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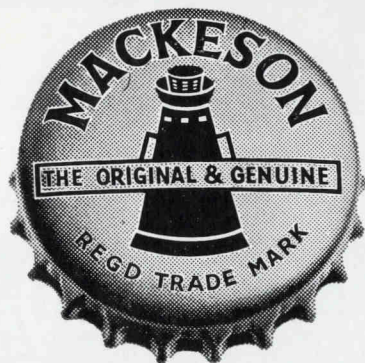
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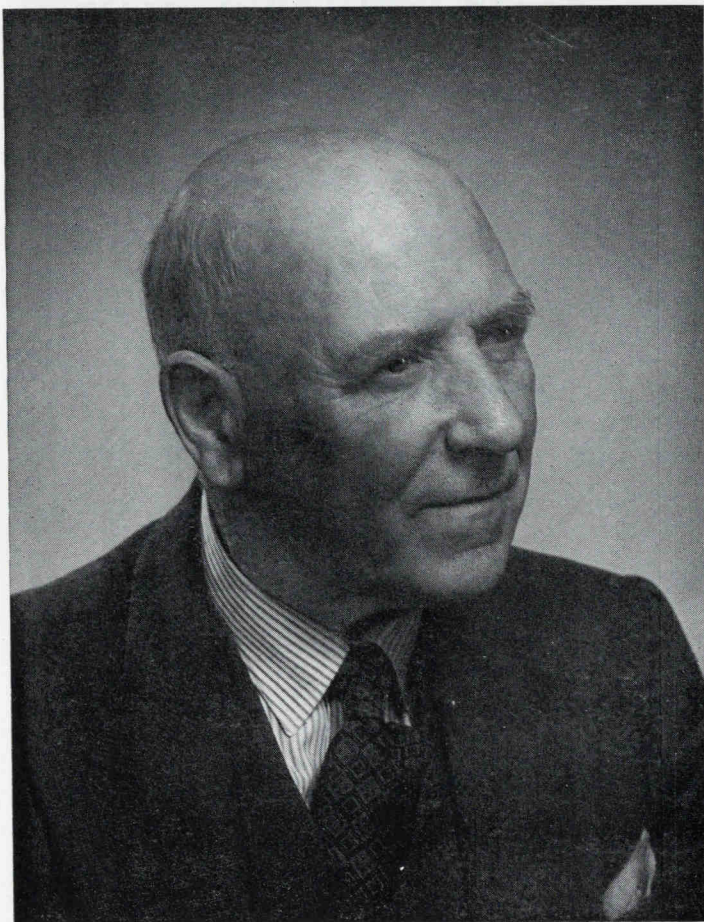

Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee

THE ACCOUNTS: I hope that every member of the Club will give the Accounts for the year 1962-63 the very careful examination they call for. The excess of Income over Expenditure of £471 is the lowest since pre-war days and on an income of nearly £60,000 gives cause for greater anxiety. For several years I have voiced the concern of the Management Committee at the steady falling off in revenue from Football Gates and Season Ticket sales, items which in the past have produced the substantial surpluses which the Club enjoyed and which made possible the building and equipment of the Club House. The figures for these items for 1962-63 show a further fall of £722 compared with those of 1961-62, although the three holiday matches were played at Christmas time in 1962 which had to be cancelled in December, 1961, and although for last season, prices of admission and Season Tickets were increased. In 1958-59 the two items produced £13,554, in 1954-55 £17,014, and last year only £7,856. The seriousness of such a falling off when costs of materials and services of all kinds have risen and are steadily and substantially rising, cannot be over emphasized, especially when the general apathy towards most forms of outdoor sporting activities, which is so manifest at the present time, is considered.

Throughout the year the Committee has exercised very strict control over Expenditure and in many cases economies have been effected and in other cases increases have been small and quite unavoidable. This is noticeable in the items of Football expenditure. Salaries and wages cost £790 more than for the previous year but £648 of this was due to the engagement of extra office staff.

Upkeep of Grounds and Pavilion at £3,718 shows an increase of £1,305 on last year's figures. This is due largely to the Club's share (50 per cent) of the cost of repairs to a section of the East Terrace. We had been informed that the condition of all the terraces was such that remedial work had to be carried out to make them safe. In order to ascertain the possible cost of this work it was decided to repair a part of the East Terrace. This was done and

the total cost was £3,304. At this rate the cost for carrying out similar work for all the terraces would be very high and it has been decided to carry out work of a less permanent nature but which will be equally effective from the safety point of view.

