Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee

THE ACCOUNTS: In my report for the year 1960-61 I wrote "the urgent necessity to increase our income or/and cut our expenditure is clearly indicated." The accounts for the past year show clearly that these aims are still of paramount importance. The excess of income over expenditure of £1,226 is the lowest with the exception of 1959-60 for very many years.

On the expenditure side, the item "Salaries and Wages" at £7,901 is £792 more than last year and is due to higher costs of living. Away match expenses at £2,957 show an increase of £653. This is due to the increased costs of transport and hotel accommodation and to the fact that the match against Bective Rangers was played last season in Dublin. Compared with 1959-60 when the Club played before in Ireland there is a saving of £531, as away expenses that year were £3,488. The Football Committee is exercising economies on this item. The increase of £283 in the cost of Water, Light and Heat was absolutely unavoidable because of rising costs of these services. The increase of £138 for Stationery, Telephones and Postages is due to increased postal rates, and the cost of summoning the Special General Meeting of members but even so, this item cost considerably less than for the year 1958-59. During the year the Committee authorised a survey of the stands and terraces and the Consulting Engineer's Report stressed that very considerable expenditure must be incurred almost immediately to prevent further deterioration of the structures and make them safe. The cost of this work will be borne by the Club, the W.R.U. and the Greyhound Racing Company.

On the Income side, Football Gates show a fall of £211, but as the three holiday matches at Christmas were cancelled, this comparatively small decrease indicates that there has been no serious falling off in attendance of the general public. In fact if the 3 matches had been played, the Football Gates for 1961-62 would not have for the first time for 6 years shown a falling off. Revenue from Sale of Season Tickets fell by £421. This fall is noticeable

in every year when there is no touring side here. A particularly pleasing feature is the slight increase of £63 from Members Subscriptions. Car parking produced a revenue of £567 after payment of attendants' wages. Apart from this financial gain to the Club, the car-parking situation is much more satisfactory than it has been for years.

I must point out that revenue from Investments will show a marked decrease next year as money has been withdrawn to pay for improvements to the Ground Floor of the Club House. Your Committee feels however that the expenditure in this section will prove a sound investment and that members will appreciate the amenities provided.

The Bar and Catering Accounts are once again highly satisfactory. Bar Sales increased by £2,780 to £30,391, and Catering Revenue increased by £728 to £4,655. As a result, after payment of Bar and Catering Wages, expenditure on equipment, decoration etc. and allowances for depreciation of Furniture etc., a surplus of £5,562 was achieved.

From the Balance Sheet it will be noted that the loan from the Glamorgan County Cricket Club has been reduced to £1,000 and this will be cleared on 1st October, 1962. The Club is indebted to the Rugby Club for £200, the proceeds of a Sweep run during the Winter and this has been added to the Development Account. In February, 1962, the Committee decided to purchase an Electric Fruit Machine and install it in the large Club Room. It is pleasing to report that the £65 outstanding on the old machine at the end of the last financial year has been paid off, the cost of the new machine cleared, and a profit of £909 credited to a Suspense Account until the legal position is clearly established.

As a result of the fall in surpluses over the past few years a refund of Income Tax has been obtained and this added to a reserve for Income Tax not now required enables us to add £852 to the Income and Expenditure Account.

INCREASE OF SUBSCRIPTIONS. The Committee decided to increase the basic Club Subscription for members from three to four guineas from 1st May, 1962, and to increase the prices of Season Tickets and admission to Football Matches for Season 1962-63, but to retain the rates for O.A.P. at substantially the old level.

Your Committee considered that having regard to the heavy and ever increasing costs of maintaining the ground, stands and terraces in a good condition, the increased costs of materials, labour and all services, and the necessity for building up a reserve for future developments, it could not do otherwise. A careful examination of the accounts will, I am convinced, cause every member to conclude that the action of the Committee was wise and in the best interests of the Club.

