

# Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee

THE ACCOUNTS. The Club Accounts for the year ended the 30th April, 1957, show that Football Gates at £11,234 are only £52 less than in 1956. This is very satisfactory as the weather in mid-winter was exceptionally bad; the match versus the Watsonians on December 27th had to be cancelled, and several other games were played in atrocious conditions and before small crowds.

It was disappointing to note that the income from Season Tickets at £4,717 was £777 less than in 1956 and £1,329 less than in 1955. Fortunately this loss of revenue was set off by the increase from share of gates which, at £1,665 was £1,020 more than in 1956. This increase was chiefly due to the success of the floodlit matches.

The Annual Subscription was increased from two guineas to three guineas and this is reflected in the figure for Members' Subscriptions which at £7,255 shows an increase of approximately £2,000 over the 1956 figure.

The New Club House was opened on Saturday, 1st June, 1956 by the President, N. V. H. Riches, and proved such an attraction that Bar Takings reached £25,149 compared with £14,804 in 1956.

The total income of the Club was £52,900 and the surplus after providing for Income Tax was £4,424. This is a disappointingly low figure having regard to the large income. The Committee is very concerned that the expenses of running the Club should have reached the substantial amount of £26,209. Yet many of the items such as the cost of Bar Wages, Communications, Transport, Hotel Accommodation and Materials are largely beyond the control of the Committee. However, having regard to the ever increasing costs of most forms of goods and labour the Committee is conscious of the need for exercising every possible economy without impairing the efficiency and high standard of the Club.

Heavy items of expenditure included under the heading of Upkeep of Ground, Stands and Plant are "Seeds and Fertilizers, £584, Electrical Re-wiring, £394, and Tarmac Roadway behind the South Stand, £353." It should be

noted that this £353 is only part of the total cost, as the Welsh Rugby Union and the Greyhound Company also contributed.

The Balance Sheet shows that the cost of building and equipping the Club House amounted to £34,366 compared with the estimated cost of £32,000 and that expenditure on the South Stand Extension amounted to £15,757. Of this latter sum, £5,000 was written off last year and another £5,000 this year. The General Reserve is increased by £900 representing a profit on Investment.

The Club is very grateful to the Glamorgan County Cricket Club for an Interest Free Loan of £6,000.

South Stand. The Committee is fully aware of the lack of protection from drifting rain in the South Stand and has had the problem under constant review. Several schemes have been submitted and rejected because while the expense of implementing them was considerable, the Committee was not satisfied that the protection afforded would be adequate. Further schemes are being prepared and members can be assured that the Committee is very mindful of its responsibilities.

New Club House. This has proved a great asset and is the envy of visitors. Its administration has presented new problems and these are being tackled as they arise.

SECTIONAL REPORTS. The activities of the various Sections are dealt with fully later, but it is pleasing to note that all are going from strength to strength. The Rugby Club under Peter Goodfellow's inspiring leadership had quite a successful season with a few bad patches. The Cricket Club again won the Knock-Out Cup Competition and has probably now the strongest Club side in South Wales.

The Bowls, Lawn Tennis and Hockey Clubs all did well in spite of very unfavourable weather conditions and for the first time the Hockey Club was able to field four sides.

RESIGNATION OF COMMITTEE MEMBERS. H. Roy Evans and F. E. Bonnell resigned during the year and were replaced by W. N. Hooper and F. Somers. The Club is grateful to Messrs. Evans and Bonnell for the valuable work they have so willingly done. It is with great regret

that we report that F. E. Bonnell died just after he retired from the Committee.

EMPIRE AND COMMONWEALTH GAMES. Before the next Report is issued the Games will be a thing of the past. Your Committee is co-operating whole-heartedly with the Organising Committee to make the Games a success. Immediately before, during and immediately after the Games there will, of necessity, be some curtailment of the usual activities of the Summer Sections. Every effort is being made to reduce the inconvenience and loss of facilities to a minimum and every possible precaution is being taken to ensure that the Ground and Stands will be ready for the opening of the 1958-59 Football Season.

OBITUARY. Since the last Report was published three Vice-Presidents, W. H. Bowcott, A. Calder and H. Picherit have passed away. The first two rendered great service during the early days of the Club and Henri Picherit made himself beloved by his great hospitality and friendliness to our Rugby sides visiting Nantes and Cognac and for his sterling work in promoting Nantes-Cardiff fellowship.

SKITTLE ALLEY. The Skittle Alley has been re-laid in the old Club Room and proved a valuable centre for Social Intercourse for the members in addition to providing an opportunity for the Sections to meet in friendly rivalry.

