Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1983

Dear Members,

In the context that the objects of the Club are the pursuit of any amateur game and the provision of such social amenities for the members as are approved from time to time, the financial results as revealed for the year ended 30th April, 1983 are acceptable with a surplus of income over expenditure of £11,761, after setting aside a sum of £10,000 to the repairs and maintenance fund.

From an entirely business point of view, however, one may be forgiven for thinking that the profit made is disappointing in a club as prestigious as ours, possessing as it does the joint assets of one of the world's most famous rugby clubs and a prime site in the Capital City of Wales.

In the year now reported on, income increased by £2,035, whereas expenditure rose by £19,904, and an analysis of some of the figures in the financial accounts will help to explain the situation.

INCOME

Football Income

As a whole, football income fell during the year by nearly £11,000 due in the main to our "lack of success" in the W.R.U. Schweppes Cup competition, a reduction in football gates and the sale of season tickets.

For the first time ever, there was a loss in the sale of programmes, due in the main to a drop in sales.

Whilst we must never ever depend on winning the cup competition to safeguard our viability, it is, nevertheless, very necessary that we should have a successful crowd-drawing rugby side. Ground earnings (perimeter advertising etc.) showed a very welcome increase.

Members' Subscriptions

It is incumbent on management to be vigilant about the rate of subscriptions. Small annual increases may be an irritant to some mebers, but one must recognise value for money and appreciate the amenities and facilities available. Higher costs in the form of increased staff remuneration have to be met from time to time.

Bar Profit

An increase in bar profits is very welcomed. The House Committee and staff are to be congratulated on maintaining a gross profit of 35.3 per cent.

Other Income

Hire of rooms show a small increase, but we must pursue a vigorous course to exploit the amenities now offered in the Centenary Suite.

EXPENDITURE

Salaries and Wages

The settlement of the tax assessment made by the Inland Revenue PAYE Audit in respect of certain casual labour over a period of years, is reflected in 1982 which, of course, is not repeated in 1983. Also, with the introduction of computerisation, the Chief Clerk was not replaced.

Upkeep of grounds and clubhouse

An increase in expenditure of £11,199 includes the electrical rewiring and renewal of conduit in the Club rooms, together with repairs and renewals of Club and kitchen fixtures and fittings. A new item in this sub-head of expenditure is that of computer maintenance. The replacement of broken seats in the Stand is another costly exercise.

Gatemen

The reduction in expenditure is in consequence of the use of volunteers.

Rent and Rates - Sophia Gardens

A ground rent review by the Cardiff City Council occasioned an increase from £450 per annum to £3,000 per annum, with retrospective effect to 25th March, 1981. The arrears payable have been included in this year's accounts. Water charges have also increased.

Lighting and Heating

Electrical charges and gas for catering and central heating show substantial increases.

Dinner Dance, Photographs and Awards

The Rugby Club awarded special commemorative decanters and pullovers to the players who participated in the club's success in winning the W.R.U. Schweppes Cup, and the Western Mail unofficial championship. The costs are reflected in this year's accounts.

In a world of rising costs and falling income, management is ever mindful of the need to contain expenditure and to look for means of increasing income. With a new administration in the offing, Management — and particularly the Finance Committee — will be asked to scrutinize all items of expenditure. We are already looking at systems to reduce maintenance costs, and indeed it must be mentioned that a great debt of gratitude is due to the Cardiff RFC Supporters Club for their efforts in the painting programmes undertaken voluntarily, and we will be ever grateful for the excellent work they have carried out in the Skittle Alley and on the Gwyn Nicholls gates.

We are also indebted to the South Glamorgan Probation Service and the officers of H.M. Prison, Cardiff, for their welcomed efforts in referring labour to us for use in the general upkeep and maintenance of the grounds etc.

Again, one cannot enlarge too much on the very much appreciated efforts of Nancy and Eddie John in their very successful efforts in running the Souvenir Shop. We are very grateful.

