

Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee

The Accounts. An examination of the Income side of the Accounts reveals the fact that Football Gates produced only £9,170, that is more than £2,000 less than in 1956/57 and the lowest since the war. There were many contributory causes for this, but the two most important were that owing to a re-arrangement of the International match versus Ireland, we played Newport at home on the same day as the game in Dublin and that on Easter Saturday when we met the Barbarians the weather was very bad. It is however very pleasing to note that Membership Income at £7,780 reached a new high record and that Season Tickets produced £300 more than last year.

The total income was only £148 less than in 1956/57, despite the fall in revenue from Football Gates.

Consideration of the Expenditure side of the Accounts shows that the item "Upkeep of Grounds, Stands and Plant" at £1,973 was nearly £1,700 less than in the previous year. It will not be possible to maintain this low figure as in the near future a considerable amount of work will have to be undertaken on the Stands and Buildings. The increased cost of "Salaries and Wages" is partly due to Statutory Increases and partly to the necessity for paying wages adequate to meet the increased cost of living.

A surplus of £4,673 under all the circumstances is satisfactory but must not be regarded with complacency. Your Committee has decided to increase the rates for Season Tickets and the prices of admission to matches in order to ensure that the Club shall continue to maintain its high standard. Old Age Pensioners and Boys will, however, be charged only 6d. to the field as in the past.

The Balance Sheet as at 30th April, 1958, shows that the balance of expenditure on the South Stand amounting to £5,757 has been written off against General Reserve and in addition the £417 spent by the Club on the Dining Room in the North Stand has been written off.

(Rugby)

The Development Account Fund of £254 is included in the item "Lloyd's Bank Limited of £3,717."

In accordance with the agreement with the Glamorgan County Cricket Club, £1,000 of the Interest Free Loan of £6,000 was repaid.

SOUTH STAND. The Committee in conjunction with the Welsh Rugby Union is constantly considering how to afford protection to spectators in the Stand from the rain. Many schemes have been examined and members may be assured that as soon as a practicable, economically sound plan is submitted it will receive immediate and sympathetic consideration.

DINING ROOM IN NORTH STAND. This has been completely re-modelled and re-decorated and the Club expresses its thanks to the Glamorgan County Cricket Club, the Welsh Rugby Union and the Empire Games Organisation for their financial help in accomplishing this.

DEVELOPMENT FUND. The Committee decided that it would be prudent to build up a Fund for future development and sanctioned the promotion of three Sweepstakes each year. Messrs. L. M. Spence and H. J. Bartlett undertook to act as Promoters. The first Sweepstake on the Grand National showed a profit of £254. It is hoped that members will support the promoters in their future efforts in this connection for the Club.

DONATIONS. Once again the Club is proud to state that it has assisted Junior Rugby in Cardiff and District to the extent of £480.

CATERING. It will be noted that Catering last year produced a Surplus of approximately £300. Many members are unaware of the fact that the Club provides lunches or snacks on most days and this amenity is proving increasingly popular.

EMPIRE AND COMMONWEALTH GAMES. By the time this Report is published the Games will be but a memory—a pleasant and proud one we hope. Your Committee has done its best to ensure that every visitor to the Club, especially those from overseas, shall receive a warm welcome. Special Honorary Membership Cards were sent to all officials.

SECTIONAL REPORTS. The Committee commends to your attention the Reports of the various Sections, all of which are in a flourishing state.

OBITUARY. Mr. A. Hayes, a Vice-President, and one of our oldest members, has passed on; the Club will miss his cheery personality especially at Annual General Meetings.

APPRECIATION. The Committee once again expresses its thanks and appreciation of the work done by the Honorary Secretaries, Officers and Committee Members of the Sections. It is not realised by many how much time, skill and energy these devote to the work of the Club and how much they contribute to its success. I am grateful to the members of the Management Committee for their assiduity and support; it has been a pleasure to work with them.

