Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1989

In the context that I revive poignant memories, I apologise to Babs and Jeremy Spence that I commence my report with a tribute to our late President, Leslie M. Spence, M.B.E. At this time twelve months ago, when preparing my report, I referred to the President's hospitalisation and sent him our best wishes. Little did I realise that he would have departed from us by the time that we were closely approaching the Annual General Meeting with the report and agenda completed and published.

Tall, craggy, endearingly clumsy and awkward, popular Leslie Magnus Spence was one of the many wonderful characters that typified Cardiff Athletic and Cardiff Rugby Club. A most able flank forward, he Captained Cardiff Rugby Club and later succeeded to Chairman of the Rugby Club, Chairman of the Athletic Club, President of the Athletic Club and, of course, President of the Welsh Rugby Union. In his other moments, he loved cricket and after his playing days he became Hon. Secretary of the Glamorgan County Cricket Club. He also played bowls and Captained Cardiff Athletic Bowls Club.

We thank him posthumously for the wonderful service rendered to the Club before the war and post war, particularly following his traumatic experiences as a prisoner of war in Japan.

Mr. Wyndham Lewis, J.P., O.B.E. succeeded him as Acting President for twelve months.

Two years ago in respect of the year ended 30th April, 1987, my report indicated that financially it had been the best ever year in the annals of the Club's history. We had made excellent profits despite an expenditure of £100,000 to bring our rugby ground into line with the regulations of the Safety of Grounds Act.

In the year ended 30th April, 1989, we have witnessed a transformation due to the fact, in the main, that Football income showed a decrease of more than £20,000 whereas Football expenditure increased by more than £32,000. It had been anticipated with the initiation of the Lottery Scheme that certain items of Football expenditure would increase but these increases would be offset by the Lottery Fund. It is debatable whether it is a good financial policy to be dependent on the Lottery Fund or that it is more prudent to use the Fund to finance special tours and other 'luxuries'. We need to think hard as to how we continue to utilise the Lottery Fund. There must be a horse and cart philosophy with the

common sense approach that it is prudent to spend money which is in possession rather than use the money which one hopes to receive.

The format of the financial accounts as produced later in the report has been changed to identify readily the Sectional Expenses and it is hoped that the following analysis will illustrate more fully the major financial changes during the year.

Comment on the reduction in Football Gates and programme profits would seem to be superfluous in view of the comparative below average results of the season. Similarly the television cameras did not visit the ground as often as heretofore. The increase in Membership subscriptions reflected the increased 'Ground' Membership charges rather than increased Membership.

In the bar, gross profit remained high at 38.53% and expenses increased by 10% due, in the main, to statutory wage increases. It would appear however that the change in legislation to allow 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. drinking has had a detrimental effect on the Club's trade especially on match and international days when the Club no longer has the advantage of opening earlier than other bars. It is felt that Members and guests are now driving home after a match to garage their cars and visit their local rather than risk a drink and drive situation.

Profits on the fruit machines, car parking and sponsorship, showed welcomed increases. Shop profits also increased and we congratulate Ted and Nancy John and thank them very sincerely.

Away Match Expenses:-

Includes the cost of the tour by the Athletic (Rags) XV to Jersey and a Club training weekend at the Belfry, Birmingham.

Home Match Expenses:-

Includes the hosting of the British Columbia XV

Players' Out of Pocket Expenses:-

Reflects the enhancement in mileage allowances from 13p to 14p, in line with the Welsh Rugby Union. Expenditure increases in this sub.head as the catchment area for players widens.

Junior XV Expenses:-

Includes the £4,000 cost of a tour to Ireland.

Dinners, Photographs, Awards etc.

Reflects the increased cost of the Annual Dinner held this year at an hotel and includes the new costs of scholarships.

Equipment:-

Includes the cost of new weight lifting equipment and expenditure on new kit.

Medical Equipment:-

The demand on private physiotherapy services by players increases, so does the demand on elastoplast strapping.

The increase in expenditure under this sub.head was due to the appointment of a clerk in the general office to fill a vacancy which had been held for some time and the pay increases above the rate of inflation to senior staff as a reward for good results over previous years and to compensate for increased responsibilities.