It will be obvious that the voluntary efforts of members is a very acceptable gesture in the Club and in this context I must make reference to the enlargement of the Bowls' kitchen facilities in the Pavilion which, had we gone to outside contractors, would have cost £5,000/£6,000. The bowlers, however, were informed that the Club were not in the financial position to proceed with such a project, and in consequence they volunteered to do this work provided the Club supplied the materials. This was done, and the whole scheme cost approximately £2,000. It would seem to me that this a prime example of what we should be looking at in the Athletic Club.

The Management Committee is concerned at the cost of schemes undertaken by contractors, and it would seem to me that we should look very closely at Do It Yourself schemes where sections desire improvements or additions. The Bowls Section is to be congratulated on its efforts, and I mention this in the report knowing full well that they have been congratulated already by the Management Committee.

As in the past, I am grateful to the President and Trustees for their assistance in preserving the high standards of the Club; and to the Chairmen of Standing Committees, Messrs. G. A. Chugg (Finance), J. D. H. Riches (House) and L. M. Spence (Ground) for their support throughout the year.

I am particularly grateful to Mr. G. A. Chugg, Vice Chairman for his support and assistance, and we are fortunate that we are able to call on Mr. John H. D. Riches, Hon. Solicitor, and Mr. J. O. Webb, Hon. Architect.

Thank you, Mrs. Gaynor Parsons and the Bar/Catering staff for your great efforts during the year, and again we are grateful to Mr. Albert Francis and his ground staff for their excellent and hardworking service to preserve the Club's main assets.

To the Chairman and members of the Section sub-committees and players, thank you for preserving the traditions and high standards of the Club.

On a more personal note I am very grateful to the Management Committee for their assistance and support.

The Athletic Club and particularly the Rugby Club are deeply indebted to Messrs. Quayle Carpets of Weldon, near Stourport, Worcs., and their Chairman Wm. (Bill) Davies for their generosity in donating that most luxurious carpeting in the Hubert Johnson Trophy Room. We are very grateful for this excellent gesture which has enhanced even further this most prestigious room.

Lastly, by design, I refer to the retirement of Mr. K. H. George, the General Secretary with whom the Management Committee has negotiated an early retirement. We are always very grateful to the General Secretary and his staff for the administrative work they carry out. On this occasion, may I on behalf of the players, members, sub-committees, committees and staff, extend to Mr. George our best wishes for a long and healthy retirement.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis of accounting.

FIXED ASSETS

Freehold land and buildings are stated at cost.

Leasehold property, ground maintenance equipment, furniture, fittings and office furniture are stated at cost less depreciation.

DEDDECLATION

Depreciation is provided	raight line basis at the following rates
Leasehold property Ground maintenance equipment	over the length of the lease 20%
Furniture and fittings	15%
Office furniture	15%

No depreciation has been provided on freehold land and buildings as the trustees are of the opinion that the market value of land is greater than the value at which the land and buildings appear in the accounts.

STOCKS

Bar stocks have been professionally valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Chairman's Report Season 1982/83

A former Committee man, after congratulating me on my appointment as Chairman of Cardiff Rugby Football Club for season 1982-83 remarked "enjoy it". This I have done despite the disappointing results.

Before I start on my report I would like to welcome a new name and face to the Rugby Committee but certainly no stranger to Cardiff supporters, Ian Robinson. Whereas we welcome Ian and hope that he stays a long time I feel and hope we have not seen the last of Colin Howe who has put in an enormous amount of work on the Rugby Committee over many years.

Supporters may well ask "What's gone wrong this season", after two successful seasons in the Cup and one in the Western Mail Championship, You may recall a statement made by Roger Beard (Coach) in the newspapers before the season started that both coaches after the success of last season would like to see more passing, less kicking and therefore more enjoyment for both players and supporters. Although the Committee viewed this statement with some concern they were prepared to wait and see what the outcome would bring. The outcome as we all know is now history and the statistics for September read played 8, lost 4, drew 1, won 3.

