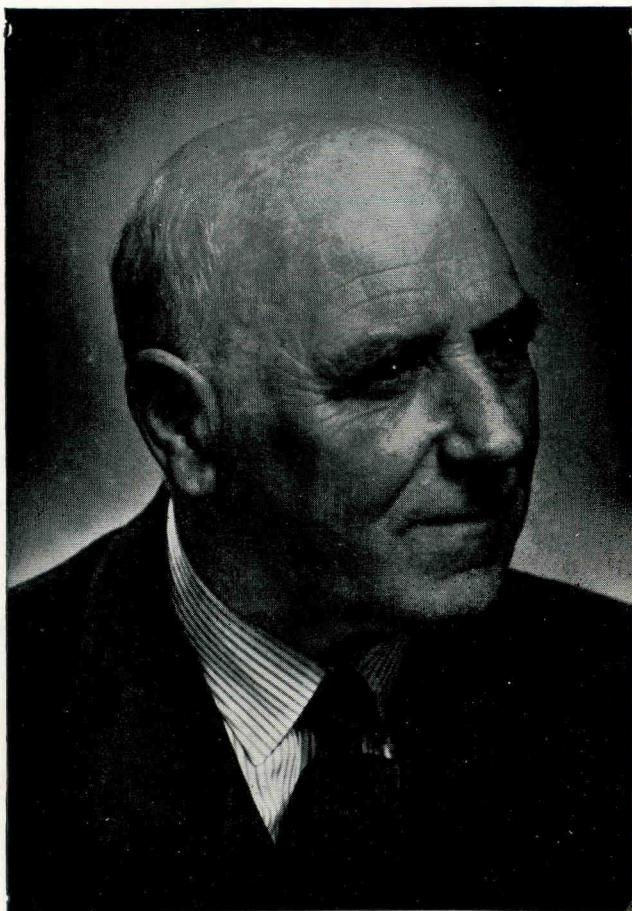

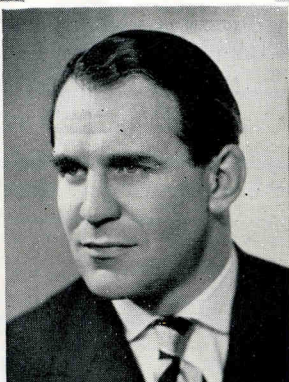

Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee

THE ACCOUNTS : INCOME. Examination of the Income side shows that Football Gates produced £9,582, that is £412 more than in the previous year. Two factors, namely the bad weather on the occasion of several of the most important matches and the record of the first fifteen, are responsible for the very small increase although admission charges had been raised. The heavy fall in revenue from Season Tickets is partly offset by the increase in that from Membership Subscriptions which at the figure of £8,512 constitutes a high record for the Club. The decrease in the amount realised by the sale of programmes is largely due to the fact that in the previous season a Souvenir Programme was published.

The Ground Earnings at £2,050, an increase of £1,795 on the 1957/58 figure, include the rent received from the Empire Games Organisation.

Bar takings at £26,085 show an increase of £698 on those of the previous year and catering produced £2,379, an increase of £1,025. The catering amenities provided by the Club under Miss Filer's efficient supervision have proved very popular and an ever increasing number of members is taking advantage of them.

EXPENDITURE. As was anticipated in the last report, the expenditure in upkeep of Grounds, Stands and Plant shows an increase of £1,593. There seems very little possibility of effecting any saving on this item for some years as the cost of some items of capital expenditure now under consideration and that of maintaining the stands and ground in first class condition is very heavy and shows a tendency to increase. The saving of £1,299 on Away Match and of £328 on Home Match Expenses is very welcome and indicates the efficient control exercised by the Football Committee, one that has in no way reduced the high standard of the Club. Other items of expenditure are very much the same as in previous years.

The excess of Income over Expenditure of £6,373 is £1,700 greater than in 1957/58 which, as noted above, is entirely due to the rent received from the Games Organisation. The Bar Profit of £4,175 after payment of Wages and Running Expenses is very satisfactory.

The Development Account now stands at £665. This money has been raised by the Sweeps run by the promoters Messrs. L. M. Spence and H. J. Bartlett for the Club. The Committee has decided that in the coming year one Sweep only shall be promoted, and that on the Grand National of 1960. It is hoped that all members will support the efforts of the promoters and make this an outstanding success.

Another £1,000 has been repaid to the Glamorgan County Cricket Club so that the loan is now reduced to £4,000.

Members will note that £5,000 has been written off the Club House from the General Reserve and £1,000 as Special Depreciation from the Income and Expenditure Account.

