

Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1984

The final accounts for 1983/84 reveal a satisfactory excess income over expenditure of £16,000, after setting aside the sum of £10,000 to the Repairs and Maintenance Reserve Fund. One would be forgiven for thinking that the excess income should be much larger after taking into account the amount of £12,000 receivable following the Rugby Club's success again in winning the W.R.U. Schweppes Cup, but expenditure during the year on salaries and wages include an offsetting sum in respect of a negotiated settlement and pension accrual for the former Secretary and his senior assistant.

Income during the year increased by £28,251, mainly through Football Gates (£8,614); W.R.U. Schweppes Cup (£12,000); Ground Earnings (£5,870); Members Subscriptions, which includes Ground Membership (£11,619), and Other Income (£6,251). Disappointing results were revealed for Season Tickets, which showed a reduction of £3,477, but it may well be that this cannot be taken in isolation from the increase in members subscriptions.

The most disappointing figure was revealed in Bar Profits which showed a reduction of £12,503 in comparison with the previous year. Bar Takings decreased during the year by £7,306, and bar wages increased by £7,294. Gross Profit was 34.9% as compared with 35.3% in 1982. At the time of preparing this report management has already taken steps to remedy the situation wherein the cost of wages have increased substantially. Those costs must be reduced without imparing the facilities available to members in a member's club.

On the expenditure side, as indicated earlier, salaries and wages include the payment in respect of a negotiated settlement in respect of the retirement of the former Secretary and a pension entitlement to the Senior Assistant in the office. These are, of course, non recurring items.

The upkeep of Grounds and Clubhouse contain an expenditure of £4,800 on painting and decorating the Sophia Gardens pavilion and an ever increasing amount for the repair and replacement of broken seats in the Rugby stands.

A new computer has been installed in the office and this will improve the membership records and administrative service to members. A few teething problems were experienced in the year but complete computerisation of the clubs payroll, accounts and

membership records will eventually improve the club's administration.

The car park adjoining the bowls green has been resurfaced and this was given high priority in view of the very rough state of the surface and particularly in the context of the substantial income derived from ground membership.

A satisfying year in which we have continued to maintain our income over expenditure, but this is very necessary if we are to pay off our loans and secure our future from revenue. Management has been looking at the administrative buildings which are now deteriorating and already substantial repairs have been carried out on the leaking roof. It was always intended that the building would only serve as temporary offices, and further expenditure is not only costly but also uneconomic. It has been decided, therefore, to look at a scheme for new administrative offices to replace the 'temporary structure'. Certainly new offices will be welcomed by the staff who have been working in a badly ventilated structure with heating and air-conditioning problems. It is hoped we will be able to start on this project in the year 1984/85.

In this context, perhaps it is just as well that no progress was made in the scheme to provide indoor bowling. Whilst management had agreed in principle to look at the feasibility study for indoor bowls no proposals were forthcoming in their request for details as to the raising of necessary finance. The matter has not been pursued and we observe 'across the road' that the Cardiff Bowls Club Indoor Stadium is progressing and we wish them well. With the need now presenting itself for capital expenditure on new offices, further very substantial capital expenditure on an indoor bowling stadium would be inappropriate and untimely. It is hoped that the many members of the club who have or will join the club 'across the road' will, however, prefer our Bar facilities.

Congratulations to the Cardiff Rugby Football Club on their success once again in the W.R.U. Schweppes Cup; to the Cardiff R.F.C. Youth side on their success in the Esso Welsh Youth R.U. Cup; to the Cardiff Cricket Club on their success in the Arthur Patterson Trophy, the Famous Grouse Western League, and the Giro Bank Welsh Cup; and to the Cardiff Hockey Club on their successful season wherein they lost in the Welsh Cup Final in sudden death extra time and they won the South Wales Cup; this apart from their achievements in the League competitions.

Thanks are due to many people for their efforts in the Club and I

refer first of all to Ted and Nancy John for their wonderful voluntary efforts in the Cardiff Athletic Souvenir Shop: to John Price and the Bar staff for keeping up the traditions in the service to the Club members and their guests: to Albert Francis and the Ground staff for their unstinted efforts in the preservation and maintenance of the club's main assets — the playing areas: and to Alfred Heffell in his first year of office and his very pleasant and helpful staff I extend my very sincere thank you for your much appreciated efforts.