October saw the arrival of the Maoris with their fleet-footed back division and superfit forwards, some just like giants. Cardiff could not match them for speed and went down by 10pts.-17pts. Other sides in Wales to play the Maoris must have watched this game and made notes on how to counter the fast passing and speedy backs because from that game on with a few exceptions they were not allowed the same freedom to play their own game.

By Christmas we had lost 11 games but in the early part of November we saw signs that the Cardiff we all knew were starting to take shape when we saw convincing wins over Leicester 32-9, Llanelli 24-13, narrowly losing to Swansea 13-18 in December and crushing defeats of Bridgend 29-6 and Pontypridd 56-3.

We must of course remember that during this period there was a late start to the season by Terry Holmes and we had more than our fair share of injuries, in particular to Rhodri Lewis and Tony Mogridge and also that Kevin Edwards decided that he needed some time off from rugby, now returned and showing us how much he was missed.

In 1980-81 season Cardiff lost 13 games but still won the Cup. I felt confident with a fully fit side we could do the same. Our run in the Cup with wins over Cilfynydd, Gowerton and Blackwood caused us no real problems but we knew it would be a different story at Pontypool Park especially without the services of Terry Holmes who was recovering from a shoulder injury. The three-quarters were never able to capitalise on the sufficient supply of ball from the forwards plus missing vital penalty kicks in the first half, dashed our hopes of making it a Cup treble and we lost the game 9-13.

Easter weekend saw the popular Barbarians visit the Arms Park on the Saturday and the Harlequins on the Monday. The least said about the Harlequins game the better, for everybody in Cardiff that is, but full marks to the 'Quins'. Against the Barbarians and without our captain John Scott we saw the true fighting spirit Cardiff are capable of when they came "back from the dead" to snatch a draw and with the last kick of the match could have won the game, the result 32-32.

The triumphs over Swansea and Neath show us what the season might have brought playing well controlled rugby.

In spite of the disappointing season, results wise, we can still produce two British Lions in Terry Holmes and Robert Norster and wish them on behalf of everyone connected with Cardiff R.F.C. a successful and injury free tour in New Zealand. A further great honour was that of John Scott to captain England, being the first Cardiff player to have achieved this. Congratulations also to Ian Eidman on his hat-trick having played for Wales B, Wales and Barbarians, to Mark Ring on his selection for Wales, to Jeff Whitefoot on his selection for Wales B and Terry Charles honoured by the Barbarians. Also Adrian Hadley, Mark Ring, Ian Eidman and Jeff Whitefoot have been selected to tour Spain with Wales this May, both Paul Rees and Owen Golding were reserves. Further honours will I am sure come to present youngsters in the Cardiff teams in the not too distant future.

Cardiff's tour to Devon and Cornwall was a complete success with wins over Brixham 25-12, St. Ives 41-25 and Penzance Newlyn 60-7, the welcome in Cornwall as good as ever. Add these scores to the existing total for the season and we have a new club points record of 1,126, not bad considering we lost so many games. This total does not include the two Centenary games we played this season against Dinas Powis which we won 22-6 and Pentyrch 50-8.

I have not mentioned every game in my report, mainly those that show us that despite the worst record ever in regard to games lost we have shown in certain games with a fully fit side that we can match and beat the best of them. Let us not forget that the success of any rugby side depends on injuries and the availability of players throughout the season.



CARDIFF R.F.C. YOUTH REPORT 1982/83

That Cardiff Youth had a poor start to the season would be an understatement to say the least. Three of the first four games were lost, the only success being the very first game of the season against Cardiff H.S.O.B. at the Diamond Ground where we struggled to a 10-3 win. Then came the reverse against Bristol at the Arms Park 3-21, St. Peter's at the Harlequins ground 12-33 and Leicester at the Arms Park 0-13. My only consolation at this stage, mid-way through September was that we had only four of last season's players available, still perturbing though. Rosslyn Park in London on 9th October was the next reversal where we were beaten by 10pts. to 6. At this stage we had played 9 and won 5 but were beginning to play together at last.

