### Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1981

Dear Members,

It is pleasing to report that the Club in 1980/81 has again achieved a welcome surplus of income for the year, due in the main to the success of the Rugby Club. In my report last year I indicated that the financial state of the Club had continued to improve since a loss reported in 1976. This improvement continues and management and members may look with confidence to the future. The developments itemised in the report of last year are still in the programme and it is hoped that a start may be made in the near future on one or two of them.

Management will be considering at an early date the development of the R.F.C. Physiotherapy and Sponsors room which will be partly financed by the funds held in the R.F.C. Centenary Fund.

Other projects will be looked at from time to time and according to the financial resources available management will assess the priorities.

Meanwhile, members will have noted the improvements made in the downstairs toilets and work is still proceeding in the efforts to improve the office accommodation.

Perusal of the financial statement for the year ended 30th April, 1981 will show that we are continuing on a sound basis and I am grateful to the General Secretary, Mr. K. H. George, for the detailed statement which he has supplied to me and from which I have been able to compile this short report.

The new style of accounts adopted by the Auditors is more enlightening and supplies more understandable information to members. Most of the items of expenditure show an overall increase and particular attention is invited to the following items:

Salaries and Wages

Administrative staff show an increase of £4,314. However all of this figure is not increases in salaries but also includes a certain amount of extra help in the office in connection with big matches.

Groundstaff-increase £4,502. The whole of this figure again does not represent increases in salaries of regular staff as extra labour was employed during the year.

During the year we have employed extra personnel on Commissionaire duties in the clubhouse and this has resulted in an extra cost of £1,696.

Upkeep of Grounds and Clubhouse-this item shows the largest

increase of all expenses. However it is difficult to reserve each year for an equal charge in connection with decorating and repairs and, unfortunately, this year has stood the brunt of items of this nature. The decorating and renovation of the ladies downstairs toilets cost approximately £3,600 together with another charge for decorating the Club's stairways and lounge of £2,673. Pavilion roof repairs also cost another £750. More seed, turf and fertiliser etc. was used this year for all areas of the ground and this item cost approximately £1 485

**South African Tour**-the Club and team photographs in connection with this tour have only just been received and, unfortunately, overlooked in the previous year.

**Zimbabwe Tour**-whilst certain items of expenditure have still to be finalised before printing, the estimated figure of £10,000 will only slightly be increased when the actual figures are known.

Players' Out of Pocket Expenses—during this season and particularly in connection with the Cardiff/New Zealand fixture, more training was undertaken and more players were retained initially by the Club due to a heavy injury problem.

**Football Home Match Expenses**-the majority of this increase relates to increased costs for catering and refreshments.

**Football Junior XV Expenses**—the Youth squad had a particularly successful year but they played a vast number of matches. The majority of this increase relates to the hire of coaches for away matches. The extent of fixtures are being looked into very carefully this year.

General rates, water rates, rent, light, heat, telephones and postages—these expenses unfortunately cannot, in the main, be controlled by the Club and in fact show an increase of just under 30% over the year compared with most other items of expenditure showing approximately 12%. Unfortunately during the year we received an extra demand due to revised assessments of £2,916 for the period April 1st, 1979 to September 1980. In addition general rates half yearly have increased to £6,500.

**Football Equipment**–a pleasing reduction this year due to the efforts of the Section in obtaining sponsors for rugby balls and other rugby equipment.

### Income:

Gate receipts—whilst we have achieved an excellent increase this does include £10,000 for winning the W.R.U. Cup and also extra money for semi-finals etc. After deducting this sum and taking into account increases last year on match day admission prices, this income is not as high as that of the previous year.

Mr. Brian Mark, the Rugby Fixture Secretary, must receive special credit for endeavouring to arrange home fixtures under the most trying circumstances. He has warned the Club that with the increased use of the National Stadium in connection with more representative games and Touring sides etc., the Club's traditional home and away fixture dates must now be revised so that matches on both grounds do not clash.

Season Tickets—receipts always tend to increase when the Club has a fixture with the "All Blacks". The Committee was obliged to restrict the sale of season tickets as if this had not been done there would be very few stand seats available on match days.

**Members' Subscriptions**-the increase relates to all types of Membership and in particular ground membership where Members pay an extra charge for reserved parking.

