Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1980

Dear Members,

Last year's report contained the sad news about the death on 5th June 1979 of our esteemed President, Hubert Johnson, and I am particularly happy to report that his memory will be perpetuated by the Management Committee's approval to rename the Trophy Room as the "Hubert Johnson Room". In a moving ceremony at the Club on Sunday morning, 16th December 1979, I was privileged to assist the new President, L. M. Spence Esq., MBE, and Mrs Grace Davies, in a well-attended and emotional function to open the newly named "Hubert Johnson Room". I make no apologies for repeating the tribute to Hubert by the Club's Golfing Society (Hon. Sec. Elfed Davies) last year—

A man who loved his fellow man:

A man who admired sportsmen of all creeds:

A man who had an unquenchable love of the game of Rugby Football, but more importantly,

A man who through his immense personality, his integrity and humility and above all his undivided interest in the affairs of the Cardiff Athletic Club, will always remain a memory to be treasured. It was a privilege to have known him.

Thank you Hubert—may the spirit you engendered always prevail in our Club.

On Thursday, 28th September 1979, at the Annual General Meeting, Mr Leslie Spence MBE was appointed President of the Club.

The popular, well-known, ubiquitous new President has given a life-time of service to the Club which he loves, and of which he is so very proud, and as one of the most senior members he richly deserves the Club's highest honour. We all wish him well.

Perusal of the Club's financial statement for the year ended 30th April 1980 will show that we are continuing on a sound basis, and I am grateful to the General Secretary, Mr K. H.

George for the detailed statement which he has supplied to me and which reproduced, gives the following information—

"The financial results for the year ended the 30th April, 1980, are more or less as expected, with increases in revenue being absorbed by extra costs. Two extra items of expense were incurred this year viz:—The rugby tour to South Africa and loan interest of finances provided by Brewers for the extension to the Bottom Lounge and without which the surplus of Income over Expenditure would compare favourably with the previous year.

The accounts this year have been presented in a manner quite different from previous years and, in company with the Statement of Source and Application of Funds, it is considered that they portray the Club's financial affairs in a light more readily understood by the majority of Members. I think it is superfluous to report on all the increases this year, of all types of expenses, as this is quite clearly shown in the figures produced and are due to inflation. I refer only to a few items which show increases more than normal.

The largest inevitable increase is in wages as follows:—

Bar Staff wages increased by £5,010 and is included in Note 1 to the Accounts.

R.F.C. Home Matches. (Increase £4,230)

Hotel expenses and refreshments for the Canadian Touring Party amounted to nearly £2,000. Catering charges have increased by £2,086 and the balance refers to incidental expenses such as printing of match tickets etc.

Football Away Match Expenses. (Increase £1,388)

This is only part of the heavy increase in hotel expenses and coaches but, due to the excellent achievement of the "Rags"

Centenary Ladies Committee who raised funds to the extent of £2,600 to offset costs of the "Rags" tour to Scotland, this has been kept to a minimum.

Junior XV Expenses. (Increase £1,752)

The Youth enjoyed a wonderful season, seven players were chosen for the Welsh Youth Side which toured South Africa. All Clubs paid for their players' badges and blazers and this amounted to £245 and in addition the Rugby Committee recognised the honour in these selections by supplying track suits which cost £236. Coach charges increased by £569 and hotel meals etc. by £702.

General Rates. (Increase £,855)

Due, in the main, to the half yearly increases in rates from £4,192 to £4,584.

Light and Heating. (Increase £6,495)

Electricity and gas increased by £1,043. Electricity at Sophia Gardens increased by £1,216 and heating oil by £4,236. It has been decided to convert the central heating from oil to gas and this, no doubt, will be completed just prior to the date of this Meeting. It is to be hoped that this has been a wise decision.

Dinners, Functions, Photographs and Awards. (Increase £1,994)

Extra cost involved related to the opening of the new Hubert Johnson Room, with refreshments etc., costing £468. Team photographs cost £694 this year as this included more than one season. Presentations were made to the Club's four representatives on the Lions Tour of South Africa, costing £207. General increases of buffets, dinners and the childrens' Christmas Party amounted to £625.

