Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1982

Dear Members,

Once again it is very pleasing to report an excess of income over expenditure in the year ended 30th April, 1982. It will be noted from the final accounts that after prudently setting aside an amount of £10,000 to the repairs and maintenance fund, management is able to record an excess of income over expenditure which is larger than that reported in the previous year.

This most satisfactory result of the year's working has been achieved despite a fall in Football Income and a reduction in Bar Profit, reflecting perhaps the recessional trend which is being experienced by most business concerns. Expenditure during the year increased by £10,532, due mainly to the inevitable uplift in Salaries and Wages, but income happily increased by £12,367 due in the main to increased subscriptions, which justified the policy of management in maintaining the level of this item of income at an acceptable level.

In continuance of the financial aspect of this report, I am grateful to the General Secretary, Mr. K. H. George, for the detailed statement he has supplied to me and further analysed comments would, it is felt, help to clarify some of the items appearing in the accounts, viz:

Salaries and Wages — the salaries and wages sub-committee make an annual assessment of the remuneration entitlement of all staff. In the year now reported upon, an early retirement was negotiated with Miss Anne Davies who had indicated a desire to retire on acceptable terms, and in view of the fact that a computer had been donated to the Club by Mr. Paddy Gallagher, it was decided not to replace the Chief Clerk. The redundancy figures negotiated and accepted are included in the year's accounts.

Inland Revenue, P.A.Y.E. Audit made an assessment of the tax liability in respect of certain casual labour workers over a period of many years, and the satisfactory settlement is reflected in this subhead of expenditure.

Upkeep of Grounds and Clubhouse — the decrease in expenditure in the year ended 30th April, 1982 merely indicates a reduction in "extraordinary" items of expenditure as compared with the previous year.

Football - Away Match Expenses - the increase under this head of

expenditure is mainly attributable to the expenses incurred in the fixture in Dublin against Bective Rangers on the occasion of the Centenary of that famous and popular club.

A further item of expenditure concerned the decision of Customs and excise to disallow Input Tax on tour clothing of players (i.e. for overseas tours). An assessment of the Club's liability over three years amounted to £666.

Football – Home Match Expenses – the cost of providing meals and refreshment to home and visiting teams continues to rise. In addition, in another decision by Customs and Excise, Input Tax on meals served to visiting teams which constituted a deduction in the Club's liability for V.A.T. was disallowed.

Stationery, Telephones and Postages; Advertising, Season Tickets, etc. — costs on these items continue to rise.

General Rates – Rates continue to rise but the decrease in this year's accounts merely reflects that the figures in 1981 contained a large assessment in arrears for the period April 1979 to September 1980.

Gatemen — following the Inland Revenue's inspection and the consequent indication that all payments for casual labour may be liable to tax the whole system has been rationalised and the services of volunteers has been encouraged for the less arduous tasks.

Car Park Attendants Wages — the car parking area on W.R.U. property at the Park Street entrance became available again for Ground membership with a consequent increased bill for the wages of attendants. (This area is closed again during the W.R.U. reconstruction of the South Stand). Additionally the entrances at Quay Street and Angel Hotel have been manned until late evening.

Football Income — football gate receipts for the year compare favourably with 1981 particularly due to the outstanding success of the Rugby Club in winning once again the W.R.U. Schweppes Cup. In addition, of course, they succeeded in topping the Western Mail Unofficial Championship Table.

Apart from the honours gained there is, of course, a pecuniary award in the Cup achievement which in 1981 amounted tp £10,000 and in 1982, £12,000.

Unfortunately, several home games were cancelled during the season and could not be re-arranged, and inevitably there was a reduction in gate receipts, profit on programmes and bar profits.

Ground earnings were disappointingly low from advertising but a new improved contract has been negotiated for the next two years. On the general aspects of the Athletic Club it has been a most satisfactory and inspiring year, and it is most gratifying to feel a mood of optimism in the sections.

I seek no pardon for repetition and our heartiest congratulations in the first instance go to the Rugby Club for achieving a great treble in winning the Welsh Rugby Union (Schweppes) Cup; finishing in first place in the Western Mail Unofficial Welsh Championship Table; and winning the Snelling Sevens.

Well done, the Hockey Section for successfully arranging and holding the European Hockey Club Championships (Division B Final) on Sophia Gardens at Whitsun. This is the most prestigious tournament to be held in Wales and this was only the second occasion on which such an event had been held in the United Kingdom. It is also worthy of mention that this was achieved without incurring expenditure on the Athletic Club and the Hockey Club's efforts in money-raising are to be applauded.

