Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee, N. V. H. Riches

Once again the Balance Sheet shows that the Club is in a strong financial position, one of which the members can be proud.

The surplus of £2,679 shown on the Income and Expenditure Account is nearly the same as that of the previous year and while having regard to the circumstances explained below it may be considered satisfactory, it is somewhat disappointing when we consider that our income, apart from Bar Takings was nearly £24,000.

The revenue from the football gates at £9,893 is the lowest for some years. This is largely due to the fact that many matches normally played on a Saturday had to be played on evenings in mid-week, because on eight Saturdays the ground was used for special games and one match, that against Newport, fixed for Saturday, February 6th, had to be postponed to Wednesday, March 17th, as the ground was frost-bound. Fortunately, the decrease in gate receipts was to a large extent set off by the exemption from payment of Entertainments Duty which resulted in a saving of approximately £1,000, and by the increased revenue from Season Tickets and Members' Subscriptions. These last two items at £6,612 and £4,176 respectively, constitute Club records.

The figure of £14,884 for Bar takings for the year is also a record one.

The expenditure including Bar Wages and Expenses amounted to no less than £24,241 compared with £24,171 in 1953. The upward trend of the figures for the Club's expenditure which has been a feature of recent years is causing great concern to the Finance Committee.

During the year fifty £5 "A" shares in the Cardiff Arms Park Company Ltd., have been received and vested in the names of the Club's Trustees. The Management Committee appeals to all holders of these "A" shares to transfer them to the Club as such transfer will in no way affect their rights as Life members of the Club.

In the last report I expressed the hope that before this report appeared there would be concrete evidence of the determination of the Committee to provide better facilities at the Club. At the time of writing the work of erection of the new Club House has not yet begun, but the plans have been approved and building should begin early in the Autumn. The plan for increasing the seating accommodation of the South Stand by more than 3,000 has been agreed with the Welsh Rugby Union and contracts for the initial stages of the work allocated. Work on this project too should be begun in the near future. The Club's liability in connection with both these projects exclusive of expenditure on furnishings for the new Club House is approximately £33,000 and the Building Reserve has therefore been increased to that amount by transferring £3,000 from the Income and Expenditure Account.

For some time the Committee has been concerned about the insurance effected on the Buildings, Machinery, etc., and, after a complete survey had been made, has increased the Insurance, which is fully borne by the Club, on many of the items, so that they could be fully covered.

With the approval of the Club the surrounds of the Cricket ground have been materially improved by the provision by the Glamorgan County Cricket Club of a 13-inch wall and wooden fencing.

In honour of the coronation of the Queen, the ground was suitably decorated and on Coronation Day itself, the Cricket Club staged a six-a-side tournament which proved a great success and benefited the National Playing Fields Association to the extent of £50. Earlier in the year we had the pleasure of witnessing a ladies' cricket match between Miss Hyde's Eleven and an eleven captained by Miss Duggan. The play was of a remarkably high standard and the cricket ability displayed by the ladies surprised many of the onlookers.

The highlight of the year was of course the memorable victory of the Rugby Club over the New Zealand touring team in the tremendously thrilling game on November 21st, 1953. The match has been fully described in the report of the Rugby Club, but on behalf of the Management Committee I extend to Bleddyn Williams and his team

