Annual Report by the Chairman of the Management Committee, N. V. H. Riches

In considering the finances of the Club for the year ended 30th April, 1951, we are faced with a very satisfactory state of affairs.

During the past year the revenue from members' subscriptions shows an increase of £391 over 1950, whilst the Club's investments bring in an income of £643, an increase over last year of £233.

The income from Football amounting to nearly £17,000, shows a slight advance on 1949-50.

The total income of the Club for the year was £33,600, being £545 in excess of the previous year, but against this, we must place the increased cost of practically everything, Equipment, Travelling, Hotel expenses and Wages.

Owing to the increase in expenses, the surplus after charging income tax amounted to £3,320, as compared with £4,735 last year. Our Assets now total £33,548, of which £24,100 are in the form of investments and £8,450 are on deposit in the Post Office and Trustee Savings Banks.

We have increased our Building Reserve to £24,100 and this is wholly covered by our investments and money on loan.

The expenditure for the upkeep of Ground, Stands, Pavilion and Plant was rather heavy, but included many improvements to which I will make reference later.

On the whole, I think it is correct to say that the Club at the moment is in an exceptionally sound financial position.

One of the most important proposals the Management Committee made was in regard to the composition of the Committee. It had been felt for some time that something in the nature of (sectional) proportional representation should be attempted. After many hours spent debating the point, the Management Committee put forward the following proposal:—

That the Management Committee shall consist of:

- 4 Trustees.
- 6 Elected Members from the Football Section.



- 2 to be co-opted by the Committee itself if so desired and
- I member from each of the above Sections, nominated by the Section Committee.

This increased the number of the Committee by two, but it was felt that such an arrangement would more fairly represent the respective number of members of each Section. A Special General Meeting was held at the Cory Hall to discuss the above proposal which was duly passed.

During the year, discussions took place on the advisability of purchasing another ground, chiefly for football and hockey, but it was found impracticable as no ground could be found sufficiently near the Cardiff Arms Park, and the cost of buying, putting in order and keeping in order of those we inspected appeared to be out of all proportion to their usefulness. At the same time, we are hopeful that we may be able to secure playing pitches for Rugby and Hockey in the near future.

The question of a new Club House is still being pursued by the House Committee and plans are being drawn up for a building worthy of the Club, with the idea of having everything in order so that we shall be ready to start building when circumstances permit.

There have also been talks by the Joint Committee of the Welsh Rugby Union, Cardiff Arms Park Company Ltd. and ourselves, concerning the building of a new South Stand. This question, apparently, is in abeyance at the moment, but will, no doubt, be re-opened at some not very distant date.

Now to refer to our expenditure on Ground, Pavilion and Plant—We have had two new dressing rooms built under the North Stand, which have been extremely useful for the Youths' Rugby Section and also, on occasion, for the Cricket teams. We have had the Car Park, which had begun to show signs of wear, covered with tarmac, thereby effecting a great improvement. We have, also, renewed the pump drainage of the Football field and made a concrete path from the Car Park to the Dressing-room door.

Referring to the Football Ground: in the summer of 1950, after taking expert advice a portion of the field in front of the North Stand was dug up, new soil put down and the piece returfed—but, unfortunately, owing to the extremely wet summer and autumn and to the early use of the ground, this turf failed to knit and the piece was a quagmire for most of the football season. Despite this, we were able to play on our ground when many other grounds were waterlogged. The whole question of the drainage of the ground has now been gone into and I feel confident that in the coming season the ground will be second to none.

During the year, the House Committee went into the question of the Club's photographs and a place for Trophies, Football Jerseys, Caps, etc. of historical interest to the Club. With the Management Committee's approval, these photographs have now been suitably retouched and framed and adorn the Lounge, Committee Rooms and Skittle Alley. They have proved of considerable interest to our visitors and members.