The President and Trustees are ever watchful and in attendance at all committee meetings and sub committee meetings, and I am particulary grateful to Mr. G. A. Chugg, vice-chairman and Chairman of the Finance Committee: to Mr. J. D. H. Riches, Club's Hon. Solicitor and Chairman of the House Committee: and to C. D. Williams, chairman of the Ground Committee for their diligence throughout the year.

I am grateful to the Management Committee for their support and to the Chairmen, members and players of all sections I say thank you for continuing to preserve the traditions and high standards of the Club.

In conclusion and at the time of going to press I ask you in the bar where you are quenching your thirst in this brilliant summer of 1984 to spare a thought for the Ground Committee and Ground Staff who are still looking for water!

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis of accounting

FIXED ASSETS

Freehold land and buildings are stated at cost

Leasehold property, ground maintenance equipment, furniture, fittings and office furniture are stated at cost less depreciation.

DEPRECIATION

Depreciation is provided on a straight line basis at the following rates:

Leasehold property ... over the length of the lease Ground maintenance equipment ... 20% Furniture and fittings 15% 15% Office furniture

No depreciation has been provided on freehold land and buildings as the trustees are of the opinion that the market value of land is greater than the value at which the land and buildings appear in the accounts.

STOCKS

Bar stocks have been professionally valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

DEFERRED CREDIT - ASSIGNMENT OF TICKET RIGHTS

W.R.U. Debentures repayable 2033 are stated as a deferred credit equal to the cost of the

Chairman's Report Season 1983/84

As I look back over season 1983-84 three major points come to mind: satisfaction, pleasure and concern.

Satisfaction in that the players have bounced right back this season. This I feel is due to improvement in performances by some of the younger players, the addition of experience to our playing squad and the welcome return to fitness of certain other members. Add to this the realisation by both players and coaches where they went wrong last season and their determination to show us they are more than capable of putting things together, and the result has been a very enjoyable and successful season.

Pleasure in that I rate the team spirit to be very high this season on and off the field. This I believe is due mainly to the tremendous commitment by players and coaches to work together in raising money towards their Barbados Tour and I congratulate them on their achievement.

My concern, however, is the number of our players that are being sent off the field. Some members may argue that Cardiff players are "got at" because they are Cardiff but that is something we have lived with for over 100 years and that is no excuse for the increase in sendings off from our club. We cannot always rely on a particular referee to be on duty to ensure that the laws of the game are adhered to and therefore ensuring protection for some of our players.

That leaves discipline. Anyone can pass judgement on who is responsible for discipline but in the end it comes down to the players' individual self-control, only a lesson they themselves can learn, sometimes the hard way for no one player is greater than the club.

At the end of a long hard season we can all look back with satisfaction and pleasure at having won both the Schweppes Cup and Esso Welsh Youth Rugby Union Cup.

With regard to the unofficial Championship it's been a season of ifs and buts. A slight hiccup against Centenary-celebrating Abertillery in the first game of September, well and truly beaten at Newport in October, losing an exciting game to Leicester in November, beaten by a single point at Llanelli in the same month saw us arrive Christmas Eve at the Brewery Field, Bridgend, looking as if we had eaten our Christmas lunch a day before we should have and we were punished by a well organised Bridgend side. It was over

two months and 10 games later I felt all hope had gone of winning the Championship when against Pontypool at Cardiff Arms Park we did not capitalise on the many opportunities created and lost 11-16. 

CARDIFF R.F.C. YOUTH REPORT 1983/84

Another inauspicious start to the season by Cardiff Youth. The first match a draw, against Cardiff H.S.O.B., did not augur well for the future and defeats followed at the hands of Bristol (10-12) and Rosslyn Park (9-30). In between, however, a classic match at Leicester resulted in a 29-24 victory for us—a better match I cannot remember. Our excellent fullback Arwel Parry contributed 21 points.

R.F. High School (South Africa) attracting the usual nonsense from anti-apartheid supporters (all 12 of them), was the next defeat (9-10) on 15th October. Jim O'Donnell and I both running the line in case of trouble!

