

Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1988

In reporting another year's activities to the 30th April, 1988, I am pleased to advise Members once again that Income has exceeded Expenditure. From perusal of the Financial Accounts as published later in the report, it will be noted that Income exceeded Expenditure by £29,767 after setting aside the following transfers:—

a.	to the Football Insurance Fund	£3,337
b.	to the Sponsorship Fund	£14,515

c. to the Repairs & Maintenance Fund £30,000

An analysis of the figures reveal some interesting facts and information.

INCOME

In comparison with the previous year, Income increased by £24,200 due, mainly to the following enhancements:—

Ground Earnings - £16,125

Additional income derived from Marquee hire during Home International Matches and perimeter advertising which reflects great credit on the engagement of the contractors, Messrs. ADsport.

Broadcasting Fees - £2,973

Bar Profits - £8,468

The improvement in the bar results is not due to increased trade but rather to better housekeeping. Gross Profit increased by 1% but bar expenses were reduced by £7,525.

Hire of Rooms -£3,658

Increased hire activities.

Members Subscriptions - £11,049

Ordinary Membership decreased. Ground Membership receipts were enhanced by increased rates.

Certain items of Income show a reduction — Fruit machines show a drop of £3,943, partly due to the increase in Excise Duty and to the fact that the machines were hardly used during the period of refurbishment.

Investment Income was reduced from £13,945 in the previous year to £9,345 due to the reduction in funds on deposit and to lower interest rates.

EXPENDITURE

In comparison with the previous year, expenditure increased by £48,030 due in the main to the increase in depreciation from £3,992 to £32,063 i.e. an increase of £28,071.

Other increases in expenditure relate to:-

Upkeep of grounds and Clubhouse - £10,997 made up mainly by:-

Renovation of dumb waiter between kitchen and lounge. £1,463

Top Lounge repainting and new floor covering to gents' toilet and hallway £1,154

Sophia Gardens roof insulation £ 703

Sophia Gardens – repairs to Tennis Fence £ 374

Remarking car parking spaces £1,996

400 new seats in South Stand £4,000

Water Charges – arrears previous year £2,000

Cleaning (additional cleaning costs with increased hiring activities. A new contract was also negotiated during the year)

Cash in Transit (a contract was entered into with a Security firm for the transportation of cash from bar, office and gates)
£4.211

In the Capital programme, both Club Houses at Sophia Gardens and Cardiff Arms Park (Members' Lounge) were refurbished at a total cost of £85,000, financed by loans from Messrs. Brains Breweries and Welsh Brewers. A new boiler plant was installed at Cardiff Arms Park at a cost of £22,500 which will, it is contended, reduce our running costs. A new Cushman machine and Mower at a total cost of £10,400 were purchased in the Ground Maintenance Machine replacement Programme.

At Sophia Gardens, an additional Tennis Hardcourt has been provided and the floodlighting of a double hardcourt has been installed, financed by a Lawn Tennis Association Interest Free Loan and a Sports Council Grant; receipts from the coin floodlighting are reflected in Sectional expenses.

The year 1987-88 has witnessed the continuation of the theme to increase the facilities for all members and the refurbishment of the Members' Lounge met with general approval. The contractors,

Messrs. Keith Evans, were congratulated on a job well done. It is true that 'curtains or no curtains' and the mode of dress were points of contention but it always has been and always will be that one will never be able to please all the people all of the time. An excellent lounge has also been provided at Sophia Gardens and it is to be hoped that Members of the user Sections particularly will, in time, ensure an increased patronage. Their support in this direction is earnestly looked for and certainly hoped for.

In the past few years, we have seen an extension of Tennis hard courts; floodlighting of a double hardcourt, new administrative offices: a new changing room at the Bowling Green: improved floodlighting of the Rugby Ground at Sophia Gardens: extensive adaptations (at a cost of £100,000) of the Cardiff Arms Park rugby ground to meet the conditions under the Safety of Sports Ground Act and refurbishment of the lounges at Cardiff Arms Park and Sophia Gardens. These schemes will be followed by a complete new perimeter fencing between the Club's ground at Cardiff Arms Park and the river Taff, stretching from the Bowling Green to the W.R.U. ground. Also a sprinkler system is being installed at the Bowling Green.

Further requirements under the Safety of Sports Grounds Act demands that further adaptations have to be carried out at the River end of the Rugby Ground.

Meanwhile, management has agreed with the Welsh Rugby Union to receive a joint report from Consultant Engineers on the implications of the proposed Barrage Scheme. Sophia Gardens will be studied separately.