Annual Report for the Season 1957-58

From the point of view of results the Season was the best since 1954/55 and the team finished at the head of the unofficial Welsh Championship Table. This was in no small measure due to the splendid example set by the Captain, Eddie Thomas, who proved to be one of the outstanding captains of recent years. He played consistently well throughout the season, encouraging his side by the hard-working example he set. He worked as efficiently for the good of the Club off the field as on it, and proved to be a valuable member of the various Committees on which he served.

The big match of the season was against the Australian Touring Side. This took place in December and Cardiff gained a well deserved victory after an excellent game by 13 points to 11. The Aussies playing record for the Tour was a disappointing one but in the match against Cardiff they looked a much better side than subsequent results proved them to be. They were however, a grand bunch of sportsmen, very popular both on and off the field. The Club is very grateful to the Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Alderman J. H. Morgan and to the Hon. Anthony Berry, for the magnificent hospitality so graciously extended to our Australian friends and the Club.

In the first half of the season, the First XV lost only two matches, to Cambridge at Cambridge by 10 points to 6 and at Gloucester by 3 points to nil.

In the second half of the season five games were lost and in addition the R.A.F. defeated us in an unofficial match by 5 points to 3. There were, however, compensations in the fine win against a very strong Barbarian XV by 14 points to 6 and victories over the Harlequins and Northampton to complete a highly successful Easter programme.

After Easter the team proceeded on the customary Cornish Tour. On this occasion the party flew from Rhoose on Saturday morning and 50 minutes later arrived in Cornwall and was enjoying coffee at Penzance at 11.00 a.m.

This method of travelling has much to commend it from the point of view of economy of time and money. The first two games against Penzance and Cambourne were narrowly won but against St. Ives we suffered an unexpected defeat. However, the Cardiff party lost no time in congratulating the St. Ives Club on its first victory over Cardiff.


On the last Saturday of the season the Annual Welsh Seven-a-Side Tournament was staged at Cardiff for the first time. It proved an interesting and entertaining day which was enjoyed by the very large crowd present. Players and officials co-operated magnificently and the organisation was so good that all matches started to time and everything ran smoothly. The Cardiff "Seven" could not, unfortunately, be as strong as the Committee would have liked it to be; Cliff Morgan, Gordon Wells, Roddy Evans, Ken Richards and others being unavailable. Newport defeated us and in turn were defeated by Ebbw Vale in the Final. The winners demonstrated the value of physical fitness as it was undoubtedly this attribute which enabled them to triumph over the experienced Newport team.

The Club added three new Internationals, namely, Alun Priday, Howard Nicholls and J. D. Evans, to its already long list. These three great Clubmen were thoroughly deserving of the honour bestowed on them. Other players to add to their number of Caps during the season were Cliff Morgan and Roddy Evans.

The Barbarians side which toured South Africa during May included three Cardiff players, Cliff Morgan, Gordon Wells and Roddy Evans. Two new Barbarians elected from the Club were John Nelson and J. D. Evans and we congratulate them on the honour.

It is always sad to see players retiring from the game but this season it has been particularly so, for we witness the departure of that great half-back combination, Cliff Morgan and Rex Willis, and those fine forwards Eddie Thomas and Geoff. Beckingham. Cliff's electrifying runs down the field will be greatly missed but his prowess will be long remembered by all. There surely can have been no player more loyal to the game and the Club than Rex.



Many had to be cancelled owing to the demands made on the team by the Cardiff and District Youth Rugby Union, which at the end of the season was in the Final of the Crawshav Cup with 12 members of the Junior XV in the team.

Three players, E. Willams, J. Regan and T. McCarthy, were selected for and represented Wales, and for the fourth year in succession the Junior XV were the winners of the Cardiff and District Youth Seven-a-Side Tournament.

Elwyn Williams captained the side in a very able manner. The opposition was as usual very strong, and the high standard of sportsmanship which one associates with the Cardiff Club prevailed.

The Junior XV demonstrated its real value as a proving ground for the Senior XVs as the majority of players from last season's Junior Team played regularly for the Athletic XV, and in some cases for the First XV, and it is hoped that subsequent seasons will follow a similar pattern.