From here on the squad was settling down and starting to play good rugby. Wins followed against Glamorgan Wanderers (28-3) Llantwit Major (22-10) Nuneaton (34-6) and Tref y clawdd (31-6) in the Welsh Cup. I watched this match and Nick accounted well for himself and the Cardiff Club. On the same day Simon Reed and Darren Gibbon, second row and half back respectively, represented Wales Schools (Under 19 group) against Scotland at Wrexham. Both players have represented Cardiff Youth when school matches and studies have allowed.

Ten members of the Cardiff Youth XV were now in the Cardiff and District squad challenging for the Crawshay Cup. Our squad includes sons of former Cardiff R.F.C. players; viz Richard son of Ian Brice, and Andrew son of John Price present steward of Cardiff R.F.C.

In the quarter final of the W.Y.R.U. Cup we overcame Llanharan 35-4 at home. Unfortunately the next two encounters were defeats inflicted by English opposition — Rosslyn Park were again victors by a smaller margin 7-4 in London; and Bristol away 4-16. Interesting to note that of the five games lost four were against English clubs and one against a South African School. On 25th February we took Swansea's unbeaten record 15-9 Arwel Parry scoring all our points with a try, conversion and three penalty goals. At St. Helen's we learned that the Senior XV had beaten Newbridge. Once again the Senior and Youth teams were in the semi finals of the major cup competitions — both drawn against Llanelli.

At Stradey Park we once again foiled Derek Quinnell's ambition by winning 18-12. Malcolm Collins was committeeman in charge celebrating his return to active participation in great style. Derek presented six Cardiff Youth players with their ties (after 20 games) making a fine speech to boot! Dare I say that Stuart Gallacher appreciated our fine performance that day and both he, Norman Gale, Derek Quinnell and Ray Williams (former Welsh Wing) wished us well for the Cup Final.

The Social Committee had come up with a great idea at this time — for an Old Players (Youth) Reunion. Many 'ex-youngsters' attended a well publicised function, including a great favourite of yesteryear P.L. Jones and his mates from Pencoed, who enjoyed a very successful evening. Credit here to Jim O'Donnell and the dads'. The racing night on Friday 23rd March was another success. Congratulations also to Dean Conway our popular prop, gaining his first cap against France; and to Arwel Parry winning his cap against

England at Pontypridd. Our Youth team again provides a plethora of talent for next seasons Senior XV's.

On Wednesday 11th April at Newbridge we beat Pontypool United to become Welsh Youth (Esso) Champions 1984. Arwel Parry's four penalties and a Mike Mullins' try were good enough to give us a 16-14 victory. We have now won the Welsh Youth Cup three times in the last five years.

My personal thanks go to Jim O'Donnell for his help and support throughout the season. He is synonymous with Youth Rugby in the Cardiff Club and it is my hope that Jim will be there for many years to come.

Next for a big thank you is Evan Thomas our popular trainer who fortunately did not fulfil his threat, made a few years ago "to hang up his track suit and first aid bag" for more leisurely pursuits. Here I voice the opinion of all youth players without exception — thank you and well done Evan.

A word of thanks too to Mr. Ken Jones and the Supporters Club for their help and work for the Youth during the season. In conjunction with faithful dads, viz., Colin, Elwyn, Bryn and others they worked wonders.

In my five years as Youth Secretary, I must admit that I do not know what I would have done without the help and friendship of Mr. Albert Francis, he will know what I mean when I say "I'm glad you were there Albert". We play on the Arms Park whenever possible and to be quite frank and to use John Price's well known words: ".... "what can I say?... I can't fault the man".

Talking about John Price and his wife Mair, I should like to quote

one instance which epitomises their co-operation with the Youth and earns my appreciation. They catered for 60 people at the Clubhouse, after the Pietermaritzburg match, at the short notice of six hours. I think they deserve a special thanks.

I always seem to leave the coaches until last — probably because they are the most important people these days! Elwyn Williams and John Evans took us to the Welsh Youth Cup Final and we won—say no more!

Player of the Year, by the way is Arwel Parry, fullback; and the most Promising Player is Dean Conway, prop; both Youth Internationals and looking forward with earnest to the Rags/First Team next year.

A word of thanks too, to the Senior Selection Committee for including certain youth players in the end of season Rags sides in readiness for next Season. An interesting fact is that of 49 players who appeared for the first team this season 15 were ex-Cardiff R.F.C. Youth products, almost one in three — something to think about.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 1983 SEASON

At the start of 1983 we confidently looked forward to the year and our results proved even more successful than our most optimistic members dared hope. In addition to winning the Arthur Patterson Trophy, the Famous Grouse Western League and the Giro Bank Welsh Cup, our second team was third in the Western League and the Third's, Youth and Sunday teams all performed with great credit.