The second part of the season was a distinct improvement on the first. Only the home match against Llanelli at Sophia Gardens on 27th November, 1982 was the last between 9th October, 1982 and the match against Bryncethin on 12th February, 1983 where we lost, 9-12 and deservedly so. That Llanelli defeat incidentally was reversed when we went to Stradey Park for the second round of the W.Y.R.U.

However, by the latter part of the season our biggest disappointment was to come. After progressing to the final of the Welsh Youth Cup we lost to Whitland at Ammanford by 10pts. to 9. We played poorly on the day and that was that, runners up we were. The players themselves accepted defeat in the proper manner and I was proud of them.

I feel it my duty, however, to mention one or two facts about this Welsh Youth Knock-Out Cup Competition. From one season to the next no one knows when or where the final is actually to be played. Between the semi-final and final is a grey area where it is anybody's guess what is going on. Why the final is not played at a major Welsh ground, fixed the season before is beyond belief. In the last couple of years I have seen Cardiff Youth play in the final against Newport at Caerphilly (mid-week evening!) and now at Ammanford. It seems that youth rugby is still the cinderella of Welsh rugby compared to schools for instance. The ground at Ammanford was good even though the whole partisan population of Whitland lined the touchline! The after match facilities were poor and never really conclusive to a Welsh Cup final. Enough of that.

Notable victories were recorded against Pontypridd at Sardis Road 16-6, Newport (away) 27-7 (even though six of our players were involved in a District match) and that Llanelli cup game at Llanelli 13-0. Swansea were beaten 25-0 at Sophia Gardens and Durban H.S. 24-3 as a curtain raiser to the Barbarians-Cardiff game.

A typically cold day at Rumney on Monday, May 2nd, 1983 saw Cardiff Youth "A" beaten in the semi-final by the best side in the annual Cardiff & District 7-a-side tournament. The Rumney Youth side were in fine form and went on to win the Final. Better fortunes for our "B" side however — they won the plate.

A special mention here for Mathew Harris, our goal kicking outside half who contributed 228pts. out of the total including 8 tries. In June 1980 Elwyn Williams was appointed Youth coach in succession to Peter Davies and he can look back at the 1982-83 season with some satisfaction as only nine games were lost. With six or seven of this year's team again available for the next season I think Elwyn can look forward to 1983-84 with enthusiasm.

Not least of the encouraging thoughts for next season is the fact that Chris Lakin, this year's captain has next year also in Youth rugby. Chris is the third of the Lakin brothers to captain Cardiff Youth and I feel that this amiable, talented and well respected player has honours in store for himself next season.

My personal thanks are extended to Jim O'Donnell, Dave Chilcott and Ray (Paddy) Collins for their company and help throughout the season. To Albert Francis I offer my personal thanks for all his help and special considerations to the Youth fraternity.

On behalf of her "cherubs" as she affectionately calls the Youth boys, I pay tribute to Mrs. Gaynor Parsons, our club stewardess, for everything she and her staff did for the Youth during the season. My appreciation too, to Mr. Ted John for his talks to visiting teams on the occasions that the Trophy Room was visited. To Evan Thomas our popular trainer may I say that on behalf of all the Youth Section I am pleased that you were able to perform your duties this year. In my report last year I wrote that you were in some doubt as to whether you could continue through business commitments. On the few occasions Evan could not attend Mr. Maurice Pinchers took his place and I thank Maurice too for his help and efforts.

Finally, the elected "Player of the Year" for 1982-83 is Mathew Harris, Most Promising Player is second row forward Nick Jones and Clubman of the Year Richard Chilcott. Trophies to be presented at the Youth Dinner at the Clubhouse on June 17th, 1983.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 1982 SEASON

The 1982 season has been the most successful since our move to Sophia Gardens. Both 1st and 2nd XIs finished in third position in the Western League, there was no repetition of the problems encountered when we relaid the square last year. David and John Herbert generously donated a new score box in memory of their father. The ground showed a marked improvement overall and the improved nets certainly contributed to the successes of the 1st and 2nd XIs.