The cricket section continues to flourish and I never cease to admire the activities of our Club Solicitor, Mr. John D. H. Riches, who, when not negotiating and/or looking after the interests of the Athletic Club, manages to bowl "a few tidy overs" for one of the Cricket Club's teams. I was more than pleased, also, to see the new Cardiff Cricket Club scoreboard erected by John and David Herbert to perpetuate the memory of their late father, Dan, a former great Athletic Club stalwart and personal friend.

Good to see the tennis Section extensively using those very good hard courts and splendid grass courts at Sophia Gardens.

What a pleasure it is to be a member of the Bowls Section. Having "graduated" from cricket, football and golf, I am reminded of the quotation:

"No wise man ever wished to be younger."

The Golfing Society goes from strength to strength and they are to be congratulated on the installation of their Trophy Cabinet in the Members' Lounge at a very typical and enjoyable function.

Good luck to the Choral Society who are still looking for more singing members to foster their many functions for charitable causes.

It will have been noted that a firm of painting and decorating contractors have been engaged during the summer months on the Rugby Ground stands. The cost of painting approaches £20,000 which will be met from the repair and maintenance fund set up for such purposes. The alterations to the office accommodation are now

complete but money will need to be spent on ventilation and heating and this is under consideration. Progress on the computerisation of records and financial data is proceeding.

The proposed Glamorgan County Cricket Club development at Sophia Gardens, which has been approved in principle by the Management Committee, seems to be in abeyance at the moment awaiting the next move of the Glamorgan C.C.C. Meanwhile, the appropriate Sub-Committee of the Athletic Club with the aid of the Club's Solicitor will be looking at the relevant licence agreement which will need to be drawn up to protect the interests of both sides.

A step into the future sees the opening in September 1982 of the Cardiff R.F.C. Centenary Suite of rooms which has been constructed beneath the South Stand. The suite comprises a Sponsors Room which has been developed to take the pressure from the Hubert Johnson Trophy Room; and a new Club Room which has been constructed within the whole complex principally to be used in a commercial venture to attract business customers who would wish to hire accommodation for seminars, exhibitions and catering, etc. It is hoped that the rooms which will be tastefully decorated and furnished will be used to the fullest extent and in this context it is felt that the suite may be used as an extension of the club for members and their guests on big match days. As in the use of the Club House there will need to be the strictest control in admittance and to this end, the House Committee will be looking at ways and means to enable such a control to be instituted as a protection of the premises and in the interests of members.

Again, and once more into the future, feasibility studies are being made of schemes for indoor bowls and an extension of the Rugby North Stand. It is emphasised, however, that these are feasibility studies only, but already one must be aware that if such projects are undertaken there will need to be consideration as to ways and means of raising funds. Certainly the ordinary business working of the Club will not be sufficient to provide the funds needed.

No report is complete without expressions of gratitude to those who help to facilitate the tasks of management, and whilst this may seem routine, it is nevertheless very sincere and I would thank in the first place the President and Trustees for their counselling and vigilance in preserving the high standards of the Club. I am grateful also to the Chairmen of the Standing Committees, Messrs. Wyndham Lewis (Finance), L. M. Spence (Ground) and D. M. James (House) not only for their excellent supervision of these most important Committees but also for their substantial assistance and unstinted support in negotiations with other bodies and businesses.

The Vice Chairman, Gerald Chugg, has been a tower of strength and his contribution to management is most valued. The Club is fortunate also in being able to call on Mr. John D. H. Riches, Hon. Solicitor, and Mr. John Webb, Hon. Architect. The Chairmen of Section Sub-Committees continue to preserve the healthy standards of the Club.

I am grateful to Mr. Kenneth H. George and his staff for their loyalty and enthusiasm despite the dislocation of services through office alterations and changes to computerisation. It would be remiss not to mention Miss Anne Davies, who is now enjoying a well-earned retirement after many years of meritorious service.

Thank you Mrs. Gaynor Parsons and the Bar/Catering staff for their ready co-operation in maintaining the good spirit in the Club.

The Ground Manager, Albert Francis and his ground staff continue their excellent service in preserving the Club's main assets and the condition of the Rugby, Cricket and Hockey Grounds; the tennis Courts and Bowling Greens testify to this, for which we are all truly very grateful.

We are very mindful of the voluntary work performed by Nancy and Eddie John and we thank them for their unstinting and unassuming efforts in the Club shop.

Last but certainly not least, thanks are due to members and players of all sections for preserving the high standards of the Club.

On a more personal note, I am very grateful to the Management Committee for their assistance and support.