The increase of £444 in the cost of Stationery, Telephones and Postages is due to higher prices and charges; yet at £1201, it is less than for 1957-58 when the figure was £1,314.

In December, 1962, the manually operated Fruit Machine was exchanged for a quieter, more modern electrically operated machine at a net cost of £270, £175 being allowed on the old model.

On the Income side £9,531 was received in Members' Subscriptions, i.e. £878 more than in 1961-62. This is a somewhat disappointing figure as the subscription rate had been increased by One Guinea.

The Committee, conscious of the fall in revenue indicated above and of the trend of rising costs has endeavoured to increase income by improving the Club premises and the Catering amenities; organising the Lottery; providing organised Car Parking and by other efforts. These, what one may term non-athletic ventures have made the running of the Club possible. The surplus on the Bar and Catering Account after paying wages, the cost of renewals and equipment and allowing for depreciation on furniture was £5,129; the Greyhound donation was £1,000; car parking provided £651; ground earnings was £650; the two fruit machines produced £2,280; other items produced £712; in all £10,422 was received from these sources. Further the Lottery in the thirty-six weeks it had been running to the end of the financial year showed a profit of £5,037, £5,000 of which has been invested in short term Local Government Loans. In the same period £6,137 was paid out as Prize Money. Many members are not participating in the Lottery and I appeal to them to come in and persuade their friends to join too. The Organising Committee is anxious to increase the Prize Money to £300 per week, for that would mean the Club too would benefit by a similar amount.

In order that the Balance Sheet should present a more realistic picture of the Club affairs £5,000 has been

written off the Club House and £2,080 off the Furniture, Fittings, etc.

THE INTERNATIONAL GROUND: In May, 1963, the Welsh Rugby Union informed the Club that the limitation in the number of matches to be played on the Park proposed by the Club was not satisfactory to the Union and that it had therefore signed a contract with the Dunraven Estate for the purchase of 80 acres near Bridgend. The Union and Club had not broken off negotiations but they had at the Union's request been left in abeyance. In July the Lord Mayor called a meeting, at which the Council, local business people and sporting organisations were represented. The object of the meeting was to discover whether anything could be done to retain International Rugby Football in Cardiff. In September the Football Committee considered a proposal put forward by Mr. Hubert Johnson, with plans and slides by Mr. J. Webb, by which the Union would have the sole use of the Football Ground; the present Cricket Ground would become the venue for the Cardiff Rugby Club's matches; and an area at Pontcanna would be reserved for the Cricket and Hockey Sections. The plan received the approval in principle of all sections of the Club and the Management Committee. It was presented to the Glamorgan County Cricket Club, the Greyhound Racing Company and the City Council. All these bodies approved of the plan after slight modification had been made in it and the Union too decided that the proposal was worthy of consideration. The Union and Club have appointed Sub-Committees and at the time of writing these bodies are working out details.

THE LICENSING ACT 1961: The provisions of the Act made it necessary to alter the Rules of the Club and after many Committee and two General Meetings new rules were adopted. On 15th February, 1962, they were approved by the Licensing authorities and the Club registered for 10 years.

THE WORLD TITLE FIGHT: The Committee, in order to improve the financial position of the Club, sanctioned the use of the Rugby Ground for a World Title fight in May or June but owing to the defeat of the then champion the arrangements fell through.

OBITUARY: During the year three Vice-Presidents, Sir Robert Webber, O.B.E., J.P., Mr. Frank Webber, O.B.E., J.P., and Mr. E. E. Pearce, M.B.E., J.P., died. All had been founder members of the Club and had maintained a keen interest in it until their deaths.

SECTION REPORTS: Once again I commend the Section Reports to members.

THANKS: The many activities of the Club would not be possible if it were not for the hard work and enthusiasm of the honorary officials and Committee members and on behalf of the members I express sincere thanks. The Club is fortunate too in having the services of an excellent staff of workers ably led by Mr. Grant, Miss Filer and Mr. Francis; they are not merely time servers but are always willing to do extra work when called upon. During the bitter weather of last winter they were frequently called upon to work under very difficult conditions and did so willingly; I express my appreciation.