Sponsorship Account

The account which is devoted entirely to Rugby Football activities was used to finance late payments for the New Zealand Tour equipment and Kit and, apart from other incidentals, the cost of a tour by the First XV to Jersey.

Members will have witnessed the rapid growth of the Hospitality Suites which at the time of preparation of this report were nearing completion. All suites have been contracted out and rents paid three years in advance to facilitate the financing of the project the cost of which is £900,000. It is anticipated that bank borrowing will be necessary in the first five or six years after which it is anticipated that the Suites will form a most advantageous revenue producing project.

The proposed Marine Barrage scheme still occupies our attention and we, on Management, are indebted to our General Secretary, Mr. A. Heffell, A.C.I.S., for keeping us abreast of matters. I record my gratitude to him for the information supplied to enable me to compile my report and, in addition, I thank the office staff for their supportive administration. I am always grateful for the help given to me by Mr. Gerry Chugg, Vice Chairman and Chairman of the Finance Committee, Mr. John D.H. Riches, Chairman of the House Committee and the Club's Legal Adviser and Dr. C.D. Williams, Chairman of the Ground Committee.

My thanks I give also to Members of the Management Committee for their loyalty, attendances at meetings and contributions to the many items of discussion. Mr. Albert Francis now has a dual role as Commercial Manager and Ground Manager. I wish him well and thank him and his staff for their efforts in preserving and maintaining our grounds. We have said goodbye to David Picton and his wife, Margaret, and we wish them well in pastures new. Congratulations to Conrad Bartlett and good luck in his post in succession to David Picton. Conrad is the new Bars Manager whilst the catering has been contracted out.

Thank you to the Supporters Club for their continued efforts in the Club and particularly to Ken and Kathy Jones, Brian Bennett, Ken and Lorna Jarrett for their voluntary and invaluable help with the Rugby Club Lottery Scheme.

In conclusion, may I extend my thanks to all those people who visited me, who did not visit me out of consideration for me and those who sent me get well cards and greetings during my post operative period. I am very grateful.

CARDIFF RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR SEASON 1988-89

Being elected Chairman was indeed an honour, but, I soon realised that if the great traditions of Cardiff Rugby Football Club were to be rejuvenated, an enormous amount of work was necessary. There was no doubt in my mind, after taking the chair at the first meeting of the new committee last July, that there was not going to be a relaxing summer period before the season actually started. The priority was to be the careful consideration of the structure and organisation; to put our own in-house activities and ideas in order, hopefully for the ultimate benefit of the players.

Firstly, two new senior coaches were appointed, Gwilyn Treharne, as number one and Brian Lease; with Bob Newman and Peter Manning as assistants and Gwyn Griffiths in support. Bob Norster had already been nominated and accepted for his second term of office as skipper. So, the off-the-field team looked the part, I must admit.

Secondly, the selection policy was reorganised. Instead of the traditional captain, two coaches and three committee men; the captain, a coach and a selector were designated to select each side.

Continuing to get our house in order, there were two more contentious issues for immediate attention.

A decision was needed regarding the Whitbread Merit Table Organisation. It was time to 'come off the fence' and firmly state our views on league rugby in Wales. Following critical discussion/liaison with players and members of the club we were able to make positive statements on both counts. Howard Norris and I attended the first Whitbreat Merit Table meeting of the new year and requested that Cardiff be accepted, as full members, along with the other top 17 Welsh clubs. We were accepted with enthusiasm and were warmly welcomed into the group. However, at the same meeting, I clearly stated the views of the committee, as representatives of the membership of Cardiff RFC, that we supported the principle of a league competition in Wales, although not necessarily in the form advocated by the Welsh Rugby Union.