Season 1953-54

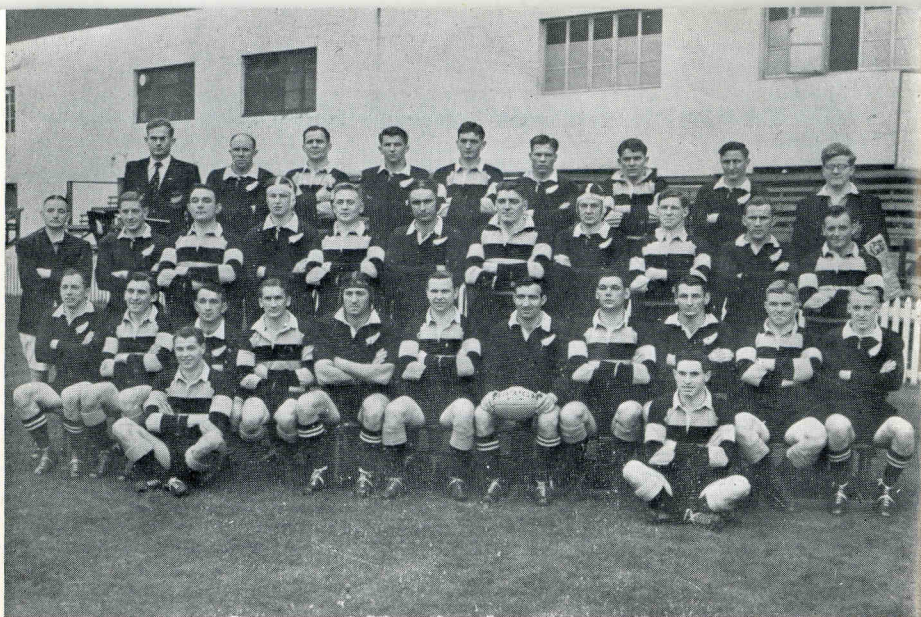
Annual Report by the Hon. Secretary, B. H. Jenkins

The opening of the season once again brought the news of the loss to the Club of a great player. That popular forward, W. E. Tamplin, or "Tamp" as he was called by his team mates, decided that in future he would play for the Police teams and no other. He had proved himself an excellent pack leader and kicker of goals; he usually scored more than 100 points each season and headed the list of scorers for the Club. He played seven times for Wales, captained the side which defeated the Australians in 1947, and kicked the two penalty goals that won the game. The Cardiff Club wishes him well for the future.

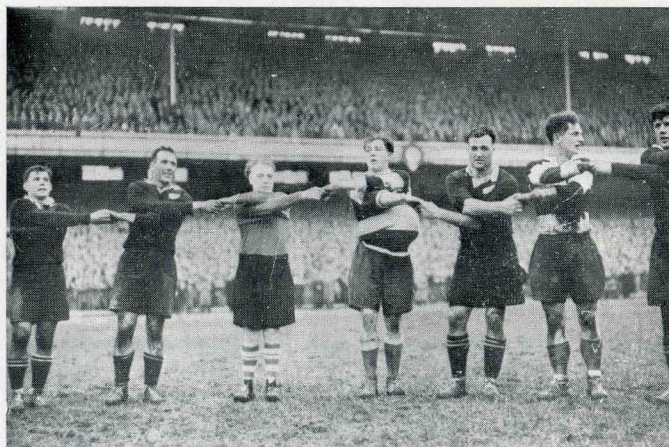
The season had an exceptional opening, for the final trial had to be cancelled because of torrential rain. The first nine games resulted in victories for the Club. Birkenhead Park, Aberavon, Coventry, Leicester and Newport were all beaten. The match against Aberavon was played in continuous rain and the Cardiff forwards who were in grand form were mainly responsible for the victory.

In the next eight games our record was not so good; three matches, all away, were lost, and one was drawn: Llanelly in the evening game, Swansea after a very exciting game and Northampton proving too good. Our heaviest defeat was suffered at Northampton on Monday, November 2nd, where after brilliant back play by both sides, which raised the large crowd to great enthusiasm we lost by 22 points to 9 points.

In our encounters with our near neighbours Newport we won three and one was drawn. The match at Newport on November 14th when Cardiff was victorious by 5 points to 3 revealed the excellent talent available in the Athletic XV. Not one of the backs of the First XV was available, most of them being engaged in a Welsh Trial game at Swansea. Stan Bowes led the side magnificently and certainly instilled confidence in the younger players.

Then came the great day! Conditions on November 21st, 1953, when we met the New Zealand Touring team, were perfect. There was a magnificent crowd of approximately 50,000; the gates had to be closed ten minutes before the kick-off for it was a "No Ticket" match.