**Investment Income**-substantially higher due to the Club being able to invest all available funds at much higher rates.

Bar takings—to all Members who consider that bar prices are too high, the Auditors' notes attached show quite clearly that although we have achieved an increased "take" of £26,660, after paying expenses related to the bar, and statutory bar wage increases of £4,357, the ulimate increase in profit only amounts to £3,267.

**Profit on shop sales**–I must refer to the additional profit achieved from selling rugby souvenirs in the Club Shop and warmly thank Mr. and Mrs. Eddie John for their "labour of love" in working every day for the benefit of the Club free of charge.

I wish to thank the Management Committee for their support during the year, and particularly I am sure the Management Committee would want me to thank on their behalf the most valued contribution made by Mr. J. D. H. Riches as the Club's Hon. Solicitor and Mr. J. O. Webb, the Club's Hon. Architect. Their assistance in conducting the affairs of the Club through negotiations with the Welsh Rugby Union, Glamorgan County Cricket Committee and the Welsh Water Authority is very much appreciated.

Our gratitude must be expressed also to Mr. K. H. George and his office staff, Mrs. Gaynor Parsons and staff for looking after our refreshment needs, and Mr. Albert Francis and staff for their untiring efforts in maintaining the grounds etc. in good order.

Our congratulations to the Rugby Club on winning the Welsh Rugby Union Cup and also to the Hockey Section on winning the Welsh Hockey Cup. Our best wishes are extended to the Hockey Section who will now represent Wales in the European Club Championship. Good Luck!

Mr. Lynn Williams, who has served the Rugby Club as a player and administrator with distinction for many years has finally decided to "hang up his boots" and we wish Lynn well in his retirement from the Club's administrative affairs.

Another landmark in the Club's history is the retirement of Mr. L. M. Spence, our President, from the administration of the Cardiff Rugby Football Club and it is highly unlikely that anyone, at any time, will surpass the record of Mr. Spence as he has completed more than 50 years as a player and administrator of the Cardiff Rugby Club. Les has now indicated his desire to devote his attention to that of being President of the Club and we wish him well and thank him for the outstanding service to the Cardiff Rugby Club.

### **Obituaries**

At this time each year we record the passing of those Members who have died during the Season and on this occasion it is with great regret that we record the death of three stalwarts of the Club.

### Miss Babs Filer

Babs, as most members will know, was initially appointed as a member of the staff in 1930 and she became well known and respected all over the world as "mine host" of the Club which she loved so well. She retired in 1973 and many were the tributes made to her at the time. It is now sufficient only to record that she leaves behind many friends and memories and we say "Bye Bye Babs and thanks".

### Jim H. Webb

Jim of the Bowls Section, as he was affectionately known, has been a Member since 1950 and he held many positions with the Bowls Section and Members, particularly of the Bowls Section, will mourn his loss.

### Fred P. Davies

As in the other two cases, we could fill pages in tributes to people like Fred Davies and we mourn his loss during the Season. Fred was an outstanding Member of the Tennis Section and the success of that Section can in no small way be attributed to the efforts of Fred during his many years of service.

### CHAIRMAN'S REPORT SEASON 1980/81

One of the greatest honours which can be attained by a Cardiff player is to be elected Club captain; as a Cardiff Committee man the greatest honour is to be Chairman of the Cardiff Rugby Football Club. It was one of the proudest moments of my life when I was elected Chairman for this season and I felt I had attained both "the penny and the bun"!

The season was also the Welsh Rugby Union Centenary Year and part of the celebrations would be the visit of the All Blacks; the challenges were there for all to see. Could the Cardiff team emulate the famous victory of the 1953 Cardiff XV and having just failed to win the Schweppes Challenge Cup in our Centenary Year could we go one better this year? Time would tell and it did; no repeat victory over the men from "Down Under" but "Glory Be!" the Schweppes Cup at last; but more of this later.

The start in September was far from auspicious with three defeats — albeit all away to Bristol, Neath and Aberavon — but what was of greater concern was the immediate lack of key players as a result of injuries. With the first visit of Nice to the Cardiff Arms Park another chapter was written in our "French Connection". It was also our pleasure to welcome at this game the Lord Mayor of Cardiff, Councillor John Edwards, who proved to be a staunch supporter throughout the season.

