





Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee

THE ACCOUNTS: The first impression made by an examination of the Accounts is that an excess of income over expenditure of f, 1,822 is very satisfactory. A closer examination, however, reveals many disturbing features. Football Gates at £6,554 are down by £688 on 1960. There has been a fall every year since 1956 when Gates produced £11,286. In 1958 the sale of Season Tickets produced £5,009 and last season's total of £2,656 is £307 less than for 1960 and £2,353 less than for 1958. Members' Subscriptions have remained steady for three years at approximately £8,500. The fall in Income from Gates and Season Tickets is causing anxiety, particularly as all items of expenditure are increasing steadily and in some cases substantially. The increased profit on the Sale of Programmes is due to the sales on the occasion of the match versus South Africa. The Welsh Rugby Union Grant of £50 is the allocation made to each and all of the Clubs in the Union out of the profit on matches played under the Union's auspices against the South African Touring side.

The Committee has exercised control over expenditure and a slight saving has resulted. It should, however, be noted that Away Match Expenses depend on the fixture arrangements and next season more away matches will be played than in 1960–61. It will be very difficult to effect further saving or even maintain the expenditure at its present level. Members will note a special item of £519 expenditure as a result of Flood Damage. The Legal Action in which the Club was involved cost £3,915 and this is shown in the Balance Sheet.

The Profit from the Bar and Catering after payment of Wages and Expenses and allowing £170 for depreciation on Furniture, etc., was £4,903 compared with £4,967 last year. The Annual Donation of £1,000 from the Greyhound Racing Co. Ltd., £500 Ground Earnings, £469 from Dividends and Interest and £219 Rent re Park Street, produced £2,188. When one considers that the Income from these sources and the Profit from the Bar totals approximately £7,000 and the final excess of Income over Expenditure is only £1,822, the urgent necessity to increase

our income or/and cut our expenditure is clearly indicated and the Committee has the situation constantly under review.

THE FLOOD: On Sunday, 5th December, 1960, the river overflowed the bank near the Bowling Green and in a few hours the whole Ground was under three to four feet of water. Many of the Staff and some Committee men were quickly on the scene and efforts started to remove office furniture, papers, etc. to safety. On Monday pumps were hired and working almost continuously cleared the water from the Ground by Thursday, 9th December. Then the work of clearing the evil smelling silt was commenced and the staff, assisted by some members soon completed this arduous and unpleasant work. The Committee paid justified tribute to the excellent work of the Staff which ably led by the Secretary, D. G. Grant worked indefatigably, with the result that conditions were almost back to normal much sooner than anyone anitcipated.

THE LEGAL ACTION: An explanation is required for the item of f3,915 in the Balance Sheet as Costs of Legal Action. When the Cardiff Arms Park was sold by the Marquess of Bute in 1923 he retained strips of land fronting on Westgate Street and Cowbridge Road but rented these strips to the Club. In 1934 the Club received notice to quit roughly half of the strip bordering Cowbridge Road and in 1935 notice to quit all of the strip fronting Westgate Street. Thus by the end of 1935 the Club rented only part of the strip bordering Cowbridge Road. The other part of the strip was not developed by the Marquess or by his successors in title to it. Thus about 1948 the Club was advised that it had acquired a possessory title to this portion. In 1959 Western Ground Rents Ltd., a company which had acquired by purchase the land formerly owned by the Marquess issued a writ on the Club claiming, i.a. the land. The Committee took legal advice at every stage and having regard to Counsel's opinion and the value of the land, decided to defend the action. This case was heard in the Chancery Division of the High Court of Justice from 26th January to 2nd February, 1961 and the Judge found in favour of Western Ground Rents Ltd. and awarded costs against the Club.

The Management Committee decided not to appeal.

CLUB HOUSE: The provision of Billiards has not proved attractive. The Committee decided that the room could be used to great advantage if it were converted into a comfortable Lounge Bar. The work of conversion will be put in hand in the Summer and at the same time other alterations will be made to the Ground Floor which it is hoped will provide better amenities for the members and make for more economic working.

The Committee would be pleased to see more members using the Club.