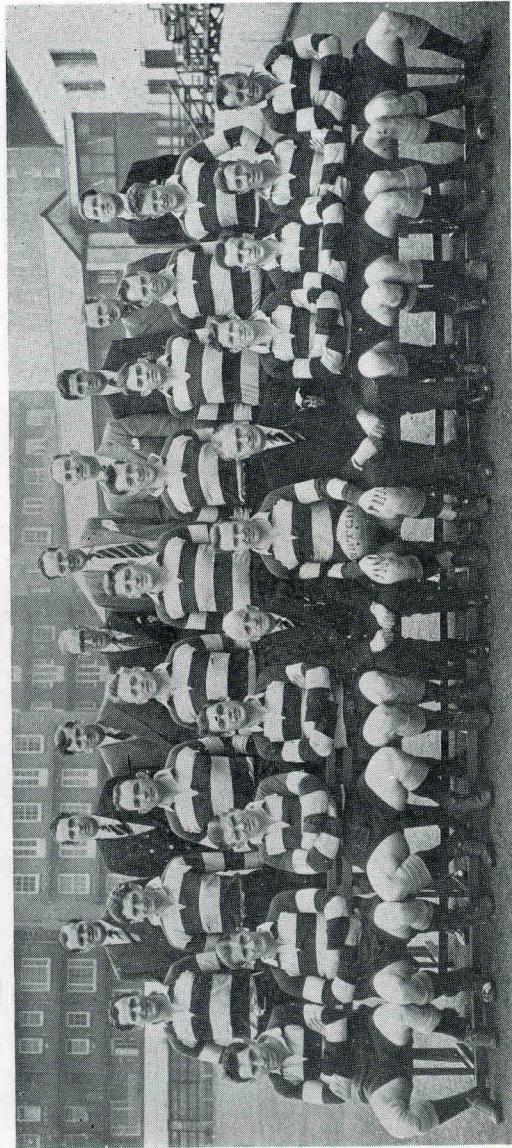

All the scoring was done in the first half. Cardiff scored first. Cliff Morgan received the ball from Rex Willis, put in a short punt ahead, raced up and caught it on the rebound. He passed it to Alun Thomas, who after making some ground, passed it to Gwyn Rowlands. He cross kicked towards the posts and Sid Judd dashing up at full speed caught it and crashed over for a try. Gwyn Rowlands converted. This try was soon followed by a magnificent penalty goal from 45 yards range by R. A. Jarden. With the score at 5 points to 3 in Cardiff's favour, the Cardiff pack going great guns against the heavier opponents, and our side doing the pressing, the excitement was intense. It reached fever heat when, after another excellent pass from Rex Willis to Cliff Morgan, the ball reached Bleddyn Williams, who put in a perfect short punt. The ball was gathered by Alun Thomas, who raced up to Scott, the New Zealand full-back, before giving a long pass to Gwyn Rowlands who raced 30 yards and scored in the corner. The kick for goal failed. There was no more scoring and Cardiff was worthy winners by 8 points to 3 and thus completed a most wonderful record of having defeated all three Commonwealth Touring sides—South Africa in 1906; Australia in 1908 and 1947; and now New Zealand in 1953.

The following extracts from reports on the game indicate the tension displayed in this historic game.

Dave Phillips in the "South Wales Echo" wrote "For 80 minutes we saw the traditional skill and fire of what has rightly been termed 'the greatest Rugby Club in the World,' countered by the all-action enthusiasm of a determined All Black side who tried everything in their power to whittle down Cardiff's half-time lead of 5 points in a storming grand stand final."

J. B. G. Thomas in the "Western Mail" wrote, "What a game it was! How magnificently the players performed. The blood raced through their veins as they bent to their tasks in attack and defence. The voice was raised to cheer as Bleddyn Williams and his fellows split open the New Zealand's defence like a destroyer's bow ripping through the flimsy hull of a crippled submarine. The rugby triumph which had eluded Cardiff since 1905 was achieved in a match full of excitement and glory accompanying a great sporting occasion."