For the trophies, jerseys, etc., we were able, through the kind offices of Mr. Hubert Johnson (Chairman of the Football Committee), to purchase a fine showcase, which now is in one of the Committee rooms and has proved an interesting addition to our Club rooms. An innovation, inaugurated by the Football Committee was a re-union of old Cardiff players, held at the Cardiff Arms Park. A very fine gathering resulted and the evening was an unqualified success, one I feel sure that will be the first of many such gatherings

The Committee, during their discussions, raised the question of honouring certain people who had contributed to the welfare of Rugby and invited Sir David Rocyn Jones, M. Henri Picheret and M. Marcel Pedron to become Life Members of the Club. I am pleased to report that all accepted. The former, it is needless to mention, has devoted much of his time to fostering the good name of Rugby Football in Wales and has been suitably rewarded by being made President of the Welsh Rugby Union.

One cannot speak too highly of the work done by our friends from across the water, who have so largely contributed to the friendly and sporting spirit which exists between Nantes and our Club.

It is very pleasing to record that the French Minister of Sport has honoured our President and Mr. D. E. Davies with the Medal of Physical Education, and I feel sure all members of the Club will join me in congratulating them on the honour conferred, which both so well merit.

Last winter the Management Committee had the pleasure of congratulating Dr. J. Matthews on being made Captain of the Welsh XV v. France, an honour which by his services to Welsh Football he so richly deserved.

Before closing, I would like to say a word about our Annual Meetings. These are very badly attended—the usual number being about 100. With a huge membership such as we have this poor attendance is not encouraging and I appeal to our members to show a greater interest in the running of the Club by attending the next Annual Meeting.

Finally, I would wish to record my gratitude to Mr. Wyndham Richards, the Vice-Chairman, and the Members of the Management Committee for their continued support, and to the General Secretary and his staff for the very good work they have done for the Club during the last twelve months.

Season 1950-51

Annual Report by the Hon. Secretary, B. H. Jenkins

W. B. Cleaver was elected Captain of the Club, but a few weeks before the commencement of the season he announced that he would retire from the game at the end of the British Team's tour in New Zealand and Australia.

This news came as a sudden shock to the Club. Cleaver was a very popular player both on and off the field. He always gave of his best and was a great sportsman. His defensive kicking wore down many opposing forwards, and his covering work was uncanny. Billy Cleaver was a regular playing member of the Cardiff Club for ten seasons and represented Wales on fourteen occasions.

The Club was extremely fortunate that Bill Tamplin was still available. It was the unanimous decision of the Committee that he be appointed Captain, with Bleddyn Williams as his Vice-Captain.

At the commencement of the season, substitutes had to be found for Billy Cleaver, Cliff Davies, Jack Matthews, Bleddyn Williams and Rex Willis, who were with the British Touring Team. Replacements were necessary too for wing forward Gwyn Evans, who retired from the game, and for Terry Cook and Russell Burn, who had joined the Northern Union code.

It is therefore a great tribute to the Captaincy of W. E. Tamplin that of the thirteen games played before the tourists returned, only three were lost.

The Club's record for the season was a good one and the standard of play was in keeping with the high traditions of the Club. The season's record was as follows:-

Ninety-seven tries were scored, 42 being converted. There were 29 penalty goals, one goal from a mark, and five dropped goals.

Bill Tamplin kicked 35 converted goals, 21 penalty goals, one goal from a mark, and one dropped goal, making a total of 139 points.

Haydn Morris was the top try-getter with 18, followed by Gareth Griffiths and D. C. Murphy with 11 tries each.

In the number of games played for the Club, Frank Trott headed the list with 42, having missed only three games. The skipper came next with 39 appearances, closely followed by Cliff Morgan with 38.

Frank Trott occupied the last line of defence and was as usual superb in gathering the ball from the feet of the oncoming forwards. Frank was the only player not perturbed by the atrocious weather conditions experienced this season. Haydn Morris, Gareth Griffiths and Derek Murphy, newcomers amongst the backs, gave an excellent account of themselves.

Haydn Morris was exceptionally fast and scored many spectacular tries.

Gareth Griffiths in his first season of senior football proved to be a most promising wing.