CAR PARKING: The parking of cars has for many years constituted a problem for the Committee. It has been found impossible to confine parking to members only, because of the rights of other users; the right of way over certain parts enjoyed by two outside bodies; and the number of entrances. From 1952 to 1956 attendants were employed who cost the Club approximately £200 per annum. They failed completely to prevent indiscriminate use of the ground. Finally, the Committee decided to control parking by (a) closing some entrances; (b) providing clearly marked parking bays; (c) appointing car-park attendants. It was felt that this would not be an economic proposition and the Committee decided to charge members 1/- per day for parking between 8 and 4.30 p.m. on Mondays to Fridays.

HEAD GROUNDSMAN: Desmond Glover accepted the position of Head Groundsman with the Cardiff City A.F. Club and left us on Saturday, 21st January, 1961 after many years of service with us. We wish him well. Albert Francis, who was a Groundsman with the Steel Company of Wales at Trostre Works, Llanelly was appointed and took up his duties at the end of February. He settled in very quickly and is proving willing and efficient.

Mr. D. (DANNY) E. DAVIES: Every member of the Club was delighted to learn that Danny was the sole nominee for the position of President of the Welsh Rugby Union. He will be the first President from the Cardiff Club and we congratulate him wholeheartedly and wish him every success and happiness. No one has served his country and Club in Rugger affairs more devotedly and he has thoroughly merited the high honour.

Fruit Machines: In the Autumn of 1960 a Fruit Machine was purchased for approximately £460 and by the end of the financial year £395 had been recovered as profits, The £65 of the purchase price not recovered then is included in the figure of £664. Debtors and Prepaid Expenses in the Balance Sheet.

HOCKEY INTERNATIONAL: On Saturday, 25th March, 1961 Wales played England on the Cricket Ground and the players and Press were high in praise for the state of the ground and the arrangements generally.

DONATIONS: The Club has again been very generous in its support of Junior Rugby.

GENERAL: The roadways have now all been treated with macadam and the Park Street Entrance will be similarly treated when, in October, the construction work on the Post Office is completed.

I commend to the members the reports of the various Sections and on behalf of the Committee thank the Sectional officers and committees for the excellent work they do.

The year has been an exceedingly difficult one in many ways and I am sure the members, as I do, appreciate the efforts made by the members of the Committee in the Club's interests. The Staff too, whether administrative, ground or Club have worked harmoniously and effectively; in many cases giving more than could be expected under normal circumstances.



Annual Report for the Season 1960-61

There was again an improvement in the Record, and in terms of results the Season was the best since Sid Judd's of 1954-55 when only five matches were lost and five drawn. In 1960-61 we lost eight and drew five.


Much of the improvement was due to earlier pre-season training and to the endeavours of the Captain, Lloyd Williams who no doubt had two important aims:

- (1) To improve the quality of the play and the Records.
- (2) To defeat the South Africans.

In the first he succeeded but he failed in the second.

The season got off to an excellent start. We played grand rugger: there was keenness and fitness in the players and a good team spirit. So when the South Africans arrived on 29th October, eleven matches out of twelve had been won and one drawn, that at Northampton. We had beaten Ebbw Vale, Gloucester, London Welsh, Penarth (twice), Coventry, Pontypool and Aberavon (away). Then on 29th October came the game against the Fifth Springboks—one that will be remembered for a long time. Tension had mounted gradually; much publicity had been given to the strength of the contestants-the power of the Springook's pack and Cardiff's excellent form and unbeaten record. On the Friday evening before the match, the South Africans had watched Newport subdue Llanelly under floodlights at Stradley Park and they could not have failed to be impressed by the showing of the Newport pack and have wondered that if Newport were that strong what was the strength of Cardiff then rated the best team in Wales.

The ground had recovered remarkably well after almost unceasing rain which had continued until the previous Thursday evening. Few who watched the game could have foreseen the manner in which it was to be played. Has a visiting pack ever shown such fierce forward play, so relentless in its

efforts to maintain possession of the ball as this South African eight. It may be wise to forget one or two of the incidents, but if the Springboks were given the slow-hand-clap; because their backs preferred to kick rather than handle especially against a team weakened by injuries, one can only attribute this to their still remaining respect for the opposition and to their determination to win.