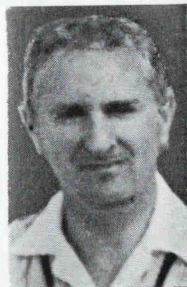

Chairman's Report for Season 1962-63

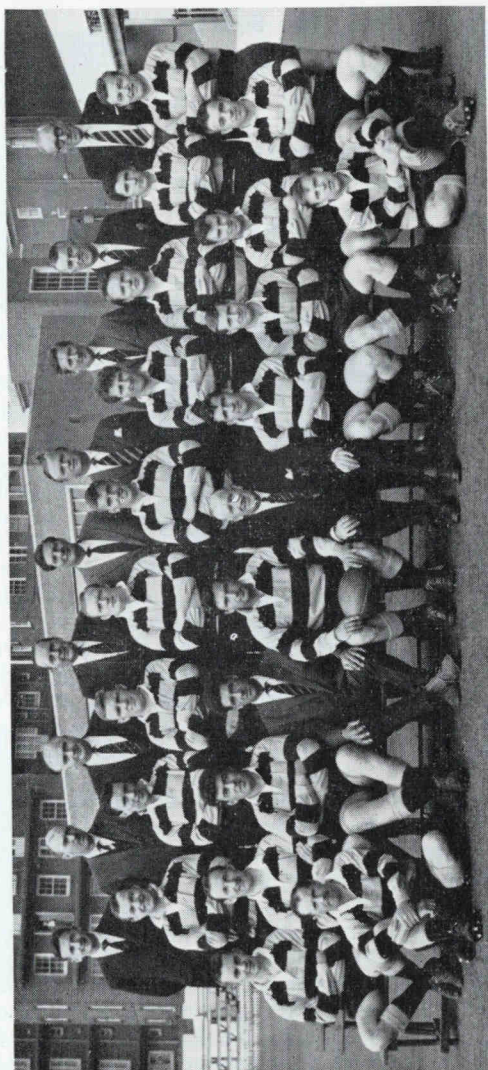
The playing records for 1962-63 and 1961-62 were remarkably similar. In 1961-62, 27 matches were won, 10 lost, 5 drawn and 5 of those lost were in March and April, while last year the figures were 26 won, 12 lost, 5 drawn and 6 lost in the last two months. Once again the Club did not do well in the Sevens. It met the eventual winners Newport in the First Round and went down by 14 points to 5.

The Season started badly; the first match against Ebbw Vale away on 1st September being lost by 9 points to 0 and the third match against Neath at home being lost by 16 points to 3. Only once since the War has such a poor start been made; in 1947-48 the second match against Pontypool was lost by 17 points to 14, the Pontypool score being made up of one converted goal and 3 dropped goals. The next five games were won in a convincing fashion; one, a very satisfactory victory, being over our great Midland rivals, Coventry by 25 points to 3. On 29th September, Aberavon triumphed over us after a closely contested game by 10 points to 3. From that date until 2nd March, 1963, only one match was lost when on 3rd November, Oxford won on the Park by the narrow margin of one dropped goal to nil. During this period fine victories were achieved over Newport twice, and over Wasps, Swansea and Harlequins away, and Bective Rangers and Ebbw Vale at home.

The holiday matches at home against Bristol, Wasps, Watsonians and Gloucester were all won by 19-8; 17-5; 35-5 and 11-0 respectively. These matches could not have been played had it not been for the foresight of our Honorary Secretary, Mr. Frank Trott in having straw delivered to the ground in good time, and the strenuous efforts of the ground staff, committee men and volunteers from the spectators who removed and replaced the straw. Thanks too, to the hard work accomplished by these workers it was possible to play the International versus England and it is pleasing to place on record that Mr. Cyril Gadney congratulated the Club and its Staff for its

efforts which had made this game possible when nearly every ground in the country was unfit for play because of the frozen condition.

On 2nd March, Newport played us on the Park as the Newport ground was frost bound and against forecasts won by 6 points to 5. Then in March and April as in 1962 occurred the falling off in form and Bristol (A), Gloucester (A), Barbarians (H), Harlequins (H) and Bridgend (A) achieved victories over us. The three Cornish Tour games were easily won by 13-5; 21-8; and 39-0. The match which should have been played against Cross Keys on 2nd February, but was cancelled because of the frozen state of the ground was played on 1st May, and to the great delight of the Cross Keys team and supporters we were beaten by 8 points to 0.