The club captain, Paul Good, set a very high standard and one of the main features of the year was the all round performance from many players who frequently sacrificed their own glory for the sake of the team.

The first competition we won, was the Arthur Patterson Trophy which is competed for by local clubs at Barry. We beat St. Fagans in one of the earlier rounds, which is always pleasing, and defeated Barry in the final which of course is even more satisfying.

In the Famous Grouse Western League, we played one game in April against Cheltenham but all games during May were rained off. Consequently only 12 games were played but we achieved the highest average number of points per game since the start of the Western League, and became the first Welsh Club to hold the title.

It was the victory of Newport on the 27th August which clinched the League title, this was an auspicious weekend for Cardiff. On an adjacent pitch the Rugby Section were starting their 1983/84 year by winning the Snelling Sevens.

The following day we won the Giro Bank Welsh Cup in Swansea.

All our trophies have been on display in the Athletic Club during the year and we certainly look forward to 1984 when we hope to retain all trophies although we realise that this is a most formidable task.

In addition to the League and Cup games the club played several friendly matches including one against the M.C.C. We won this game convincingly by 6 wickets. M.C.C. 154 (D. Lewis 5-47) Cardiff 155 for 4 (John Hansell 58).

During the year Chris Elward represented Wales against Ireland and M.C.C. Michael Cann captained Wales Under 19, both played several games for Glamorgan Seconds. Hugh Morris missed many games when playing for Glamorgan and captaining Young England. Julian Francis was a regular member of the Wales Under 19 team. Congratulations to these and all the players who made the year so memorable.

The second XI under the captaincy of John Hogg began the season in fine style, defeating the St. Fagans first XI in the opening game prior to the start of the league fixtures. Prior to the season it was hoped that the Third XI would improve their position in the table. They also ended a commendable third in their division of the Morganwg League, although there were some outstanding victories against Llantwit Major and Treorchy, most of the games ended in close finishes. One of the main features of the Third XI was the standard of fielding which improved considerably during the year.

Next year we hope to join the Gwent League where we know the wickets are of a higher standard. We look forward to this as the Third XI must be a team which bloods

youngsters and introduces them to senior cricket.

An ever improving fixture list allowed the Sunday XI, captained by A.C. Edwards, to enjoy another season of competitive cricket of good quality away from the more intense atmosphere of league matches. The side had its usual 'Jekyll and Hyde' character, being too strong for most opponents except on days when the First XI were involved in cup games. On such occasions, sides of Third XI strength tended to struggle if the opposition was of any note. It is unfortunate that the majority of husbands outside the First XI cannot make themselves available on cup dates as a team of near Second XI strength could surely hold its own against the best of clubs. Perhaps the outstanding performance of the season was our innings against Glamorgan under 19's.

Having watched the opposition put in a half hour session of exercises and fielding practice, we scored 229 for 5 wickets (T. Littlewood 81), the 200 coming in two hours off only 37 overs. Sadly, rain prevented our finishing the iob. although we reduced our guests to 86 for 5 wickets.

Our first trip to Ross-on-Wye for some years saw the season's most exciting run chase in which a superb innings of 102 by Peter Goodfellow saw us 5 runs short of the home sides 214 with 3 wickets in hand.

The other century of the season came from the unlikely source of Willie Jones who scored 100 at Thornbury in only his second innings of a return to the club after some seasons absence.

Wins were recorded against Sully Centurions, South Wales Hunts, Skewen, Monmouth and Barry, whilst we had the better of most of the drawn games.

The leading batsmen were Chris Elward, Mike Cann, Tim Littlewood and Peter Goodfellow. Of the bowlers, the majority of the hard work was shouldered by Gary Hibbard, Julian Francis and Alan Bretos. Chris Day, who made an unwisely early return after a cartilage operation, gave an interesting insight into the way Long John Silver might have played cricket.

The Sunday XI has long provided an opportunity for younger players to blossom and Gary Headley, Julian Francis, Alan Bretos and David Herbert

all showed great promise.

