# Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee, N. V. H. Riches

The financial position of the Club continues to improve. After allowing £390 for income tax, the Accounts show the very satisfactory surplus of £2,693. However, I feel I must strike a note of warning. Since the financial year 1948-49, when the surplus, before allowance was made for income tax, was £9,959, the excess of income over expenditure has steadily increased and the figure of £2,693 is the lowest since the War.

The net income from Football Gates and Season Tickets amounted to £17,720; in 1951-52, it was £17,514. This is an increase of £206 and when one considers that Entertainments Duty at £1,520 was £840 more than last year, it is a very healthy sign. There was a fall in the income received from the sale of Season Tickets of £914, but this was partly offset by an increase of £484 from Members' Subscriptions The increase in the Club Membership thus indicated is very gratifying.

The Bar Takings at f.12,934 show a decrease of f.720. The two most important items of expenditure are £4,085 for Upkeep of Ground, Stands and Plant and £4,500 for Salaries and Wages. The cost of keeping the ground, stands and plant in good condition is certainly very high, but I am certain that members will agree that the Park has never looked better. During the year a full-time painter and handyman was appointed. His work should effect a saving in the Upkeep Charges and ensure that the buildings are kept in good condition. The increase in expenditure on Salaries and Wages has caused the Committee considerable concern. A Sub-Committee was set up to consider it and after a careful examination reported that in some cases wages were governed by Statute and in all other cases the rates of pay were not excessive when compared with those paid to similar classes of employees elsewhere. The number of the staff and conditions of work were also found to be satisfactory.

In the Balance Sheet the Building Reserve has been increased to £30,000 by transferring £5,900 from the Income and Expenditure Account. This is more than

covered by Investments and Savings Bank Accounts. As the Club is now relieved of liability for Entertainments Duty I feel sure that we may look to the future with quiet confidence.

In reviewing the events of the year, I am pleased to record that on Saturday evening, May 10th, 1952, the Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Alderman Robert Bevan, J.P., paid a visit to the Club and spent a very happy and informal evening with the members.

In my last report I stated that the Management Com-

mittee had reluctantly terminated the engagement of the Secretary and the Chief Clerk. An Extraordinary General Meeting was requisitioned by 50 members to consider this action. It was held at the Cory Hall in May, 1952, with the President in the Chair and attended by more than 500 members. By an overwhelming majority the meeting expressed its confidence in the Management Committee. In the circumstances it was considered advisable that the Secretary should leave at once. Mr. Brice H. Jenkins kindly consented to act until a new Secretary was appointed. He did so until August and on behalf of the Committee I place on record our appreciation of the work he did.

In June, Mr. C. E. Sargent, who was Secretary of the Glamorganshire Golf Club, Penarth, was appointed Secretary and he took up his duties early in August, 1952.

At its Annual General Meeting in May, 1952, the Rugby Club decided to increase the number of Committee Members from 12 to 15 because of the extra work involved in running the Youth side in addition to the two senior fifteens.

The experiment of the Cricket Club in organising a Knock-out Competition in 1951 was so successful that a similar competition was held in 1952. Twelve teams entered. The matches were keenly contested and attracted large crowds. The increased revenue from Cricket Gates and Collections is largely due to the popularity of the competition. In a very exciting final, St. Fagans beat Cardiff and deprived the Club of the Cup it won in 1951.

The wide windows in the Club Room and Main Dressing Rooms had become very unsafe and were replaced by a much better type. We hope to replace the windows in the other Dressing Rooms in the near future.

In September, 1952, the Club received visits from two sides from Nantes and Cognac. These have been reported on in the Football Report but it should be recorded that our Veteran Rugby XV retained the "Championnat du Monde Vétérans" Cup and that we entertained our visitors royally. It should be noted too that continuing our friendly relations with Nantes we entertained 60 young people from that town to tea in August.

The Museum continues to receive additions and is a source of great pleasure and interest to visitors and Club members.

The Committee has instructed the Club architect to prepare plans for new Club Rooms near the Quay Street entrance, and it is hoped that before the next Report appears there will be more concrete evidence of the determination of the Committee to provide much better accommodation for its members.

In order that too many matches shall not be played on the Park with consequent damage to the turf, arrangements have been made for the Junior XV and the Hockey Club to play most of their home games in Sophia Gardens.

It is very pleasing to be able to record that the Joint Committee of the Welsh Rugby Union and the Club continues to meet periodically and is working very harmoniously in dealing with matters affecting the ground.