On behalf of District B of the Welsh Rugby Union it was our privilege and pleasure to host, at a farewell luncheon, overseas delegates to the very successful W.R.U. Conference of Coaches and Referees. Although not all the representatives of the forty six countries present at the conference were at this function, it was even so a unique occasion.

October saw the final build-up to the New Zealand game but because of injuries-at one stage twelve players with first XV experience were undergoing treatment-we were never able to field a settled team. Defeats by Bridgend and Pontypridd, again away and under floodlights, although doing nothing to help our confidence undoubtedly made the side more determined. This became evident in the New Zealand game for although we lost by 16pts. to 9pts. we did, as John Scott pointed out at the after-match dinner, win the second half 3pts. to nil. On the strength of this he suggested that the

'81 side could join the '53 side for the "Sweet Course" at their annual re-union!

During the month it was also the privilege of the Club to entertain the Zimbabwe team and officials who were on tour in England. This was a small gesture of appreciation for the fabulous hospitality which had been extended to us when touring Rhodesia, as it then was, in 1972. As events have turned out it would appear that we are again in debt to our rugby friends from Zimbabwe.

A series of victories followed the game against the All Blacks but again we lost, albeit narrowly, in another away game under floodlights, this time at Moseley. However, the month of November saw us through the First Round of the Schweppes Cup in atrocious conditions at Tonyrefail.

In December the side began to realise its full potential. Seven wins were recorded and amongst our victims were Pontypool, where the second half in particular contained everything good in rugby, and Pontypridd and Newbridge-the latter two in the space of two days. We also defeated British Steel at home in the second round of the Cup and, perhaps even more significantly, Swansea at St. Helens. There was now no doubt that the side was responding to the leadership of John Scott, who was probably playing his best ever rugby.

Even though injuries were still with us it was thought that New Years's Day would see us lay the "Bridgend Bogey" of 12 games at the Arms Park without a win. It was not to be and Steve Fenwick's "Siege Gun" kicking won the day. The third round of the W.R.U. Cup saw Tredegar visiting the Arms Park for the first time but a comfortable win for John Scott's team saw them into the quarter finals. This game was midway through January and although victories were recorded over Moseley, London Welsh and Aberavon, Llanelli avoided our completing the double over them by virtue of a great display by Phil Bennett in what was probably his last game aginst us.

February saw the quarter finals of the Cup and again we were fortunate enough to be drawn at home. Whilst I cannot but agree that we had been favoured with home draws I felt it was only recompense for the injuries which had ravaged the side since the commencement of the season. Our opponents on this occasion were Cross Keys, a club who could boast of having beaten us more times than we had beaten them – nine to eight in fact. After playing somewhat loosely to begin with and trailing by 10pts. to 9pts., we tightened up and eventually won by 22pts. to 10pts.

We drew Swansea in the semi-final but with the weather interfering it looked as if the fates were against us. The game had had to be postponed and because neither side could agree on a mutually convenient date the Welsh Rugby Union had decided that we had to play mid-week, under floodlights and obviously away from home! To offset this our record against Swansea was good and we had been allocated the home dressing room! Came the night and inspired by the captain the side gave a masterly display under atrocious conditions with Terry Lee reaching a pinnacle of a performance. The encouragement given by our supporters was superb and I only wish the chant of "Cardiff, Cardiff" could be heard more often; I can assure all and sundry that the players appreciated it.


A draw at Newport, a handsome win against Bedford and an almost injury-free side. Came "The Day" and although the game was not the classic that it was expected to be there was no doubt that our tight, workmanlike approach created frustration in the Bridgend ranks with resultant errors. Even so Neil Hutchings scored a glorious try and the build-up to it was superb. At times one could be forgiven for thinking that the "Bridgend Hoodoo" was still with us-even though we had drawn the away dressing room!-but the final score, 14pts. to 6pts., two tries to nil, was a fair reflection of our superiority.

There is no doubt that we will win the Cup again but the first time is always the best and April 11th, 1981 will be remembered as a great day in our history. Well done John Scott and your boys, particularly Robert Lakin who was voted "Man of the Match" by the Welsh Sportswriters Association, although with so many playing well it must have been a close decision.