In the last week of July we once again made the club tour to Hampshire. There again the cricket is played in a more relaxed atmosphere than the normal Saturday afternoon and the players are able to develop whilst still playing competitively. The tour was successful match wise, four games won and one drawn. The lasting memory will be of splendid weather, splendid hospitality and the very vigorous off the field activities.

Mid week games against touring teams and evening games against local sides were regularly played. In these all members are given the opportunity to participate. Efforts are made to select sides that will ensure close contest. The closest was a fixture we were delighted to resume against Cardiff City which ended in an honourable tie.

In the last game of the season, a Sunday match, played not strictly according to the M.C.C. Manual, we tried to achieve a close result but were beaten by Captain Scott and his men from the Rugby Section. We have warned them that in 1984 they can expect no favours from us and less lenient umpiring from Gordon Eccles.

Our Sunday morning nets continued to prosper and our under 13's and under 15's sides all accounted for themselves well in the various competitions they entered. Thanks are due to the Cheltenham and Gloucester Building Society whose sponsorship helped meet the costs of the vouth cricket.

Unfortunately, the Cardiff Cricket Club Schools Cup competition could not be completed because of bad weather in May, we hope the competition will be re-introduced in 1984.

Our six-a-side competition held early in July proved to be a great success. The sponsor was Manor Brick and the eventual winners were St. Fagans. Our own First XI were playing at Penarth in the Welsh Cup on the same day.

During the year several social functions took place. At our club dinner in November, the guest speakers were John Norman of B.B.C. and Barry Lloyd. the then captain of Glamorgan. At Christmas we had our Ladies Night, at the Athletic Club. Before the season Mrs. Margaret Gower held a Cocktail Party in her house. We all thank her for her generosity. Early in October, we attended the Western League Dinner where Paul Good was presented with the Famous Grouse Trophy and an enormous bottle of Whiskey to help our celebrations.

After the Season, Ossie Herbert, one of the stalwarts of the Cricket Section, died. He had enjoyed his last tour to Hampshire in July and continued to support the Club during the year. His quiet but generous support, regular visits to Sophia Gardens and most of all his sense of fun will be sadly missed.

We were delighted by the support we received from Ken Owen of the C& G and Ewan Coull of Manor Brick, the office and bar staff of the Athletic Club, and particularly Albert and Len for providing ever improving match and practice facilities.

From our own section I would like to thank the committee in particular Nick Gower, Secretary and Ramash Patel, Fixture Secretary, who had an enormous amount of re-arranging as a result of our successes in the Welsh Cup. The Umpires and Scorers who turned out for us regularly all deserve special praise, in particular Chris Fookes, the First team scorer and the ever present Gordon Eccles despite his rather biased umpiring in the Cardiff R.F.C. game.

Finally, the ladies who gave up their Saturdays and Sundays to provide us with our teas and for organising a celebration supper to mark our victorious season — a special thank you for your support during one of the most successful years ever enjoyed by the Cricket Section.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 1983/84

This year has been dominated by the successes of our First XI. under the captaincy of Howard Williams, the team has shown great determination. Howie must be congratulated on his leadership, discipline and organisation. This has all been worthwhile to produce the following results:— A win against Beckinham in London, a wonderful achievement. Winning the South Wales Indoor League again very easily. Losing in the final game of the Marlborough Carpets League to Firebrands. Winning the Wares Ibrahim Cup. Again getting to the final of the Welsh Cup, and loosing to Whitchurch. This trophy has now eluded us for two years. Winners of the Premier Division of the league, losing only one game.

The veterans have only played one game, but this may lead to a series of fixtures for next year.

Once again, we must give our thanks to Albert Francis and the ground staff for their hard work in preparing the best pitches in the South West.

Our attempt to gain entry to the Sun Life West of England League has been pursued with aggression by Tony Rhys-Jones, who still has the bit between his teeth, with alternative proposals to enable us to play the standard of hockey we deserve.

Discipline, I am sorry to say, caused a lot of problems this year. The committee made decisions which, after very lengthy discussion they felt were just. It is a shame that at the meeting where these decisions were made, people who had other ideas, did not either attend, or put their views in writing. Both players who were suspended however, have never given less than 100% to the club during their suspension, taking up the task of umpiring which must be a lesson. I only hope that next season, as much effort goes into fund raising as this season has been put into heated discussions on discipline, and that Cardiff Hockey Club players keep clear of cards, no matter what colour.
