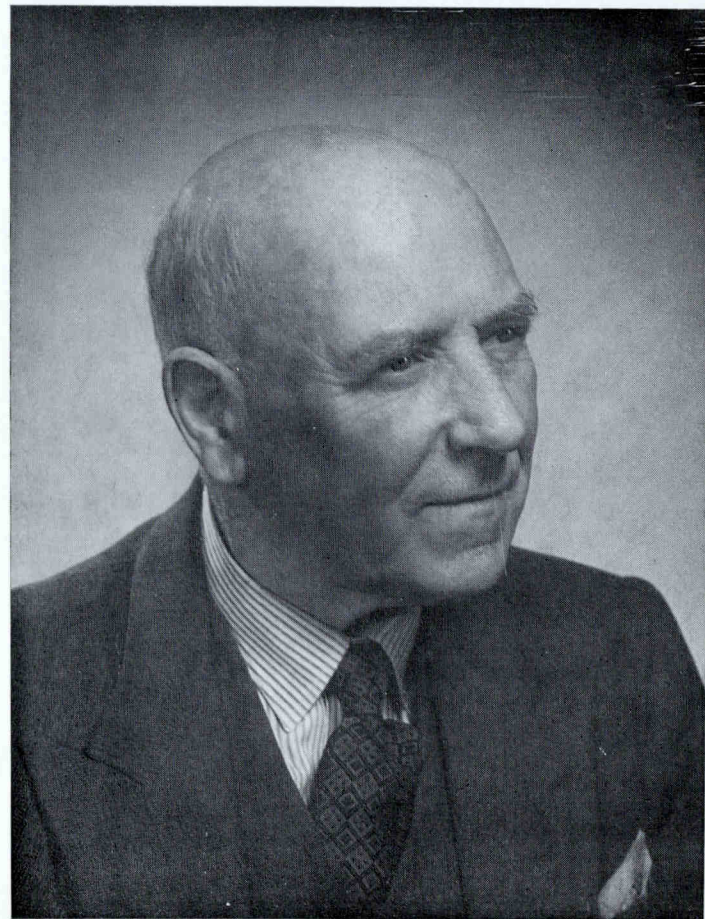

## CARDIFF ATHLETIC CLUB

**Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee**

Dear Member,

Just to assure you at the outset that the Club is still in a very sound financial position I will report first on the accounts.

The excess of Income over Expenditure this year at £3,849 shows a slight increase of £280 over that of the previous year and indicates that the Club is on a sounder financial basis than for some years past. Although the response to the membership drive was not as great as was expected, income from this source was a new record at £10,568, showing an increase of £1,473 over that for the previous year. To those members who are still in possession of the brochures sent to them, I would again appeal to them to urge their friends to join, as subscription income is the life blood of a Club.

The Revenue from Football Gates showed an increase of £1,799 at £8,345, which, although pleasing to record, is, as a final result, disappointing, in view of the fact that halfway through the Season the increase over the corresponding period of the previous season was £3,200, due in the main to the opening Floodlight Match against the Barbarians and the Floodlight Alliance Match against Bridgend. A closer examination reveals that weather conditions caused the cancellation of the Watsonians and Swansea matches and inclement weather and the televising of the Scotland v. South Africa game badly affected the gate receipts for the Barbarians match on Easter Saturday. In addition, the gate for the third Cardiff v. Newport match was disappointing.

In the Floodlight Alliance, Cardiff won the cup after a two leg final with Llanelli and the net profit from these two matches was shared out equally among the eight participating Clubs. The £100 from this source is included in the figure for "Share of Gates".

Television fees show an increase of £186 at £646.

Our first season of Floodlight football has proved that floodlighting, wisely used, can be of financial benefit to the Club.



Following the pattern of the last eight years, income from Season Tickets again decreased, this year by £142 but, it should be noted, many season ticket holders of long standing became full members of the Club.

The profit on sale of programmes at £891 is very pleasing, as last year's figure of £1,133 included the £575 profit made on the Cardiff v. New Zealand match programme.