THE CLUB HOUSE. The new Ground Floor Lounge was opened on the 29th November, 1961, and has proved very attractive. The Committee feels that many members do not realise the amenities the Club House offers and hopes that they will in the future take advantage of the services Miss Filer and her capable staff provide. The Club's lunches and snacks are equal to the best in town. Work is still proceeding in fitting up the Museum so as to make it a "Mecca" for lovers of amateur sport.

During the year we have been pleased to offer temporary membership to officers of ships of H.M. Navy visiting Cardiff, and they have greatly appreciated this gesture. We also had the pleasure of receiving Miss Dawn Ryan, the Official Hostess of the Empire and Commonwealth Games and other officials of Western Australia, and explaining how the Park was organised to stage the Games in 1958.

HONOURS FOR MEMBERS. ALDERMAN E. E. PEARCE, M.B.E., J.P., F.C.A., one of our Vice-Presidents was installed Lord Mayor in May, 1961. He invited officials of the Club to his Installation Banquet and showed his love for and interest in the Club by attending the Rugby matches against Swansea and Newport in his official capacity accompanied by the Mayors and Mayoresses of those towns.

The Welsh Rugby Union honoured Mr. D. E. (Danny) Davies by electing him their President for 1961-62, and the Rugby Club and the Athletic Club showed their appreciation of the honour. The Rugby Club's Function is dealt with in the report of the Chairman. Mr. N. V. H. Riches on behalf of the members generally, presented Mr. Davies with an inscribed plaque of the Arms of the Club and a Transistor Set and eulogised the tremendous amount of

work Mr. Davies had done so selflessly for Rugby in general and the Cardiff Club in particular over many years.

ASSISTANCE TO OTHER AMATEUR SPORTING ORGANISATIONS. The Club has again been pleased to assist the Cardiff Schools Rugby financially and by giving permission for its inter-school finals to be played on the Park; the Cardiff and District Rugby Union financially and by permission to play its Cup Final too on the ground, and by grants to the Youth Organisations.

Facilities were given to the County Bowls Association, and the Glamorgan and Monmouthshire Women's Bowls Association to play matches on our green and to Schools

to play Cricket matches on the Park.

Rooms were regularly made available for Committees of many Amateur Sports organisations and Groundsmen to meet.

GROUND IMPROVEMENTS. The Park Street Entrance Roadway has been macadamised and the gates and fencing moved back to the main road. Trees have been planted on the river bank and the appearance of the ground generally improved.

SECTIONAL REPORTS. I hope that all members will read the reports of the various Sections so that they may realise the nature and extent of the Club's activities.

THANKS. The year has been an exceptionally busy one In addition to one Extraordinary General Meeting, the Management Committee has held eleven ordinary meetings and four special meetings. Standing and Sub-Committee meetings have been legion and I am very grateful for the splendid attendance and assiduity of members and the Secretary. The Section Committee members too have devoted their time, thought and energy wholeheartedly for the Club and I placed on record my sincere appreciation of their services.

The plans and schemes of the various Committees could not have been successfully executed had it not been for the splendid work of the staff. The Secretary, Mr. D. G. Grant, Miss Filer, Mr. A. Francis, the Head Groundsman and their staffs have done excellent work throughout the year and have served the Club loyally, effectively and wholeheartedly, often at great personal inconvenience to themselves. We are fortunate to have such a band of willing workers.

Chairman's Report for the Season 1961-62

The playing season of 1961/62 was like the Curate's egg, resounding and thrilling victories allied to some dour wins on the one side with matches lost that could have been won and the odd win that could have been lost. Outstanding achievements such as two wins and two draws against the great side Newport, scintillating rugby against Llanelly, away Doubles v. Llanelly and Aberavon, playing the famous Ba-Baas into the ground and foiling the age old desire of the London Harlequins to perform the Easter double after they had well beaten Swansea with one of their most powerful sides helped us to remain the Cardiff Club as we know it.