Chairman's Report Season 1981/82

In my opening paragraph of last season's report I wrote that I felt I had obtained both "the penny and the bun" as I had been fortunate enough to have achieved both the captaincy and the chairmanship of the Cardiff Rugby Football Club. This year on being re-elected Chairman I suppose I can say that I have had "two bites of the cherry"! In all seriousness I am fully conscious of the unique honour which has been bestowed on me.

Again in last season's report I made reference to the impending tour of Zimbabwe. I am delighted to say that under the enthusiastic management of Malcolm Collins and Mervyn John, ably supported by the acting captain, Gareth Davies, the tour was an outstanding success. All five matches were won and the hospitality was tremendous.

By now all members will be aware that Les Spence, the Athletic Club President, decided to call it a day and retire from the Rugby Committee. He had served the Rugby Club as a player and administrator for 52 years; fortunately his vast experience is still available to us. The committee places vacated by Les and Lynn Williams were filled by two past captains of the Club notably David Hayward and Gary Davies.

Another pre-season resignation, on personal grounds, was that of John Ryan, the senior coach. Although we were sorry to lose John we were fortunate in maintaining continuity through the appointment of Roger Beard and another former Cardiff player Gary Samuel was brought into the coaching team.

An air of expectancy blows through every club as each new season dawns, and we are no exception! Can we retain the Cup? Will we achieve the double of the Western Mail Championship and the Cup? These were some of the questions on everyone's lips. Prior to the season we won the Snelling Sevens tournament beating the guest side Leicester in the final — was this a portent?

Minus our captain John Scott, who unfortunately had had operations to both his ankles, September saw us off to a good start including wins at home over Neath and Bristol and away at Pontypridd. A draw at Coventry was followed by a defeat at home by Aberavon. On reflection, it may have been a blessing in disguise to lose our ground record so soon.

If September had been a hard start to the season with eight matches October saw us playing nine games, six of which were away. Our only defeat was at Pontypool Park where the previous seson we had been beaten ignominously, but our performance this time was much better. Victories at home over Northampton, Bath and — wait for it — Bridgend, were followed by further wins including mid-week away games at Maesteg and Newbridge which pointed to the quality and spirit of the team. By now with only two defeats there was talk of the possibility of the "Double" even though Swansea and Pontypridd possessed outstanding sides and our defence of the Schweppes Cup had yet to begin.

The 6th Wallabies also arrived during October. Although we had not been granted a fixture with them, it was our privilege and pleasure to act as hosts to Sir Nicholas Shehadie and his party at an informal buffet held in the Clubhouse. Whilst appreciating the views of those who arrange tour fixtures, we were extremely disappointed at not playing the Wallabies particularly as our record against Australia is the best in the Home Counties having won all of our previous five encounters.

During the month I was more than delighted to present a cheque on behalf of Cardiff Rugby Football Club for £4,000 to the W.R.U. Charitable Trust. This money was, in the main, raised at the Gala Dinner held in the City Hall last May and was in addition to the £1,000 previously donated by the "Cardiff 1953" side.

Three home games in November saw us register wins over Munster, Oxford University and Ebbw Vale whilst we commenced our defence of the Schweppes Cup with an away win at Barry still without the Club Captain. In his absence, however, his vice captain Gareth Davies was doing a magnificent job. Another away win at Llanelli on November 27th saw us take the lead in the Western Mail Championship — could we hold on?

December saw fixtures become decimated with bad weather. these included our second round Cup game against Glamorgan Wanderers but with the agreement of themselves and Bridgend, who commendably forfeited a plumb date for a home fixture we were able to re-arrange before the end of the month. Our success in this game and against Pontypridd meant we had stretched our number of consecutive wins to 12 — this started the historians delving into past records!

Despite further problems created by the weather we registered four more wins in January. From the result aspect the game at Aberavon under lights was probably the most important but from an overall viewpoint the return of "Scottie" to lead the side against Bective Rangers was the most significant.

The postponed third round Cup game against Ebbw Vale was eventually played at Eugene Cross Park and although we won by 22 pts. to 6 the score somewhat flattered us. Our mid-week re-arranged home fixture against Swansea resulted in a resounding victory with superb support play and handling despite atrocious conditions. The following Saturday we returned to Ebbw Vale and again emerged victorious; I cannot recall another instance whereby we played the same opponents on consecutive Saturdays. Meanwhile the Old Player's Reunion which was a tremendous success took place on Friday, 5th February and again was held in the Top Lounge of the Clubhouse.

Having been drawn away for the first three rounds of the Cup it was a great relief, and a bonus, to be drawn at home for the quarter-final since, if we were fortunate enough to win, both semi-finals and final are played on neutral grounds. The game against Llanelli was hard, but on the day our pack proved itself once again and we won 12 pts. to 3. This was our 20th consecutive win.