Our next priority — How should Cardiff best embrace and nurture local talent – an aspect somewhat sadly neglected in the past? Certainly, we have been guilty of resting on our laurels when the team was going well in the late seventies and early eighties. So much so, that many talented youngsters, schoolboys and youth players, left. The First XV has to consist of regulars, obviously; but, the Second XV was not used for its proper function, i.e. the development of young, aspiring talent for First XV 'blooding'. Too many players, some past their best, others never of First Team calibre, were enjoying the kudos of playing for Cardiff, at the expense of youngsters and the future. To prevent this situation arising again we are cementing relations with Cardiff Schools. The talent is most definitely there, as was seen in the admirable performances by Matthew Lloyd at senior level, and is in good hands. It is our responsibility to unite the schools' organisation with Cardiff R.F.C.

This initiative was launched in the Cardiff Schools Rugby Union Annual Presentation for the 1987-88 season, held on Wednesday. 13th July at the Cardiff Athletic Club. After a super evening of speeches and presentations, where pride in performance was evident, I pledged our club's support to the Cardiff Schools Rugby Union. I stressed that the Cardiff Club was now well aware of its duties in supporting and aiding the development of our own young schoolboys. I reminded the youngsters that they were the Cardiff R.F.C. of the future; and, if they were to be tempted, niggled or nudged to play for anyone, it should be their own home town club. Cardiff. Committeemen, Terry Charles, Bob Newman, Brian Mark and John Davies are working, in conjunction with David Williams. Chairman of the Under-15 and Jack Lewis, Chairman of the Under-19 age group, to forge successful links. In fact, the coming season 1989-90 sees Cardiff R.F.C. sponsor the Cardiff Schools Under-16 side for 8/10 games — a superb coalition!

The restructuring, reorganisation and planning referred to in my opening remarks were well under way, and, as the season approached, so too, were the usual rumours regarding players moving from one club to another.

Early season additions to our playing strength included ex-Cardiff Youth and Cardiff and District Representative players, David Young and Mark Ring, Roger Bidgood and Ritchie Collins.

So the scene was set. We had cleared the decks internally, the players looked healthy and raring to go, Bob Norster was again at the helm, and I was happy and optimistic — but, the rest is history and unfortunately disappointing.

The season consisted of a Schweppes Cup run to the semi-final where we were beaten by Neath. Excellent wins were registered against Bridgend on Christmas Eve; the Barbarians on Easter Saturday and a superb performance against Neath at the Arms Park on 15th April. But, these wins were small news for our expectations of the squad. We were persistently guilty of lack lustre performances

especially from players who should be first team material. Players seemed to follow the game around rather than take part. This is the only way I can describe their actions. Whatever happened to the pride of playing for Cardiff, and the Blue and Black spirit? It was very much conspicuous by its absence. The second half of the season showed some improvement, but generally we failed to impress against modest opposition and we were more heavily beaten by the best. The results are there for all to see.

I have mentioned the exceptions to the general team performances and I feel the same must be done for individual players. Both first team wings, the popular Gerald Cordle and Steve Ford, winner of the Golden Oldies Most Promising Player of the Year, played with distinction throughout, scoring 64 tries between them. Mike Rayer deserves credit for his consistently high standard of play - caps will come I am sure. Mark Edwards, our No.8, is surely the most improved player of the year; and, Ian Greenslade was an admirable stand-in for the 'master' playing with his usual drive and determination. As the season progressed we gained David Evans and Andrew Booth at half back and Andrew Williams, from Oxford University, at loose head prop; youngsters who will definitely make a difference to the Cardiff First XV in the future. It was great to see Anthony Donovan and Denver Thompson, on Permit from Llanharan, playing against Llanelli in the final match of the season. They did very well, playing with pride and much enthusiasm which augurs well for the future.

Referring to earlier comments made regarding young players, schools and colleges I must mention the fixture between South Glamorgan Institute and a virtually Under-23 Cardiff XV on Easter Monday. What a superb game of rugby from the talented and 'up-and-coming' Cardiff players — one of the few afternoons of satisfaction for me. Of this outstanding XV, Andy Moore, Richard Shepheard and Ceri Thomas, who deserve a mention, have already played for the Senior XV.

To conclude on the playing side. All I want to see is this sort of performance every Saturday — where players want to play for Cardiff and look as if they are making every effort to do well for their club.