Once again special thanks should be registered to the "Rags" Centenary Ladies Committee for raising the sum of £564 to provide special blazers to commemorate the "Rags" unbeaten record in the previous season and also to offset costs of the "Rags" Centenary Reunion.

Football Equipment. (Increase £2,270)

Unfortunately costs of all sporting equipment are rising rapidly and the rugby strip this year costs anything up to £10

more than the previous year. In addition in the two previous years all rugby balls had been sponsored.

Income.

Details of increases are as follows:-

Football Match Day.

Stand prices were increased by 50p and the Enclosures by 20p with corresponding reductions for O.A.P. and Juniors.

Season ticket.

Prices were increased by £4 for the Stand and £3 for the Enclosures and once again reductions for Juniors and O.A.P.

Club Subscriptions.

Were increased this year by £5.56 which included V.A.T.

Ground Membership.

Subscriptions were also increased by £6 for Members of the Athletic Club and £10 for Members who had not yet joined other Sections.

Broadcasting Fees.

Are governed by the Welsh Rugby Union and the Club's share is dependant on the number of Cardiff games televised etc.

Bar Profits.

These are already analysed under Note I attached to the accounts. Those Members who always oppose increases in bar prices should note the present heavy costs of bar wages and equipment, renewals etc.

Ground Earnings.

Of the £5,694 increase, £1000 relates to the increased rental at Sophia Gardens paid by Glamorgan County Cricket Club and the balance represents increased revenue this year from advertising around the Rugby Ground.

Although the Club's accounts show a reasonable profit after a year of heavy inflation, what is more important is that we are not achieving sufficient income to provide for the many items of capital expenditure which Committees, of all Sections, consider necessary for the well being of their Members.

It should be noted that during the six years ended 30th April, 1980, capital expenditure on development of the Clubhouse, Bowls Pavilion, Tennis Courts, plant, fixtures and grounds, has amounted to £134,417 and yet, in the same period, the total surplus of income over expenditure amounts to only £49,911. The financial affairs of the Club have steadily improved since a loss was sustained in 1976 and, thanks to the Finance Committee, this position should be maintained. I would, however, like to stress again that it is imperative that we now seek means, along any avenue, to increase income so that funds can be provided for development which will bring in future income. Such development is already being discussed by the Management Committee and certain priorities must now be maintained. I therefore hope that all Members will be patient should there be a delay in providing facilities which they consider necessary."

As indicated earlier we are continuing on a sound financial basis and by prudent housekeeping there is no reason to believe other than the Club will continue in a healthy state. You will know from previous reports, however, that the Planning and Project Sub Committee have recommended to the Management Committee certain developments in the Club designed to consolidate and improve on the facilities and activities for members. The Management Committee have agreed in principle that we should be looking at an expansive programme to include—

- (a) the development of tennis room accomodation and machine shed for Sophia Gardens
- (b) extension of the Cardiff RFC Stand accomodation
- (c) extension of the Bowls Pavilion, Cardiff Arms Park
- (d) accomodation for sponsors, Cardiff Arms Park
- (e) building of squash courts

These are not necessarily in priority order, but it illustrates to members that the Management Committee is very conscious of the need for further development to increase the activities and the income of the Club. Meanwhile, arrangements have been made for the modernisation and improvement of the female and male toilets on the ground floor, and attention is being given to the heating and ventilation of the office accommodation. The ideal situation would be for all these developments to be tackled simultaneously, but I need hardly point out to you that within the

constraints of financial resources, the Management Committee from time to time will have to adjudge the priorities.

At this juncture, it is prudent to point out that the increasing demand on the Club's financial resources inhibits any substantial contribution to the envisaged growth of its facilities, and it behoves Management and Sections to investigate fund raising schemes. In this context the activities of the Rugby Section are most commendable, when one considers that during their Centenary Season enough funds were made to finance an overseas tour to Canada and to provide a balance which the Management Committee has agreed should be earmarked to the Rugby Club's use.