Then from the leading article in the "Western Mail" on Monday, 23rd November, 1953, we take this extract :—

"We do not think that the passing of the years will ever dim for us the gleam and glory of the historic encounter at the Cardiff Arms Park on Saturday, or tarnish the memory of Cliff Morgan's darting and swooping across the turf and skimming past every obstacle like a swift at play. There was greatness too in that clash of bone and sinew wherein the impenetrable object that was the Cardiff pack successfully withstood the supposedly irresistible force of the New Zealand 'terrible eight.'"

In this match the whole Cardiff team played magnificently and towards the end of the game appeared stronger and fresher than their opponents.

The following Saturday, Cardiff won easily at Gloucester against the team which is usually most difficult to beat on its own ground.

The Combined Services team sprang a great surprise the following Wednesday by taking our ground record in defeating us by 18 points to 9.

The two games played in Ireland in February, 1954, were lost. Cardiff were most unfortunate in the second

match as the Captain and a forward were off the field through injury for the major portion of the game. From then on to the end of the season only one match was lost that being against Cheltenham at Cheltenham on the day Wales played France at Cardiff.

Although not experiencing, from a results point of view, one of the best seasons in the Club's long and illustrious history, 1953-54 will always be remembered as the season when Cardiff defeated the All Blacks.

There was only one match in which Cardiff failed to cross the opponent's line, that being against Old Belvedere, Ireland, who also failed to cross the Cardiff line.

Dr. Gwyn Rowlands headed the list of scorers with 127 points. Bleddyn Williams topped the try getters with 17 tries, followed by :—

In scoring ten tries each, S. Judd and C. D. Williams hold a post-war record for the number of tries scored by a forward in any one season.

During the season, E. Thomas made the highest number of appearances, viz. 42, followed by C. D. Williams with 41, Malcolm Collins, 40, and Bleddyn Williams, 39.

First team caps were awarded to Colin Hewett, Glyn Morgan, Howard Nicholls and D. J. Walsh.

Perhaps the greatest triumph of the 1953-54 season was enjoyed by the Club Captain, Bleddyn Williams, who had the honour of leading both his Club and his Country to victory over the New Zealand Touring Team. This is a record which is not likely to be beaten for some time. Besides proving himself still to be a great player he was a splendid captain and fully deserved his success. He was ably assisted by his Vice-Captain, Sid Judd.

THE ATHLETIC XV

For the fourth season in succession, Stan Bowes was appointed Captain of the Athletic XV. It is believed this constitutes a record. Stan who first played for Cardiff in season 1937-38 was playing so exceptionally well that he gained promotion to the First XV in November, 1953. His game against the All Blacks was probably the best of his career and he retained his place in the senior side until the end of the season.

Peter Goodfellow took over the Captaincy of the Athletic side when Stan Bowes became a regular player of the First XV. Here again the Club was extremely fortunate. Peter with his wide experience of the game proved an excellent captain and was an inspiration to the young players in the team. He became very popular and earned the respect of his team mates.

The Athletic team's record was a good one. Out of 35 matches played 26 were won, 6 lost and 3 drawn.

Two matches were lost at home, one against Newport United by 13 points to 11 and the other against Cardiff High School Old Boys by 5 points to 3.

Alan Priday scored 87 points, the highest number by one player for the season.

THE YOUTH XV

Although its record for 1953-54 is not so impressive as it has been in former seasons, the Youth XV had one of its best seasons. The players were younger than those in the past, and so fewer were called up for National Service. This fact was largely responsible for the fine team spirit and sense of loyalty to the Club which developed; attributes which have always been a feature of the Cardiff Rugby Club.

After trials, twenty-four players were selected to become Junior Members for the Season and a rota system was introduced so that each member could play in three out of four games. This system was adhered to without regard to the quality of the team played against, and as a result the strongest opposition was not of necessity met by our strongest XV. But this policy of giving each member the maximum number of games possible, enabled the Committee to watch his progress and coach him so that his natural abilities could be developed to their fullest extent. The winning of games, although a win was striven for most energetically, was subordinated to the aim of trying to improve the play of the young members and this was undoubtedly achieved in nearly every case. As eighteen of the players will be available next year, the team should have a very successful season.