If there was a decline in the manner of some of the games won, it could be in part due to the great improvement in playing ability and confidence of all the opposition now being met. The difference between Clubs is fading with the years in particular where rugby communities encouraged by new and palatial Clubhouses create greater local spirit and pride.

However, one is never content with anything ordinary from Cardiff. Something extraordinary is always expected even demanded and so our standard of play is always up for almost National comment. The changing pattern of rugby interest has never been more apparent than in this season with the disappearance of the glamour-hungry spectators to their motor cars and Television firesides, leaving as usual the hard core of rugby people who are part of the rugby way of life, to give the very necessary support in spite of all other attractions.

Before going on to the official results and records for which I am indebted to Danny Davies, I wish to record that Lloyd Williams left no stone unturned to make it as successful a season as possible. His pre-match talks to the Players were first-class in the right approach and enthusiasm. His efforts on and off the field were in every way up to the required standards and ably backed up by his Vice-Captain, Kingsley Jones, they spared no effort to keep the Club flag flying in the Cardiff manner. 

FIXTURES

Fixtures have this season come in for criticism, and it may be that the difficulties here are not fully appreciated. The Welsh Rugby Union have claims on Cardiff Arms Park for six Saturdays in any year, these usually being

claimed in the second half of the season. No first team match can be played on a Saturday preceding a Union Date and in addition no mid-week match can be played during the week preceding a Welsh Rugby Union Saturday. Out of 18 Saturdays therefore, from December 30th, 1961, to the 28th April, 1962—six weeks—and indeed eleven Saturdays were barred for First team games.

The restriction on Saturdays in the second half of the season means that most home games must be arranged early. Clubs do request fixtures on a home and away basis and fitting these in becomes extremely difficult, the result being large gaps in our home list in the new year due to Welsh Rugby Union claims and our own commitments.

The loss of three home games over the Christmas period. namely Wasps, Watsonians and the Royal Navy, was a cruel blow to the Club, members and supporters alike. The heavy frost effected cancellation of all three games causing, apart from the financial loss to the Club, a very unbalanced fixture list. The question has been asked. "could they have been saved?", the answer is undoubtedly "yes" but that does not fully cover the position. Matches can be safeguarded in various ways, i.e. Straw coverage, Ground Heating, Insurance. Each one of these has in the past been fully investigated by your Committee and here the question of economics raises its ugly head, each one being a gamble which could be most expensive. It would seem that the ultimate answer is in capital investment for ground heating, but for a Rugby Club is this possible? £4.000 is a lot of money and three Christmas matches had not previously been lost by frost in the History of the Cardiff Club.

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES

The social side, although always secondary to the game itself, has in the changing pattern assumed a very important place in the life and economics of a Club. As Members are proving that they are the backbone of Club, life so they must have every opportunity to add to the pleasures of playing and watching rugby by having amenities to enjoy each others company during the evenings of the season.

The following functions were held:

The Club Dance was once again the happy event it has always been. We would welcome more members making early application for tickets.

The Ladies' Night organised for the long-suffering wives and lady-friends proved again the excellent taste of the Committee and Players in their choice of partners.

The Old Players' Re-union once again brought out the Old and Bold and was the usual line-shooting occasion that always has enhanced the comradeship of the Cardiff Old Players.

The Committee and Players subscribed to a Supper at the Club Rooms to honour Mr. D. E. Davies with the presentation to the Club and to himself of suitably inscribed photographs to commemorate his election to the Presidency of the Welsh Rugby Union. None of the foregoing events could have been so enjoyable without the full co-operation, ideas and excellent catering of Miss Babs Filer and her loyal and hard-working staff.

An interesting departure from traditional functions, which may well be a foretaste of what is necessary in the future, was the holding of an Informal Dance/Buffet on Easter Saturday for all members. This impromptu effort was highly successful and resulted in more members attending the Club Premises to say nothing of the very large increase in bar takings.