The Accounts reveal that items of income on the General Account show an increase of £3,856 over that of the previous year.

In addition, Bar Takings at £37,779 show an increase of £2,658 and Catering Takings at £6,031, an increase of £1,096. Fruit Machines at £2,743 show a reduction in income of £386.

At the commencement of this year, the Committee realised that the formation of an Extra XV. would cost approximately £1,000 per annum. The Expenditure side of the Accounts bears this out and, in addition, the Club was faced with increasing costs for salaries and wages, travelling, hotels, home match catering, printing, electricity, gas, rates and many other services. Expenditure on the General Account shows an increase of £3,901 and on the Bar and Catering Account of £3,033.

From the Balance Sheet you will note that the Club Lottery produced a profit of £5,172 during the year and that the cost of the Floodlights and necessary emergency lighting at £5,829 has been charged to the Development Account.

A further sum has been written off the Club House and this is now shown at a written down figure of £15,000.

I would like to mention that in achieving these results the Management and Standing Committees met more than fifty times and in addition there were many meetings during the year of duly elected sub-committees. In this connection it is worthy of note that the General Secretary was in attendance at every meeting.

I make no apology for once again stating that the income from Bar profits, Car Parking Fees, Greyhound Racing, the Glamorgan County Cricket Club, Fruit Machines and the Club Lottery is responsible for the continued survival of the Club. So, please enlist more members, and give more

support to every facet of the Club's activities—it is your Club; one of the greatest in the world, but it needs nourishment not punishment.

### **Cardiff Arms Park and Sophia Gardens.**

Negotiations for the development of these areas are moving slowly but surely to a successful conclusion. The difficulties are many, and as there are so many interested parties, delays are inevitable, but discussions are taking place almost daily. Heads of Terms have been signed with the Welsh Rugby Union, and we are now awaiting completion of an agreed lease for 10½ acres at Sophia Gardens with the Cardiff Corporation. Negotiations are proceeding with the Glamorgan County Cricket Club, and it, too, appears to be quite happy about its future at Sophia Gardens.

Through the energy and foresight of the Ground Committee and the General Secretary a magnificent cricket square has already been laid at Sophia Gardens, thereby saving money and time, and enabling us to use the new cricket ground a season earlier than was thought possible. Any late developments will be reported fully at the Annual General Meeting and any questions then will be welcomed.

**Social Activities.** The usual Dinner Dances and Social Functions have been held in the Club Room, and apart from the pleasure which this part of Club life gives to the members, the Bar and Catering receipts benefit quite materially. One very successful feature of Club Catering has been the provision of lunches. It has been stated many times that the sandwiches provided are the best in Europe, but members generally do not realise that the Lunches are of an equally high standard, though many who are in business in the Club's vicinity attend regularly in good numbers.

A new look has been given to the upstairs lounge, and the furniture of the new lounge downstairs has been renovated. The House Committee has devoted much time to planning the changes, and although owing to its spaciousness the Top Lounge has always been a difficult room to decorate, I feel that the Committee has succeeded in devising a decor, which has given more dignity and comfort to the room, and made it one more in keeping with the high standard of the Club. The work in both lounges, having been completed



since the 30th April, 1965, the costs will be shown in next year's financial statement.

**Golfing Society.** Owing to the enthusiasm of some of the very stalwart members of the Club, and in particular of Arthur Evans and Chris. Ashe, a healthy Cardiff Athletic Golfing Society has been formed. Several get-together dinners and meetings have taken place, and such great interest has been aroused that the membership limit of 80 has already been reached, and there is a waiting list. There is no doubt that this worthy Athletic venture will prove a great acquisition to the Club.

**Obituary.** The death of Harry Bartlett was a great loss to the Club. The Chairman of the Cricket Club has written his appreciation of Harry in this Report, but I must add my tribute to the hard unselfish work he put in as player and administrator, and for his happy and cheerful personality. He will be missed by us all.

Our sympathy and understanding are tendered, too, to Les. and Mrs. Spence on the sudden death of their son Michael.