The first Saturday in March saw us winning well against London Welsh at Old Deer Park and by another quirk of re-arranged fixtures we played and again beat Llanelli at home on the following Wednesday. Then came one of the finest club matches seen for many years. With Pontypool "hot on our heels" at the top of the Western Mail table we could be forgiven for anticipating a dour game but it turned out quite the opposite. Although the game was vigorous it was exceptionally fluid as the score of 36 pts. to 23 in our favour illustrates. The season was gradually coming to the boil! However, there was one depressing feature—the injury which Terry Holmes sustained against England at Twickenham.

A win against Heriots F.P. saw us ready to face Newbridge in the semi-final at Newport, and what a game that turned out to be with the team coming from 11-10 down to win 21 pts. to 11 pts. One interesting point was that in the previous year's semi-final Terry Lee had scored to clinch the game, whereas this year it was Gwynfor Williams who regained the lead. Two tremendous scrum halves and club men. This win gave us 25 consecutive victories which tied with the record achieved by the 1947-48 and 1885-86 sides, but the creation of a new record was not to be. By now reactions, both physical and mental, particularly after extremely hard matches were creeping in. It was therefore no surprise that we lost to a very strong Swansea side — who had not played for over a week — at St. Helens on the Wednesday following the semi-final.

A narrow win at Bedford and a narrower defeat at Bridgend — our Cup Final opponents — followed. However, on Easter Saturday, coincidental with the return of Terry Holmes the side peaked again. After trailing by 10 pts. to 3 we beat the Barbarians by 36 pts. to 31 in a fast and furious game played under ideal conditions. The news that Swansea had lost to Harlequins was cause for extra celebrations since now we could not be overtaken in the Western Mail table — November 27th, 1981 to 10th April, 1982 had seemed a lifetime!

Two victories over the Harlequins and Neath followed and once again we faced Bridgend at the National Stadium. As expected it was a hard game but even so was fast and most exciting. We made a disastrous start being 9 pts. down after six minutes but the character and determination of the side were not to be denied and by reason of Ian Eidman's well timed only try of the season, the game and the Cup was ours even though the scores were level at 12 pts. each.

Two days later Alun Priday, Roger Beard and John Scott led a tour party to South Africa following an invitation from the Pretoria Harlequins to play in an international club knock-out competition. Additional games were also played against Natal in Durban and a Western Province XV in Cape Town.

As the recent World Invitation touring side discovered the standard of play by the South African sides was particularly high, whilst considerable difficulty was experienced with the refereeing interpretation of laws applying to lines-out, ruck and maul and tackle.

The hospitality and reception by officials and all concerned was tremendous and on our part I have been informed and assured that the players conducted themselves on and off the field in a manner which was a credit to both Welsh and Cardiff rugby.

To Don Davies and his stewards for their cooperation in accepting the reorganisation. To Ted and Nancy John for their untiring efforts with the shop and to Ted in particular for his assistance with schools and touring parties. To Ken Jones and the most loyal and best supporters club in existence and to all members for their support.

Finally, in concluding this somewhat lengthy report—it isn't every year that we complete the "Double" and I feel that each moment should be savoured again — may I once again pay tribute to John Scott and Gareth Davies for their leadership, to the coaches Roger Beard and Gary Samuel for their dedication and to the Cardiff players. Their overall performance this season required some luck, but it really emanated from a blend of experience, character, ability but most of all—club spirit. With such a squad of young players I will be surprised if they do not enjoy their rugby and more success for some years to come.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 1981 SEASON

Although the season saw a marked improvement in the First XI performances, especially in the Western League, the 2nd and 3rd XI's demonstrated that with a little luck they could do well enough to win their Leagues. The Sunday and mid-week sides won most of their games and the Youth XI won the Western League Wilkinson Sword Trophy. The lasting memory of 1981 will be the early season problems with the wicket.

Had there been reasonable weather the attempts to improve the square by relaying part of the wicket would have gone unnoticed, but the torrential rains of March, April and May did not allow the new laid turf to take root, consequently it was mid-June before we played our first home league game.

The 1st XI programme began with three wins at Gloucester and Downend and our first home game at Cardiff against the Optimists. Further victories were recorded against Brislington, Clifton, Midsomer Norton and Stroud, and our game against St. Fagans at Sophia Gardens ended in a tie. Five games were lost and four were cancelled. Many games which would have been drawn before the advent of limited over cricket were won or lost by the narrowest of margins and our position of eighth in the League could well have been higher.