In the changing world and with the eternal quest for improved finances, we have seen American Football at the Cardiff Arms Park; Pop Concerts at the W.R.U. complex of the Cardiff Arms Park; and the launching of the new Cardiff Rugby Club Lottery Scheme, of which the initial details of the early financial activities are quoted in the financial part of the Report. On this last venture, a tribute must be made to the Supporters Club for the magnificent invaluable voluntary efforts they are making in the administration of the Lottery; Ken and Kathy Jones, Brian Bennett, Ken and Lorna Jarrett — we thank you.

The reports of the constituent sections of the Club will indicate the success or other of their respective sections. The Rugby Club is conspicuous on this occasion by their absence from the Schweppes Cup Final! I have a feeling however, that they will be back next year.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Management Committee for

their continued support. In person I am indebted for their continued help to Mr. Gerry Chugg, the Vice Chairman and Chairman of the Finance Committee; Mr. John D.H. Riches, the Committee's Legal Adviser and Chairman of the House Committee; and Dr. C.D. Williams, Chairman of the Ground Committee.

The General Secretary, Mr. Alf Heffell continues to serve the Committee and Club well and I thank him for the financial data given to me to enable me to make this report. We are grateful also to the office staff for their loyalty and unstinted efforts. We wish those well who have recently joined our ranks.

Mr. Albert Francis, in his usual inimitable, ubiquitous way, and his energetic staff continue to take care of our main assets — the grounds — for which we are grateful. Thank you David Picton and staff for continuing to look after our needs at the bars.

Subject to the approval of Members at the Annual General Meeting, Management's proposal that Trustees should retire at 75 years of age provokes a sad note, particularly for me in that it has the consequence of seeing the departure from Committee of Wyndham Lewis.

Wyndham has been a stalwart in Cardiff Athletic club's affairs and during his forty years service, he excelled himself as an excellent Honorary Secretary of Cardiff Cricket Club. There was never a dull moment with Wyndham and I shall always treasure his friendship and company. Above all I thank him on behalf of Management for the wonderful contribution he has made to our Club. I wish him well in his retirement and sincerely hope that he will derive as much enjoyment and pleasure in that retirement as I have derived from knowing him.

Last but certainly not least, our President, Leslie M. Spence, is still hospitalised and the least we can do is to send him our best wishes.

Limited are due on 1st November, 1997 and on 1st May, 1991 and the final instalment on the loan from Bass Wales and West Limited is due on 1st December 1997. Interest is chargeable on the loans at 5% p.a. Amounts repayable within one year are included in current liabilities. Brewery loans are secured by promissory notes from the Trustees.

The LTA loan was granted interest free, repayable by half yearly instalments, the final repayment to be made in June 1992

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis of accounting.

FIXED ASSETS

Freehold land and buildings are stated at cost.

Leasehold property, ground maintenance equipment, furniture, fittings and office furniture are stated at cost less depreciation.

DEPRECIATION

Depreciation is provided on a straight line basis at the following rates:

Leasehold property	 over the length of the lease
Ground maintenance equipment	 20%

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR SEASON 1987-88

On being re-elected Chairman this year, I realise that I am an honoured Member of Cardiff R.F.C. Committeemen who have had 'two bites of the cherry'.

Last season's Schweppes Cup victory was still a vivid memory as was our success in the last two months of the season, yet they had not hidden a few lingering doubts — could this team, that had been together for so long and had achieved so much, launch yet another successful campaign or would the tide turn against us and our 'Old war horse' find a season containing too many battles for the adrenalin to flow continuously for victory?

We had lost the flair, ingenuity and adventure of our International Centre, Mark Ring, to Pontypool with our other 'Six World weary heroes' making a staggered return. Did we possess the players, prepared with the confidence skill and ability, to continue our success?

The season started with a visit to two Centenary Celebrating sides, Taffs Well and Bristol. Both sides were defeated but a sign of what lay ahead was that both victories were very scrappy affairs. Some of our deficiencies were soon noticed when we were held to a 6-6 draw at Glamorgan Wanderers and then cut down to size 35-6 by a very mobile Neath team who registered their first win in Cardiff for 15 years. We had no excuse as this was probably our strongest available side. Our dismal form continued with a home draw with Maesteg and losing to Coventry after leading early in the second half. A good result at Pontypridd but, once again, we allowed Aberavon to snatch victory after leading justifiably 12-3 with only two minutes of injury time left. With no mid-week game at the end of September, we were happy to see the month close — when did we last experience a September without a home victory?