**Thanks.** This report would be incomplete if I did not express my grateful thanks to the President, Norman Riches, for his constant support, and to my colleagues on the Management Committee for their interest and work. My Vice-Chairman was his usual impeccable self, and the chairmen of the Standing Committees, Jack Thomas, Les. Spence and Gwyn Porter were towers of strength, and conducted the work of their committees with efficiency and dignity. I thank them, too, most sincerely for their personal support and loyalty; whatever they were called upon to do they did willingly and enthusiastically.

**The Staff.** It has been said that a Club is no greater than its administration, and in this respect we are fortunate in having, off the field, a team of the calibre of David Grant and his staff. David goes from strength to strength in his efficiency and enthusiasm. He has saved the Club a lot of money by his foresight and initiative—he has a 100% record of attendance at meetings, and he is a tower of strength to all Sections. His work and efforts at all times are progressive. He is able to maintain this high standard by the support and loyalty of the experienced senior clerk, Miss Ann Davies, who in her turn has the full support of

Mrs. Walter John, who, many years ago was assistant to the late secretary, Mr. Jack Watters, then as Miss Nancy Wilkins—"Who said they never come back", and Miss Sandra Bethell, a capable junior who is proving her worth in a pleasant and helpful manner.

Mr. Gruberman has settled down as Mr. Grant's right hand man in running the Lottery, and is proving most reliable and helpful.

The work of Les. Gerry and his Ground Staff speaks for itself. All the playing areas have been kept in excellent condition, and the general appearance of the ground has evoked the highest praise from members. The work done in laying the Cricket Square in Sophia Gardens by the Ground Staff was exceptionally praiseworthy, and justified the confidence we had in appointing Les. Gerry to succeed Mr. Francis as Head Groundsman. The Bar and Catering Staff have once again proved their value to the Club. On this side of the Club's activities we go from strength to strength, both from amenities provided and in financial benefit. The success was achieved notwithstanding that we were deprived of the services of Miss Filer for some time when she was ill. We were all delighted to see her return to us in good health and in her customary happy efficiency.

In recognition of Miss Filer's thirty-five years loyal service, the Management Committee has opened a Testimonial Fund for her. Many members have already subscribed and those who have not yet done so, are invited to send or hand their tangible tribute to the office or any Committee member before Saturday, October 9th next.

Finally I give my thanks to all the other members of the Staff; the Doormen, Cleaners, Car Park Attendants, and Handymen for their loyalty and efficiency.

We are about to enter a period of great change in the Club, but I am confident that with the enthusiasm and loyalty of the members we can look forward to a future as bright and successful as the past.

On behalf of the Management Committee I wish to express their appreciation to all Members for the sterling support given to the Club during 1964-65.

If, as I believe it is true, that a Club is carried by the quality and numbers of its members, then, why not aim to carry it **Shoulder High**.

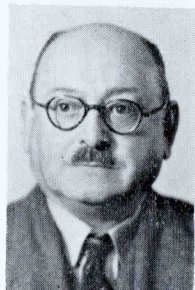

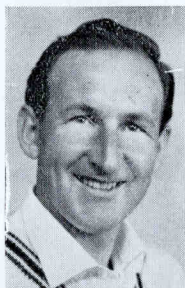

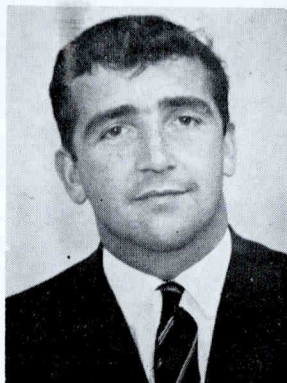

## CARDIFF RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

### Chairman's Report for the Season 1964-65

**Playing.** Our Team, under the captaincy of Meirion Roberts, opened the Season more promisingly than it had done for some years. Once again all matches in September were won and there was much praise for the attacking skill, and the approach to the new laws. We amassed a total of 223 points for, to only 30 against, which gave us an average for of just 26 points per match. Alas, this sparkling momentum was not maintained, and the season's final results show that the average points scored per match dwindled to 14. In all, 12 matches were lost during the season.