This year our batting was more sound with Paul Good and Chris Elward frequently getting us off to a good start. A number of times opening partnerships of 50 were recorded but the middle order did not always keep the momentum going and too often the tail enders were grafting for runs. When the middle order did back up the openers, as against Brislington and Clifton, over 200 runs were scored. The best knock of the the season was Paul Good's 75 against Midsomer Norton on a rain affected wicket. Paul eventually finished with 323 League runs at an average of 29·36. Chris Elward totalled 272 League runs at an average of 22·67.

At the start of this season our bowling was one of the strongest in the League with Tony Cordle and David Lewis our main bowlers. Peter Morgan, David Cooper and Captain, Howard Slade, Backing them up. We started well against Gloucester who were bowled out for 100 runs, David and Tony getting four wickets each. Unfortunately for David the next three games were rained off and he had difficulty regaining his form unlike Tony who went from strength to strength taking the most wickets by a Cardiff player in the Western League. His figures were 235·3 overs, 57 maidens, 554 runs, 49 wickets at an average of 11·30. As we missed four games he would certainly have beaten the Western League record of 55 wickets in a full season. His line and length were perfect throughout the season, a model for any youngster and I am delighted that he was awarded one of the League's "Player of the Year" awards.

Whereas Tony's line and length were immaculate our other opening bowler Peter Morgan suffered as a result, nevertheless some hostile bowling was seen from him — none better than his opening spell against Malmesbury when he took 3 for 16 including some of the League's better batsmen. He finished the season with 16 wickets at an average of 18-81. I am sure that as

with other players more practice will ensure an improvement on that figure.

Our Cup efforts ended in failure in the early rounds, this was partly because we were not able to play our strongest sides on Sundays but also because we were going into games without any practice on grass wickets or grass nets whilst our opponents had been playing regularly in the early part of the year. We were particularly disappointed to be knocked out of the Welsh Cup by Barry but we look forward to getting our revenge in 1982. There is no reason at all why we could not win the Welsh Cup and emulate our colleagues in both the Rugby and Hockey sections.

The 2nd XI record was similar to the first team, they finished seventh in the League, winning seven and losing six games, four being cancelled. As in previous years they contrived to beat the the best sides but lost to poorer opposition. Captain, Steve Lang and Vice Captain, Gerry Mills, Richard Lewis, Hugh Jones and Wynn Evans all produced match winning scores. The main bowling was done by Gary Hibbert, Steve Price, Ed. Evans, Wynn Evans, Chris Day and John Hogg. All produced excellent performances, the best being against Brislington who were bowled out for only 50 runs.

As well as their League commitments, the 3rd XI played several friendly games all of which were won. Seven League games were cancelled, seven were won, four were lost and our points per game played were higher than the leading team who had played 16 games compared to our 11. Obviously they had a far higher aggregate number of points.

The success of the 3rd team should not, however, be judged only by its League position. The team once again serves as a nursery for the Club and I am very pleased that new younger members received the benefit of the experience of several senior players. I would like to mention particularly J.D.H. Riches, who still takes wickets regularly even though he started to do so 50 years ago, and our Captain, Ramash Patel.

For the second successive season under the captaincy of Tony Edwards the Sunday XI remained unbeaten. Having achieved a tie with a boundary off the last ball of the first match at Panteg, the side went on to record 12 victories and three draws from the remaining fixtures. The main strength of the side was probably the batting. batting first, runs were seldom hard to come by, whilst no run chase was out of our range. Of the batsmen, the highest scorer was Graham Bruce who in his last season with the club scored over 350 runs in 10 innings, passing 40 on five occasions. David Sinclair totalled 323 from 11 innings thanks to a purple patch in August when successive visits to the wicket brought him 102 not out v. Briton Ferry, 69 v. Old Whitonians and 91 v. Maesteg Celtic. Chris Elward (271), Hugh Jones (232) and Ricky Lewis (224) all batted consistently.

The bowling was more of a problem since we were very short of pace for most of the season, missing Chris Day in many matches. In the circumstances, our two main spinners performed admirably, Gary Hibbert achieved 38 wickets from his 139 overs at a cost of 436 runs whilst Mike Cann's 87 overs yielded 17 wickets for 281 runs. Both bowled well when under pressure and never more so than in the final game at Monmouth when they claimed seven wickets in the last seven overs to transform likely defeat into victory. It was also pleasant to see J.D.H. Riches turn in his usual

'performance' achieving five for 21 against Newport Fugitives in his only appearance.

The standard of fixtures continued to improve this year and it was satisfactory to be able to field sides capable of beating both Briton Ferry and Gorseinon on the same day.