ANNUAL REPORT for Season 1957

The Season 1957 saw the greatest number of wins obtained by the Club since the war. The weather was mainly favourable and the "Six-a-Side" Knock-out Tournament was the only event to be abandoned without a ball being bowled.

The First XI played 24 games. The Sunday team had a full Fixture List but it was decided to cancel the home Wednesday fixtures in order to rest the ground as much as possible. The usual evening Knock-out Tournament was held and once again was won by the Club.

We were once again represented in the Weston-super-Mare Six-a-Side Knock-out Tournament. Two trips were made to the Somerset resort. On the first occasion as mentioned above no play was possible because of the inclement weather. On the second visit play was possible but the Club side was defeated and the Tournament was won by Somerset.

At Whitsun the Annual Gloucester Tour took place in beautiful weather, but it did not seem as popular in its shortened form as the four match tour was.

The First XI played 24 games, won 13, lost 3, drew 4, and 4 were abandoned.

The best win was against Newport, a strong side which we defeated by nine wickets. The double was achieved against Pontymister and victories were recorded against Bristol Imperial, St. Fagans, Abergavenny, Stroud, Pontypridd, Aberystwyth, Panteg, Widnes, Monmouth and Pembroke County.

The general policy we adopted was to put our opponents in to bat first and then go all out to exceed the total they made. The result was that we had some very exciting finishes and only four matches were drawn.

The outstanding batsmar was Jim Pleass, whom we were delighted to receive back to the Club after his period of service with the County. His experience with the bat and in the field proved invaluable and his innings of 111 not out against St. Fagans was as delightful an exhibition of batting as could be seen in any class of cricket. Ross Johnson, the Vice-Captain was consistent in the middle of the batting order and he proved an extremely useful member of the side. We extend very hearty congratulations to Peter Gatehouse on his selection for the County. He was our most successful bowler and took 38 wickets. John Riches was second in the Bowling Averages and other good bowling performances were registed by Alan Thomas and Alun Priday.

The fielding generally was of a very high standard and contributed considerably to the high number of victories.

The outstanding player in the Knock-out Tournament was Gwyn Davies who batted well in all the rounds. The bowling was shared with equal success by Peter Gatehouse, Alun Priday and Stan Manuel.

At the close of the season a dance was held in the Club House and was a great success. It is hoped that this function will become an annual event.

We acknowledge with gratitude the fine work put in behind the scenes by the Chairman, W. J. Evans, who was also the First XI umpire and a team selector. Our congratulations go to him on his election to the International Panel of Referees. We are also grateful to our efficient Hon. Secretary, Wyndham Lewis, Len Thomas, the First XI scorer, Brian Kempson and Frank Shanahan, the Second XI umpires, F. Brookes, the Second XI scorer and O. Herbert, for his services on the Selection Committee.

The playing record of the side can be considered a good one, in a season marred by poor weather.

The Second XI in one of its defeats was beaten by the Crick-howell team for the first time.

Five wins against Pontypridd, St. Fagans, Newport, Barry, and Penarth gave the playing record an "air of achievement." Seldom are these clubs, the cream of the local opposition, all beaten in one season.

Personal performances are remembered for the consistent batting through the season of Arthur Oaten, N. K. Contractor, Lionel Butler and Lionel King. Lionel King was certainly in his last season a rare delight. In the bowling R. H. Stephenson performed nobly and consistently.

It is now known that two members of the side have decided to retire and so in this, their last season, it is opportune to thank them for their generous and happy co-operation. Lionel King, who as a wicket-keeper-batsman has served the club since 1938, was a cricketer who will always be remembered by those who played with him, gay, generous and a happy spirit, he was the sort of batsman, a captain dreams of. Told to quicken the rate of scoring, he would generally try to double it, in an audacious and delightful manner. The Second team has lost some of its character, a lot of its ability, and one of the finest clubmen in cricket.