We hope to continue to provide a steady flow of players to the First and Athletic XV's. Terry Donovan, Lloyd Williams, Bryn Mapstone and Alan Priday have already played for the first XV and should be "permanent" members in the near future, while B. Walsh, P. Walsh, P. Owen, E. Foster, W. Speake, B. Milton, E. Heron, L. James, D. J. Pile and others have played for the Athletic side. E. Heron and G. Curtis also gained Welsh Youth caps. Thus the Junior or Youth XV may be regarded as a good investment by the Cardiff Club.

The Fixture List was a heavy one. Opposition was provided by the strongest Youth Clubs and the local Grammar Schools. Socially this was our best season. The loyalty of the members was such that frequently all 24 members turned up ready to play if needed. Many friendships were made and cemented. The away trips were thoroughly enjoyed, especially the Annual Trip to Bridgwater. The team was ably led on and off the field by the Captain, E. Heron and Vice-Captain, N. Salmon. The very successful season is largely due to the energy and efficiency of the Honorary Secretary, Leslie Jones.

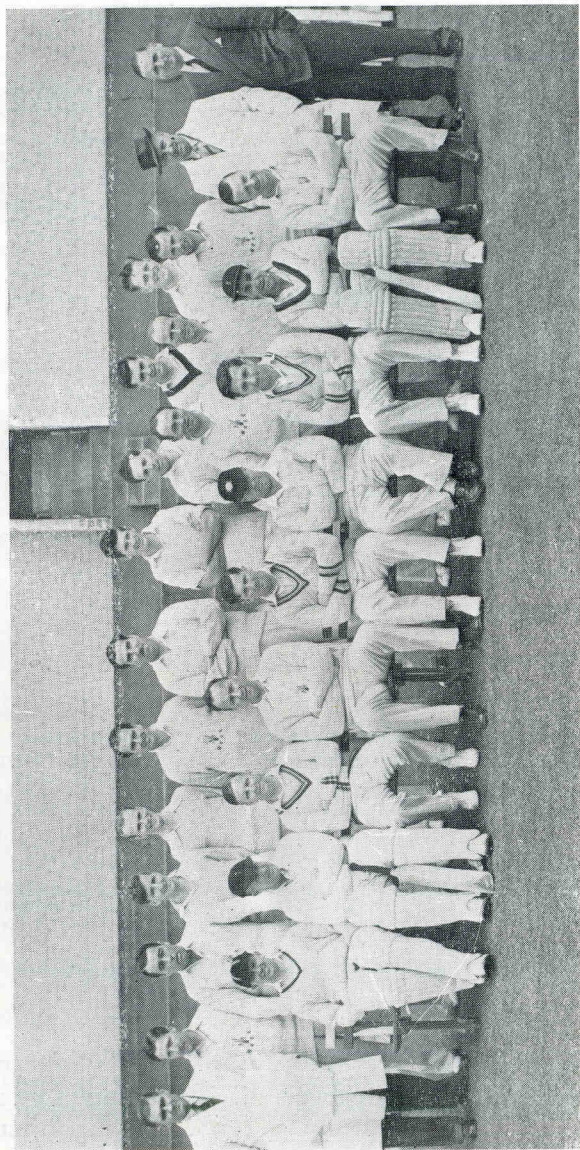

ANNUAL REPORT

Season 1954

The 1953 visit of the Australian touring side aroused great enthusiasm for the game throughout the country from the county clubs down to the humblest village eleven. The Cardiff Club which had gone through a transitional period following the war now began to derive advantages from its policy of encouraging youngsters and affording them every opportunity of playing on a first-class ground with top class coaching at a reasonable cost to the individual.

The fixture card, probably the most comprehensive of any in South Wales, included five sides playing every week from the last week of April to the first week of September. Three Saturday XI's a Sunday XI, and a Wednesday evening team were fielded. In addition to this activity the Club organised the annual Inter-Club Knock-out Competition played on Tuesday evenings, from May to July, and for good measure a six-a-side knock-out competition on Coronation day.