Our tour in the Winchester area coincided with the Royal Wedding, both were celebrated with enthusiasm in four scorching days. Two games were drawn, one tied and one lost. Only Stuart Dyke was disappointed when the last game was rained off but he was still seeking his first run on tour.

Mid-week, as well as evening games against local teams, we entertain visiting touring sides. These friendly games provide an opportunity for younger players denied them in League cricket. Throughout the season on Sundays and mid-week these players have tended to form the nucleus of the side and have displayed increasing confidence and maturity.

This was confirmed by the youth section when the under 17 side, captained by Mike Cann, won the Western League Knockout Trophy. It was particularly pleasing to me that the side knocked out both St. Fagans and Newport in the early rounds. In the final at Bristol Imperial, Midsomer Norton were restricted to 98 runs. In reply we lost Hugh Morris, Michael Cann and Andrew Morris for only 10 runs, but Jeff Bretos 49 not out and Huw Roberts 28 saw us through to a six wicket victory. My congratulations to all of the squad. I hope very much that we will be successful in defence of the Trophy in 1982.

Apart from the under 17's, games were arranged for 10 to 15 year olds who attend our Sunday morning nets. The nets which are well attended are run by players. it is important that young members learn the basic skills and in this respect we are indebted to the expertise of Tony Cordle whose coaching should ensure the future success of the cricket section.

Poor facilities for youngsters were in our minds when we introduced the Cardiff Cricket Club Schools Cup. Unfortunately because of the bad weather most of the games had to be played on the all weather wicket and the organisation became a nightmare for our secretary Chris Fookes. With the co-operation of the schools and the help of the ground staff the final was played on the last day of term between Cardiff High and Whitchurch. Whitchurch, who won the cup in the first year and have appeared in every final, won the competition for the second time.

Our other cup competition, the 6-a-side, was sponsored by Manor Brick. Our own team, who had won the Newport Fugitives Competition the previous Sunday, were knocked out by the eventual winners, an invitation side led by Kevin Lyons. Bad weather meant the final had to be played on a later day. I am therefore particualrly grateful to our President Mr. Les Spence, M.B.E., who attended on two occasions before presenting the winners with their trophies. One of the teams taking part represented our colleagues from the Rugby section: at the end of the season we met their First XI in the friendliest of fixtures.

The Cricket Club was represented by the various captains, the youngest and oldest member and players who had gained representative honours during the year. The oldest player J.D.H. Riches starred taking five wickets,

including those of ex-St. Fagans star, Rugby Club Chairman C.D. Williams and present Glamorgan 2nd and Barry player, Peter Goodfellow Jnr. In 1982 the fixture is arranged for 11th September. I hope you will all support it.

The players who won representative honours were Howard Slade, our Captain, who was selected for the senior Wales side, Gary Hibbert for Wales under 19 and Julian Francis Wales under 15's. Chris Elward scored 59 on his debut for Glamorgan 2nd's. Michael Cann and Andrew Morris played for Glamorgan under 16's, Hugh Morris captained England under 19's, Young England Cricketers, M.C.C. under 19 and played for Glamorgan whilst still in our under 17's team.

Generally the standard is high and improving, the quality of the Western League was confirmed when they won at the first attempt the League Cricket Conference Presidents Trophy. We were pleased that on the way to the final they beat the South wales Cricket Associations team and the Durham Senior Cricket League which contained three current Test players. Two of our players, Paul Good and Tony Cordle, were members of the team throughout. Congratulations to them all.

I am pleased to have the opportunity of acknowledging the help given us during the year, the ladies who give up their weekends to prepare and serve our teas receive our grateful thanks, to the scorers Chris Fookes, David Stone and Cathryn Owen, our ever present umpire Gordon Eccles, the speakers at our Dinner Malcolm Nash and Gareth Daniel, fellow members of the Committee and all supporters — many thanks. One group of people held in the highest esteem are the bar staff. I overlooked them last year but I thank them most sincerely for their continued support.

Special mention must be made of the ground staff. We received the fullest co-operation from Albert and Clive in a very difficult year. We were aware that relaying the square might present some difficulties but had no idea that the weather would cause the problems it did. We are assured that the wickets and nets in 1982 will show a marked improvement and the difficulties encountered will in the long run benefit the ground at Sophia Gardens.

I do indeed look forward to the future with the greatest confidence both in the playing strength of the Club and in the conditions and facilities at Sophia Gardens.

Although outside the time covered by this report I would like to record the loss the death of Jack Evans will mean to the Cricket section. Jack was a proud member of Cardiff Athletic Club and a member of the Management, Rugby and Cricket Committees. As a former captain and Chairman of the Cricket section he maintained a close connection with the Club. He put back a great deal into the game and the Club, and he will be greatly missed.