The trend continued in October with early defeats at the hand of old rivals, Newport and Bridgend. A short revival winning 14-7 at Northampton followed by a heavy defeat in atrocious conditions at Pontypool. Three consecutive wins followed against Cambridge University, centenary celebrating Caerphilly and away to the Harlequins. However, we lost our 101 year home record against Moseley with a 14-10 defeat; a defeat that saw three of our International players walk off injured — Malcolm Dacey at his debut, Alun Phillips, playing his 400th game and Gareth Roberts.

I will remember November, not for the defeats at Leicester or

against Oxford University but for that unique celebration occasion when H.R.H. Prince Edward became the first member of the Royal Family to watch a match at our Cardiff Arms Park. The game celebrated 100 years of Frank Hancock and brewing in Cardiff and we defeated a Rest of World XV 17-13.

A good home victory against Ebbw Vale set us up for the beginning of yet another Schweppes Cup campaign away to Ystradgynlais. It was a pleasant return for me as I had captained Cardiff on our previous Cup visit there in 1974 and once again we were victorious. Our return to form was short lived with a resounding defeat 41-6 at Stradey Park. Without our injured skipper, Bob Norster, we produced two good wins over Newbridge and Swansea and in the latter game our newcomer Ray Giles indicated why he is such a close rival to Robert Jones.

Victory over London Welsh and we were away again in the Cup at Aberavon Quins. A comfortable victory although all rugby followers must be disappointed to witness the taunts that popular Gerald Cordle has to endure.


No festive spirit on Boxing Day against Pontypridd when both teams fought a very dour struggle in atrocious conditions while two days later, Bridgend once again highlighted our weaknesses with a heavy defeat.

A good start to 1988 with victories over Bath, Aberavon and Ebbw Vale, a fine preparation for our Cup visit to Newport. With a postponement because of a waterlogged pitch, we had the unusual experience of knowing our Quarter Final opponents if we were successful — Pontypool, Wales' most improved consistent side this year. We overcame a poor Newport side to continue our good Cup sequence and followed with wins against London Welsh, Newport and South Wales Police.

And so to Pontypool and the Cup — with over 60% possession and territorial advantage, we failed to score a try and lost 9-6 on kicks. Our long Cup run of the 80's is over — perhaps we can now look to the future with a constructive selection policy with long term ambitions.

Still carrying a Cup hangover, we lost to Bristol and a third defeat in a season by Pontypool. Apart from the expected victory over Penarth, with defeats at Nottingham and Newport, we were glad to see the end of March.

A return to winning ways over our traditional Easter visitors, the Barbarians 32-27 and Swansea 18-13 but once again we were given a rugby lesson by Schweppes Cup finalists Neath. Our remaining

We all wish Bob a successful return to New Zealand and hope he enjoys an injury free tour. I must pay tribute to Alan Phillips who has now joined that select few who have played more than 400 first team games for Cardiff while I doubt whether his 150 tries will ever be surpassed by a forward, let alone a hooker. I also wish our Vice Captain Alun Donovan an enjoyable retirement from the field of play and thank him for the excellent service he has given us as a most talented centre and versatile performer. We may also have seen the last game played by our popular Englishman, John Scott, who has decided to seek a place on the Committee. His contribution to our success, especially in the 80's, has been immense and his inimitable brand of leadership on the field will long be remembered.

With this list of retirements, one is certain to ask whether we are coming to the end of an era. In the case of my next tribute, Roger Beard, we definitely are. Our Coach for the past eight years, he has been synonymous with all the success that we have achieved. His firm control and authority has been respected by all, while his experience and understanding of the rigours of our game has made him one of the outstanding Club Coaches of this decade. His success at Cardiff came at a time when Welsh fortunes were failing - why our governing body did not recognise his talents still remains a mystery. Very few people are aware of the commitment required from the Club Coaches. It is a job that takes its toll of both time and nervous energy and requires complete dedication. Roger has epitomised these qualities and his partner Gwilym Treharne is another who is dedicated to our cause. Roger has now become a Committeeman and we are pleased that we will continue to use his considerable experience in a more administrative capacity.

NEW ZEALAND TOUR

MAY/JUNE 1988

It was indeed a great honour to manage the Cardiff R.F.C. Tour Party on their visit to New Zealand, the first Welsh Club side ever to visit that Country. After a very mediocre season, with a number of players unavailable for various reason and our Captain, Robert Norster, on tour with Wales, it was with some trepidation that we set out to match our talents against teams from the strongest rugby country in the world.

Although it was our intention to play only Club sides, we soon realised on our arrival, that the world famous name of Cardiff R.F.C. had suggested to our hosts that they should strengthen their sides. It was not therefore surprising to see named in the selected sides, current All Black Captain, Wayne Shelford, plus other All Blacks, Murray Mexted, Hika Reid, Allan Hewson, Michael Speight, Mark Findlay, Scott Crichton and Brian McGratten.