SIXTH EMPIRE AND COMMONWEALTH GAMES. Nineteen Fifty-eight will for ever be memorable in the history of the Club as the year in which the Athletic Events of the Games were staged on the Park. All members who attended or saw the Games were proud of the part the Club played in contributing to the success of the venture. Visiting officials and athletes were made Honorary Members of the Club and were very appreciative of the privilege thus afforded them. The Cardiff Arms Park, already famous throughout the Rugby World, is now known in still wider circles as a great centre of amateur sport where sportsmen are welcomed with true and sincere hospitality. The Club has purchased photographs of the Games and these will be hung in the Club.

The difficulty of re-instating the ground in the few weeks available before the opening of the Football Season, one which was accentuated by the very wet weather in August, presented the Club with many problems but tribute must be paid to the Empire Games Council for Wales for its prompt recognition of these problems and its assistance in carrying out remedial measures on the ground.

It is hoped that the work to be carried out in the Summer of 1959 will effect a great improvement.

GROUND IMPROVEMENTS. (a) New heating apparatus has been installed to provide more effective heating of the Club, a better hot water supply to the Dressing Rooms and to reduce running costs.

(b) New Drains have been laid in the Football Ground.

(c) Instructions have been given to re-surface the roads around the Football Stands and this work should be completed before the Season opens. It is hoped to re-surface the roadway around the Cricket Field later.

(d) More work is to be carried out in sealing the roof of the South Stand and in providing protection against the rain.

SECTIONAL REPORTS. The reports of the various Sections are commended to your careful attention.

OBITUARY. By the death of Major T. Vile, M.B.E., J.P., who was proud to be one of our Vice-Presidents the Club has lost a good friend whose services to Rugby were of inestimable value.

SECRETARY. Early in August 1958, Mr. C. E. Sargent, the Secretary, accepted the position of Secretary of the Cardiff City A. F. Club and your Committee released him immediately. The vacant post was advertised in the Daily Telegraph, ManchesterGuardian, Western Mail and South Wales Evening Post and attracted more than 90 applications. A Sub-Committee made a short list of six applicants and interviewed them.

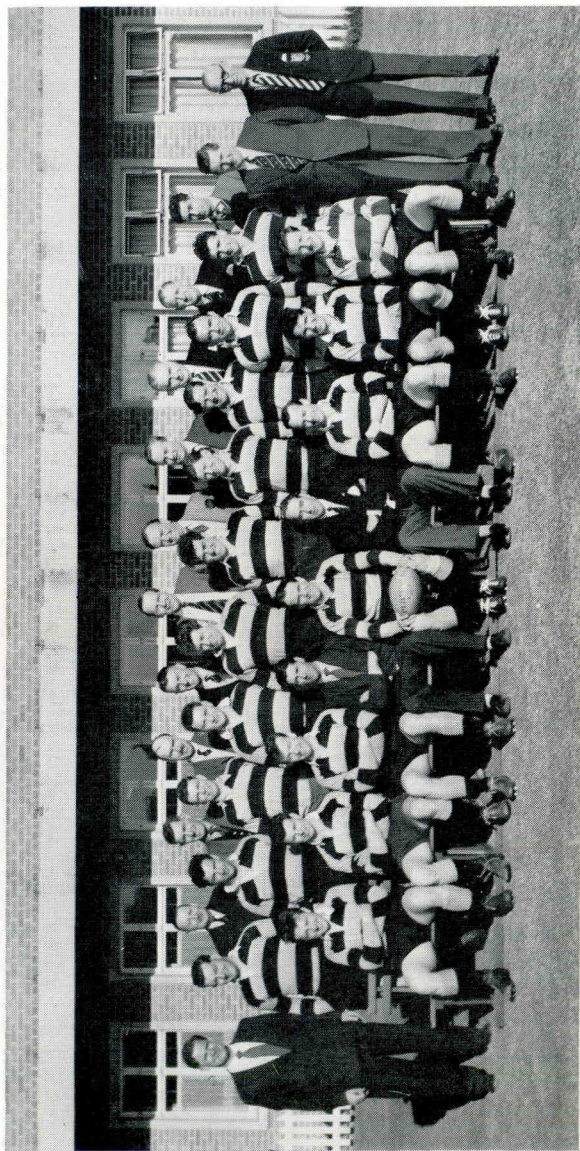
CARDIFF RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB **Annual Report for the Season 1958-59**

It had been hoped that when the occasion arrived for this report, as far as playing records were concerned, this season would compare favourably with any since the War. Unfortunately the Season was not a good one for the First Team, but it was an outstanding one for the Athletic XV.