CARDIFF HOCKEY CLUB CHAIRMAN'S REPORT 1982

The main aim of this season has been the European Club Championship Division B Final which we held at Sophia Gardens at Whitsun. This was the most prestigious tournament to be held in Wales and only the second occasion on which such an event had been held in the United Kingdom. we were honoured with the presence of Jurg Schaefer as Technical Delegate, the Chairman of the Championship Committee and the President of the West German Hockey Association. We hope that he enjoyed our hospitality and approved of the manner in which we organised the Tournament. The teams participating were the winners, Rock Gunners from Gibraltar, Slagelse from Denmark, Edinburgh Civil Service of Scotland, AHTC Vien of Austria, Partille from Sweden, Amiens of France, Suboticanka from Yugoslavia, and ourselves.

The Tournament was a considerable success from all viewpoints. On the field we came third, the highest placing ever achieved by a Welsh Club. Even so that was a slight disappointment as we had hoped to be first or second and thus gain promotion to Division A; however, after the opening match, when we lost 0-2 to Amiens, it seemed that even third place would be unattainable. On Saturday we were unlucky to only draw 2-2 against Suboticanka but finished second in our group by beating Partille 4-1. In the play-off against Edinburgh Civil Service we won 2-1 in a tense and exciting match.

Our final position means that having again won the Welsh Cup, and thus qualifying for the European Club Championship next year, we do not have to play in a preliminary Tournament but have automatic entry into Division B, thus saving us several thousand pounds. The goal scorers for Cardiff in the Tournament were Steve Sparkes 4, Colin Grafton 2 and Tim Percival and Howard Williams 1 each.

To all those who trained during the season and those who played at the Tournament, well done.

It is often unfair to mention any one player out of asquad of 16 who in a hard Tournament all did everything that they could for the Club, but on this occasion it would be churlish in the extreme not to pay tribute to Andy Gowman. In the game against Suboticanka he was hit in the face by an opponent's stick but despite his injury he continued playing. After that match he had six stitches in his nose but still played in the two remaining matches, playing brilliantly, doing more than anyone else to achieve victory in each game, and in one dazzling run against Partille created the best goal in the Tournament.

On the social side the highlight of the weekend was the Civic Reception provided by the County of South Glamorgan and Cardiff City Council and attended by Councillor David Evans, Chairman of the County Council, Councillor Philip Dunleavy, Lord Mayor of Cardiff, and other civic dignitaries. Indeed, the essential friendliness and good humour of the Tournament was exemplified by Herr Schaefer joining in the Amiens singsong in the car park after the dinner. The President of the W.H.A., John Cranwell, gave a Cheese and Wine Reception for the officials attending the

Tournament at lunchtime on the Saturday. on the Saturday evening at Sophia Gardens we held a disco and barbeque, and the bar was open throughout the weekend.

The organisation over the weekend itself was also excellent; after a couple of snags early on, which were overcome and we hope forgotten, the Tournament ran very smoothly and all those who helped worked extremely hard. It would be impossible to mention everyone who worked but particular reference should be made to Sean McCarthy who as pitch marshall organised the ball boys and girls, who did extremely well, Mike Faires and Dave Parsons who successfully extracted money at the gate from spectators, Mervyn Greenwood and Denis Moran who ran a café and the disco, and Paul Kelvin-Smith who as the Tournament manger endeavoured to keep to the only two important rules of running an event such as this: the Technical delegate is never wrong, and the Technical Delegate is always right.

To all those who played and helped and worked, thank you. Welsh Hockey, and Cardiff Hockey Club in particular, has been well and truly put on the European Hockey map: next season players will have to train and play just as hard and will need support wherever they play.

Finally, I wish to thank all the others who helped to make the weekend possible and successful: the management Committee, for their support, John Cranwell and Pat Higgins of the W.H.A., for their assistance in bringing the Tournament to Cardiff, Glamorgan County Cricket Club, the Sports Council for Wales for their excellent facilities at the National Sports Centre, and the Cricket Section whose matches during the weekend provided an unexpected but amusing and curious spectacle for the continental teams.

It was difficult to imagine last season's 1st XI results could have been improved but it is a fact. They have won the Welsh Cup, the Premier Division of the South Wales League, the South Wales Indoor League, are in the final of the Welsh Indoor Cup (Sunday, 9th May) and have added a prime trophy in the shape of the Marlborough Carpets League. this against opponents of a high calibre and including two sides — Firebrands and Bristol — who both reached the last eight of the English Championship — needless to say we defeated them both.