Ken Osment, who retires also, was a character of a different kind, for he was a tough uncompromising batsman and an eminently successful one. Many runs came his way by careful concentration; a hard hitting batsman when he wished, but above all, he was a bowlers' headache. As a wicket-keeper, we found him keen, efficient and fair.

Two well-liked characters in one club, different as chalk from cheese now with one interest—golf! We wish them well.

As the 1957 Summer was one of the finest for many years the Reserve XI had a very enjoyable and successful season. 19 games were arranged; 7 were won, 3 lost, 6 drawn and 3 cancelled. Of the three lost two were on Saturdays following Bank Holidays when it was difficult to put a team in the field. Victories were achieved against such good sides as Pontyminster, Newport, Southerndown and Bridgend.

The side has many young members who are making such good progress that vacancies will have to be found for them in the Senior sides in the near future. This influx of young keen players augurs well for the success of the Club in coming seasons.

He also hoped that the Green would prove to be as good and true for playing as it looked, and that all members would be able to remember with pleasure many grand and enjoyable games played during the summer of 1957.

From the outset it was pleasing indeed to see the increased interest of the members, and with glorious bowling weather during May and June, full opportunity was provided for many excellent encounters.

A drawback to good bowling was the fact that the "experts" considered it necessary to keep the grass longer than we liked, but a steady improvement in the running and condition was evident throughout.

It really seems, after the disappointments of the last few years, that we can now look forward with real hope and justifiable optimism to possessing a Green comparable with the best in Wales.

With the talent available in the Club, our Match results were not as good as we had hoped for, but on the other hand they could have been very much worse.

Our poorest form was shown in the W.B.A. and P.G.I. games.

W.B.A.: Played 5, Won 1, Lost 3, Drew 1. 360 shots for; 424 shots against. 64 shots down in the 5 matches.

P.G.I.: Played 6, Won 2, Lost 4. 470 shots for; 472 shots against. 2 shots down in 6 matches. So near, and yet so far. Only 2 shots down in the 6 matches means that we were well within striking distance of real success.

Why did we lose? Obviously because we didn't play well enough to win. The easy and usual reply is to blame the Selection Committee, but the principal reasons this year seemed to be that too many of our fellows played with a carefree "friendly match" complex, without the concentration and determination to win and make every wood count.

Two many platitudes are uttered on how the game should be played, and how well a team should lose. The W.B.A. and P.G.I. games are the backbone of our fixture list, and it is absurd to say that the result doesn't matter. The result certainly does matter, and undoubtedly has a considerable bearing on the interest, well-being and prestige of the Club.

It's the team that counts, not the individual, and until the last wood is bowled every player must concentrate on not wasting a shot no matter whether he is winning or losing, and do his best to help his colleagues win the match, as well as to enjoy himself.

After each match is over, the social aspect of such a Club as ours should be fostered and encouraged. We are fortunate that we have such excellent amenities, and we should make fuller use of them.

How good is the feeling when the players from both sides meet together to celebrate a grand, hard fought game. How good to be able to take the opportunity for generosity to an opponent, and to be able to cultivate the friendships made on the Green.

Good companionship, and the true spirit of amateur sportsmanship ought to be associated throughout the bowling world with the name of the Cardiff Athletic Bowls Club.

The results of our friendly matches showed a considerable improvement on the competitive matches.

Played 12. Won 8. Lost 4. Shots for 1,080. Shots against 1,019.

Our Mid-Week fixtures showed even more gratifying results.

Played 10. Won 8. Lost 2. Shots for 951. Shots against 727. 224 shots up on these Mid-Week fixtures; a very fine achievement, showing plainly that the reserve of playing strength in the Club is in a very healthy state, but that the job to be tackled is the blending of this talent into first-class competitive rinks.

The two matches lost were by the narrowest of margins. We were only 2 shots down against Fairoak and 5 shots down against a very strong East Glamorgan Civil Service side.

Following upon this, we have the very excellent achievements of the "A" Side.