CIVIC VISITORS

The season was highlighted by the official visits of the Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Alderman E. Ewart Pearce, M.B.E., J.P., F.C.A., who was responsible for an interchange of visits between the Mayors and Mayoresses of Newport and Swansea in which officials of all Clubs concerned were entertained in the Mayoral Parlours with reciprocal entertainment by the Cardiff Rugby Club in the Club Rooms. Among many other visitors attending matches and who joined us at the Clubhouse were the Minister of State for Welsh Affairs, Lord Brecon; The High Sheriff of Glamorgan, The Hon. Anthony Berry; Air Vice Marshall Sir Paul Maltby, Serjeant at Arms, House of Lords.

ADMINISTRATION

International Ticket Distribution.—With long term equality in view rather than to persist in taking pot luck, an alphabetical system was put into operation. A public draw for the starting letter took place in the Club's new bar on the evening of the Llanelly Fixture. In fact, the letter was drawn most impartially by the Llanelly Chairman who drew letter "D".

SWEEPSTAKE

In an endeavour to raise funds for the Athletic Club an experiment of running a Sweepstake was carried out. This resulted in much experience being gained for the future and a cheque for £200 being handed to the Management Committee. Bigger and better things should come next year.

One could go on ad infinitum of incidents of the past Season that may be of interest, but I feel that I must pay tribute to all my colleagues who, at all times, worked in the Club's interest. Frank Trott, Hon. Secretary, for his first class support and sterling work; Brian Mark for his excellent editing of the Programme; Duncan Brown and his Youth Committee: David Grant for his full time service in many tasks and enthusiastic co-operation at all times to the Rugby Section and for acting so ably as Fixture Secretary; Miss Anne Davies and the rest of the office staff for their cheerful efficiency and general helpfulness in rugby affairs; Albert Francis and his staff for giving us the best playing surface for years plus his willingness to help at all times; to the Club's Medical Advisers, Drs. Naysmith and Thompson; the Hon. Masseurs Messrs. T. Holly, E. Arcos, E. Spillane and J. Spillane and to Les Spence for his excellent work as Welsh Rugby Union Representative District "B"; the St. Alban's Band and finally, Mr. David Cooper and his hard working staff of stewards.

The Press, a law unto themselves, nevertheless gave a lot of support and helpful criticism during the season. They will always be a lasting adjunct to our Rugby scene.

It has always been a pleasure to see the cheerful countenances of the band of Members of the Cardiff Supporters Club, turning up at away Matches to give their staunch support.

To you Loyal Members I can assure you that the Committee and Players need and appreciate your support at all times and will do everything in their power to keep the Club in its rightful place in the Rugby world.

In conclusion, although we have over 1800 (eighteen hundred) members, the average attendance at the Annual General Meetings is between 100/150. We would appreciate a much larger number at these meetings; after all the Club is for all members.

The 1961 Season was successful from the playing point of view, but the weather generally was not as warm as one would have desired; it still, however, enabled all but one game to be played. Although the First XI was composed in the main of players who had formed the nucleus of last year's team, not as many wins were registered as in the previous season.

This was due to several reasons — when the toss was lost the Club was generally asked to bat first and when a reasonable total was reached no great effort was made by our opponents to win the game, a draw being quite acceptable to them. Whilst still turning in good bowling performances. David Lewis in particular was not able to bowl out the tail-enders, as had happened previously; the result was 10 drawn games.



A game was arranged against the First XI to commence at 12.0 a.m. but, unfortunately, rain interfered and a draw resulted. The Australians were not only a good team from the cricketing view point but were excellent mixers and socially the weekend was a great success.

The Club was most unfortunate in losing the services of Peter Davies, our opening bat and wicket keeper. He left to take up an appointment with the Imperial Tobacco Company at Bristol and we wish him every success in his new venture. We did not realise at the time how much of a void he left behind the stumps, but by the end of the season we had found out. Several wicket keepers were used, and although all tried hard many wickets were unfortunately lost through inexperience or lack of specialist practice in this all important position.

