure of £2,205 for the opening floodlight match against the Barbarians. In addition, only one home Floodlight Alliance match was played this season, compared with two the previous season (showing receipts of £157 compared with £572) and, of course, only one home game was played against Newport this year.

This Club's share of the Floodlight Alliance pool was £200 and this is included in the figure of £430 for "Share of Gates". The share of the Sevens' Tournament at £300 is exactly double that of the previous year and shows the financial benefit accruing to the participating Clubs when Cardiff Arms Park is the venue for this popular tournament.

The income from season tickets has again dropped, this season by £161. I regret to say that this has been the pattern over the past nine years.

The profit on sale of programmes at £817 shows a drop

of £74, but last year's figure included £180, the Club share of the "A Wales XV" v. Fiji programme profit.

The accounts reveal that items of income on the General Account show a drop of £372 on the previous year. This was offset by the fact that Bar Takings show an increase of £2,701. Catering Takings an increase of £84, and Fruit Machines an increase of £370.

Items of Expenditure on the General Account show an increase of £1,731 and the items on the Bar and Catering Account an increase of £2,818.

One item of expenditure calls for a special report. In October last, the problem of obtaining suitable replacements for cleaning staff leaving the employ of the Club proved unsurmountable and it was decided to employ a firm of Contract Cleaners. The cost to the Club for this service for the period 1st November, 1965, to 30th April, 1966, at £709 is shown as Cleaning Services—Clubhouse. Because of this, the figure for cleaning material and window cleaning at £282 shows a reduction of £76 and the figure for Salaries and Wages at £10,093 a reduction of £45. As you will realise, this latter item would have shown a sharp increase in the normal way.

From the Balance Sheet you will note that the Club Lottery produced a profit of £4,237 during the year and this amount has been added to the Development Fund.

The cost of the new furniture and fittings for the Top Lounge at £1,415 is also shown on the Balance Sheet as a capital addition to "Clubhouse — Furniture, Fittings and Equipment".

During the year the Club purchased a new Tractor, large Trailer and a 34" mowing machine and the cost of these items at £1,057 is shown as a capital addition to "Motor Roller, Mowers, etc."

At the commencement of this report, I mentioned the problem of ever-increasing costs. In the 1966 Finance Act, the Selective Employment Tax was brought into being. The Club has appealed to the Chancellor regarding this Tax, as have governing bodies of various Amateur Sports and also other Clubs. I include in this report the letter sent by Mr. Grant to the Chancellor and fully approved by the Management Committee.

#### Selective Employment Tax.

At a recent Meeting of the Management Committee of this Club, concern was expressed at the effect of the above tax on this Club's future finances.

The objects of the Club are the pursuit of amateur sport and the provision of such social amenities for the members as are approved by the Management Committee. The Club has five active Sections, *i.e.*, Cardiff Rugby Football Club, Cardiff Cricket Club, Cardiff Athletic Lawn Tennis Club, Cardiff Athletic Bowls Club and Cardiff Hockey Club.

As you are aware, the playing standards of the various Sections of the Club are very high and it is, therefore, necessary that the various playing areas are kept in first-class condition. The cost of upkeep is very high and is in fact as high, if not higher, than many professional sporting undertakings.

Playing facilities are granted free of charge to the Cardiff Schools Rugby Union, Cardiff & District Youth Rugby Union, Cardiff & District Junior Rugby Union and Cardiff Schools' Cricket League. In addition, monetary grants are made to the first three of these organisations and it is no exaggeration to state that without these grants the organisations would be hard pressed to continue in their present form.

Playing facilities are also granted, free of charge, to International and County Bowls, International and County Hockey and International Lacrosse.

The Club Room is used by other amateur sporting organisations for dinners, dances and annual prize presentations. No charge is made for the use of these facilities.

The new tax will cost this Club in a full year — £1,781 per annum. The annual surpluses of income over expenditure over the past few years are as follows:—

The effect of the new tax to this Club is obvious. It will either be a struggle for existence under the present arrangements or necessitate the withdrawal of all help granted to amateur sporting organisations less fortunate than ourselves.

My Committee feels that this new tax is a retrogade step as far as amateur sport is concerned and earnestly requests you to consider the possibility of allowing amateur sport an exemption from the Selective Employment Tax.

If a Club of the standing of the Cardiff Athletic Club finds itself hard pressed to continue because of this new tax, many less fortunate amateur organisations may be forced to cease their activities.