On behalf of the Committee I extend to Bleddyn Williams our heartiest congratulations on the honour conferred on him by his appointment to captain Wales last season. It was one he richly deserved. We congratulate too his fellow Club members who played with him for the National side; they all brought honour to the Club.

In conclusion, I thank my Vice-Chairman, the members of the Management Committee, and the officers and members of the Section Committee for their ever-ready cooperation in the work of the Club and my appreciation of the loyal support given by the many voluntary helpers, the Secretary and his Staff.

# Season 1952-53

# Annual Report by the Hon. Secretary, B. H. Jenkins

In the last Annual Report reference was made to the retirement from the game of the International players, Jack Matthews, Desmond O'Brien and Frank Trott. When season 1952-53 was about to open, that great and loving character Cliff Davies announced that he too was giving up active participation in the game. He was a grand player who loved the game and thoroughly enjoyed playing it. No one knew better than he the technique of forward play; he studied and planned moves for every contingency. A true Welshman, he loved singing and made sure that his fellow players shared his love. When at after-match gatherings he removed his collar and tie, his colleagues knew that "the conductor" meant business. When he was on tour our hosts knew that their visitors were from "the land of song." I am told that Cliff saw to it that the Lions before they landed in New Zealand to commence their tour were able, under his persuasive and dynamic conducting, to sing the most famous and well beloved Welsh hymns.

All who have met Cliff or enjoyed his virile Rugby wish him the very best of health and good luck for the future.

The season 1952-53 was again a successful one despite the fact that a number of star players were on the injured list for long periods.

In this respect the Club Captain, W. R. Willis was the most unfortunate. He damaged a shoulder in the final Club trial and again at Murryfield, when playing for Wales against Scotland on 7th February. He received a further injury at Cheltenham on 25th April, 1953.

Despite these handicaps Rex served the Club well. He was an excellent captain on and off the field and never missed a meeting or a mtach.

When unfit to play Rex's place as Captain was taken by a very able deputy in Sid Judd, the vice-captain. Sid did a good job of work, was a grand leader of the pack and set a fine example to the players both on and off the field. His play improved so much that he obtained four caps for Wales as a back row forward.

Rex and Sid did their job in the true tradition of the Club. Their powers of leadership and sense of loyalty quickly earned the respect of their clubmates.

The season began well; the first fourteen matches were won. The first defeat was at Oxford on 1st November by 6 points to 3. This game will be remembered for the number of missed penalty goals. All the kicks were good but not good enough.

In the first serious game of the season on September 6th, Neath were well beaten at home by 21 points to 3.

On 13th September the new score board was in use for the first time. Those recording the scores were kept very busy and by the end of the game must have been well experienced with the new apparatus, for it registered a win for Cardiff against Plymouth Albion by 7 goals, 4 tries, 47 points to nil.

In the first four matches 115 points were scored by our team with only 11 against. Then came a narrow win over Cheltenham and a successful Midland town. This was followed by two victories over our friends from Nantes and Cognac. First, on Friday evening, September 26th came the win by the veterans under the captaincy of Wilfred Wooller, who played an excellent game. It was a treat to see such old timers as Wendy Davies, Les Spence, Harry Rees and Les Manfield in the blue and black jerseys once again. On the following day in a free scoring game, with open playing by both sides, Cardiff won by 36 points to 11.

Then came the first game of the season against our friendly rivals Newport, at Newport, which Cardiff won by 9 points to 3.

From Newport the team and officials proceeded to Ireland to play two games. The first was against Old Belvedere who were beaten in a clean but very keen game by a single point.

On the following day, in the most spectacular game of the season, Cardiff beat the Young Munsters by 31 points to 17. In this game the Cardiff team was irresistable and the handling of the ball was uncanny. Cliff Morgan and Bleddyn Williams were in brilliant form although opposed to such great players as Jackie Kyle and Noel Henderson.

Early in the game Cliff received the ball on his own 10-yard line, beat man after man to score between the posts.

The teams received a great ovation at the close of the game and the Cardiff party will always have happy recollections of the hospitality extended to them on this tour.

The next game was a hard one against Pontypool at home in which Cliff Morgan was injured, but fortunately, not seriously.

It was a "black" November for the Club, for four of the six matches were lost, those against Oxford, Northampton, Llanelly and Neath.

Cliff Morgan was again injured at Northampton and was kept out of the game for the following six weeks.

Llanelly captured our ground record on 22nd November, beating the Club by 5 points to nil. Incidentally, this was the only game lost at home during the season 1952-53.

The next eight games were won. Then came the game against Aberavon in January when the Club was beaten by 11 points to 9.