The team's fielding and catching was generally good. However, chances were occasionally missed, mainly in the slips where we had no real specialist in this position. The bowling was good and it was only during our "Whitsun Tour" that our attack was at all dominated this again was partly due to some ineffective fielding.

The "Whitsun Tour" was not a success from a playing view point. We played Gloucester and Stroud on Whit-Monday and Tuesday respectively and lost both games. I think I can safely say that if not the weakest touring side to leave Cardiff it must certainly be one of the weakest. On the Saturday before the "Whit weekend" we had only seven players available to play against Stroud and serious thoughts must be given to this tour if we are to give a good account of ourselves in the future.

Our best batting display was put up against last year's winners of the South Wales and Monmouthshire League. We batted first and scored 235 for five in 2 hours 12 minutes. Alan Thomas scored an excellent 80 and he was more than capably supported by K. D. Williams (56) and Gwyn Davies (54). The game was unfortunately drawn, as we were unable to bowl out our opponents.

Victories were recorded against many of our old rivals, including welcome wins over St. Fagans who were dismissed for 76, and Bristol for 95. The outstanding bowling success of the season was kept until the last game, when Bridgend were bowled out for 18.

Although no one made an individual hundred during the season there were many fine innings. The outstanding batsman was Alan Thomas and his best knock was against Newport, when he scored a magnificent 82 out of a total of 154. Newport were defeated by 44 runs. Good form was shown by Jim and Alan Pleass, who both made individual scores of over 50. Alan Priday completed several good innings and was a more than useful stock bowler.

David Herbert, whilst not achieving great success with the First XI, still promises much as a batsman. He is a useful change bowler and is now a more mature fielder than in previous seasons. Hugh Williams also played for the club on several occasions and with more experience must surely become a regular member of the team. He is an excellent fieldsman, both near and away from the wicket. Although Paul Jones has not achieved the success this year that we all hoped, I am sure that with practice he will come again and cause batsmen a great deal of trouble.

This year's Annual Knock-Out Competition was won by Barry. They beat us very convincingly in the final and must be congratulated on a fine win.

It is fitting at the end of this report to thank W. J. Evans, the Chairman of the club, for the very active part he plays in the running of the section and also for his regular umpiring appearances throughout the season.

My thanks are also due to Mr. Len Thomas, our scorer, and to the co-operation received from the Captains of the Second and Reserve Teams, which was greatly appreciated.

Lastly my sincere thanks are due to my Vice-Captain, Alan Thomas, who supported me at all times during the season. I would also like to thank all players who played with me and helped to make my job so easy, both on and off the field.

Captain's Report for 1961

While the season from a playing point of view was not quite so successful as in the previous year, this was hardly surprising since the results in 1960 had been outstanding. Nevertheless, the playing record for the year was a good one; of 17 matches played—9 being won, 7 drawn and only one lost late in the Season.

The weather remained fine much later than in the previous year and 3 matches were played and completed in September. Only 2 matches were cancelled owing to rain—one against Briton Ferry Town early in May and the other, unfortunately, against St. Fagans in the middle of July. This was particularly disappointing since there was a blank date on the following Saturday and merely a match between married and single on the Saturday after, so that the team did not play together from 8th July until 5th August. There were, in fact, two Saturdays during the season on which no matches had been arranged but this position has been rectified for future seasons. The season started well with 4 consecutive wins but subsequently there were a number of draws mainly owing to the fact that we were unable to dismiss our opponents. In most cases we were trying to win, rather than to save the game and in certain cases bad fielding let us down—vital catches being missed in the closing period of the games.

Since, in the previous season the one match against Newport had been cancelled owing to rain and the other interrupted by rain, it was all the more pleasing that the 2 games this season were played without interruption and that we were able to win them both—the second match at Cardiff by the narrow margin of 21 runs.