Derek Murphy, a product of the District Union was sound and reliable, and against Llanelly on 21st April scored three brilliant tries.

Alun Thomas, a good all-round footballer, very quick off the mark and a splendid drop kick, was equally at home at centre, outside half or on the wing.

Our two centres, Jack Matthews and Bleddyn Williams, felt the strain of three continuous seasons of football and

their play therefore was not always of the very high standard which we expect from these two great players. Their loyalty to the Club could not be surpassed and on many occasions they turned out when not physically fit.

Cliff Morgan at outside half improved in every match and from Christmas onwards was in brilliant form. He proved an efficient successor to Billy Cleaver and gained his first senior international cap against Ireland on 10th March, 1951.

Rex Willis was a tower of strength at scrum half and even improved on the high standard of play which he achieved last season. He was generally regarded as the best scrum half in the four countries.

Bill Tamplin was a grand pack leader and proved himself to be an excellent Captain. He was always an inspiration to his team mates and won many a game by his excellent goal kicking.


Our forwards always gave a good account of themselves and generally had the measure of their opponents. Malcolm Collins came very near to securing a Welsh cap and that honour still proved just out of reach of John Phillips who has been the Welsh reserve hooker on ten occasions.

It was always a difficult problem for the selectors to decide whom to omit from the following when selecting the pack for the First XV.:—

Cliff Davies, John Phillips, G. Beckingham, G. Jenkins, W. E. Davies, W. E. Tamplin, Malcolm Collins, Des. O'Brien, P. Goodfellow, C. D. Williams, S. Judd, J. D. Nelson and Glyn Williams.

Des. O'Brien the Irish International forward, joined us at the commencement of the season and soon became very popular with players and spectators alike.

Glyn Williams, another product of the District Union quickly gained a place in the First XV, but owing to a knee injury did not play in the second half of the season.



Gwyn Llewellyn, a centre, and Howell Greenslade scrum half, playing their first season with the Cardiff Club proved efficient deputies, particularly during the first 13 games.

The extremely heavy and continual rainfall made season 1950-51 probably the worst from a climatic point of view for thirty years. Every ground was in a bad state and only on very rare occasions was a pitch dry and firm. Despite these conditions every effort was made to play the open game which is the tradition of the Cardiff Club. This policy paid, for although the weather was so unfavourable, our total gate receipts exceeded those for the previous season.

Against Newport at Cardiff on 17th February, 1951, there was a world record gate for a club rugby match of 48,500.

During the season Newport was the strongest Club side in the country and lost only two games. They played splendid football and made no attempt to close up the game in an effort to preserve their record. We congratulate our Newport friends on their very fine record and on the attractive football they displayed.

In the four games between the two clubs Newport won 3 and drew 1. As will be seen by the points scored there was very little between the two teams.



Our first game of the season was against the District XV and it was a strange Cardiff back division that played in the opening games, Frank Trott and Cliff Morgan being the only two regular players.

The first defeat was against Coventry at Coventry on 2nd October, when we were beaten by 6 pts. to nil.

The game at Cardiff on 4th November, when Bridgend were the visitors, was invested with more than ordinary interest as the five Cardiff players who toured New Zealand and Australia were making their first appearance in the senior team after their return.

This was Billy Cleaver's last game and the retirement of such a versatile and popular player was regretted by all.

Against Gloucester on 2nd December, Haydn Morris scored three brilliant tries and was already being regarded as a potential international.

Aberavon were met on 9th December, in the first game between the two Clubs for twelve years. One of the best games of the season was against the Wasps at Cardiff on

Boxing Day. The handling of the ball by both sides was excellent. There was an exciting finish and Cardiff won by one point, the score being 14 points to 13.

On 30th December, Cardiff played in Northumberland,—their first visit for many years. The ground was very hard and unfit for a serious game. However, not to disappoint the large crowd, it was agreed to play a token game, with the result not to count in the records of the two Clubs.