I think it was, perhaps, the weakness in the basic principles of the game that was our undoing, namely, the giving and taking of passes at speed. The pack, led by Howard Norris, was an excellent unit, and it appeared on certain occasions to take matters into its own hands when the backs were failing to exploit the possession given to them. 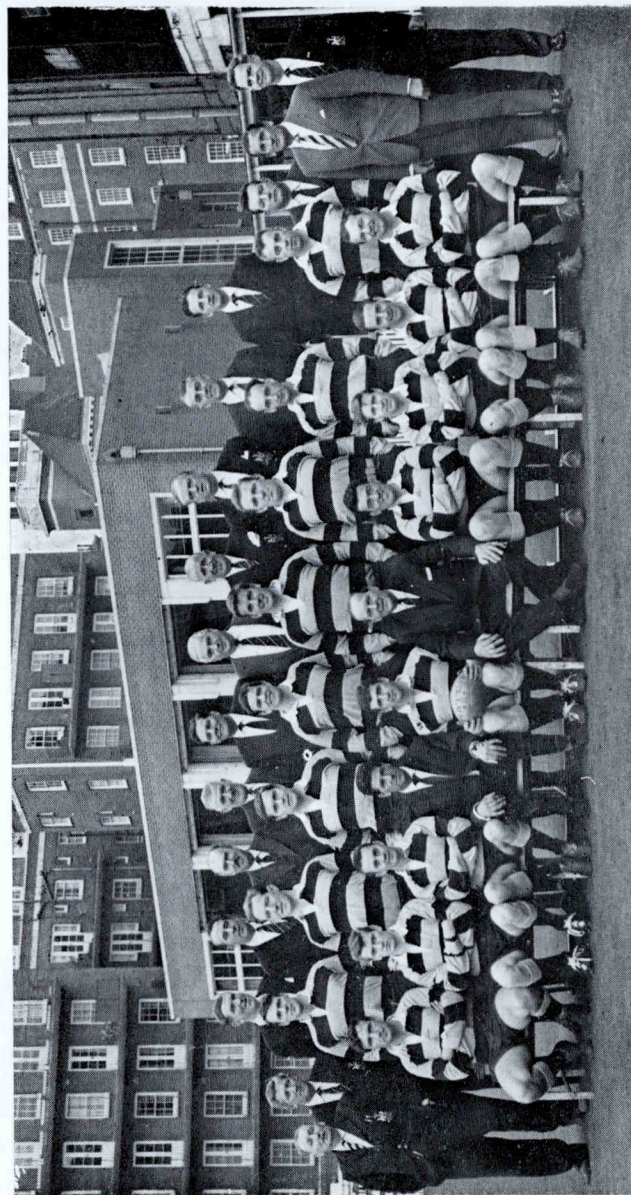

**Finance.** Financially, the season was better than for many seasons, the receipts were £8,346, which showed an increase of £1,799, the highest since season 1959/60. It was very pleasing to the Committee to see such an increase especially as the trend in the last few years has been downwards. We hope that the upward trend will continue and that the numbers of our season ticket holders and members of the Football section will increase.

He took part in 381 matches, has been a Selector for many years and took over as Fixture Secretary after the retirement of D. E. Davies.

Gwyn Davies joined the Club in 1946/47 and has been a member of the Football Committee for 11 years. He has done an excellent job of editing our programmes. The two new members nominated to the Committee are well known to all of us—Lloyd Williams (ex-Captain of Cardiff and Wales) and Fred Croster, the well-known ex-Referee who has had previous experience of serving on our Committee. We all wish them well for next season.

**Administration.** The administration side of the Football Club has been first-class. I must pay tribute to Frank Trott, Hon. Secretary, David Grant for his help and advice and to the Office Staff, Miss Anne Davies and Mrs. Walter John, who made life so much easier and the task of the Football Committee so much lighter, also to Les Gerry and his staff for giving us the best playing surface ever.