With the retirement of such stalwarts as Cliff Morgan, Rex Willis, Eddie Thomas and Geoff Beckingham the team took a long time to settle down. The outside half position created many problems and was the crux of indifferent performances on many occasions by the backs who seemed to lack the confidence necessary for success. The captain, C. D. Williams, and his forwards tried hard and seldom did they play second fiddle to the opposition, but despite their efforts we won only two games out of eight played in October. A welcome revival of fortunes then occurred and of the next thirteen games played only three were lost. This was followed by another black period in February when three out of four games ended in defeat. However, the season ended on a high note for out of the remaining thirteen games, 9 were won, 2 were drawn and 2 were lost.

The best performances of the Season were against Oxford away and Coventry away; in fact we inflicted on Coventry their heaviest defeat for many years. The last of the four games against Newport was played at Cardiff, when to the relief of all Cardiff fans we foiled all Newport's efforts to achieve the coveted distinction of four wins in a season. Against Bridgend away, towards the end of the season, with only 12 players in the second half the "few" rose to the occasion magnificently, and the five forwards actually outplayed the Bridgend eight in scrums and lines-out. It did appear that the team kept the best performances for away matches.

A tribute should be paid to the captain, C. D. Williams, for the work he put in for the Club on and off the field. It was a worrying and difficult Season, but he shouldered the responsibilities and criticisms without question. He

was helped considerably, by his vice-captain, Lloyd Williams, our only International this season. Our sincere commiserations go out to Lloyd in not being selected for the British Lions 1959 Tour of Australia and New Zealand, an honour which we think he truly merited. Our congratulations however, go to Roddy Evans on his selection.

The Athletic Team under the very capable leadership of Peter Nyhan had a wonderful season. His team contained a number of very promising young players, some of whom had their baptism with the premier side. With the necessary encouragement and guidance they should do well with the club.

The Youth Side again had a good year and we look forward next season to those eligible stepping up to the ranks of senior football. We feel that once again special mention should be made of the great work done by the Youth Hon. Secretary, Mr. Les Jones, who was ably assisted by Mr. Bill Lewis.

In the early part of 1959 the condition of certain areas of the Rugby pitch was causing concern and in February experts were called in to inspect the ground and to report, with recommendations for close season work. The report was duly submitted and it was decided to carry out all the recommendations energetically in order to ensure the playing area being in perfect condition for season 1959/60.

During the season we have devoted a great deal of time to the question of Floodlighting the ground. Many difficulties have been encountered in evolving a scheme which would be one of the best in the country. One great difficulty encountered was the suitable erection of floodlight frames on the new cantilever type South Stand. This however has been overcome in the proposed scheme which is nearing finalisation.

The policy to reduce fixtures to a level more fair to Club and Players has been pursued. From 50 matches played in Season 1953/54 we are down to 44 in season 1959/60, a far more realistic level. Dates such as the Final Trial and Home Internationals have been left open which avoids the fielding of weakened sides and poor gates due to the Televising of some of these matches.

This was Televised and was the first occasion for the B.B.C. to produce a live Television Show from a Rugby Club. So many complimentary reports were received that another Show took place on the eve of the Irish International match.

In February the Annual Rugger Dance was held in the Club House and proved to be a most enjoyable evening.

During the winter months we met other Rugby Clubs in a Quiz Show, with very definitely greater success than on the actual field. Our Team—made up from C. D. Williams, John Nelson, Fred Croster, Walter Brinkworth and Alun Priday—scored a notable victory and gained the Cup, which is now in the Museum for all time.

As you are all fully aware, early this year, Sid Judd, a great player and Club man, passed away after a terrific fight against great odds, and we as a Committee felt it our duty and privilege to launch a Memorial fund in aid of his wife and children: a Past v. Present match was organised in aid of this fund and realised nearly £1,200 and our thanks must go out to the Past Players who so willingly turned out and provided such an excellent game. The Band which gave its collection to the Fund, the Gate-men, and the Fire Service who gave their services, the Supporters Club for their part in Programme sales and Mr. W. Madocks of Ferndale who printed the Tickets and Posters free of charge, are all thanked for their wonderful efforts in this worthy cause. Mention must be made too of the grand gesture of the Cardiff City Association Football Club, in collaborating with Mr. Stan Stennett in organising the Show Biz Soccer match which benefited the Fund by nearly £1,000. We are also grateful to the Cardiff Schoolboys organisation for their superb effort on a Monday afternoon which realised a sum in the region of £500.