Bristol beat us at Bristol on 13th January by a try to nil. This was our first defeat at Bristol since 1937.

Swansea were beaten home and away, the game at Cardiff being one of the best home games of the season. Cliff Morgan was in splendid form and Bleddyn Williams and Jack Matthews played their best game of the season. It was grand open football with the Cardiff backs ever on the attack.

The game against the Barbarians, always an attractive one, was played before a large crowd. Cardiff gave one of their finest displays of the season. The forwards, particularly John Phillips, were in excellent form and Cliff Morgan again gave a polished display.

The Easter Monday game against the Harlequins was played in rain and mud. The ground was in a very bad state, particularly the patch near the North Stand. Before the final whistle blew it was extremely difficult to distinguish between the two sets of forwards. The only score of the match was a try by Rex Willis in the first half.

The last home match of the season was against Llanelly and in this game it was a welcome change to have a dry ground and a fine afternoon. The Cardiff backs were in splendid form with Cliff Morgan better than ever. In this game Derek Murphy scored three brilliant tries, beating the full back on each occasion. His first try was scored after a determined run of seventy yards.

During the season 1950-51, Cardiff were represented in the Welsh team by Dr. Jack Matthews, Bleddyn Williams, Rex Willis, Cliff Davies, together with Cliff Morgan and Haydn Morris who gained their first international caps. Des. O'Brien represented Ireland, who won the International Championship, in all their games.

The following players were awarded First XV Caps:—Haydn Morris, Gwyn Llewellyn, Alun Thomas, Howell Greenslade, Desmond O'Brien, W. E. Davies, Glyn Williams, Derek Murphy, and C. D. Williams.

THE ATHLETIC XV.

Stan Bowes, who refuses to be classed as a veteran, proved to be an excellent skipper of the Rags. He was most popular with his team mates, a splendid leader of the pack and of great help to the younger players.

Stan is very proud of the fact that four of the Cardiff players who were members of the British Touring Team turned out for the Athletic side on 28th October, prior to their first game with the Senior XV. There was a record crowd for an Athletic game at this match.

To mark the occasion each of the touring players received a memento subscribed for by the Athletic players.

Despite the many calls to fill vacancies in the senior side, the Athletic XV had a very successful season.

Stan Bowes easily headed the list for the number of appearances in the Athletic side. He played in 30 out of the 31 games. The one game he missed was when he played for the Senior XV against Newport. All these are young players who will soon be challenging for regular places in the senior side.

Amongst the more seasoned players who rendered good account of themselves were P. V. Davies, Bill Douglas, Arthur Hull, Ken Lloyd and Ivor Thomas.

CARDIFF RUGBY CLUB JUNIOR XV.

The Cardiff Youth XV had another successful season, as the following report submitted by Mr. A. T. Thomas, the Hon. Secretary of the Youth XV demonstrates:—

CARDIFF RUGBY CLUB JUNIOR XV Season 1950-51

The season 1950-51 opened with a unanimous decision by the Rugby Committee to continue with the experiment of the previous season in running a Junior XV.

The same sub-committee as for season 1949-50 was requested to continue with the organisation of the side, namely Hubert Johnson, Duncan Brown, and A. T. Thomas. This sub-committee immediately co-opted the same two outside members to assist them as for the previous season, namely, Viv Phelps and Leslie Jones, the former being the Secretary, and the latter a past chairman of the Cardiff Schools Rugby Union. The liaison supplied by these two between boys as they leave school and the Club was of the greatest value.

When the first trial match was held it was seen that the majority of the previous season's side would be available at least for a while. National Service commitments, of course, take a regular toll of this side as the boys come of service age. It is pleasing to note that lads who have left the side have all done well in service rugger, and never fail to visit the Club, anxious to wear again the Blue and Black jersey when on leave. If this spirit can be maintained, the Committee feel that their efforts have not been in vain.