THE FUTURE. The Club has used nearly all its liquid assets in effecting improvements of a capital nature and during the next few years must by strict economy in all Sections and increased revenue build up its reserves again.

Donations. The Club again materially assisted Junior Rugby by making the following donations: Cardiff and District Rugby Union, £350; Cardiff Schools Rugby Union, £100; Cardiff and District Youth Rugby Union, £25.

APPRECIATION. The Committee expresses its thanks and admiration for the work done by the Honorary Secretaries, Officers and Committee Members of the different Sections. The work of the Football Club Hon. Secretary and Committee has been exceptionally arduous this year because of the visit of the German and Italian National sides and of the South African Universities XV.

### CARDIFF RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

Annual Report for the Season 1956-57

A strange and complex season for the Rugby Club. Beginning on a high note which resulted in 19 games without loss there was a fade-away in middle season, a black Easter, and somewhat of a "come-back" by victories in all three games on the Cornish Tour followed by a successful tour in Roumania.

The season opened without the usual preliminary match against Cardiff and District, as the German National XV were making their first ever visit to Wales on 1st September. These visitors proved very popular ones, and showed themselves well versed in the basic arts of Rugby Football. However, the extra brilliance of the Cardiff backs prevailed, and the game was won by 25 points to nil.

All games to the end of September resulted in convincing victories and then on 3rd October, history was again made by a visit from the Italian National XV. The Italians proved themselves more experienced than the earlier Continental visitors and the game was a hard one, but resulted in another victory by 8 points to 3.

October and November saw some excellent football, particularly against Swansea, Halifax and Bective Rangers, and the end of November arrived with the First XV still unbeaten, with of course the "unbeaten season" once again in focus. This was not to be however, and the first two games in December, both away, resulted in defeats. Cardiff losing to Swansea by 6 points to 3, and to Harlequins on the day of the First Welsh Trial by 17 points to 11. A period of bad weather during this month resulted in two games being cancelled and by the end of the year 1956, the playing record was—Played 24. Won 20. Drawn 2. Lost 2.

The New Year opened with a tour in Scotland, where our Scottish friends the Watsonians entertained the Cardiff party in their usual grand style. The official game against the Watsonians was won, but the unofficial extra game against the Glasgow H.S.O.B. unexpectedly

resulted in a loss. Defeats, which this season seemed to follow in sequence, were against Moseley and Bath on consecutive Saturdays, but a string of victories including one against Newport away was halted in the "needle" matches against Llanelly, which resulted in Llanelly winning a very hard match by 11 points to 6, and Newport by 10 points to nil, again on consecutive Saturdays.

From 9th March to Easter, of nine games played, 6 were won, 3 lost but the Easter programme resulted in three defeats including that fantastic match with the Barbarians which resulted in a score of 40 points against and none for. The Barbarians on the day looked world beaters, and this was borne out in their tour of Canada which followed immediately after their Easter games.

The Cornish Tour saw a return to form, and Penzance, Camborne and St. Ives were well beaten by good open football.

Three extra matches played during the season need special mention. Two Floodlit games, against the Harlequins at the White City and Bristol at Ashton Gate, were tremendously successful. Both were won by Cardiff and the standard of play was very high; the Bristol game being regarded as a classic. The Combined Universities of South Africa Team which toured under the auspices of the Home Unions was played at the Cardiff Arms Park and soundly defeated.

On 6th April, 1957 the Cardiff Club relinquished, with the co-operation of Pontypool the home game arranged for that day, and a special match in aid of the British Empire and Commonwealth Games Fund was organised. This match was highly successful, and resulted in a cheque for over £13,000 being presented to the Fund.

The usual annual functions were held during the year, the Old Players' Re-Union, Ladies Night and the Annual Dance. These were very successful, being held in the New Club House for the first time.

During the season, Cliff Morgan, Gareth Griffiths, Gordon Wells and Lloyd Williams were awarded International Caps and special congratulations are due to Lloyd





Williams on his becoming an International and Barbarian in his first full season with the Cardiff First XV. Congratulations also go to Cliff Morgan, Gordon Wells and Gareth Griffiths who were selected for the Barbarian Touring Team for its tour of Canada.

Tribute must be paid to Skipper Peter Goodfellow who ably captained the side, and very often under most difficult circumstances. Peter played well and was honoured by selection and captaincy in a Welsh Trial.