The 1st team under the captaincy of Howard Slade began the Western League programme on 1st May on a very high note for Cardiff. We defeated Newport at Rodney Parade by 7 wickets, possibly the best way for any Cardiff side to start the year. Thanks on that occasion were due to excellent batting by Terry Davies, and by Peter Morgan, who took 5 for 18, his best bowling performance of the year.

Victories were also recorded against Bristol Imperial, where Tony Cordle took 6 for 62, Downend, Brislington, Westbury, Clifton (Chris Elward 95, David Lewis 5 for 74) Midsomer Norton and Stroud.

The leading batsman was Chris Elward, who is to be congratulated for topping the Western League batting averages with 510 runs scored at an average of 55.67. He was supported by Paul Good with 446 runs at 31.86 and Howard Slade with 217 runs, 24.11. The leading wicket takers were Tony Cordle with 34 at an average of 14.71, David Lewis with 31 at an average of 17.97 and Peter Morgan who finished third in the League averages with 20 wickets at 11.9.

Once again we managed to lose cup games in both the Haig and Welsh Giro Bank competitions. In the Haig we lost in an early round to Llanelli having scored 183 for 5 in our 40 overs, (Paul Good 105) and Llanelli reached 184 for 6 in the last over.

In the Welsh Cup competition we did better with wins against a Rhymney Valley Side — Butchers Arms, David Lewis taking 5 for 8, Dowlais, Rhymney, Barry, Pontymister whose Jim Littlewood scored 56 and Mike Elward, back from College, took 5 for 20.

We lost the area final to Newport Fugitives but look forward to an improved cup run in 1983.

In addition to the league and cup commitments, we entertained several touring sides, including a mixed team from South Africa. Alma Marist were most welcome visitors, we played them on the last game of their tour and managed to inflict one of the few defeats they suffered whilst in this country.

Our 2nd team, captained by John Hogg, also achieved third position in the Western League, losing only three games, winning nine and tying one with the Lansdowne Club. Better luck early on in the season would certainly have meant an improvement in their very commendable third position.

It was the batting of the side that proved to be most successful, wins were frequently achieved after putting in the opposition to bat, on four occasions over 200 runs were passed when batting second to win the game. The most

notable of these was against Malmesbury at Sophia Gardens. Malmesbury had scored 258 in the 45 overs, the winning run was hit off the last over by the Captain after Chris Elward 81, D. Sinclair 66 and S. Lang 48, had laid the basis for the highest total by any Western League side chasing runs to win the game.

Other notable performances were at Cheltenham, where Cheltenham had scored 159, Cardiff in reply were 54 for 5 when Gary Hibbert and Gerry Mills put on 106 wins to win the game by 5 wickets. Gary Hibbert's contribution was a very aggressive 72 not out. On two occasions centuries were scored; Chris Elward scored 125 not out against Optimists and Barney De Clerk, a visitor from South Africa scored 115 against Bath. He averaged 91.3 runs in only three completed innings, Michael Cann was the main run scorer, who in seven completed innings scored 341 runs averaging 48.7.

Steve Lang and Mike Cann finished high in the Western League batting averages, Mike Cann third and Steve Lang seventh. The bowling was shared around quite equally, but Gary Hibbert took 28 wickets at 15.5 and Steve Price 32 at 16.9 runs per wicket.

The 3rd XI captained by Merfyn Owen did not achieve the successes of the 1st and 2nd teams, but once again provided the opportunity for many new members to play for Cardiff and gain experience on the excellent wickets provided at Sophia Gardens. Continuation and progress of the 3rd XI is vital for the success of the other sides in the Club and we look forward to improved performances in the forthcoming season from such players as Jeff Bretos, who managed to score 100 against Bedwas in a League game and Garry Headley, a young all-rounder whose performance has been recognised by the M.C.C. and the Welsh Under 15 selectors.