With our National side struggling and losing their early games, we helped to restore Welsh pride with our victory over a Northcote Birkenhead Centennial XV, 19 points to 10 at Auckland. We then lost narrowly in Rotorua, 32 points to 28, to a Wasps XV which comprised of Bay of Plenty provincial players. An excellent performance when you consider that this Province finished fourth in their First Division last year behind Auckland, Canterbury and Wellington and we had been losing 32-4 just after half time. Our final victory at Athletic Park Wellington over a Wellington Centurians XV, 41 points to 32 was a most satisfying finale against a strong side captained by Murray Mexted.

The whole squad must be congratulated for their tremendous spirit and determination to do well throughout and maintained a consistent form. Our top try scorer was Gerald Cordle, with seven touchdowns, playing his first game just 30 hours after arriving in New Zealand.

A most enjoyable three weeks where not only did we endure the rigours of All Black rugby but also found time to visit Auckland, Rotorua and its world famous Thermal Springs, Hamilton, Wellington, Los Angeles, while finally relaxing for two days at Waikiki Beach, Honolulu.



CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR THE 1987 SEASON

FIRST XI

The First XI under the Captaincy of the former Glamorgan player, Roger Davis, were without doubt the voungest Cardiff side for many years and on the occasions when the Captain was absent, averaged 21 years old. The results were therefore encouraging in view of the lack of experience of the vounger players but it was extremely disappointing that it was the fielding and catching which cost us dearly at times. By mid-season we were third in the Famous Grouse Western League and the Girobank Welsh Cup Zone Final but a weekend in which we lost twice to our old rivals, Newport, emphatically ended our League and Cup hopes. We finally finished in fifth place in the League having played 13 and won 8, with wins against Keynam, Chippenham, Imperial Bristlington, Cheltenham, Gloucester, Optimists and Clifton. The leading run scorers were Roger Davis with 454 runs at an average of 50.44 and Mike Cann with 307 runs at 51.16. Steve Kings bowled extremely quick at times and deserved to be our leading wicket taker with 32 wickets. David Herbert, Ed Meggitt and Darren Howells continued to develop and with more consistency will be leading run-scorers for years to come, while Alan Hardman, as a wicket-keeper/batsman was outstanding at times.

In the Capital Windows Sunday League, we finished in the lower half of the table, purely because we continued to honour matches which clashed with Welsh Cup games. This League however offers a splendid way to help the development of the younger players.

SECOND XI

Similarly to the First XI, the Second XI, under the Captaincy of Wyn Evans, fielded an extremely young and unsettled side. However, after a promising start, they eventually finished in seventh position, winning 7 of their 13 games. During the season, they used almost 30 players and the constant changes were reflected in that not one Cardiff player was included in the League averages. Three of the games lost were extremely close defeats and it shows the depth of the Club to achieve such a reasonable League position. What could have been achieved with a more regular side!! John Hansel was a consistent scorer and showed the younger players how to build an innings. Steve Lang with Wyn Evans batted well at times, while Ed Evans and Stephen Pearce carried out the brunt of the bowling. Prem Sudha, David Bleach, Jonathan Good and Ian Bridgeman showed tremendous promise for the future in making Western League debuts.

THIRD XI

Tony Edwards was again Captain and the side won 10 of their 16 games in the Gwent League. It was policy to include as many U-15 and U-17 players to blend in with the older statesmen. Ken Williams had another good year with the bat, while Darren Howells, who was quickly promoted to First XI and Andrew Pearce had several big scores. Mike Langley bowled a superb length and line in virtually every match and set the example to the younger bowlers. Glen Smith and Ian Bridgeman, from the Youth side, performed well and

Glen picked up eight wickets in the match against Malpas. Both will, no doubt, make the First XI during the next two or three years.

The Sunday XI, under Stuart Dyke, again had an enjoyable season but the strength of the side depended on Welsh Cup and Capital Window League Commitments. On occasions when there was no First XI fixture, the Sunday Side were stoo strong for the opposition. Virtually all the recognised batsmen had individual scores exceeding 50 runs, while hundreds were scored by Ed Meggitt and David Herbert. The Six-a-Side Competition was again sponsored by Glamorgan and was completed in dreadful weather conditions. It says much for the spirit of the players that it was completed with Midland Bank, the winners but socially it was an excellent afternoon with Chris Day and Stephen Pearce organising the Bar-B-Que.