Then on 3rd May we lost to Neath (A) by 6 points to 5 and the season closed on 7th May with a good win over Glamorgan Wanderers by 24 points to nil.

So ended a strange season — a season badly affected by Arctic conditions for nearly 3 months — a season when Cardiff, inspired by precept and example by the skipper Dai Hayward, played open attacking football, trying always to make the games attractive to the spectators and enjoyable for the players. It is difficult to explain the falling off in form at certain periods.

Report for the Season 1962-63

The Cardiff Junior XV has enjoyed a moderately successful season when compared with the records of previous years. The programme was interrupted by the inclement weather and out of a fixture list of 30 matches only sixteen were played. Of these 12 were won and 4 drawn, with 303 points for and 36 against. The standard of play was quite good and the quality of the opposition appeared to have strengthened.

The team was unsuccessful in its attempts to retain the Sevens Cups which it had won in the previous seasons but the players performed in the typical Cardiff attractive manner.

Islwyn Matthews, the Captain, and Jim Mills both gained Welsh Youth Caps against France and England, and England respectively and in addition Geoffrey Jones and David Ivens played for the Welsh Youth against the Midlands Youth XV. Ten players also represented the Cardiff and District representative side and Jim Mills and Ron Hill played for the "Rags" XV in the last matches of the season.

The 1962 Season proved to be yet another successful one for the First XI. Although the weather was often unfriendly, it is surprising that it caused only four games to be cancelled.

The First XI was a very well balanced side, with each member being able to give a good account of himself with the bat. The batting strength can be judged by the fact that only on two occasions did the whole side bat. The club was also fortunate in possessing an extremely good and fast attack. The fielding was generally good, and an improvement was shown by the fielders close to the wicket.

Included in our twelve victories were doubles over St. Fagans and Cowbridge, but the best win of the season was against Bristol Imperial, who set us the task of scoring 203 in 2 hours 10 minutes; we accomplished this for the loss of five wickets, with ten minutes to spare; Alan Thomas scoring 90 and Alan Pleass 47. Another very good win was against Stroud at the Arms Park, when Alan Priday and Ross Johnson bowled our opponents out for 79, and we won by 8 wickets; Nigel Rees scoring a very good 50 not out.

The annual "Whitsun Tour" to Gloucester and Stroud was more successful than of late, and the Club was able to turn out a representative eleven. We beat Gloucester by six wickets; John Webb scoring 56 not out and drew with Stroud; Maurice Givan 50 not out.

Our only defeat came late in August against Maesteg Town, when our batting let us down for the only time during the season, and we were all out for 83.

One individual hundred was recorded, Alan Thomas scoring 105 against Abergavenny. Alan Priday, who topped the batting averages, played some fine innings, especially his 69 not out against Pontypridd and 41 not out against Cowbridge. It was Nigel Rees, however, who showed the most improvement with the bat, and, in addition to his 50 not out against Stroud, batted with much more confidence than in past years. Of the other players, John Webb and Ross Johnson could generally be relied upon to score some quick runs.

The outstanding bowling performances were usually reserved for our opening attack of Peter Gatehouse and newcomer Tony Cordle. Peter topped the bowling averages and took 52 wickets during the season, capturing five or more wickets in a match on six occasions, with a best performance of 7 for 14 against Cowbridge. Tony Cordle came next with 30 wickets, and with a best performance against Ebbw Vale at home, when he took 6 for 37 in 22 overs, and helping us to another win by taking the last wicket in the final over of the match. Other good performances were by David Lewis with 6 for 26 against St. Fagans and by Alan Priday and Ross Johnson.

Congratulations to Peter Gatehouse and David Lewis who were invited to play for the Glamorgan County Cricket Club during the season.

CARDIFF CRICKET CLUB — Second XI

Captain's Report for 1962

This was a summer during which the weather, for the most part, was not ideal for playing cricket and in consequence the cricket played by the Second Eleven was rather undistinguished in keeping with the weather.

On the fixture list twenty matches had been arranged but of these three were cancelled without a ball being bowled, two owing to rain and one because our opponents did not make an appearance. It was doubly unfortunate that for the second season in succession the game against Briton Ferry Town early in May could not be played owing to rain. In addition two games were abandoned because of rain during our innings and before our opponents had batted. It is interesting to note that these two matches produced the two best opening stands of the season. Against Newport at Newport we had made 70 for no wicket when the rain came and against Pontypridd at Cardiff rain stopped play when our first wicket fell at 162.