One serious problem which arose during the season, was the number of calls made on established stars to play in Charity Matches. This resulted not only in players engaging in far too many games, but resulted often in their not being available for their Club sides; a serious problem which must be faced and controlled for the benefit of all concerned.

Top scorer for the season was Alan Priday with 158 points. Most tries were scored by Gareth Griffiths and Glyn John with 18 each, followed by H. Nicholls, 14 and Gordon Wells, 11.

During the season, Peter Goodfellow made the greatest number of appearances, viz. 48, followed by J. D. Evans with 46, Colin Howe, 45, Geoff Beckingham, 43, Eddie Thomas, 43 and Glyn John, 42.

First Team Caps were awarded to the following: W. R. Evans and Lloyd Williams.


### REPORT OF THE ATHLETIC XV Season 1956-57

The Athletic XV enjoyed a good season, their record being:

Played 32. Won 21. Lost 8. Drawn 3. Points for 465. Against 183.

Five matches were cancelled owing to bad conditions, including the traditional match on Boxing Morning against Llandaff.

Considering that a large proportion of the Athletic Fixtures are played away from home the record was a



good one, particularly as many established players were called for duty with the First XV resulting in the Athletic XV fielding a different side most Saturdays. No fewer than 73 players were tried during the season and credit must be given to F. C. Ferguson for his able captaincy under these difficult conditions.

Very good wins were recorded against Kenfig Hill 27-3, Treorchy 32-3, Gloucester United 26-0, Totnes 32-3, and Wrexham 24-11.

Top scorer for the season was D. G. Murphy, 52 points.

F. C. Ferguson made most appearances with 29, followed by B. Sadler 24, S. Bowes 22, and Kingsley Jones 21.

Most tries were scored by Ray Parsons and Derek Murphy with 16 each.

Athletic Caps were awarded to Cenydd Williams, and Glyn Williams during the season.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF JUNIOR XV Season 1956-57

The Junior XV, again a very successful side, was run on similar lines to last year and showed a very creditable record of: Played 27. Won 24. Drawn 2. Lost 1. Under the superb captaincy of Graham Buck, wonderful traditional football was played, and the usual good team spirit prevailed.

The opposition was of an extremely high standard and the one defeat against Aberavon away was a very hard game. The Harlequins Colts, virtually the pick of the English Public Schools, were beaten by 6 points to 3.

G. Buck, A. Williams and P. Thomas played for the Welsh Youth XV against Germany and all the points scored were by the Cardiff Juniors under the able captaincy of Graham Buck.

As a proving ground for the Senior XVs the running of the Junior Side should now show its real worth, as many of the players are ready to enter first-class football; a case in point is Lloyd Williams, an ex-Cardiff Junior player who in his first full season with the First XV has become a Welsh International and Barbarian.

### ITEMS OF GENERAL INTEREST

THE ROUMANIAN TOUR—MAY-JUNE, 1957 HUBERT JOHNSON

The visit of the Cardiff Rugby Club to Roumania, although it had been pioneered by Swansea, Harlequins and London Counties Clubs, was a new experience and adventure for us. The tour was unforgettable, educational and not without the spice of adventure, but to describe it in detail would take more space than the Report can give.

We flew in 'planes of two countries, each with its own individua idea of air-transport, over a vast area of Europe, with great variations of scenery. Sometimes we passed over wide open spaces criss-crossed with roads that made the great North Road of England look like a country lane; at others we had a view below us of almost primeval forests in which lurked wild bears, boars, deer and all types of game, and finally there was the great thrill of crossing thle visual frontier of the Iron Curtain countries which in itself was sufficient to take ones mind completely off the object of our journey. To land in Brussels, Nuremburg, Frankfurt, Prague and Budapest and then after a journey of 1,600 miles to be received in Bucharest with a great bunch of flowers made us feel that Marco Polo's journey to the East was a mere week-end jaunt.

The Cardiff Club were guests of the Roumanian Rugby Federation. I cannot fault our hosts for the way they received us and made us welcome, for we were provided with a First-class Hotel with very good food and accommodation. In fact, nothing was too much trouble for our hosts to make our stay a pleasant one. We were taken to many places of interest in the City including the Czechoslovakian Industries Fair. Of particular interest was a tour of their many sports arenas completed or in course of building. We found that Rugby was fast becoming the National sport and was in the forefront of the scheme for the future development of Roumanian athletics. In two years time they will celebrate the fiftieth anniversary of the introduction of Rugby to the country and the desire to do well in International games is very much a part of the National programme.