Captain's Report

The 1958 Season brought some of the worst weather we have known, and yet we were able to play 22 of the 28 games originally arranged and of these, 10 were won, 4 lost and 8 drawn.

The playing record is not as impressive as that of the previous Season, but this is largely due to the fact that many established members of the side missed several matches during the Season for various reasons. Even so, we were able to introduce many of the younger players into the First Eleven, and this gave them valuable experience. It must surely encourage these young players to know that consistent performances for the Second and Reserve Elevens can quite easily lead to a place in the First Eleven. The Selection Committee have taken the long term view by always being ready to include a promising young player, even if it means leaving out an older player who has given good service for many years, but who is, perhaps, nearing the end of his playing days. The majority of these older players, if they have the future of the Club at heart, will no doubt be in agreement with this method of selection.

While many of the younger players showed much ability and sound temperament on occasions, there were times when it was apparent that a little more practice in batting, bowling and especially fielding, would have produced better results, and it is hoped that during the coming Season properly organised practice and increased attendance at the nets will raise the playing standard generally.

Although individual performances are secondary to Team performance, and should always be so, the following may prove of interest:

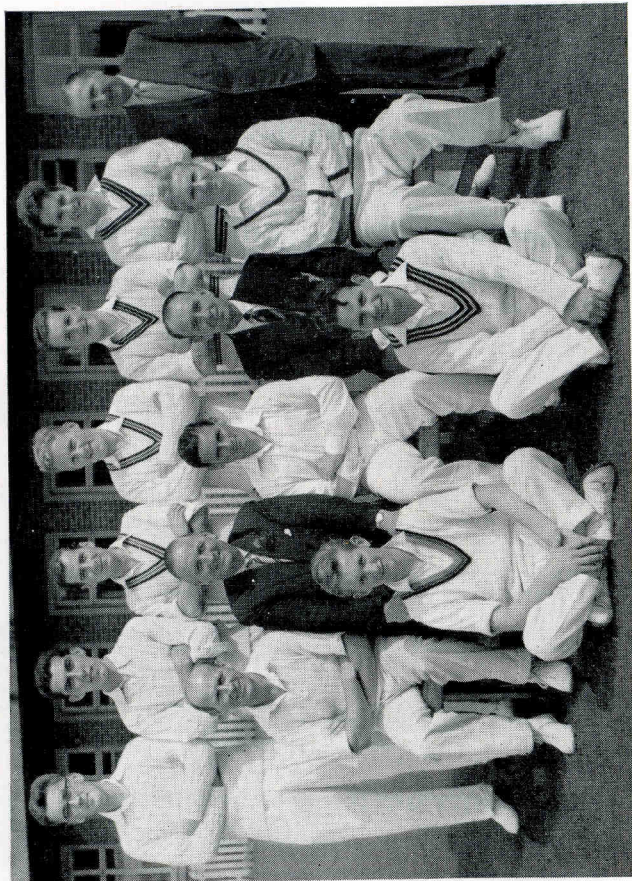
Six batsmen averaged over 20 runs per innings, and scored nearly 1,900 runs between them. Of these J. Pleass made 468 runs, at an average of 46 runs per Innings, and Alan Thomas 480 runs at an average of 40, while Alan Pleass, Ross Johnson, S. Montgomery and Alun Priday gave very capable support. The highest individual scores were:

Although it was at times ragged, the general standard of fielding was reasonably good. Eighty catches were taken in all.

Peter Gatehouse progressed so well that we were deprived of his services for the latter part of the Season, during which time he was performing nobly with the County side. We congratulate him on his achievements, and trust that they will continue.

John Webb, the Vice captain, missed several games at the end of the Season through illness, but we are glad to know that he is greatly recovered, and look forward to his continued presence next Season.

Brian Joseph will be remembered for his outstanding bowling performance against Stroud, when he took 9 wickets during a sustained effort on a very hot afternoon. His performances with the bat were not as impressive, but he was always ready to go in early and force the pace. We congratulate him on his recent marriage, and trust that he will return to us next Season, fit and strong.

Our thanks are due to Wyndham Lewis for his untiring efforts as Hon. Secretary, Jack Evans and Len Thomas for umpiring and scoring respectively in such an efficient manner, and lastly to those much maligned people, the Ground Staff, who worked extremely hard on many occasions to make play possible, and who were always prepared to co-operate.

Because the Ground was required for several weeks by the Empire Games the popular Knock-out Competition was not held.

To end on a personal note, I would like to thank all those who played under my Captaincy for the loyal support which they gave me, for the way in which they accepted my occasional criticisms, and for helping to make the Season a memorable and pleasant one.