Thanks are also extended to Dr. J. H. Naysmith and his colleagues, the Hon. Masseurs—T. Arcas, T. Holley, K. Ashton and K. Harse; to the Conductor and Members of the St. Alban's Band and to Mr. David Cooper and his Staff.

We are all pleased to see Miss B. Filer back again after her illness and thank her and the Bar Staff for looking after our players, members and guests so well after our games.

Our thanks go to our old friend "Danny" Davies for all his help in keeping the records and supplying the statistics for the Chairman's Report.

**New Ground.** Heads of Terms have been provisionally agreed between the Welsh Rugby Union and the Cardiff Athletic Club and also between the Cardiff Athletic Club and the Cardiff Corporation, but nothing has yet been signed. # CARDIFF CRICKET CLUB

## REPORT - Season 1964

In reviewing such a unique season as that which the Cardiff Cricket Club enjoyed in 1964 one has to be aware of the dangers of self-congratulation. Both the First and Second XI's achieved the distinction of being unbeaten throughout the season and one hopes to avoid both false modesty and pompous pride in presenting this report.

Alun Friday, perhaps more widely known for his stalwart performances on a nearby field, was honoured with the captaincy of the Club and justified the faith of his colleagues by leading them in a campaign which produced the following results:—

Played 25. Won 15. Drawn 8. Abandoned 2. Lost 0.

If the proportion of drawn games would appear to be somewhat high, it may be pointed out with some relevance that a number of opposing teams viewed with some reluctance the challenge to score a reasonable target set them. On a number of occasions, too, opponents had indulged, to a reprehensible degree, in time-wasting and negative tactics to prevent a probable Cardiff win. However, these games were more than compensated for by some wonderful highlights. A 50-run win against the Australian Old Collegians was probably the best match of the season. The "double" over our old friends from St. Fagans can never fail to be enjoyable, whilst a win "against the clock" at Barry can also have its pleasures. This latter game produced a magnificent knock of 107 by John Lewis, an innings that was to cause many opponents in later matches to review their "runs and minutes" ratio. Hundreds were also scored by Alan Thomas, who had a most consistent season, and John Davies, whose schoolmastering duties prevented his playing more than six innings. But perhaps the season's most brilliant performance came from Peter Gatehouse. His 68 wickets—a Club record—cost a little over 8 runs apiece and his partnership with Tony Cordle devastated many teams. Peter left for the United States at the end of the season to take up an exchange research scholarship and will not be with us for the 1965 season. As sighs of relief go up from many a dressing room we send him our best wishes.

### THE CAPTAIN'S COMMENTS.

When I was appointed Captain for the 1964 season I stated that I hoped we would have a happy and successful season, and we know now how completely that hope was fulfilled. For this fulfilment I have to thank many people who made it possible, and helped to write another page in the history of our Club. Firstly I would like to thank my Vice-captain, Alan Thomas, for his full and most capable assistance; if there is a better and more consistent all rounder in South Wales Club Cricket, I do not know him. Secondly my thanks go to the Committee and the Selection Committee, and especially to our Chairman and first team umpire, Jack Evans. We are fortunate to have such a great and loyal officer.

I express, too, my gratitude to the Captains of the Second and Third Elevens, John Herbert and Harry Ernest. The strength of the first eleven always depends on the strength of the two other teams, and my task was made easy because I was always able to call upon good players from the second team, and I am grateful for the very willing co-operation I had from its skipper.

Lastly and by no means least, I would like to thank all those who played for the first team for making it such a successful and memorable season. It was only the second time in the 97 years history of the Cardiff Cricket Club for the first team to go through the season unbeaten, and there are a number of individual efforts that I must mention, Peter Gatehouse broke the Club Record for the highest number of wickets taken in a season, and he richly deserved that honour. There was, too, his speed twin, Tony Cordle, a fine cricketer and a friendly character. Tony is now making his career with Glamorgan and we wish him well and congratulate him and his colleagues on their victory over the Australian tourist at Swansea. We must, however, not forget that all the wickets were not taken by the "quickies", for David Lewis, Ross Johnson and Alan Thomas spun the ball to great effect and took many valuable wickets.