The Youth Cricket has continued to flourish with sides at U-13, U-15 and U-17 competing successfully in their Leagues. Several of the players went on to represent the Club at senior level and it is essential to continue with this policy. My thanks to Roger Pexton and Paul Lodge for their hard work in this respect. No Annual Report is complete without thanking Gwyn Stone for all his continued hard work for the Club with the Youth and Fixtures. Albert Francis, Len Smith and the groundstaff provided some excellent pitches but the preparation was sometimes hindered by adverse weather conditions.

Our Annual Dinner in November was extremely enjoyable, well attended and considered by many to be our best-ever dinner. The former Test Cricketer, Tom Graveney, and John Bartlett, a former Cardiff player but now best known as the producer of the T.V. Shows 'Parkinson' and '3-2-1', were the main speakers. It was a pleasure to see so many of our ex-players on the night.

In conclusion, it was a year when the younger players were given the opportunity to produce the goods. Lack of experience and consistency at vital times cost us dearly throughout the season but I have no doubt that the benefit derived from this season has left the youngsters knowing that they have the ability to win the League and Cup double in the near future.

CHAIRMANS REPORT

The facts and figures shown above are the bare bones of the past season. It is my pleasant, but somewhat bewildering task to put some flesh on the bones. Dr. Frankenstein only had to contend with a horde of the local villagers when he assembled a body. If my creation lacks the odd limb I must apologise in advance, and hope not to end up more black and blue than I already profess to be.

The review of the season must start with a salute to club captain Steve Sparkes. As anticipated last year, he duly notched his 500th goal for the Club—and did it in the grand manner. On 17th October, 1987, we played Penarth at Sophia Gardens in the 100th recorded fixture since 1931. Steve's 500th goal

was the first of five he scored as we won by a record 9-0. A presentation was made to our visitors to commemorate the 100 fixtures, and it was a pleasure to be able to present a plaque to Steve in recognition of his unique record.

This was a mere pipe-opener, as Steve then set a Welsh record by scoring 12 in the 18-0 defeat of Haverfordwest in the Welsh Cup. How happy we are to have him as an accredited veteran, since he has now become a decrepit 35 years-old. (But still club captain).

The glory team was without doubt the Second XI, led from behind by Chris Watts. He whipped them on to a double triumph of the Second XI Cup and First Division Championship with an enthusiasm which reaped its own reward.

The First XI also had a good season, winning the Premier Division of the League, and only losing 3-4 in the semi-final of the Welsh Cup when suffering an off day and from injury.

The Ladies also surpassed expectations, both on the pitch by gaining promotion for the second successive year, and off it by their ever keener participation in the social structure of the section.

I have already written that "The glory team was...." and this is true in the strict context of Cardiff Athletic Club's Hockey Section. However, the opportunity arose for a team representing the City of Cardiff to enter an indoor league in Birmingham and to be selected to play in an Intercity indoor tournament sponsored by Lada Cars at the Alexandra Palace. The regulations stated that no more than six players could be from one club. Cardiff provided six for the City team and performed with distinction. Largely written off before the start they won their pool with ease and had the agonising disappointment of losing to Southampton (a thin disguise for the GB Olympic Squad) on a penalty stroke shoot-out in the semi-finals. The players and organisers brought great credit on both City and Club.

If the other teams were not so successful in the matter of trophies, it was nevertheless apparent that a lot of good hockey was played and enjoyed in the Third and Fourth XI's. I do however get the strong impression that although the postmatch celebrations are as prolonged as ever (as Dave Picton can testify from the bar receipts) we are not spending as much time talking to our opposition as we used to a few years ago. If this is true then it is regrettable and the trend must be reversed.

As usual we have lost several players though movement and resignation/ retirement, but, also as usual we have gained several players and have taken the losses on the chin.

The Social scene has been hectic and effective. We rather believe that Albert Francis developed his elusive skills in dodging the Saturday night fever at Sophia Gardens, but at least he doesn't complain about the noise.

Youth hockey is now becoming increasingly important as clubs take over from the schools. We must develop our own talent or get left behind as a club. We have been lucky that Dal Kaler has almost singlehandedly been responsible for training and organising the youth hockey, but more help is needed and I appeal for volunteers to help in any way they can. There are legions of youth teams springing up all round us at other clubs, and for the sake of our future we too must expand.

There is increasing activity all round, and we hope to be running five mens and two ladies teams in the coming season, as well as having two teams in the indoor league. This is throwing extra strain on the Committee and I cannot adequately express my thanks to both the elected and co-opted members for the strenuous efforts they have made in the running of the day to day affairs of the Club.

I would also express my personal thanks to Alf Heffell and the Office staff for their 'background' work and the club as a whole congratulate Albert and his merry men for their groundwork.