The unfortunate deterioration in the state of the Cardiff Arms Park, owing to the unusually wet season, had an adverse effect on the Junior XV, as the majority of their home fixtures at the beginning and end of the season arranged as curtain raisers to the games of the two senior sides, had to be cancelled and the games re-arranged on public parks. Unavoidable as this expedient was, it often caused disappointment to visiting teams who had looked forward to the great experience of playing on the Cardiff Arms Park.

The side itself soon settled down, and with Bryn Mapstone as captain and Bernard Harris leading the pack, was undefeated until it met Llandaff Youth on Boxing day.

The record for the full season was:—..

(14 games were cancelled owing to bad weather.)

Points For, 336. Points Against, 72.

Whatever may be one's personal opinion on competitive rugby, the Club had every reason for gratification in having nine of the Junior side selected to represent Cardiff and District in the Crawshay Cup Competition.

In the International arena also, the side supplied three members to the National side, viz., D. Murphy, D. Grindell, and Lloyd Williams, with John Simon filling the position of what seemed to be that of permanent reserve.

On the whole the Club feels that with the promotion of the Junior XV it has not only added to its own potential strength, and prepared for its own future well-being, but has made a contribution to Rugby Fooball as a whole.

The final game was between the Senior side and the Athletic side. Stan Bowes's boys scarcely thirty seconds from the final were leading 3pts. to nil, when Derek Murphy kicked, amid great excitement, a penalty goal. Extra time was played and the Senior side won by three points.

ANNUAL REPORT—Season 1950

The 1950 Season opened with a welcome from the weather which, to say the least, was most unkind. The scheduled game with the Glamorgan Club and Ground XI was snowed off! On the morning before the game was due to start, the Arms Park was a carpet of white, and therefore it was decided very wisely to forget cricket that day. With the very next game against Briton Ferry Town being cancelled because of rain, it was no wonder there were disappointed faces, particularly amongst those who had practised keenly at the Indoor Nets and on the green turf when conditions permitted. Weather quite as bad, if not worse, was to follow during the season, but in between the showers the First XI built up the impressive record of played 19, won 10, drawn 7 and lost 2. If a further analysis of the drawn games were made, the record would look even better. Indeed, it was the best season the First XI had enjoyed for many years, certainly the best post-war season.

The deficiency of a good opening bowler was a problem which had confronted the Club since the war and it seemed as though the same weakness would show itself in season 1950. It was most pleasing and comforting news to the Committee and the Club Captain, Haydn Wilkins, therefore, when it was learned that George Lavis was joining the Club. It was hoped that whilst being a big asset on the Saturday afternoons, George's value in the nets, if he could find the time, would be immeasurable. Unfortunately, after a grand start to the season he was taken ill and was prevented from playing regularly.

At this time, it was pleasing that Brian Foster, one of the Club's fast bowlers, was making it obvious that he meant to keep his place in the First XI. As the season progressed, Brian bowled better than he has ever bowled before, and it is true to say that he had as much to do with the Club's success as anyone. It is a pity that his analysis, although good, did not portray his true worth to the side. Brian bowled so well as to influence the Captain's decisions upon winning the toss, and invariably he was given every opportunity to use the new ball. Had George Lavis or another opening bowler been available throughout the season, the skipper would have had a completely balanced side, with John Riches supplying the slow left arm spin, Alan Thomas and John Widger the off spinners, and the skipper himself the leg breaks. As it was, Haydn Wilkins opened the bowling on many occasions with Brian Foster, and although not possessing the necessary speed and ability to swing the ball, he was able to keep the batsmen quiet.

John Riches, using with some guile, good length flighted left arm bowling was a decided asset in that he could bowl for long spells and keep the batsmen in check. Oftentimes the batsmen's impatience when facing John was their own undoing. He finished on top of the bowling averages with 33 wickets at a cost of 441 runs, an average of 13.36 runs per wicket. He was followed by Haydn Wilkins with 30 wickets for 505 runs, an average of 16.83, and Alan Thomas with 19 wickets for 320, an average of 16.84. It should be mentioned that George Lavis took 10 wickets for 72 runs, an average of 7.2 per wicket.