Turning to the batting; we congratulate John Lewis on topping the averages. The most memorable innings was undoubtedly his century at Barry and this proved to be the start of good things to come, for runs flowed from this youngster's bat throughout the season. John Davies and his brother Roger, too, batted extremely well, as did K. D. Williams, David Herbert, Paul Good and of course, Alan Thomas.

The future of the Club seems assured of success with the many young players like Peter Simpson, Paul Good and Jack Lewis making such fine progress as batsmen, while Wally Carter and Liam Robinson will be looked to for the brunt of the speed bowling. They will be fortunate to have such a good wicket keeper as Derek Pask to assist them.

Finally my thanks go to Les Gerry and his ground staff for providing us with such good wickets; we appreciate their efforts.

A glance at the averages will reveal the Club's general consistency and depths of reserve strength. This latter quality was provided by a Second XI which, under the captaincy of John Herbert, enjoyed a season almost equal in performance to that of the First XI. The full record was as follows:—

Played 22. Won 9. Drawn 11. Abandoned 2. Lost 0.

There again the proportion of drawn games was too high. Too often, indeed, after having their opponents "on the run" the Second XI were not able to complete the rout. Perhaps the presence of a good off-spinner would have accounted for this deficiency in an otherwise proficient team. Consistent performances from Graham Rees, Nigel Rees and Eddie Donovan provided many runs and the bulk of the bowling was done by Wally Carter and Liam Robinson. Mention must also be made of the whole-hearted efforts of Malcolm Page both



with bat and ball. The team would have been much the poorer but for his effervescent contributions. Newcomers in Paul Good, Peter Stimpson, Peter Edwards and Peter Cook turned in some useful performances which promise well for the future, whilst John Webb and Gwyn Davies gave some seasoned and mature batting exhibitions.

The Reserve XI, which could, with some justification, claim to be the poor relation of the Club, again persevered manfully under Harry Ernest's leadership. For the most part, games were played against indifferent opposition and on poor wickets. The latter was the cause of inconsistent batting and it is not surprising that the luxury of compiling averages has been dispensed with. However, the XI was a happy unit and, even if it was back at the Arms Park just after the tea interval on many occasions, perhaps that in itself was a compensatory feature. Battle-bruised stalwarts of this campaign were Gordon Eccles, Bob Cragg, Clive Williams and Frank Delderfield, whilst bowlers Brian Corbett and John Timmins may well have enjoyed themselves rather more.

The Sunday XI was led, in the main, by John Davis and it is to him that great credit should be given for the more positive approach to the playing of Sunday Cricket. His efforts on the field were not inconsiderable but it is to his regard for the necessity of proper organisation of a game of cricket that we are even more indebted.

The 24-Over Knock-out Competition was sponsored by Messrs. Whitbreads Ltd., and a handsome trophy was presented by them. The Club lost to St. Fagans in a replayed final and no-one would begrudge Ernie Tyerman and his team their deserved success.

The Six-a-side competition was won by a Cardiff VI and a thoroughly enjoyable day's cricket gave the organisers every encouragement to repeat the event.

An experimental Single Wicket Competition was held for the first time on the last Sunday in September and proved to be a most interesting event. The winner was, perhaps rather surprisingly, Paul Good, who defeated Harry Shewring in the final. The experiment was undoubtedly successful and thought should be given to its retention as an annual event.

The end of the season saw the retirement of Mr. Wyndham Lewis as Honorary Secretary of the Club after 16 years in office. It is not easy to assess fully the extent of Wyndham's efforts in the promotion of the Club's affairs in that time. His introduction of the 24-Over K.O. and Six-a-side competitions long before they had been thought of by most clubs, was just one example of his foresight and organising ability. Many players who have yet to play for Cardiff will, unknowingly, be indebted to him for his services to cricket in general and to the Cardiff Club in particular.