The Sunday side fell short of its very high standards and suffered some defeats, all but one occurred when the 1st XI Cup fixture coincided with strong Sunday opponents. Victories were recorded against Ton Pentre, Briton Ferry, Lisvane, Dinas Powis, South Wales Hunts, Barry, Old Whitonians and Monmouth. The season began with an opening partnership of 151 between Ricky Lewis and David Sinclair against Ton Pentre. Runs were seldom hard to come when we fielded our full strength batting order. David Sinclair followed his 78 not out in the opening match with 106 in the next game against Lisvane to help us to an 8 wicket victory. Chris Elward's excellent season was not confined to Saturdays and he recorded centuries against Zambia Nomads, 126 not out and Gorseinon 112 not out. Other batting performances of note were from Tim Littlewood, Mike Cann and Jeff Bretos.

Of the bowlers, Chris Day began the season strongly taking 5 for 49 against Ton Pentre and 5 for 25 against Dinas Powis; unfortunately his availabilility was restricted by injury. Gary Hibbert and Mike Cann bowled regularly while at the end of the season Julian Francis emerged as a bowler of genuine pace and real potential. Another of our youth players, Gary Headley, put in a fine spell taking 5 for 21 against Briton Ferry who were bowled out for only 91 runs.

The Sunday fixtures, which are not played under limited over conditions generally give younger players chances of batting which are denied them in limited over league and cup competitions.

The same applies on our Club Tour, where games are generally not played under limited over conditions. I am pleased to report the Club Tour to the Winchester area proved to be a great success, four games being won and one being drawn.

The Sunday side and the Touring side showed an increased maturity which is visible throughout the Club and this is due to the opportunity being given to players when not operating under limited overs and I would like to thank our Fixture Secretaries for providing us with such a strong and friendly fixture list.

In addition to the various team reports, I am pleased that our Six-a-Side Competition, which was sponsored this year by ABACUS Office Equipment Ltd., proved to be a great success, despite our ability to pick one of the worst days of the summer. The Cardiff team was successful, as they had been in retaining the Newport Fugitives Cup a few weeks before.

Our youth team were not successful in their defence of the Western League Wilkinson Sword Trophy, but many games were arranged and several competitions were entered for younger members of varying ages.

The Cardiff Cricket Club Schools Cup Competition was again contested; in the final Whitchurch defeated Cowbridge to win the Trophy for the third time in five years.

Congratulations are due to members who gained representative honours, Howard Slade played for Wales against Ireland and Denmark. Michael Cann played for Wales under 19's although he was only 16. Gary Headley played for Wales under 15's. We hardly saw Huw Morris as when he finished captaining England Schools, Young England and the M.C.C., he went straight into the Glamorgan side and managed to top the batting averages. It came as no surprise when he was chosen by the M.C.C. as the best young cricketer of 1982. We offer him our best wishes and look forward to 1983 when he will be playing for us in the early part of the season.

One pleasing feature of the year, apart from the cricket, has been that more members have taken part in the running of the Club. This has been much appreciated by the Committee and has led to the various successful functions that were held.

Early in the year, Colin Howe and Alan Jones were our Guest Speakers at our Annual Dinner. A successful Ladies Night and various other fund raising parties and barbecues were held during the season. The final event of the year was the fixture between the Rugby Section and the Cricker Section which somehow we contrived to lose. We very much enjoy this game and look forward to a return fixture in September 1983.

Finally I would like to thank the members of the Committee, particularly Ramash Patel and J.D.H. Riches who have shared the Secretarial duties, Chris Fookes and Gordon Eccles for scoring and umpiring and to Albert Francis and to his newly appointed assistant, Len Smith our most grateful thanks. Thanks also to the members of the bar staff who continue to support us, but most of all, a special thank you to the ladies who continue to give up their weekends to provide us with the best cricket teas in the whole of the Western League.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 1982

This season was again dominated by the European Hockey Club Championship. The Club participated in the 15th Championship which was held in Subotica, Yugoslavia. The Club came fourth, one place lower than last year, but all things considered this was an extremely creditable result. The factors that were against us were the long and tiring journey, the heat in which the matches were played, and above all the weakness of the squad of players who represented the Club. Of the 22 players originally nominated (and that was not the strongest 22) seven were forced to withdraw as a result of injury, pending exams, or inability to take time off work. Those unable to go included our two Great Britain players, Bryn Williams and the Club Captain Howard Williams (who was seriously injured only two weeks before the Tournament), as well as other vital members of the squad. The Coach, David Prosser, also had to withdraw, and we thus had not only an understrength squad of players but also a weakened management team.