Alan Thomas in 12 innings, six times not out, topped the batting averages with an average of 42.16, but the most consistent batsman during the season was, without a doubt, Ken Osment, who in 16 innings, twice not out, scored 573 runs with an average of 40.92. N. K. Contractor and Ken did grand service as an opening pair and invariably gave the side a good start. Gwyn Davies scored the only century for the First XI, when he made 125 not out at Newport in a score of 265 for 3 dec. Ken Osment and Gwyn in this game had a partnership of 181 runs in an hour and thirty-five minutes, Ken's share being 85.

The Club's Annual Whitsun Tour was not a good one as far as results are concerned. Two games were lost, but we won against Stinchcombe. It is a pity that a stronger side could not travel to Gloucester for the tour matches because these were the only two games which were lost during the season. Although wanting to give full credit to Stroud and Gloucester it is lamented that the opposition provided by us was not as we would have wished. The return match with Stroud was transferred from the Cardiff Arms Park to Stroud who honoured the club by inviting us to participate in their Centenary week. It was fitting that the strongest XI for some years should have been able to represent the Club in this game which we won by 7 wickets after a grand forcing partnership between Alan Thomas and Gwyn Davies and the sporting action of Martin Cullimore who kept his men out in the rain.

It is not desirable to give a summary of each game during the season but some games are worthy of mention, particularly that at Swansea where, in reply to our 204 for 6 dec., the home side scored 200 for 6, including a grand century by Jack Rippon. At Neath we were dismissed for 80 runs, and in reply the home side could muster only 68 runs, thanks to the excellent bowling of George Lavis who took 6 for 18. At Briton Ferry, we soon had the Steelworks on the run, when Brian Foster had a devastating opening spell of 4 overs, 2 maidens, six runs, four wickets. After being 9 runs for four wickets, the Steelworks pulled themselves together and after a stand of 97 for the fifth wicket the score reached 161. We were 100 for two and seemed set for an easy victory when we collapsed rather badly to 104 for 7 in 30 minutes. Alan Thomas and John Widger effected a recovery but the eighth and ninth wickets fell at 141, leaving us requiring 21 runs to win. Wyndham Lewis joined John Widger

and they passed the home side's score amidst great excitement, so we won by one wicket. People at Briton Ferry will always talk of the excitement and chairing of Wyndham Lewis and John Widger from the field by their colleagues.

Owing to inclement weather the season prematurely finished on the 19th August, when the side was really riding on the crest of a wave with four consecutive and convincing wins. It was a great pity that the season was shortened by the rain but one consolation is that it was sweet—very sweet. It was a very successful season and for the statisticians the records read:—



The outstanding feature of the season was the weather. Not for a long time have so many matches had to be cancelled owing to the waterlogged state of the pitches. The First Eleven were very fortunate in that they had only one cancellation up to Christmas, but in the second half of the season a further eight matches were cancelled. The "A" XI were particularly unfortunate in having as many as fifteen matches scratched. Luckily it was found possible to arrange an additional three matches at the end of the season when the weather improved.

The First Eleven had quite a good season—although they did not win as many matches as in the previous year, they lost fewer than in any season since 1921; the only matches lost being to the "A" XI, Newport, Abergavenny and Old Bristolians. Once again the best games were with Bristol, that at Ashley Hill being won 3—1, and the return game being drawn 3—3. M. H. C. Meggitt is to be congratulated on not missing a match throughout the season.

The "A" Eleven again had an excellent season in spite of their unlucky record of cancellations. They were unbeaten until March and only lost two matches throughout the season. Their greatest achievement was their defeat of the First Eleven in the annual Boxing Day match. The defence was extremely strong, and in only one match—that with Barry—were more than two goals scored against them

The experiment of fielding a "B" team whenever possible was continued and seven matches were played. Having regard to the nature of the opposition encountered, results were distinctly encouraging, and the Committee has decided to arrange a full fixture list for three teams next season. This means that a number of additional members will have to be recruited.