With regard to the performance of our team, I give our boys the highest possible praise for the way they accepted the role of ambassadors of Cardiff and Rugby Football by their immaculate approach to the job in hand. They trained every day under the strict supervision of Maldwyn James and Billy Cleaver. Their smart appearance on and off the field with Peter Goodfellow and Eddie Thomas setting a great example established a standard which will be difficult to surpass on future tours. The play was right up to the best traditions of the Club. We won the first match and were only beaten in the second game before 80,000 spectators in a humid atmosphere which was quite strange to our players. This performance after playing more than 50 games on our fixture list was something that made me feel the trip had been worthwhile.

At this stage I should like to express my personal opinion that if these tours on the Continent are to continue, and I hope they will, it would be advantageous to the spirit and traditions of the great game of Rugby if the top class referees of all countries involved held an annual conference and agreed on the laws of the game and the spirit in which these laws should be enforced.

I thank my colleagues, Billy Cleaver and Maldwyn James and Tom Holley our Honorary Masseur for their very great assistance in making the tour a success. Particularly pleasing was the singing of Welsh songs under Billy Cleaver's conducting at a party given by Group Captain Appleton at his flat. It caused many wet eyes in the ranks of the staff of the Embassy who were present, and affected me similarly.

A tour such as this Roumanian one requires a tremendous amount of organisation and planning and it is a tribute to Frank Trott's efficiency that the trip was so successfully run.

I conclude with thanks to the Roumanian Rugby Federation, the British Embassy Staff in Bucharest and our team and officials and record that the Cardiff Rugby Club is, as ever, a Club we are all proud to serve.

# CARDIFF CRICKET CLUB ANNUAL REPORT for Season 1956

I was able to introduce the report for 1955 by a favourable reference to the weather enjoyed during that summer. For the 1956 season, it is necessary to exercise considerable restraint in referring to the same subject. Suffice is it to say that of the Club's Saturday fixtures no less than one in three was either cancelled outright or abandoned at some stage.

The First XI completed 16 games, the Second XI, 15 and the Reserve XI, 10. The playing record shows that the First XI won 4 games, lost 6 and 6 were drawn. The Second XI won 8, lost 0, with 6 drawn, while the Reserve XI won 5, lost 3 and 3 were drawn. It will be seen that whereas the First XI's record was not very commendable, the other two XIs had quite successful seasons.

For the First XI, the high-light was undoubtedly the resounding victory over St. Fagans away from home. This marked the first defeat of St. Fagans by the Club since 1948 and laid a bogey which one hopes may now remain long defunct. The other victories were against Cowbridge, The Steel Company of Wales and Usk. In mitigation of some of our defeats, it can be said that three (versus Bristol Imperials, Newport and Widnes) could well have gone the other way-the final scores being so close. In the game against Widnes, the irony of defeat lay in the fact that the highest score for our opponents was made by a Cardiff player (L. Butler) acting as substitute. Several of the drawn games ended markedly in our favour—we being unable to remove "tail-enders" of opponents who were many runs in arrears. Rain also thwarted us on occasions. The Midland Bank had lost 6 wickets for 54 runs in reply to 236 when rain stopped play. Monmouth were dismissed for a mere 72 runs, but the weather intervened before we could begin our innings. It was, however, extremely weak batting that caused our defeats at Pontypridd and Neath, but our home defeat by Stroud, resulted from our batsmen being caught on an extremely unfriendly wicket. In spite of the team's lack of success, it is fair to say that it always played attractive cricket, getting full enjoyment from it and from the subsequent social activities.


As to individual performances, the outstanding batsman was L. Hughes who had several attractive and long innings. He developed remarkably during the season and headed the averages. A. Thomas and A. Priday were very valuable "middle of the order" batsmen, both showing agreeable intentions at all times to attack the bowling. A. Pleass one of the band of young players, regularly opened the innings and had one or two good performances. During the season there were three century partnerships—of 108 and 171 between G. K. Wilby and L. Hughes against St. Fagans and The Steel Company of Wales, and of 106 between G. K. Wilby and Dr. N. K. Contractor against Gloucester City. Two "old hands" headed the bowling averages and each bowled extremely well on occasions. A newcomer to the Club, C. Bolter, proved very valuable as a slow "leg-

break "bowler and A. Thomas obtained the most wickets. R. Johnson and P. Gatehouse also had considerable shares in the attack. The fielding was generally of an improved standard—helped largely by the presence of several young, keen and active fieldsmen.