Of the remaining 15 fixtures, which were played throughout, results were obtained in 13, only two matches being left drawn. This was a very satisfactory feature and showed the advantage of playing until 8.0 p.m. whenever possible instead of finishing at 7.45 p.m. or earlier. Both the drawn games were against Cowbridge who batted second on each occasion making no attempt to win either game but being content to play for a draw from the beginning of their innings. In these circumstances we were unable to bowl our opponents out in the time available, on the one occasion dismissing 9 opponents and on the other 7.

Nine matches were won — the same number as the preceding season — there was one tie and three matches were lost. The tie which was against Newport at Cadriff was most exciting. Each side scored 76 runs. We batted first and the feature of the game was the bowling by Malcolm Page who took 8 wickets for 14 runs in just over 13 overs, the last Newport man being caught on the mid wicket boundary to tie the match.

At the beginning of June we lost two matches in successive weeks. At Cardiff against Bristol Imperial our opponents wished to finish the match early at 7.30 p.m. Misguidedly, in the event, Bristol were asked to bat first in the hope that in this way we might be able to force a win in the restricted time. In spite of the new ball and Tony Cordle our opponents declared at 201 for 4 wickets and bowled us out for 101. Our fielding could only be described as atrocious, the number of catches dropped or missed being legion. One of our opponents profited by his good luck to score 136 — a big score in club cricket. Our batting also failed lamentably and could only be described as on a par with the fielding.

The following week we lost a much more even match at Crickhowell but here again it was our short comings rather than the skill of our opponents which beat us. Having made 166 for 9 wickets declared we dismissed the first five Crickhowell batsmen for 29. They recovered to 73 for 6 and 142 for 9 wickets when we allowed the last wicket to put on the necessary 25 runs to win the match in a very exciting finish.

The third match lost was against Cardiff H.S.O.B. in what proved to be the last match of the season. It is unfortunate that we usually play the Old Boys' in late August when our side is seriously depleted because of holidays and possibly Football trial matches. On this occasion we could only raise ten players and a score of 101 was not sufficient, our opponents obtaining the runs comparatively comfortably for the loss of 5 wickets.

We were delighted to beat our old rivals and friends St. Fagans twice in the season. Barry and Ebbw Vale were also beaten twice each while we defeated Pontypridd, Pontnewynydd and Briton Ferry Steelworks once to make up the nine victories. In the match at Barry our opponents batting second were dismissed for the very small total of 18. However in the return game at Cardiff we had to struggle to win by two wickets with less than five minutes remaining for play. After our opponents had made 141 all out we fell to 114 for 8 wickets before Russell Jenkins joined Brian Joseph in a match winning stand.

Most of the other games won ended with reasonably comfortable victories and not too much anxiety and excitement in the closing stages. However at Pontypridd after the home side had recovered from 26 for 7 wickets to make 129 all out we lost 7 wickets for 101 before Ray Hill and Brian Sims produced a stand of 30 runs to win the match.

In the match at Barry which was won so easily Nigel Rees made an excellent 104 not out, the first hundred made for the Second Eleven for a number of years and the only hundred of the season by a member of our side. In the same match N. Edwards and P. Jones opened the bowling and bowled throughout taking respectively 5 wickets for 7 runs and 5 wickets for 8 runs. Three no balls made up the rest of our opponents score. N. K. Contractor had another consistent season as a batsman although his bowling was not so effective as in previous years. He had only one large score — 70 against Pontypridd at Cardiff — but generally did his job as an opening batsman very well. John Duncan was top of the batting averages although not scoring quite so many runs as N. K. Contractor. John Duncan had a very good innings of 81 at Briton Ferry and our two opening batsmen were highly successful being first and third in the averages. John Lewis, although batting only four times for the second eleven, had two large scores, 91 against Cowbridge at the beginning of the season and 80 not out against Pontypridd after his return from School. He shows much promise and it is to be hoped that he will soon become a consistent and valuable member of the first team. He also bowled with no little success on the few occasions on which he played.