During the season lots of things were happening off the field. The Lottery was doing well, with almost up to 1800 members by Christmas time. Many thanks for all the effort put into it by one and all, i.e. players, committeemen, Ken Jones and Kath, Ken Jarrett and Lorna and Brian Bennett. The Executive Boxes Project was ticking away too, and this great venture will be completed by the opening of the 1989-90 season.

Our congratulations to Bob Norster and David Young on their selection for the British Lions team to tour Australia this summer; and to David Evans on gaining International honours against France and England.

My personal thanks go to all those committeemen who supported me throughout the season, especially my vice-chairman, Howard Norris, who did a thoroughly competent job, being particularly supportive at Whitbread Merit Table Meetings! Thanks also to Peter Nyhan for those superb programme notes throughout the season. The contents were second to none. To Brian Mark, a special word of thanks for surmounting the thorny problems of a fixture secretary. Thank you to Alf Heffell and the office staff, the Supporters Club, the Club Doctors, Physios and Masseurs, Ted and Nancy in the shop, and anyone whom I should have mentioned but have forgotten!

My final words must be for Alan Phillips, the man who is second only to the great Bleddyn Williams in the number of tries scored, in total, for Cardiff; and, who has played more games than anyone else in the history of the club, 469! I doubt if either of these records will ever be beaten. Alan will be missed not only for his consistently high standard of play but for his powers of organisation and direction off the field. He was respected on all counts and will be sorely missed as a player.

I am proud to say that I introduced Alan to Cardiff Rugby Club in my year of Captaincy in 1974 and he succeeded me on my retirement in 1975.

FACT – I scored 17 glorious tries in my 13 years with Cardiff. Alan scored 17 tries in his first season with the club!!

I hope that this original 'Cambridge Blue and Black' will remain with us for many years to come in one capacity or another.

It only remains to be said that I hope the reorganisation undertaken this year, and the lessons learnt from our many mistakes will bear fruition next season particularly on 17th October.

appeared the distinct possibility of disbandment. Young players have developed into capable players. Tony Orrell and Leroy Bishop were capped by the Welsh Youth R.U. Under-19's, a fitting tribute to their ability and commitment. Over half a dozen players were chosen for the Cardiff and District Youth Under-19's, and a select minority had games for the Rags at the end of the season and for Crawshavs' Under-19's.

Throughout the whole season, the dress and behaviour standards of the team were a credit to the traditions of Cardiff R.F.C. In ringing the changes to blood youngsters, the team occasionally succumbed to the heavy pressures of the fixture list, and through indiscipline and immaturity, three players were suspended. These blemishes were happily removed in the team's continued development after Christmas, and by the last game of the season at home against Rochdale, the team had developed into a good combination. Next season, sixteen players are back to form a strong nucleus, and already several of this group have been involved in the W.Y.R.U. Under-19's pre-season squad training. All in all then, a remarkable turn around from the dark days of last September.

It is the intention of the Club Committee to institute an Under-16 team next season managed by two Senior Cardiff Schools Under-15 Committee Men in liaison with the Youth Committee in an attempt to develop the game at this intermediate level. This is in harmony with the Club's avowed policy of direct encouragement of schools rugby over the last two years, and should be a seedbed for the future of rugby and the Club.

It is usual for the Honorary Secretary to offer sincere thanks to those who have given outstanding commitment and service to the Youth Team. In this respect I specifically thank the Coaches, Weldon Davies and Neil O'Donnell, and in general I would like to thank the Youth Captain, Alex Psaila and the Youth Committee for their enthusiasm and support throughout the year. Thanks must go to the Supporters Club and Club Members; to those who have directly and indirectly sponsored the Youth team — Place for Homes, Llandow, Taunton Cider, Welsh Brewers, SA Brains and Peelers Veg n' Prep; and lastly to our patient and understanding staff in the Clubhouse, on the Ground and in the Club Office.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE 1988 SEASON

The 1988 season was one beset with difficulties both on and off the field. The major difficulty was a lack of commitment throughout the Club. On a playing level, this saw little consistency in either individual performances or availability. The result was unsettled sides in all teams which was detrimental to the results achieved.