One week later saw the side reach the heights again and, in an entirely different type of game, defeat the Barbarians by 45pts. to 19pts. Unfortunately the season was not over; because of the W.R.U. Presidents XV versus Wales game the Cup Final, normally played on the last Saturday of the season, had been brought forward and we still had to play postponed matches. These proved to be a disaster particularly at Pontypool.

The Old Players' Re-union did not take place until Friday, 24th April. The attendance was tremendous and that it was an unqualified success and well worth waiting for was in no small measure due to the fact that it was held in the top lounge of the Clubhouse.

The season with its few disappointments and many successes culminated in the holding of a Gala Dinner at the City Hall. The

object was to raise money for the W.R.U. Charitable Trust Fund and what a fitting climax it proved, not only socially but also financially. As far as I can ascertain ladies were invited for only the second time in 104 years; they, the Athletic Club Choir and the St. Albans Band made it a night to remember, as did our guest speakers John Young and Gareth Daniel.

May I take this opportunity to thank all Committee men for the loyalty and support which they gave throughout the season and although it would be invidious of me to mention individuals I feel I must pay special tribute to our Hon. Secretary Alun Priday; I cannot express adequately the debt I owe to them all. To Lynn Williams who has decided to "hang up his boots" after a marvellous forty five years of service as player and committee man, a happy retirement!

My grateful thanks to Messrs. Ken George, Albert Francis and their staff; also to Mrs. Gaynor Parsons and her staff. To Mr. Harold Richards, the Club doctors, the Club physiotherapists and masseurs my thanks for not only helping to keep the players fit but also for restoring them to fitness after a season in which we surely suffered more serious injuries than at any other time. Although I referred to our supporters earlier may I now thank the best and most loval Supporters Club in existence and in particular Ted John and his cohorts: to the St. Alban's Band and their conductor John Williams our sincere thanks.



### **CARDIFF YOUTH XV SEASON 1980/81**

On 28th March, 1981 at Neath, Cardiff Youth were beaten by Neath Youth 13pts. to 10. Most people will ask why on earth the annual report should begin with a particular result. I will explain immediately by stating the fact that previous to this game Cardiff Youth had chalked up 82 consecutive victories stretching back to season 1978-79. A remarkable record in anybody's book.

In 1979-80 season I had the pleasure of being associated with a squad that proved to be genuine Cambridge blue and black both on and off the field. With seven Welsh Youth internationals in their ranks they broke all sorts of records on their way to a memorable season of 40 victories.

In 1980-81 season almost a new squad of players had the unenviable task of "following that". Our only international cap of the season was Mark Ring, our popular captain. A prolific points scorer, he accounted for 13 tries, 6 drop goals, 36 penalties and 88 conversions, a total of 354 points. Mark was the spearhead of a good all-round team and indeed looks very much like a senior Wales outside-half of the future. Without the individual brilliance of the 1979-80 squad his team demonstrated just how important team spirit is. With good coaching and the atmosphere of being a Cardiff Club

player in close second the ingredients of another successful season became evident.

Of the 45 games played-certainly too many at any level-only one was lost. Neath were successful on that day; they overcame a Cardiff Youth side that were reluctant to their eternal credit to resort to similar "over vigorous" tactics as the Neath side-but I am better qualified than to complain.

During the season ex-Cardiff Youth captain Anthony Bartlett, who enjoyed early success, Joseph Souto, Phil Ford and Kevin Trevett all played in senior Cardiff XVs out of the Cardiff Youth fraternity of 1979-80, a good omen. I mention especially prop Alan Edwards and back row forward Howard Stone of the same vintage as having the potential to make their mark in no uncertain fashion next season.

My thanks to Jim O'Donnell, Don Reed and faithful followers for their help and support throughout the season. To stewardess Gaynor Parsons a special thank you and appreciation to Kathy, Vicky and Miss Ann Davies at the office.

Finally may I personally congratulate our coach Peter Davies on

another highly successful season. Surely one defeat in 93 games is something for all of us to think about.

### CARDIFF CRICKET CLUB

### **ANNUAL REPORT 1980**

The marked improvement in Club fixtures during 1979 continued throughout 1980 for the Section as a whole, despite the disappointing results of the First XI.

Several difficulties arose during the year and, although they seem very distant now, they should certainly be recorded. The flooding, which took place at the end of 1979, delayed the relaying of the cricket square and prevented us from using the indoor nets at the Sports Centre. When the season finally got under way we were restricted in the use of the square as a direct result of the flooding.