It is true to say that the strength of a club is in its members and their enthusiasm for the game, and in this respect the cricket section of the Cardiff Athletic Club is second to none. Through the long winter months, cricket members would be found in the club room more often than not arguing rugby, a considerable number of them being either present rugby players or past members of the illustrious Cardiff Rugby Club, and from January onwards it was a common sight to find players hurrying from rugby training to have a go at the indoor nets.

Every Thursday evening the indoor school welcomed members of the club and promising youngsters anxious to improve their cricket under the guidance of the coach, Phil Clift of the Glamorgan C.C.C. Some very good prospects emerged from these pre-season sessions, not least of whom were, Brian Joseph, a fast bowler from Penarth, who is also a member of our youth rugby XV; Alex Cohen, a most useful wicket keeper and batsman from St. Iltyds; his school friend, John Daley, who looks the most promising batsman we have found for some seasons; and Vince Woodward, who was so keen that he came down from Ystrad Rhondda every Thursday whatever the weather. These are just a few of the discoveries.

The captains of the three sides were again seasoned campaigners, in the persons of Gwyn Davies, George Gibson and Harry Bartlett. One could not wish for better skippers, men who couple a sound knowledge of the game, with the cricketing ability to set a standard at all times.

Gwyn Davies, equally well known on the rugger field, is one of those rare people who wants to finish a Saturday afternoon's game of cricket with a result. He sets out from the outset to win or lose games by trying to obtain a decision and do away with the dreary draws that are such a feature of all classes of cricket today. At the beginning of the season if he won the toss and elected to bat he told his players that he was going to declare at a certain time whatever the score, but he found more often than not, that his opponents were not willing to have a go, so he changed his methods. If he happened to win the toss, he put the other side in to bat and threw the onus on to it. This was the turning point of the season. The Cardiff batsmen revelling in the opportunity to go for the runs and force a result, did so with gusto, and some splendid cricket resulted. Altogether 19 matches were played, 11 were won, 6 were drawn and 2 lost. Rain washed out eight matches. It is perhaps not necessary for me to say that the games lost were against our age-old rivals, St. Fagans. They certainly have cast a spell over us. The two holiday periods were most successful. Three games were played on the Whitsun tour in Gloucestershire, and all resulted in victories. During the August Bank Holiday period at the Arms Park three excellent games also resulted in wins.

Without a doubt, the Knock-out matches at the Arms Park proved most exciting! How the public like this sort of cricket! This was the third tournament and captains and players alike are now getting wily and finding ways and means of keeping the runs down. Bowling and fielding were of a very high standard throughout the competition. The two games between Newport and Cardiff were thrillers. The first match resulted in a tie of 57 runs apiece. Newport batting second had to achieve the low total of 58, but so keen was the bowling and fielding that the last over came up with one run to get and the last man in. Haydn Wilkins had the unenviable task of trying to remove the Newport batsman who had been in since the commencement of the innings and he bowled him with the very first ball of the over. Great indeed, was the excitement. In that match Wilkins took 6 for 22. In the replay Cardiff again batted first and this time did better, scoring 107.

Once again Wilkins caused havoc with the Newport batsmen taking 5 for 9 in three overs. One amazing spell of 5 wickets in seven balls included a hat trick.

The Cardiff side met Barry in the final and after a very close game won by 96 to 87. At the conclusion of the match there was a supper at which not only the two teams which reached the final, but also the representatives of all the teams that had played in the competition sat down. All who spoke expressed their pleasure at having played in the competition.

The weather man was not very kind on Tuesday nights and most of the games were played in either showery, or overcast conditions, but even so good, gates were the order of the day.

Twelve sides competed in the six-a-side competition on Coronation Day, which the Cardiff First team also won, St. Illtyds Old Boys

being the runners up. This competition was enjoyed by all concerned and judging by the bar receipts for the day, playing must have been thirsty work. The finalists were rewarded with tankards suitably inscribed, and a donation of £50 was sent to the National Playing Fields Association, a result which proved the success of the effort. Many club members spent the day at the club, enjoying the television relay which was specially installed for the occasion.