Although H. Williams and M. Givan each made one 50 during the season neither was sufficiently consistent to warrant a place in the first eleven. However both show promise and the Club will wish them to develop to take their places in the first team when older players retire. Brian Joseph had three very useful innings, including 60 not out against Cowbridge at Cardiff, and ended up second in the batting averages. When he plays his natural game and attacks the bowling, he is liable to make runs very quickly as a lower middle order batsman. Malcolm Page and John James and others made useful contributions to the batting from time to time but generally speaking the batting was rather disappointing and not nearly so consistent as in previous seasons.

Apart from taking 5 wickets at Barry, N. Edwards took 5 wickets on two other occasions during the first five matches of the season. Unfortunately he could not keep up this form and his performances declined rather disappointingly during the remainder of the season. Paul Jones disappointed apart from his 5 wickets at Barry but he will surely improve and fulfil his early promise. It is a pity that he has decided to leave the Club, also A. Furst who showed distinct promise and bowled very well to take 6 wickets for 34 runs at Pontypridd. John James also took 5 wickets on one occasion and generally bowled steadily but Malcolm Page, apart from his great performance against Newport, had to work hard for his wickets and seldom seemed to bowl with much luck. Brian Joseph was a steady opening bowler, his best performance being 4 wickets for 8 runs at Briton Ferry. W. J. Carter bowled well on occasions and it is to be hoped that he will soon develop greater accuracy and consistency.

The wicket keeping was done almost entirely by Russell Jenkins who had a successful season ending with a total of 21 victims.

It was not an outstanding season but nevertheless enjoyable. While the running between the wickets showed improvement and rather more discretion, the fielding was not so good as in previous seasons.

Our thanks are due to all those who contributed in any way to our enjoyment of our cricket; To the umpires and scorers — particularly B. Kempson and B. Jones; To A. Francis and his team of groundsmen for the good wickets and general care of the ground; To the Secretary of the Club — David Grant — and to Wyndham Lewis our indefatigable Section Honorary Secretary.

Finally my thanks are gratefully given to the Captains of the First XI and Reserve XI for their ready co-operation and to Nigel Rees, the Vice-Captain, who played with us very little since his batting was required by the First XI.

My three years as Captain have been most enjoyable for me and I hope that all those who have played in the Second XI have enjoyed their cricket as much as I have.

Inevitably any review of the 1962-63 season must start with a reference to the weather. During the season no fewer than 48 matches had to be cancelled, or about two-fifths of the fixtures arranged for the Club's four sides. This was particularly unfortunate in a season in which the Club's overall playing record was probably as high as it had ever been. Although fewer players than usual gained representative honours the general standard of play reached a uniformly impressive standard. Of 76 fixtures fulfilled 50 were won and only 19 lost, and the improvement in the records of the junior sides promises well for the future of the Club.

The First XI was again captained with enthusiasm and ability by Peter Wilkinson. It temporarily lost its rhythm when play was resumed after the snow, and lost three successive games in which its opponents scored 10 goals without reply. In the remainder of the season, however, it lost only to Beckenham and Bristol and its defences conceded only a fraction more than one goal a match. The outstanding achievement was probably the "double" over the powerful Weston-super-Mare side. During the London weekend Hounslow, still one of the strongest club sides in Great Britain, were held to a draw on their own ground.

In the "A" XI, captained for the second year by Peter Hall, both attack and defence did well, with an average of over 3 goals a match for and only fractionally over 1 goal a match against. The forward line scored 31 goals in its first 6 matches, and failed to score on only one occasion, whilst on only two occasions in 20 matches did the defence concede more than 2 goals.

The improvement in the records of the two "B" XI's, and in particular the very marked advance in their scoring power, was a source of great satisfaction. A useful pool of reserve players is now being built up.

The state of the grounds on which the Club has to fulfil its fixtures remains a matter of concern. The wet weather in the early part of the season, followed by the snow, meant that the Arms Park could hardly be used at all, and the Pontcanna pitches appear to be deteriorating rather than improving. Efforts are being made in the close season to affect some improvement in the standard of maintenance at Pontcanna.

The Club entered a team for the Penarth 6-a-side tournament early in the season and were runners-up. At the end of the season a Club 6-a-side team won the Weston-super-Mare tournament against some very strong opposition.

On the social side, the Club dance was held on 7th December, 1962 and proved a success from every point of view, making a profit of over £41.

The Club's thanks must once again be offered most sincerely to the General Secretary and his staff and to the head-groundsmen and the ground staff, for their assistance and co-operation throughout what, except for the weather, can fairly be claimed to have been an extremely successful season.