In the third game against Newport on 21st February and against Gloucester the following week, Cardiff suffered defeat.

Our next game with Newport was drawn. This was followed by the game against Coventry in which Bleddyn Williams scored one of his most spectacular tries. Receiving the ball well inside his own half he jinked and side-stepped his way through the Goventry team to score near the posts. This was one of the best games seen on the Cardiff Arms Park for a long time. Cardiff won by 19 points to 6.

The game at Birkenhead Park was lost by 6 points to nil. This was not surprising as only six of the Club's regular players were able to play.

April saw the Club produce its best form; a series of victories started with a splendid win over the Barbarians on Easter Saturday. Ten games were played in April without defeat. This was a remarkable achievement having regard to the number of players who were on the injured or sick list. Bleddyn Williams was taken ill after the Barabrians game and did not play again for the rest of the season.

Following a successful Cornish tour, a very exciting game was won at Pontypool by 16 points to 15. Less than ten minutes from the end Cardiff were 7 points in arrears. Then came two grand tries initiated by Cliff Morgan, who played a brilliant game throughout. One was converted by Bill Tamplin to give Cardiff a win by one point.

Another splendid and exciting game was at Bristol on 18th April. Rex Willis was in his best form and an inspiration to the young backs, Barter, Bosley, Wells, Griffiths and Rowlands, all of whom upheld the traditions of the Club for open play. Despite the absence of a number of regular players and an injury to Sid Judd which compelled him to retire from the game early in the second half, Cardiff won by 10 points to 9.

In the last match of the season, Bridgend were beaten by 6 points to 3. This was, fortunately, one of the very few games in the season when it rained throughout the match.

As stated earlier in this report, injuries to players were more pronounced than in an average season.

The skipper was the most unfortunate, and it was a good thing for the Club that such an excellent deputy was available in Brian Mark.

Gower Jenkins, suffering from knee trouble, did not play after Xmas, 1952.

He hopes to be quite fit when the next season commences.

Injured in the game at Northampton, Cliff Morgan was out of action for eight weeks. This was a serious blow to

the Club and to Wales as Cliff is probably the best outside half in the four countries today.

Haydn Morris, Alun Thomas and Gwyn Rowlands were on the injured list for long periods, and it was fortunate that capable deputies were available.

Sid Judd received an ankle injury at Bristol which has since proved very troublesome. He continues to undergo treatment but is confident that he will be perfectly fit when next season commences.

Two members of the Club were co-opted to serve on this Committee, viz., Viv. Phelps and Leslie Jones.

During the course of the season the Committee changed in complexion slightly through A. T. Thomas resigning to take up an appointment on the staff of Christ College, Brecon. Maldwyn James was chosen to fill the vacancy thus caused.

The Rev. Howell Loveluck was elected Chairman of this Sub-Committee, and Duncan Brown re-elected Hon. Secretary.

About thirty to forty lads applied for a trial, and after the first few weeks of the season it was decided to retain twenty-five players, to be played on a rota system. Nearly all the players were new to the Club.

John Rex was elected Captain of the Youth XV and he chose E. Forster as his Vice-Captain.

Our players played good rugby and in the right club spirit every time.

Here are the achievements of some of our former youth players. Alan Priday ((full-back) and Lloyd Williams (scrum-half) played for the Royal Air Force in all the games including the inter-Service games at Twickenham. They have also played for our Club senior teams this season.

The other products of our youth team who have played for the senior teams are Terry Donovan, Brian Mapstone and Peter Owen, while some of our youth players are playing with other senior Clubs.

National Service affects our team—a lad has to be under 18 years of age on 1st September to play youth rugby—and coupled with injuries (and there was quite a spate of those last season), team selection sometimes proved difficult. Despite all this, the Youth XV, showing the same club spirit as the senior players, is beginning to show profits and will continue to do so. I would suggest that greater support be given the lads when they appear on the Arms Park by way of "curtain raisers" to the senior games.


# REPORT ON SEASON 1952

The Club record for 1952, which reads played 22, won 8, drawn 11, lost 3, can be regarded as a record of two halves. The first half produced only two wins, while two games were lost and seven were drawn. The second half however, makes much better reading. Six games were won, four were drawn and only one game was lost. Indeed, from these figures the general trend of the season can be seen. Up to the halfway mark, whenever I won "the toss," I decided to bat first, with the result that we were unable to dismiss our opponents in the time available. This however, was not always the fault of our bowlers, but more the lack of enterprise shown by the opposing batsmen, who refused to take any undue risks in getting the runs needed. After the halfway mark I decided that whenever I won the toss, the opposing side would be given first knock. The results accruing from this decision have already been shown, but they would have been impossible had not the players in the team cooperated so splendidly. With the exception of the last game of the season, runs had to be obtained in a race against the clock, and on only two occasions did we fail in our endeavour to win.