For the records, Alan Thomas headed the bowling averages, for the season, achieving some splendid figures, the best being 8 for 37 against St. Fagans. Brian Joseph showed promise. Haydn Wilkins and S. Machray amongst the old guard did well at times, but the brunt of the attack as in past seasons fell on Brian Foster, who never stopped trying, but the slow wickets with so much rain during the season never gave him any help. The batting was not too good if judged by high individual scores, but the totals achieved were always sufficient. It is difficult to mention any individuals, but it was good to see Ken Wilby back in form. What a splendid batsman he is to have in a Saturday afternoon side, for he is always looking for runs and is most attractive to watch when he has his eye in. Bill Perkins who had been playing cricket in Pembrokeshire, was very useful when runs were wanted quickly.

Altogether a most memorable season, and tribute must be paid to Gwyn Davies for the fighting spirit he instilled into his team.

The Second XI is a cheery combination, consisting mainly of seasoned players not trying to get back into the First side. It is a very difficult side to bowl out, has a good attack with the Captain always ready if a stand is threatened, but it is not a very good looking side in the field. But what can one say when a side is undefeated. Opinion will never be unanimous as to whether youngsters should be given preference over seasoned players in form. Cricket is not the only game where there is a difference of opinion on this point. We have seen footballers retired by public opinion long before they should have been.

But to return to the Second XI. The batting was at all times adequate and enjoyable. The unwritten law was that when any member reached 50 he should commit "hara kiri," a deed which is satisfactory to the batsman padded up and waiting for a knock. This procedure is good for Club Cricket. The bowling was never very good; this is the department where the Cardiff club could do with reinforcement. Bowling is a science, which only the thoughtful can master. The young aspirant for bowling honours should realise that most batsmen have only a few shots, and they should not feed these whatever they do. Alan Pleass and Alan Priday continue to make progress. These two youngsters are going to be more than useful if given time to develop. Yes, altogether a good side and a happy one. Harry Bartlett steered the Reserve XI through the season in his usual calm manner, giving the younger players every encouragement. Never very strong in the bowling department, it managed to win 5 of the 11 games played.

Some of the boys put up good performances which carried them to the Second XI, and each week the Captain of the reserves found himself with new faces in the side.

Wickets throughout South Wales are improving, having recovered from the ravages of the war period, and all the clubs want is a little more support from the public to ensure a very rosy future for club cricket in the area.

One final word or two about activities other than on the field . . . 1953 marked the seventieth birthday of our Chairman, N. V. H. Riches, and the members very secretly went about collecting for an inscribed pen and pencil set which was duly presented to him by W. J. Evans at the Annual meeting of the Athletic Club. Our Chairman was deeply touched by the thought, and in a few well chosen words thanked the members. What a wonderful servant he has been to the club, and not just to the cricket section. He first joined the cricket club at the early age of nine years, and then had a long and distinguished career for the club, the county and the M.C.C. Then we must never forget the work he put in during the second world war, when he took over at the club offices, helping to keep the wheels turning, by organising rugger matches, dealing with the correspondence and guarding the club's finances. When the new pavilion is built, it will be a tribute to our Chairman and others like him.

That happy band of sportsmen the Innswingers (confined to thirty members of the cricket section) organised their Xmas Draw

once again and distributed 20 Xmas hampers to deserving families in the Cardiff area, a charitable effort which is much appreciated.

They played a number of evening cricket matches during the summer season, skittled every Thursday night during the winter and at all times were ready to assist the rugger section by stewarding big club matches, internationals, etc.

Once more our membership increased and as a direct result of our continued policy of asking new applicants to attend trials, the general standard of play in the club is on the up grade.