At the present time, we are a very young Club and this can be reflected in a lack of self-discipline. Too often, Club members put themselves before either their team or the Club as a whole. On the field a more competitive edge is required. On and off the field, members should realise that to represent Cardiff is an honour which their behaviour and attitude should reflect.

On the administrative side, there is still much work falling on too few shoulders. The membership as a whole should appreciate the amount of work behind the scenes needed to run a Club like Cardiff. More effort by a greater number of people is essential if our potential as a Club is to be achieved.

Despite the temporary problems, I believe that the future is rosy. The Club seems to have attracted many of the talented young players in the area. This is reflected in our blossoming young cricket. Regularly, over thirty boys attend our Sunday morning Under-13 coaching sessions. In 1988, our Under-15 team won the Lords Taverners Welsh Cup. With a view to translating this into future success at senior level, a decision was taken at our Annual General Meeting for 1988 to run a fourth Saturday eleven in 1989. This will provide our youth players with an earlier introduction into the senior set-up.

At senior level, we have some young players of undoubted ability and I am sure that if we can hold onto them and continue to develop our youth players, then Cardiff Cricket Club will become a major force in Welsh Cricket during the next decade.

Toward the end of 1988 there were more encouraging signs. Much effort went into our Club Dinner which attracted very good numbers. An interesting speech by former Cardiff City and Everton footballer Brian Harris started the speeches and the main guest speaker was Bob Taylor, the England and Derbyshire wicketkeeper.

In 1988, we returned to the system of wives/girlfriends/mothers making

our cricket teas and I am sure all players appreciate the results.

My thanks must go to Roger Davis, Tony Edwards, Gwyn Stone, John Riches and Chris Fookes for their support during the year. Thanks also to Alf Heffell and the office staff and of course to Albert Francis and the all-important ground staff for their efforts.

CLUB CAPTAINS' REPORTS

FIRST XI

From a playing point of view, the 1988 season was disappointing. However, there were many encouraging aspects which should guarantee the future success of the Club.

We finished in the lower regions of the Famous Grouse Western League

but we proved that Cardiff is still a force in Wales. We were zone winners in the Girobank Welsh Cup, losing to Maesteg Celtic in the semi-final in somewhat controversial circumstances. (Generally, when a batsman is bowled, the bails fall backwards, not towards the bowler!) We also acquitted ourselves well in the Capital Windows Sunday League, where our cup commitments saw us often field our second eleven.

The Club presently lacks experienced players and this undoubtedly made a difference to our overall results. Paul Good was only able to play a handful of League matches and his knowledge would have been a great asset to the young batsmen in the side. We also suffered from being unable to field a settled side, due in part to certain players not being consistently available, although team changes were made as the season progressed. Ultimately, over twenty players appeared in Western League matches. Greater stability is

essential if success is to come in future seasons.

Of the batsmen, the highest aggregates were achieved by David Herbert and Roger Davis, both of whom appeared in the majority of matches. Graham Clutton and Alan Hardman showed promise as fluent batsmen. Ed Meggitt found the Western League First XI a hard school to learn in but will surely make the breakthrough in 1989. Later in the season, John Hansell and Darren Howells were promoted from the lower sides and achieved some success. Steve Kings, Roger Davis, Alan Wilkins and Rob Swallow were the leading wicket takers. The all round ability of Gary Hibbert did not make its presence felt and I hope this will be remedied in 1989 when Gary will captain the side. The wicket keeping duties were undertaken mainly by Alan Hardman, with David Wolfenden and Hamish Stuart filling in on occasions.

The Club has many talented young players but the Western League in particular is a hard competition and experience is an essential attribute. Unfortunately, this cannot be acquired overnight. The secret of success in any cricket is consistent batting backed by tight bowling and fielding. Too often in 1988 we scored too few runs and the fielding left a lot to be desired. Hopefully by 1989, some of the younger players will have developed into mature league cricketers which in turn will provide the essential stability the

team lacked last season.