The First XI under new Captain, Howard Slade, began the year with an emphatic 8 wicket victory over Newport in what is euphemistically called a friendly. Unfortunately at this stage of the season we lost the services of John Solanky who was offered a coaching position in Northern Ireland. One newcomer, South African Dudley Palmer, went North for most of the season in order to play in Lancashire League cricket. Furthermore, David Lewis, our last year's captain, was unable to play because of injury and later, business commitments.

We lost to Gorseinon in the Haig Competition in a closely contested game, Cardiff scoring 199 for 5 and Gorseinon reaching our score with only a few balls remaining. The highlight of this game, as far as Cardiff was concerned, was an 85 by Howard Slade which must have been noted by the Welsh Selectors as he was selected for the Welsh team during the season. In the Welsh Cup we beat Senghenydd quite easily, Chris Day taking 7 wickets for 10 runs in his 8 overs. We beat Bridgend, last year's runners-up, thanks to a team effort but Graham Bruce should be mentioned for his knock of 63: unfortunately, we lost the next game to St. Fagans in a match restricted by rain on a slower scoring rate. This was despite the fact that we were ahead of St. Fagans at a similar stage in their innings.

Later in the year in the Western League we convincingly beat St. Fagans, even though they had in their ranks former Cardiff player A. E. Cordle. During the year several players performed notably, once again Paul Good topped the Batting averages with 22-6 and vice-captain David Cooper topped the bowling averages with 25 wickets at 18-76.

The Second XI, also under a new Captain, S. P. Lang, started off with a string of victories against some of the better sides in the League and were leading the table for some time. Notable performances were by Martin Warren, 70 against Westbury, and Richard Lewis helped us beat Keynsham with 75. Paul Good and Kevin Hibbert both scored 65 against Chippenham and, at Brislington, Steven Lang reached 100. The leading wicket taker was Chris Day with 24 including 8 for 76 against Chippenham; he was backed up by Gary Hibbert and E. Evans, both taking 19, and Steve Price with 12.

The side finally finished sixth in the League. This is quite an achievement for a side which contains many young players. Certainly if the side continues to learn from experience and mature, there is every reason to expect a further improvement in the next few years.

The Third XI also did well in their division of the Morgannwg League. Duties of captaincy were shared between J. D. H. Riches, R. Patel and G. Stone. The success of the side is somewhat secondary as the team is used mainly as a blooding ground for young players. This year Huw Owen, Jock Day, Michael Cann and Hugh Roberts all performed with distinction. If the strongest side had been picked each week the Thirds could have finished top of their League but the policy of introducing new players inevitably meant that the strongest side was not always put into the field. Even so, they finished in third position in the League, which is commendable, especially as the side had the satisfaction of beating the leading clubs in the League.

Perhaps those players who play on Sundays are able to get the most enjoyment out of the game. They are not involved in the restricted over cricket of Cup and League. During the year there were plenty of exciting finishes, there was only one defeat and that was at the hands of Maesteg Crusaders, one of the weaker opponents. Perhaps the closest game was against Barclays Bank who were chasing 177 for victory and their number 11 batsman came to the wicket with one ball to go needing 5 runs to win. Despite some unorthodox fielding their attempts to run 5 to win were dashed during the third run.

We had our closest fixture to date against the South Wales Hunts. Cardiff totalled 216 for 4 declared and our opponents ended on 198 for 9. J. D. H. Riches, appearing for the Hunts, proved his usual "dogged" self and thwarted his club mates.

We enjoyed the luxury of a double over Briton Ferry. The Cardiff match was particularly notable, a century by Peter Crowther in Briton Ferry's 171 for 5 was bettered in Cardiff's innings which was dominated by Graham Bruce. He scored 105 not out in our reply of 172 for 3 off only 33 overs.

A double was also achieved against Cardiff High School Old Boys, P. Morgan taking 5 wickets for 21. He also took 7 for 22 in 11 overs against Llantwit Fardre.

Our highest score of the season was against Barry, where we reached 255 for 4 off 45 overs (Chris Elwood 135 not out). Later in the season we gained revenge against Maesteg Crusaders by recording an 8 wicket victory at their ground.