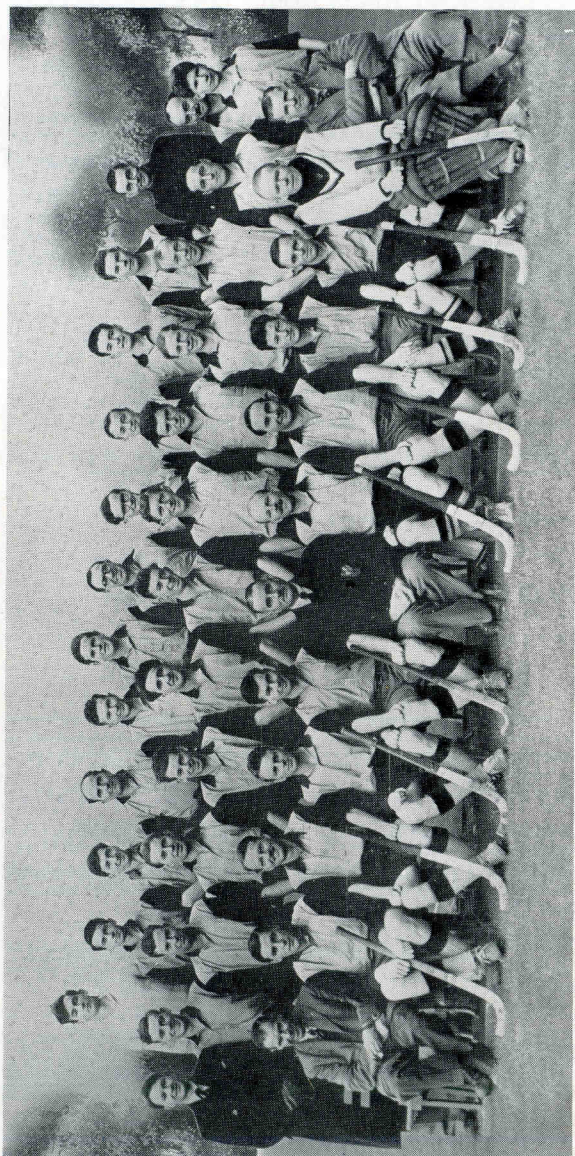
In this respect our gratitude is due to Jack Broad for his conscientious interest in and coaching of the Juniors, a task which is bound to bring reward in the future.

Season 1953-54

Despite very poor conditions at Sophia Gardens at times, the Club continued to maintain its high standard of play. All three teams performed well, as the records show. The First XI, although losing two more matches than in the previous year, did well to attain the same number of wins. The "A" XI, for the second year in succession, could boast of more than a hundred goals scored, whilst the "B" XI had their best season ever.

The First XI again drew both their matches in London, thus producing after three years the unusual record of five games drawn out of six played. From being two goals in arrears, the side rallied well against Beckenham, and, finishing on top, were unlucky not to win. The feature of the season was the discovery that the Captain, N. C. Pallôt, usually an inside-right, was the centre-forward the Club so badly needed. Taking over this position early in December when the team was having a bad patch, he filled it with such success that twenty-five goals were scored in the next five matches! On no occasion did the side suffer a bad defeat, those games which were lost being quite close affairs. Among the best achievements of the season were the double victories over Bath and Newport.

The "A" XI, with a well-supported forward line always looking for goals, had a number of clear-cut victories to their credit. They scored notable "doubles" over Weston II, Imperial II, West Gloucestershire II and Newport "A." One of their best performances was against the Bristol Aero. Co., a good First XI side, whom they beat 3-2. So long as the "A" XI continue to play in this vein, there will not be much wrong with Cardiff hockey. The Club is indeed fortunate to be able to call upon such capable reserves to fill the vacancies which so often occur in the First XI.

When one considers the difficulties that the Selection Committee faced in trying to give every member a game as often as possible, with the result that the team was often quite different from one week to the next, the record of the "B" XI is even more creditable. This has been much their best season to date, for they beat many a Second XI side, and had two good wins against Old Bristolians II. They had an unusual number of drawn games; at one period there were four in succession, each 1-1. The enthusiasm that now exists, coupled with the general improvement in the standard of play, should ensure an even better season next year.

Thanks to the efforts of K. H. Ingledew, members were privileged to listen to a most interesting and instructive talk on tactics given by E. S. Hoare, the famous old England centre-half and Olympic coach, at the Cardiff Arms Park on 22nd February, 1954. It was surely the best talk of this kind that the Club has ever had and all present learnt a great deal.