As for the outstanding performances, I do not intend to run through every game, but there were four occasions which I think were worthy of mention. Two concern bowlers and two batsmen. The batsmen were, Ken Osment, who made 100 not out against Pontypridd at Cardiff, and my vice-captain John Webb, who made 104 against Swansea, also at Cardiff. The two bowlers were John Riches and Brian Forster, both of whom took "hat tricks." the former at Gloucester, where he had an analysis of 4 for 12 and the latter at Usk, where he had an analysis of 6 for 26.

The results, on paper, do not look very impressive, but to me the last part of the season was very encouraging. We were able to prove that if a side makes up its mind to get runs, and get them at a reasonable speed, games can be won with ease. Our side is beginning to need a few younger players, with special emphasis on bowling and fielding, and it is hoped that players like A. Priday, B. Joseph and A. Pleass, who have done quite well in the second XI, may next season supply our needs. As for next season, I hope that we can carry on the spirit and will to win matches, which has been gradually built up during this season.

In conclusion, let me thank all those who have given up their time in order to umpire or score for the different teams. Their thought and kindness in fulfilling these tasks is greatly appreciated by myself and the Committee. Last but not least, a word of thanks to Wyndham Lewis, our Hon. Secretary, who once again has got through a tremendous amount of work in the interests of the Club. May I wish him success in his Coronation Day tournament and may 1953 be a "best ever" for the section.





# Season 1952-53

On the whole, the Club had another good season. The 1st XI, under the captaincy of W. N. Francis for the fourth consecutive season, did particularly well, losing only four matches, whilst the "A" XI, with the accent on attack, mustered the very creditable total of 103 goals. It can also be said of the "B" XI that they too had a good season, despite the fact that they lost one more match than they won, for it must be remembered that on a number of occasions they play opposition of a standard equal to that of the "A" XI.

The greatest disappointment, both to players and officials alike, was the ground. It was again found that Sophia Gardens was never up to the standard required of a hockey pitch, principally due to the lack of attention given it. The Committee made great efforts to try and improve it, but found that only on rare occasions were they able to get satisfaction. It was only on two consecutive Saturdays, when the 1st XI played Newport and Bristol, that it could be said that the players were satisfied with the conditions—a real effort having been made during this fortnight. All the while, the Committee have been on the look-out for a new ground, and if one does not come to light before next season, it is to be hoped that with a new tractor and spike machine at the Club's disposal, something can yet be made of Sophia Gardens.

The Ist XI's greatest achievement was in November, when they won 6-4 at Bristol, after being two goals in arrears for the best part of the game. The score was still 4-2 against, with barely fifteen minutes left for play, when our forward line all of a sudden came to life and shattered a hitherto very steady Bristol defence. The Club has still to be at full strength on the London tour, but nevertheless it put up a magnificent show in drawing with Beckenham, 0-0, E. C. Hall and G. R. Townsend being outstanding in defence. The game against Hounslow was also drawn, the score being 1-1. The only time the 1st XI was really mastered was by the Imperial Tobacco Co., who beat a side weakened by County calls to the tune of 7 goals to 1.

The "A" XI, as can be judged by their tally of goals, usually possessed as good a forward line as the 1st XI, their most impressive wins being 6–0 against Weston, 8–1 v. R.A.F. St. Athan, 10–2 v. Cardiff Medicals, and 6–0 v. Newport "A." As always, the Army Cup Finalists, A.A.S. Beachley, to whom they lost 5–0 in a grand game, were their greatest stumbling block.

The "B" XI again had more matches cancelled than the other sides. This was a pity as it made it more difficult for the Selection Committee to give everyone a fair number of games. Their record while not being convincing, was in every way encouraging considering the nature of their opposition, and the fact that two defeats were at the hands of teams drawn from the Club. They were beaten twice by West Gloucester II and once by Old Bristolians II, but did well to outplay A.A.T.S. St. Athan twice and draw with Penarth II twice.

In December, A. L. Allen, assisted by K. H. Ingledew, gave an instructive talk on the Tactics and Rules of the game; this was followed later in the season by a very interesting lecture on the Olympic Games at Helsinki, given by Dr. J. P. Jenkins, who was the doctor to the British party.

The Club suffered a great loss by the death of T. L. Chappell. He was outstanding among the younger players. His death came as a complete shock.