Throughout, the Cardiff team played magnificently and did their utmost to attack by running with the ball. The way they managed to heel the ball from the scrum in the second half with the weight of six forwards only and still open out in attack was a source of great admiration. But the handicap of having Dai Hayward a crock after only five minutes and Tommy McCarthy off the field after thirty-five minutes was too great, and the Springboks won by 13 points to nil-two converted goals (one from a penalty try) and a penalty goal. Lloyd and his team worthily upheld the high reputation of Cardiff.


Tommy McCarthy's services were lost for many weeks; Dai Havward was off for three weeks and then Lloyd was crocked against London Welsh on 17th December and did not resume until 11th February.

In addition Cyril Davies who had played first class attacking Rugby was injured in the Wales v. England match and played only one game afterwards, and Kingsley Jones, through sickness and injury played in only two of the last twelve games.

Early in January we lost to Ebbw Vale and Bristol in very bad conditions and later three matches were drawn, those against Swansea (H.), Pontypool (A.) and Abertillery (H.) again when conditions were vile.

Two outstanding events were, our great success over our Newport rivals by winning three matches and drawing the fourth and the Cornish Tour when the three matches over Penzance, Camborne and Penryn were won with a tally of 69 points to six.

Seven of our players were capped for Wales: Cyril Davies, Dan Harris, Kingsley Jones, Meiron Roberts, Alan Priday, Bill Thomas and our Skipper Lloyd Williams, who captained the Welsh Team against France. Howard Norris and Martin Rees were reserves for Wales.

Previous to this season the age limit for Juniors was under 18 on 1st September. This has now been amended to read 1st January. The only match lost was that against Swansea Juniors, when we were defeated by 8 points to 5 on a day when four of our club were playing in a Welsh Trial. Magnificent victories were scored over Harlequin Colts and a Welsh Public School XV. L. Hewer, I. Jewell, C. Prescott and B. Harris played for the Welsh Youth Team. Our Juniors won the Cardiff Seven-a-side Tournament and were finalists in the Bridgend and Welsh Sevens. The Chairman of the Youth Sub-Committee, Mr. H. Johnson, has been an enthusiastic supporter and saw most of the games. He was ably assisted by S. Bowes, Rex Willis, F. Croster, Bill Lewis and the Hon. Secretary, Les Jones.

The weather conditions in 1960-61 were probably the worst on record: the rain seemed relentless and continued unceasingly up to February. Members will ever remember the fury of the storm and the unprecedented conditions prevailing when Wales met South Africa on the Park on Saturday, 3rd December, 1960, and the flooding of the Park on Sunday, the 4th. The Club took every possible precaution to protect the pitch after the flood water had been pumped off. No match was played on the ground for three weeks; Sophia Gardens and Maindy Stadium being used. During the season seven matches were transferred to Sophia Gardens and one to Maindy and two other Home Matches were cancelled in order to preserve the playing area and to co-operate with the Welsh Rugby Union in providing a good surface for International matches.

The weather conditions caused two postponements of the floodlit match against Bristol at Ninian Park. It was, however, finally played on the 14th March and after a good open game our visitors triumphed by 19 points to 14. The Committee further considered the question of installing floodlighting and because of the very heavy cost and other adverse factors decided again that it was not an economic proposition.

TELEVISION: The effect on gates of the televising of sport on match days has been carefully considered by a joint committee set up by Senior Clubs and consultations held with some English Clubs. No definite conclusion has been reached at the time of writing.

CHARITY: We sent our First Team to play Abertillery in aid of the Six Bells Colliery Disaster Fund—a gesture which was much appreciated. We also sent a donation to the fund set up for the widow and family of W. G. Jones who had rendered good service to the Club just after the war.

Schoolboys: It may not be generally known that the Club issues annually some 1,400 Complimentary Season Tickets to boys who play rugby in the school teams.



From a playing point of view, there can be no doubt that the season was extremely successful since, out of eighteen matches played, fourteen were won, four were drawn and none lost.

During the early part of the season the weather was good and no games were seriously interfered with by rain until the middle of July. However, from the 23rd July onwards five game were cancelled owing to rain and of the five games played in this period two were seriously interfered with and there was rain during the other matches.