We were not as lucky in our second visit to Maesteg to play the Celtic team. They scored 184 for 6 off 50 overs, leaving us only 40 overs to score the runs. We finished 12 short with two wickets left in a most exciting game.

Perhaps the outstanding performance of the season was against the Lisvane side when we scored a meagre 116 runs but Lisvane were bowled out for 27. John Riches returned the remarkable figures of 6 wickets for only 11 runs.

Sunday games are particularly important in that they give players the opportunity of performing under less pressure than on Saturdays and it gives the occasional bowlers the opportunity of long spells, something not possible in limited over cricket.

Similar cricket is of course played on our Club tour. This year was our fifth in the Hampshire area and once again we were favoured with fine weather,

all five matches being played with 2 wins, 2 draws and 1 defeat. We lost our first match at Corsham but the second game at Hambledon, although ending in a draw, was very much in Cardiff's favour. Games at Portsdown (Tim Littlewood 82) and St. Cross were won by 5 and 4 wickets respectively. Against Alton we hung on to draw.

Once again the tour was based on the Westgate Hotel in Winchester and we now look forward to returning there in the summer of 1981.

Our Youth Section again did us proud and although we were not able to retain the Under 18 Western League Trophy, our Under 15's performed admirably in winning the Youth Competition at Newport. Hugh Roberts, who captained the side, and Michael Cann both showed considerable maturity in their batting, particularly in the game against St. Fagans when Michael Cann scored 152.

I should like to thank R. Patel and G. Hibbert for looking after the Youth teams at this event and R. Patel for his organising of the Sunday morning Youth nets and the Schools Competition.

The finalists in the Schools Competition, the Dan Herbert Cup, were once again Whitchurch and Llanishen. Llanishen, captained by Gary Hibbert, retained the trophy.

In addition to the league and cup commitments, we have several midweek fixtures, unfortunately the weather took its toll of these but I should like to thank our Secretary, Chris Fookes, for the wide and varied fixtures arranged for all teams.

At the end of June the Club was successful at the Newport Fugitive Six-a-Side Competition but unfortunately the following week at our own Six-a-Side, sponsored this year by the Cheltenham & Gloucester Building Society, we were eliminated at an early stage. The winners were Cefn Fforest and we are pleased to offer them our congratulations. I should particularly like to thank Ian Holmes and Richard Napier for working so hard in making the event the success it was. Thanks to all members for their support and to our President, Mr. Les Spence, who presented the various trophies. An extra special thanks to our ladies for providing us with refreshments throughout the day.

In 1981 a slightly different format is envisaged, when all teams will have the opportunity of playing more than one game. This will mean that the members of the rugby section will have the opportunity of gaining experience ready for our fixture against them later in the season.

We were pleased the rugby section put out a side on September 7th last year-we thoroughly enjoyed the day and I hope that this will now become an annual event. A further fixture has been arranged this year for September.

The first event of the year was our Dinner. Vic Marks of Somerset was our main speaker with David Yendol who also spoke later in the year with Alec Bedser and John Dawes at a dinner arranged to boost the funds for Alan Jones Testimonial. Both dinners were most successful.

I am pleased to have the opportunity of formally thanking all who have supported us during the year particularly Gordon Eccles who regularly turns out to umpire our Second XI, Sunday XI, Youth games and mid-week

games, also all the other scorers and umpires. Special thanks must also go to Albert Francis and his ground staff, who despite very difficult circumstances have provided us with improving facilities that are certainly better than any club in South Wales. Our appreciative thanks must go to the ladies who help us raise money and who give up their weekends to help prepare our teas. We are most grateful to all of them and appreciate so very much the efforts they put in to give us excellent teas at a very modest cost.

Finally, a word of thanks to the Management Committee for their support in regularly opening the bar at Sophia Gardens, I am sure that given time this will develop in the summer months and I look forward to seeing all members giving it their full support in the 1981 season.