The feature of the season for the Second XI, under the captaincy of Dr. N. K. Contractor, was that while winning a record number of 8 games, it sustained no defeat. In their case, too, the weather had its say and but for its interference, the playing record of the side may well have been better. It was recorded by the captain that at no time did the team play defensive cricket in order to preserve an unbeaten record but rather strove at all times for victory. The team also carried out one of its functions—that of sustaining the First XI—in splendid fashion. No fewer than eleven players appeared at one time or another for the senior side. Good batting performances were recorded by Dr. N. K. Contractor, H. Ernest, A. Oaten, K. G. Osment and N. G. Rees who, in addition, showed promise of developing into a useful wicket-keeper. The bowling honours were shared by George Gibson, Stan Manuel and R. H. Stevenson. The double of 50 runs and five wickets in one game was performed by the captain, Dr. N. K. Contractor who, it will be seen, headed the batting

The weather dealt even more harshly with the Reserve XI than with the other two teams. Six games were cancelled and another abandoned after only four overs. This feature apart, the side had a satisfactory season under Gerry Hunter. The batting was a little more consistent than in previous years and G. Eccles, B. Barnes, J. Penzer, H. Bartlett, L. Stockham and D. Thomas all had useful scores. The bowling was not as strong as could have been hoped for and it was again apparent that the Club has a real need of young bowlers of promise. Pride does not prevent the making of special mention of one notable defeat. This was against the "Overseas League" who dismissed the Club side for a mere fifteen runs—of which seven (not out) were collected by Les Stockham. The side tackled its opponents of the following Saturday with undiminished keenness.

Apart from Saturday fixtures, a full list of Sunday and Wednesday evenings games was fulfilled. These games, played in a somewhat lighter spirit, are valuable for bringing forward young players and allowing them to have some experience of playing on the "Park." In addition, the 24-over Knock-Out Tournament was held on evenings during early summer. Yet again, this competition was won by the Club. We are becoming almost monopolistic. Notable during the series of games was the innings of 73 by Alan Priday in the semifinal, including one "six" which was the biggest hit seen on the ground for some time. A theoretically much weakened team faced a strong St. Fagans XI in the final. Ably led by the vice-captain, Ross Johnson, the side astounded friend and foe alike and emerged winners, after a sound innings by John Herbert and sterling bowling by Ross Johnson and Stan Manuel. A team was also sent to play in the Weston-super-Mare six-a-side Knock-Out Tournament. For the first time since appearing in the tournament, we found ourselves drawn in the First Round against another club rather than a county

side. We duly won that round but fell victims to the Somerset County team in the next. As usual, all greatly enjoyed the day across the water. The usual Whitsuntide tour to Gloucestershire was carried out. The two games against Gloucester City and Stroud were drawn. It is rather disturbing to report that it is becoming increasingly difficult to send a truly representative team on this two-day tour.

The season was notable for the visit of a South Australian Touring team to the Cardiff Arms Park. A combined Cardiff and Newport team led by the Cardiff captain met these opponents in a full-day's match and triumphed by 5 wickets. G. Davies had an excellent knock of 62 and C. Bolter was the most successful bowler. The game and the following "get-together" were both decided successes.

On the whole, weather excepted, the Club had another enjoyable and successful season. Concern is still felt at the need to recruit more young members to the Section. The First XI had a strong nucleus of young players but many more are needed if the Club is to maintain its position. The Section's committee is aware of and is endeavouring to solve the problem. At the other end of the scale, this report would hardly be complete without mentioning the retirement from active cricket of one of the Club's outstanding players since the war—Haydn Wilkins. As captain of the Club (four seasons), as batsman, bowler and fieldsman, he left a gap that is hard to fill.

It should also be recorded that between the 1955-56 playing seasons a Club annual dinner was inaugurated. Over 80 persons were present at a very successful function and it is hoped that such an annual re-union will be held for many years to come.

Finally, it is my duty and pleasure to acknowledge the part played by W. J. Evans, as Chairman, First XI umpire and selector, by Wyndham Lewis, as Secretary, by Len Thomas, as First XI Scorer, by B. Kempson and F. Shanahan, as Second XI umpires, by F. Brookes, Second XI Scorer, by O. Herbert, as co-opted member of the Selection Committee, and by the general members of the Section's Committee. My personal thanks are extended to Dr. N. K. Contractor and Gerry Hunter, Captains of the Second XI and Reserve XI, for the time, energy and interest they devoted to welfare of the Section and to the First XI Vice-captain, Ross Johnson, for his unfailing support.