Our first match, the day after a fifteen hour journey, was against Eur Marilena, of Italy. We scored first, should have scored a second but instead immediately conceded a goal, and lost to a winning goal only six seconds from the end. Steve Sparkes' goal was the only one scored against the Italians in the whole Tournament. Our next match was against Slavia Prague from Czechoslovakia; we drew 1-1 to qaulify for the third/fourth place final. In that match, despite having more of the game and being the better side, we failed to take our chances and conceded some soft and unlucky goals to lose 0-5. Eur Marilena then comprehensively beat Banbridge, from Ireland, 2-0 in the final.

The Club can be proud of the players who represented it; fourth is the best position obtained by any Welsh side away from Wales. It was a most creditable performance, and just think what we could have done with a full strength side. Special mention must be made of Andy Gowman, who stood in as Captain, and the veteran Terry Jones who was to have been team manager but in fact played for almost the whole time. Thanks are also due to Paul Kelvin-Smith for his part in organising the trip and who received his reward by getting a place on the Tour at the last minute as Team Manager.

We must also thank the Athletic Club for their generosity in making a substantial grant towards the cost of participating in the Tournament.

So on the domestic season 1982-83 and I will commence by giving the season's statistics first.

I feel that the season generally has gone well, true we have lost the Welsh Cup, and it would have been nice to have three wins in a row and to claim the Cup as our own, but it is folly to judge the season by the Welsh Cup and there have been many successes. The highlights perhaps being the smashing of all the opposition in the Marlborough Carpets league, the purple two weeks 8th and 15th January when only a 2nd team draw against Hereford prevented us whitewashing Hereford and Firebrands, two leading West of England clubs, on successive Saturdays. Also in that period being a 5-1 defeat of Llanishen in the 2nd XI Cup and a Welsh Cup 7-4 defeat of U.C. Cardiff (how did they get 4?).

The 1st XI have been led by Howie Williams, and what an innovator he turned out to be. No other Cardiff captain has asked his players to don binliners and wellington boots, to run along streams and through woods, and to do it at his house at 7 o'clock in the morning. But he did, and to his credit the

team have done so and enjoyed it. Was it because of the thought of Rhoda making the toast after the training, or was it because of leadership? On the playing side the team have not scored 100 goals, as in the last two seasons, but they gave the Club the best start to a season for a long time. It was not until 27th November that they lost a game and that a ridiculous 0-1 to Llanishen on a Welsh training weekend. Whilst every credit is due to players invited to training weekends, it is a cross the Club must bear. When you realise that this year there have been weekends for Wales, indoor and outdoor, Wales U-21 Indoor and Outdoor, Wales Schools at U-19 and U-16 there have not been too many weeks when somebody is not away. The playing success has been highlighted by some excellent games, such as the draw with Beckenham and the 3-0 defeat of Glasgow Western on the London Weekend, the trip down to Exeter to take on and draw 2-2 with Isca on their own ground, an achievement in anybody's language, and the 9-1 thumping of Bradford. The lows were the loss to Whitchurch in the Welsh Cup, when we outplayed them completely, camped in their half and yet lost to a lucky breakaway touch in, the goalless draw with Newport when we squandered 32 short corners and at the end of the season when, again with weakened sides, we lost the South Wales Cup Final and the South Wales League.

But Indoors we are supreme, again winning the South Wales League easily, winning the Marlborough Carpets League where we scored more than 10 goals against each team except Firebrands and again winning the Final of the Welsh Indoor Cup.