Tributes are also willingly paid to those others who, by their very presence, add so much dignity to the game of cricket—the umpires and scorers. Few Clubs can have been better served in this direction than by Mr. Jack Evans and Mr. Len Thomas. Their conscientiousness and reliability are greatly valued.

In December a Celebration Dinner was held at the Clubhouse when mementos were presented to members of both the First and Second XI's and to Mr. Wyndham Lewis. Our guests included Mr. Ian Peebles and Mr. Donald Robinson of the "Sunday Times", and many South Wales cricket personalities. A memorable evening was enjoyed by all.

And now, what of the future? In 1967 we shall be celebrating our Centenary as Cardiff Cricket Club. But before then we shall have moved to our new ground at Sophia Gardens. There will be many who will see this move as the sacrificing of an inheritance and there will be others who will see it as the beginning of a new era of promise in the Club's history. Let us hope, however, that they will all go forward with the resolution that, wherever Cardiff Cricket Club plays there are many more seasons to be enjoyed like that of 1964.

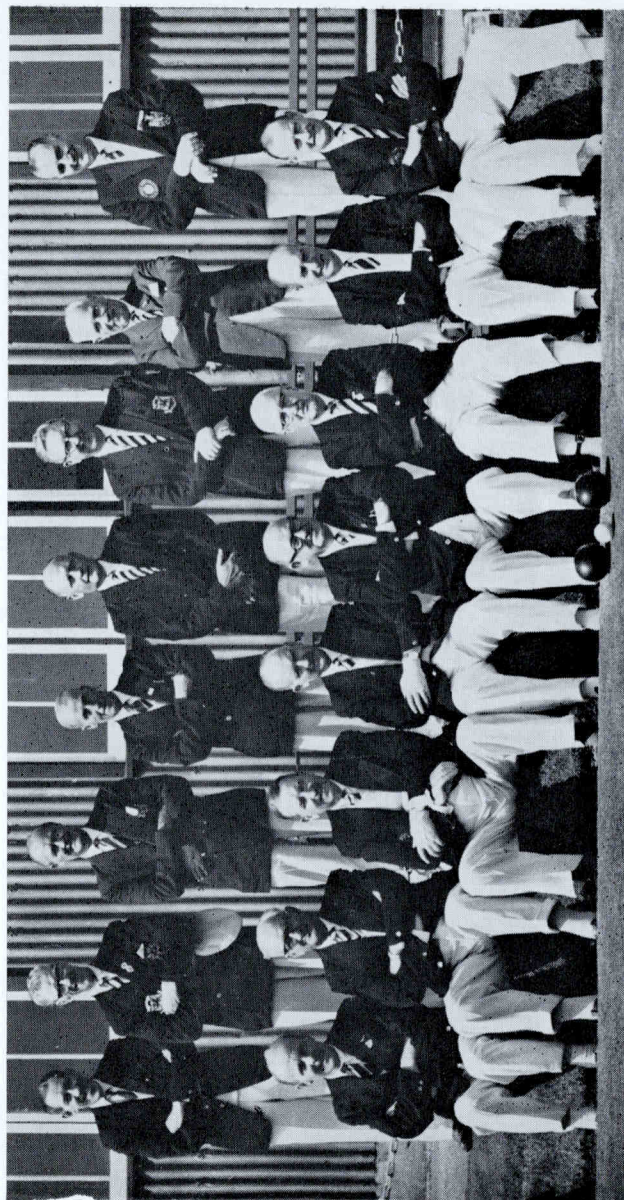

### Annual Report for Season 1964



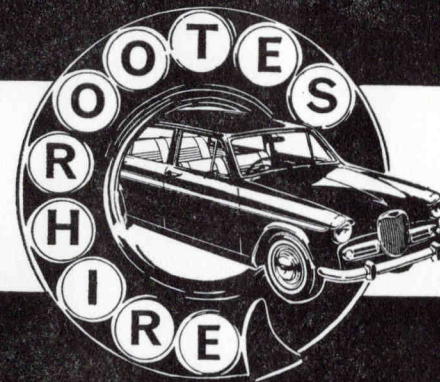