There were a number of close finishes apart from the match against Newport mentioned above. Crickhowell were beaten on Whit-Saturday by 18 runs in a low scoring game and in another low scoring game Pontnewynydd were beaten by 3 wickets. This victory was even closer than appears, since we had only 10 men available to bat.

The closest finish of all was kept for the last match of the season which was won against Miskin Manor at Miskin by 6 runs. In this match, the first XI having completed their fixtures, their Captain, J. Webb, played for us and, not only made 35 runs, but, in the gathering gloom, caught a towering catch in the long field which turned the course of the game.

The game which was lost to Bridgend Second XI was again by the narrow margin of only 15 runs and we had been in difficulty in raising a side owing to people being on holiday.

For the most part the fielding and catching were reasonable for a Second XI but there were occasional lapses. However, with younger players coming into the side, the standard should improve. It is interesting to note that altogether 40 players appeared for the Second XI during the Season and, owing to so many changes, there was inevitably a certain lack of continuity.

It will be seen from the averages that Dr. N. K. Contractor made most runs and took most wickets and this was indeed an outstanding performance and showed his value as an all-rounder. M. Page was troubled by a knee injury during part of the season and his contribution was, therefore, not so outstanding as in the previous year.

We were very sorry to lose H. Partington who left the Club to take up an appointment abroad before the end of June. During his short stay with the Club he proved to be a more than useful member of the side and for the 6 innings which he played was top of the batting averages. His consistency is shown in that he failed only once in 6 innings and otherwise made 2 scores of over 50 and 3 of over 30. N. K. Contractor made 3 scores of over 50—his highest score being 90 and 6 other players made one score each of over 50. Again no individual score of 100 or more was made during the season. Other batsmen who made consistent contributions were J. Duncan, H. Williams, N. G. Rees and M. Page and it is good to see H. Williams—a younger player—appearing high in the batting averages. R. Cragg made 53 not out in his only appearance and H. Mottram on his first appearance made 52 very valuable runs at Neath on August Bank Holiday.

The outstanding bowling performance of the season was by N. K. Contractor who took 8 wickets for 32 against Briton Ferry Steelworks. On only 4 occasions during the season did a bowler take 5 wickets or more but D. J. James—a newcomer to the club—produced some very consistent performances before he played, during the latter part of the season, in the first team. N. Edwards took 6 wickets for 38 in the victory over Newport at Cardiff and W. Carter took 5 wickets at Neath. The wickets were shared by a number of players as will be seen from the averages and, here again, it is noted with pleasure, that 2 of the younger players appeared at the top of the bowling averages. Various players kept wicket during the season but, in the latter part of the season, R. Jenkins became more regularly available and settled down as the regular wicket keeper in the side.

Certainly during the season the younger players made a bigger contribution to the success of the team than in the previous year and this is a feature which is to be encouraged. Unless a Second XI has a good basis of young players available to take their places in the first team when the older players drop out, the future cannot look so favourable. It is, therefore, to be hoped that the younger players will continue to progress and force their way into the First XI.

It is again noted that our players were rather more successful in running themselves out than in running out our opponents and the running between the wickets is undoubtedly a feature of play which requires much improvement.

Once again matches were played until 8.0 p.m. whenever possible and this, undoubtedly, should be the case in all matches, except late in the season when the light fails, to give a better chance of a result particularly since it still seems to be difficult to make a prompt start at 2.30 p.m.

Those non-playing Gentlemen who add so much to our enjoyment in their various activities on our behalf must not be forgotten. We were nobly served by our umpires and our scorers and the names of B. Kempson and B. Jones are particularly to be mentioned in this connection. The groundsman and his assistants did much work on our behalf and Albert Francis is to be congratulated on the improvement in the cricket square. Our thanks are also due to our tireless Hon. Secretary, W. Lewis and to the Captains of the First XI and the Reserve XI for their steady co-operation throughout the season.

In conclusion I would like to thank personally my Vice-Captain, J. Herbert for all his assistance in making the season a most enjoyable one for me and, I hope, also for all those who played in the side.