The 2nd XI, captained by Paul Kelvin-Smith, have had a mixed season, unfortunately they have lost the Championship of Division 2 of the League but have persisted with a policy of playing the more promising of the younger players in the side and the success of this move cannot be measured, not even by the fact that Matthew Rees, Mark Thomas, Steve Ellis, Sean McCarthy and Alan Human have played in the 1st team this season. The 2nd XI carry a large proportion of the load of training weekends so that on these days we lose games to Whitchurch Saints (1-4) and Llanishen (1-4) but when all players are available can beat Lydney (5-2) and Swansea (6-1).

The 3rd XI had the misfortune to have its Captain — Dennis Moran resign at the end of October, and since then have existed on a mixture of Rod McKerlich, Channi Kaler and myself. In theory we should have won the Division 3 of the League with the promotion of Whitchurch to Division 2 but it was not to be for a number of reasons, mainly that again the side gave away matches it should easily have won. Games to be savoured were the 10-3 defeat of Penarth and the 9-0 beating of Cwmbran, but again the difference between training weekend teams and others was very marked.

Mike Faires again captained the 4th XI and they enjoyed a season that gave them better results than of late especially the 6-0 beating of Hereford and the 4-2 against Firebrands. Hockey at this level, without the pressures of league and cup is an enjoyable exercise which I hope will continue for a long time.

It is worth noting that we did field a 5th XI for one game when everybody was available and also that our U-19 XI have produced some good results including beating Llanishen 3-1 in a cup game.

This season we have again been plagued with a lack of umpires able and

willing to perform in the league and cup games. As it is a requirement of playing in the league it caused the Committee to persuade Roy Manby and Ted Butler to take up the whistle on our behalf to replace Martyn Gallivan and Eric Hurden who had both moved on to pastures new. This was fine until Roy injured his knee, and since then a number of stopgap umpires have officiated. To each of those and to our regular umpires Norman Francis, Geoff Percival and Haydn Warmen I offer the Club's thanks and appreciation for a job well done.

Perhaps this is an opportune moment to mention the Club's disciplinary record which in a few cases is disgraceful. Players who persistently are sent from the field of play let down themselves, their team mates and the Club whose colours they wear. Can the Club afford to have its name tainted in this manner? I think not and the Selection Committee, who traditionally handle these matters, should instruct these persistent offenders that their membership is no longer required. Anybody that cannot hold his temper or his tongue should not represent this Club.

On a happier note I am pleased to report that this season not one game has been cancelled at Sophia Gardens as a result of the ground or bad weather. This is indeed a tribute to Albert Francis, the groundstaff, and the sand slitting that has been done over the past two years. I extend our thanks and appreciation to Albert for providing not only the best pitches around but also weather-proof ones. I have asked Mervyn Warfield, our Ground Committee member, to endorse this appreciation in the appropriate place.

The social highlight of the season was again the Bar-b-que/Disco at Whitsun. We were not blessed with such good weather as last year but there was still a reasonable turnout and everyone enjoyed themselves. We have an agreement with Llanishen that this will again be held next year and I hope that it will become a regular annual event in our calendar.

I am now at the end of my term of office as your Chairman, and it now only remains for me to thank the people who have worked, with me, on your behalf as your Committee. I have been very fortunate to have presided over a Committee that has had very little change for the whole of my office and that has the advantage that once people have learnt their jobs they carry on with them with an increased efficiency. To all those who have helped, advised and prompted me I offer my sincere thanks. To all the captains for doing such an essential job, to Paul Kelvin-Smith without whose dedication and graft a lot of work would not have been so successfully achieved (his work especially at the Eurocup weekend was worth a Knighthood), to Sean McCarthy for whom nothing is too much trouble, too big or too small to do, and he still wants more - without his efforts the weekly fielding of sides and their matches would be far less smooth. To Ed Cooper, the Committee members, Bryn Williams, Mervyn Greenwood, Terry Jones and Pip Rees, and to the Management Committee members Mervyn Warfield and Len Morgan and last, but by no means least, to Gaynor and "Womble", the teagirls, I say on behalf of Cardiff Hockey Club a big thank you, your services are all essential and appreciated.