Again we were unable to win the Wares Ibrahim Cup losing narrowly to Whitchurch for the second year running. It is worth noting that we have not won that trophy since 1974. But that is beside the point and I congratulate Bryn Williams and all the players who have helped to produce this magnificent set of results.

Perhaps we have been fortunate in that the International scene has been quiet this year but I would like to think that these results are a tribute to the extra fitness gained as a result of the incentive of the Eurocup Tournament. Highlights of the 1st XI season for me were beating Marlborough 4-1, the double over Bristol 3-1 and 5-1, 4-1 against a strong Combined Services Side and the Welsh Cup Final where we powered to a 4-1 win over Whitchurch, our most convincing result against that club for many a season. The team also won the Penarth 6-a-side tournament and produced some very good results in our first visit to the Folkestone International Easter Festival.

The 2nd XI have also enjoyed a splendid season and won their division of the league in handsome manner producing a new league scoring record of 71 goals. Their season included a purple eight days when they beat U.C. Swansea 15-0, to set a club scoring record, Whitchurch 4-2 and U.C. Cardiff 12-2, a total of 31 goals to 4 against in three games, they also scored 9 goals against Swansea, Llanishen and U.C. Swansea in league games.

Unfortunately, U.C. Swansea failed to complete their fixtures and so their results have been removed from the league tables by the League Management Committee so our record will not stand. But this in no way detracts from their feat.

Alas we surrendered the 2nd XI Cup when we lost a poor semi-final 2-1 to Pilkingtons on a redgra pitch in mid-Wales. Terry Jones and his team have played good hockey and also deserve our congratulations for an excellent season.

The 3rd XI again finished second in their league, and again took three points from Whitchurch, the winners, and again gave away points to lesser clubs when they were there for the taking and this despite the fact that the side played with more organisation and direction than it had seen for some time, mainly due to the inclusion of ex-first team midfield players Channi Kaler and Rod McKerlich.

The 4th and 5th XI's have had a particularly poor season as far as results go. Between them they have played fewer games than usual and won fewer matches but they have been used as a proving ground for our younger players, and as such will need considerably more attention next season to ensure better results and environment for those that enjoy their hockey at this level. The redeeming feature being that they do enjoy it.

I and the Committee have been criticised for the amount of effort spent in connection with the European Final to the detriment of the rest of the Club and during the season perhaps the criticism seemed justified, perhaps we did allow our ambition and enthusiasm to dull our judgment. But we saw this event as the opportunity to put Cardiff Hockey Club in the very top echelon of Club Hockey and at the same time put the Club on a firm financial footing. Sadly the latter will not be the case, our fund-raising has not gone as well as we hoped and whilst I was at one time very worried it now seems that we should at least break even.

Lack of attention this year did result in one of our successes last season becoming one of our failures this year, namely, our juniors. Both at Under-14 and Under-16 level we have failed to give the support and guidance to these players that they deserve. Despite valiant efforts by Andy Gowman and Sean McCarthy we have allowed them to fend for themselves and may well reap the harvest that we have sown unless immediate action is taken to put the matter right.

I think that Club discipline has taken a slight turn for the better but there are still far too many players disgracing the Club's colours by being cautioned. I understand that the Umpires Association will be more strict next season and so even greater self control will be necessary to avoid turning a trickle into an avalanche.

Again, our social events have been far too few, and those we have held could have been better supported. The Barbeque was enjoyed by all and particularly the cooks and those who purchased the residue of the food. At the dinner a number of people again just failed to turn up on the night despite confirming their intended attendance. The dinner itself again was a success being embarrassingly illuminated by the chief guest attired in evening dress.

I have been fortunate to preside over a Committee that has remained

virtually unchanged for two years. It has been a good Committee in which each member has contribted his own strengths, done his job well and argued his case with force and conviction. To single out one for particular mention does not imply that the others are any less deserving but I do feel that Terry Jones has done exceedingly well in that he has not only done his own job but also given considerable support to the first team performance as Club Coach and managed the 1st XI at the European Tournament. There must have been times when the pressure was unbearable. To him and all the other captains I offer your thanks.

The secretaries, as usual, have performed quietly and efficiently and also deserve your grateful thanks. So too do the Committee members who have performed the odd jobs I can always find, the Management Committee members who represent your interests in the higher strata of the Athletic Club, the umpires who have nearly worn out their coloured cards, the groundsmen who provide what must be some of the best pitches in Britain, the tea girls, God bless them, to these and anybody I have inadvertently omitted who have helped Cardiff Hockey Club during the year I say please accept our sincere thank you.