P.G.2. Matches. Played 7. Won 4. Lost 3. Shots for 593. Shots against 528.

Friendly Matches: Played 10. Won 9. Lost 1. Shots for 885. Shots against 688.

Some fine performances! Well done indeed!

Under normal circumstances, even though the cost was in the region of £500, this necessary overhaul would have been made, but owing to the financial position of the Club it was decided at the Management Committee held last May to leave this matter in abeyance for six months. This decision was arrived at with regret as it was realised that the request was justified.

Before I end this report I would like to bring to your notice a few items of considerable importance. In 1955, Miss Pat Evans won the Welsh Junior Championship (under 16) at Penarth. The following year she was just beaten in the finals by Jane Roberts, a Welsh International. This year I am pleased to say Pat won the Junior Championship (under 18) convincingly. She also won the Ladies' Singles Championship of this Club and for a Junior I think

this is unprecendented. She was the winner of both the Swansea and District and the Carmarthen Junior tournaments and was narrowly beaten in the finals of the Empire Games Tennis Tournament. Her qualifications were sufficient for her to enter the Wimbledon Junior Championships where she was narrowly beaten in the second round of the singles and in the third round in the doubles.

Pat and another member of the Club, Miss Pat Russell, were selected to play for the South Wales Ladies' Team.

And now to a young male member, Terry Bevan. Terry has reaped his first reward for assidouus practice during the summer and winter months by winning the Empire Games tournament. To do this he had to beat in the finals, Len Davies, an experienced team player of Rhiwbina and Penarth Clubs. In my opinion it is only a matter of time before Terry will be playing for the South Wales team.

In mentioning the outstanding performances of these three young members, it would appear that the policy of allowing juniors the same facilities of play as the senior members has paid dividends and makes one wonder why such rigid restrictions are made by other clubs which curtail their hours of play to a minimum.

This report concludes by recording the appreciation of all the members who played in the league and friendly home matches, for the efforts of the Ladies' Captain, Mrs. M. Wheeler and her colleagues in supplying the refreshments after these evening games. I would like to add my personal thanks to Mrs. Wheeler for her loyal cooperation, Mr. David Ashton, the Hon. Secretary and Mr. Cyril Lewis, the Match Secretary, as well as to all members of the Committee. I would also like to record my appreciation of the help given me by the Office and Ground Staffs.

Season 1957-58

On the whole, this was another successful season. The First XI made a bad start, winning only one of the first eight matches. Just when it looked as though they were in for one of the poorest seasons in the Club's history, they suddenly pullled themselves together and proceeded to win 19 of the remaining 22 matches. After the end of October, the only matches lost were the two against Bristol and a somewhat unsatisfactory one against Weston, played in Bristol on the morning of the England v. Wales match. The Captain, D. J. O'Brien, had a very good season at centre-half, and if rumours of his retirement prove true, he will be a difficult man to replace. N. C. Pallot was once again the most consistent of the forwards.

The "A" XI again had a very good season, remaining unbeaten until the beginning of February. From 5th October until 25th January, they had a run of 16 successive victories. The greatest credit is due to the Captain, W. N. Francis, for the way in which he handled his team.

The "B" and Extra "B" XIs did not do so well as in the previous year, but this was probably due to the fact that it was impossible to field a settled team in either case. Injuries and absences due to examinations in the First and "A" XIs meant that the junior sides were continually being called upon to provide reserves with a consequent dislocation of their own sides. While membership at the start of the season was more than adequate, in the later months it was found difficult to field four full sides every week. Additional members will have to be recruited for next season.

Reference should be made to the improved state of the playing pitches, and to the fact that for once Saturdays were not the wettest days of the week. Both the First and "A" XIs only had two matches cancelled owing to weather conditions—this probably constitutes a record for the Club.

Congratulations to G. T. Whiteway on receiving his first "cap" for Wales after being reserve on many occasions. Congratulations also to G. Dennis-Jones on being appointed to Umpire, Wales v. Holland at Penarth and France v. Belgium at Lille.