It was a great pleasure to congratulate the 1st XI on a truly marvellous season in which they won the Welsh Cup, the Premier League, the Indoor League, have reached the Final of the Indoor Cup (yet to be played) and have only a slight hiccup in the Wares Nibrahim Cup when a 0-1 defeat cost the

Club the maximum possible number of Welsh trophies. These results are due to the number of players in the 1st XI squad and to firm selection policies rigorously applied without fear or favour; on one occasion Howie Williams was a substitute! Regular training on the astro turf also helped a great deal, but undoubtedly the leading factor was the captaincy of Bryn Williams who, even though he did not play a lot, provided guidance and leadership to the squad. It is important to emphasise the squad, since six 1st XI players missed most of the League games as a result of their participation in International matches and training weekends.

The strength in depth of the Club is emphasised by the excellent season also enjoyed by the 2nd XI. Tribute must be paid to the work that Terry Jones has done in not only running the 2nd XI but also helping out with the 1st XI. The 2nd XI won their Cup and finished second in the League. It was most unfortunate that the only two matches which the 2nd XI lost were in the League, on each occasion by only 0-1. It is ironic that despite scoring so many goals in the season they lost the 2nd XI league by virtue of scoring 3 goals too few.

The 3rd XI also finished second in their League; they took three points from the League winners, but gave away three points each to Newport and Cwmbran, who finished well down.

One of the highlights of the season has been the Under-14 mini-hockey team. This started in September with a tournament on the astro turf pitch when we lost in the semi-final to Swansea, the winners of the tournament. The level of skill and understanding of the team has steadily improved ever since and in May they reached the final of the Welsh Mini-Cup which was held at Aberystwyth. Besides all this, they have been strong enough to prop up the lower XI's during the season. Our thanks must go to Shri Sharma for the hard work that he has put in in coaching and encouraging the youngsters; a number of future 1st XI players are likely to come from these boys.

Also of note during the season was our changing shirts at the beginning of January. We did, of course, retain the same colours but the new shirts are made of a much lighter and more modern material. With only one or two exceptions, the new shirts have been welcomed throughout the Club.

Unfortunately, there have also been a number of disturbing factors to the season.

First, the state of discipline within the Club-the number of cautions, sending-offs, retaliation, vicious tackles and comments about and to umpires-is unacceptable. To my mind we reached the depths of bad behaviour when a member of the opposition complained to me that he had just played in the worst game of hockey ever. It is easy to get a bad name; it is difficult to live it down. Next season action will be taken against anybody who lets down the name of Cardiff Hockey Club.

The other disturbing factor is the lack of social activities. After producing a programme of events we failed to deliver the goods. For this I apologise.

We did have a successful cheese and wine evening at Jacksons when we honoured the long playing career of Mervyn Griffiths. The dinner was again very successful but not as well attended as it might have been. Two poor promotions were the "conker night" and the "skittles evening". The "dance" just did not materialise. We will endeavour to do better next year.

When I took the chair the outgoing Chairman, Rod McKerlich, commented on the Committee that had been elected and said that with that Committee I would have a good year. How true that was; each member of the Committee has performed his function so well that there have been few crises. Each individual has sorted out any problems as they have seen them arise. We changed the selection system, doing away with Monday night meetings and the new system did falter a little until Mike Faires took on the 4th XI and sorted out the selection. To him and all the captains-Bryn Williams, Terry Jones, Mervyn Greenwood and Dave Parsons-who carried the brunt of the work I say thank you for a job well done.

To the Secretaries-Paul Kelvin-Smith, Channi Kaler, Sean McCarthy and Ed Cooper-who have each done their jobs efficiently I also offer the Club's thanks. I am happy to report that telephone calls from Sean to myself have gradually reduced from two a day at the start of the season to less than one a week now as he has learnt the job and learnt to make his own decisions.

To the "keeper of the tin", Rod McKerlich, I say thank you. Rod's job is so important to the smooth running of the Club and besides handling £1,000 odd he has to chase captains for money, organise the food and girls for the teas and generally prompt me. All these tasks he has performed with his usual precise efficiency. Perhaps he will also accept on behalf of the girls who served the tea and now, thank goodness, do the washing up, namely Sally Kear, Sean, Stephen, and the others.

Finally, I wish to thank the people who are really appreciated.

The umpires, without whom we cannot play; they are always available, always abused and frequently shunned-please accept our grateful thanks.

The groundsmen, whose work is taken for granted and yet plays so important a part in our game-our thanks.

I conclude by saying that I understand the slitting work at Sophia Gardens appears to be successful and we hope not to see so many lakes next season.