The season started with nine consecutive wins and it is interesting to note that the First XI also started with seven consecutive wins. The fact that both First and Second Teams won all their first seven matches must surely constitute a record in the Club.

Of the four matches which were drawn, two were seriously interfered with by rain. The first side to stop the winning run were Bridgend First Team. When the match ended they were still twenty-six runs behind with only two wickets to fall.

It is interesting to note that in the eighteen matches played, our opponents batted first on only two occasions and, in both of those games, we bowled out the whole of the opposition so that no declaration was made by our opponents during the whole Season. In all the matches which were drawn the end came with the opponents fighting to avoid defeat and in no game were we forced to play for a draw.

There were a number of close finishes and, in the first game of the season against the Cardiff High School Old Boys, we won by three wickets in the last over of the game. Incidentally, in this match the High School totalled the highest score against us during the whole season—namely one hundred and twenty eight. Another very exciting game was that against Pontypridd Second XI at Pontypridd when, having set them to make one hundred and twelve to win in something over two hours, we won by three runs in the last over—their last batsman being run out.

The fielding and catching of the team were generally good for a Second XI, except in the game against Neath on August Bank Holiday Monday when we drew and would certainly have won had we held our catches. The Bowling was steady and the wickets were shared mainly among six bowlers—five of whom took twenty wickets, or more. Over the whole season there were only two partnerships of over fifty made by our opponents whereas there were fifteen such partnerships made by us.

Probably the outstanding performance of the season was the fact that Malcolm Page was top of the batting averages, top of the bowling averages and took most catches. He was indeed a most useful all-rounder, although he was not with the side the whole Season, playing certain matches for the First XI. Dr. N. K. Contractor was another whose all-round ability was a great asset to the side. The most consistent batsmen were E. Donovan, H. Partington and J. Duncan, while C. Bolter and B. Joseph were leading bowlers.

No one made an individual hundred during the season—E. Donovan made ninety-one against Newport at Newport and H. Partington made ninety against Pontypridd at Cardiff. Gwyn Davies, N. K. Contractor and D. Herbert all had scores of over eighty and Contractors' eighty-two not out at Miskin was an outstanding innings. Altogether ten players made scores of fifty or over during the season.

The outstanding bowling performance was that of Malcolm Page who took eight for forty against St. Fagans at St. Fagans. On the hard wickets, in the early part of the season, C. Bolter took six wickets on two occasions and five wickets on two occasions but he found the wet wickets later in the season less to his liking. B. Joseph took seven wickets for forty-seven against St. Fagans at Cardiff and R. H. Stephenson came out of retirement to take five for twenty-three early in the season against Cowbridge. P. Jones took six wickets in the first match of the season, after which he played regularly for the First Team.

The wicket keeping was done by J. Downing and E. Donovan who both performed very creditably.

It is perhaps a pity to note that the leading players in both the bowling and the batting averages were, for the most part, older players and that not many of the youngsters played leading parts. However, this was perhaps not surprising since the First Team contained a number of young players but it is too be hoped that next season more of the younger players will establish themselves in the Second Team.

The running between the wickets left much to be desired and during the season twelve of our players were run out, practically all as a result of bad running and not from skilful fielding.

It was unfortunate that both the games at Newport were arranged for late in the season, since the one match at Newport was brought to an early conclusion owing to rain, and the second was cancelled altogether.

While difficulty was still experienced in starting games promptly at 2.30 the experiment of playing all matches until 8 p.m. instead of 7.45 p.m., except towards the end of the season, was undoubtedly a success and certainly contributed to the reduction in the number of draws and a greater number of finishes being obtained.

It would not be right to finish this report without thanking all those gentlemen who acted as umpire, scorer and in various off the field activities and whose efforts undoubtedly helped considerably with the enjoyment of our cricket. The First Team are also to be congratulated on a most successful season and the co-operation received from the Captains of the First Team and the Reserve Team was very much appreciated.

It can, I think, be safely said that it was not only a successful season on the field, but an enjoyable one off the field and I would like to thank my Vice-Captain, C. Bolter and all those who played for the team for making my job as Captain so easy and for their grand cooperation throughout a very pleasant season.

ANNUAL REPORT for Season 1960


SOCIAL EVENTS