This appeal has been acknowledged but at the time of writing this report the Club does not know whether legislation will be introduced to exempt amateur sport from the Selective Employment Tax. It behoves me, therefore, to advise all members that the direct result of this is that, in a full year the Club has to find an amount of £1,781 for its liability under the Selective Employment Tax. In addition, indirect charges will fall on the Club and increases can be expected in all the Club's items of Expenditure. It has been said that these could average out at a figure of between  $7\frac{1}{2}\%$  and 15%. I am sure that you will realise that the Cardiff Athletic Club, although an amateur sporting club, has to take its place in the business world as regards finance and must be run accordingly.

#### The New Ground Scheme.

I am writing this at a time when completion of all plans are poised for legal and actual finalization. I am able at last to feel confident that most of the routine problems are behind us, and with the final acceptance of the plans for Sophia Gardens now passed by the Cardiff Corporation, embracing the playing of cricket, hockey and rugby, also Glamorgan County Cricket, we will be able to make a start in the laying of the rugby pitch on the cricket ground at Cardiff Arms Park by the end of the current Cricket Season.

To straighten out many of the day to day difficulties, there has been formed a Joint Executive Committee of Welsh Rugby Union and Cardiff Athletic Club officials. Messrs. K. M. Harris, Cliff Jones and Bill Clements on the Union side, and Messrs. Hubert Johnson, Frank Trott and

David Grant for Cardiff Athletic Club. This Executive Committee will have plenary powers but will report to its respective Management Committees at their normal meetings.

I must, at this stage, warn all members, both active and supporters, that we shall be entering on a time of serious inconvenience that may well last for a few years. I am sure, however, that we will all take this in our stride to ensure the future benefits to the Cardiff Athletic Club and Welsh Rugby Football.

To all Sections and Members I say, the critical path analysis which has now been completed and agreed must become the Bible, as any interference, divergence or delay in the programme as set, would cause complete disorganisation, great expense and loss of revenue to all concerned.

#### Social Activities.

Once again these are on the increase with the usual Dinner and Dance occasions, which are a must in the holding together of the sections and spirit of the Club.

A new feature of the use of the Club is the increased number of Bowls visitors and the many excellent functions they hold. Well done the Old and Bowls!

The popular downstairs Bar is due for a face lift soon and we hope that it will be enjoyed even more so.

Golfing Society.

The Club golfers are keeping the flag flying on many golf courses, and here again the propaganda value is of great benefit to the Club. It will, I am sure, encourage more members to enjoy the amenities and comradeship that the golfers are helping to make possible. Perhaps a Golf School somewhere on the Club premises would be a thought for the future.

Obituary.

No words of mine can adequately convey the great loss the Club sustained in the death of that great gentleman and sportsman, Mr. T. W. Richards, the Club Vice-Chairman. A man who did things not only for the Cardiff Athletic Club but for many outside interests. His services and loyalties were carried out in the most modest, sincere and efficient manner. The Club can ill afford to lose such a man.

I, like many others, was always grateful for his help and

experience and, apart from losing an excellent past Chairman of the Cardiff Athletic Club for nine years, I feel personally that many of us have lost a friend. Our sincere condolences to his very charming lady, Mrs. Jessie Richards.

Management Committee.

I would like to make a special mention of the excellent committee work done throughout the Club from the President down. The Management Committee, the Standing Sub-Committees and Section Committees have all played their part in the organisation of the Club.

The new Vice-Chairman to succeed the late Mr. Wyndham Richards is Mr. Frank Trott, the Hon. Secretary of the Rugby Section. Mr. Trott needs no introduction to you all. Sufficient to say that the Club could not have a better deputy. His Club knowledge and business efficiency, plus his work for the Rugby Section and New Development Plan makes him a very valuable asset. I feel very fortunate to have his unstinted support.

The three Standing Committees Chairmen, Messrs. J. R. Thomas (*Finance*), L. M. Spence (*Ground*), and G. Porter (*House*), have all carried out their responsibilities in a very able manner.

The Sub-Committee dealing with the New Ground Scheme, Messrs. Hubert Johnson, F. Trott, G. Porter, W. J. Evans and Edward Hall, is frequently called to meetings with only a few hours notice at any time and place of the day.

The attendances of all Committees are right up to standard.

The General Secretary, Mr. David Grant, has once again fulfilled all promises in the duties of Secretary. His work on the Sub-Committee of the new ground venture is of the highest quality and value.

#### Staff.

Once again it is a pleasure to report on the Staff of the Club under the wise management of Mr. Grant. It should be enough to say that since the last Report the Staff has remained unchanged as it has for many years, which is sure proof of its loyalty and the manner in which the Club is administered.

The office staff, Miss Ann Davies, Mrs. Walter John and Miss Sandra Bethell are, as usual, courteous, efficient and helpful.

The Stewardess, Miss Babs Filer, and all the unchanged staff make it a pleasure to visit the Bar, and they play a great part in the encouragement of new members and the retention of the old.

With the tremendous amount of work and responsibility entailed on the ground, plus the preparations of the new venture, Les Gerry and his Staff are once again on the ball in spite of the difficulty experienced in getting casual labour to assist in the extra work.

The custodians of the door have always been very helpful, and car park attendants, etc., have all done a difficult job well.

To mention all would take too long, but I would like to end by thanking everyone on the Management and other Committees, the Club Members and the Staff for the loyalty and encouragement I have received during the past year.

Incidentally, in the Season 1894/5 there were 1,258 members in spite of there being no clubhouse nor any social amenities, to say nothing of the present covered stand accommodation. As the population of Cardiff is now approximately 260,000 we are not doing so well, are we?



Chairman's Report for the Season 1965-66

Playing Record.

The team had one of its best Seasons for many years, finishing second in the unofficial Welsh Championship Table by winning 35 matches, losing 9, with 3 drawn. The points for totalled 583 against 198. Altogether 128 tries were scored against 32, or a ratio of 4 tries to 1.

Two additional matches were played away — the first celebrated Treorchy's 75th Anniversary and we won this entertaining game by 38 points to 8. The other match inaugurating Moseley's Flood Lights was won by Cardiff—13 points to 0.

Much of the team's success this Season has been due to the excellent Captaincy of Keith Rowlands, for he has led by example and his vast experience has enabled him to vary the tactics to suit the occasion.


#### Athletic XV

#### The Junior XV


Report on the Junior XV by the Chairman, Mr. W. Lewis. The Junior XV did not have such a successful Season compared with previous years.



REPORT - Season 1965

Liam Robinson, Peter Stimpson and Paul Good had been promoted to the First XI and it is likely that Graham Rees will soon follow them. Two great acquisitions to the team were Harry Shewring and Russell Thomas. The bowling was not too good and Brian Joseph was undoubtedly the best of those used. John Herbert was re-elected Captain for the third successive year.

The Reserve XI under Brian Kempson had an encouraging and promising season and with the expected improvement in the fixture list, look forward to an even happier and more successful season in 1966. Promising newcomers in Andrew Jones, Tony Davies, Peter Sweetnam, and Robert Clarke were integrated with the more mature stalwarts in Gordon Eccles, Brian Corbett, John Riches, Bob Cragg and Clive Williams to provide a dependable side. Some cause for self-congratulation was gained from the achievement of fielding not only a full eleven every week, but also of providing an umpire and scorer regularly.

The Sunday XI enjoyed an unbeaten season and good victories were achieved against Clifton, Usk and Cardiff H.S.O.B. However, the opposition was often not strong enough to provide a good match.

John Davis proved to be an energetic and popular Captain.

The Whitbread Cup 24 Over Knock-out Competition was brought to a successful conclusion despite the weather, and Cardiff were the winners once again.

The Six-a-side Competition was again well supported by the local Clubs and our thanks are due to Godfrey Motors for a permanent Challenge Cup which they provided, and which Cardiff duly won.

The Single Wicket Competition was again successfully organised by John Riches and we congratulate Paul Good on winning it for the second consecutive year.

A Youth XI was formed for the first time for a number of years, and though only four matches were played, sufficient encouragement was gained from the experience to enable us to give the project even more thought for the future.

All in all, a busy season and a happy one. We were again fortunate in possessing a hard-working Committee and a loyal band of umpires and scorers. Our thanks in this direction are particularly directed to our Chairman, Mr. Jack Evans, Mr. Alan Jones, Mr. Neil Baddeley, Mr. Len Morgan, and to scorers Morris Thomas and Peter Johnson.

The 1966 season will see the last of cricket on the Cardiff Arms Park after having been played there continuously for exactly 100 years. The prospect of moving from this historic ground is, of course, a melancholy one and could be considered to be something of a sacrifice, but the argument of the economic case which makes the move inevitable, has become unanswerable. Cricket, by its very nature, is a game which does not take kindly or easily to change and such a fundamental change as this will call for patience and tolerance during the transitional period. However, this is not to say that the prospect of establishing ourselves in a new and an attractive setting will not have its element of challenge and adventure. With this exciting prospect in view, therefore, the Cardiff Cricket Club will commence its second century in the certain knowledge that its sacrifice has, in part, contributed to the hoped for future prosperity and well-being of the Cardiff Athletic Club as a whole, and that, after all, is the primary concern of all of us.

#### **Annual Report for Season 1965**