Again, in the Cardiff RFC 'Rags' Centenary Season, sufficient funds were raised to finance a 'Rags' tour to Scotland, to pay for the Centenary celebrations, and from the balance remaining to provide a most acceptable clock in the member's lounge.

Thank you, Muriel Williams and your ladies committee not only for raising the funds but also for providing very much needed entertainment in the Club in the form of an enjoyable 'Wild West' night, and a Punch and Paté evening. In the same spirit I would like to thank the Cardiff RFC Supporters Club for the efforts they continually make to offer entertainment in the Club. The Club's facilities are there to be enjoyed. The more they are used, the better for the Club and for the spirit of the members. Incidentally, in the evenings during the summer months members can enjoy a drink in the Club's Bar at Sophia Gardens.

A Chairman's Report would not be complete without the usual expression of gratitude to all those who have helped in my year of office. Whilst this may seem routine, it is nevertheless sincere, and my thanks go to—

The President and Trustees for their counselling.

The Vice Chairman, Gerald Chugg for his guidance, assistance and support.

The Chairman of Standing Sub Committees for their support and assistance in streamlining the management task.

The Chairman of Section Sub Committees for their efforts to preserve the healthy standards in the club.

The General Secretary, K. H. George and staff for their loyalty and dedication to their tasks.

Mrs Gaynor Parsons and the Bar/Catering staff for their ready co-operation in maintaining the bonhommie and conviviality.

The Ground Manager, Albert Francis, and the ground staff for their untiring and successful efforts in preserving the Club's main assets, the playing areas (despite the floods of December 1979 and the substantial remedial work on the wickets for County Cricket matches).

Eddie and Nancy John for their hard-working diligent and unassuming efforts in the Club's shop.

The members of the Club for helping to make the task of management such a pleasant one,

and last, but not least

The players of the various sections for preserving the traditional high standards.



Ground maintenance equipment, furniture, fittings and office equipment are included in the accounts at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is calculated so that ground maintenance equipment, furniture, fittings and office furniture are written off by equal annual instalments over their estimated useful lives at the following rates:

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT SEASON 1979/80


To be appointed Chairman of Cardiff Rugby Football Club must be the ultimate honour in the game after 21 years involvement with Cardiff. Last June I experienced the same feeling of pride and distinction that I did in September, 1958 wearing the Blue and Black jersey for the first time. This pride has increased game by game and year by year. I accepted the Chairmanship with some feeling of trepidation, but these fears were completely unfounded. It soon became apparent that everyone's aim was to make my task as enjoyable and successful as possible — thank you all.

Training commenced earlier than usual this year due to the South African Tour scheduled for August. Our Tour Management, Brian Mark and Lloyd Williams, led the party with new captain Gareth Davies and coach John Ryan. We had accepted a strong provincial fixture list but with hard work, commitment and dedication the tour proved to be an outstanding success both on and off the field and a record of fixtures and results reads as follows —

Against Western Province — one of the strongest sides in South Africa, we were well and truly beaten by a superior side. The other game lost was against Northern Natal — a game that we let slip rather than them winning — an occurrence to be repeated later in the season. I'm sure that the Lions Tour of 1980 will put into perspective our success in South Africa.

One of our stipulations before the tour was that we play a full multi-racial fixture. This game against Northern Natal at Newcastle made history in the area and was welcomed by the officials who were anxious to play more of these fixtures. Perhaps Cardiff R.F.C. have opened a little wider the door to multi-racial

sport in South Africa. An excellent Press was received both on and off the field and it was generally felt that the standards and traditions of Welsh Rugby had been upheld by the Cardiff Rugby Club.

Our domestic season opened on September 1st against East District with a 66-8 win. Throughout the month we played attacking, attractive rugby and our only reversal was at Coventry 15-16. Especially pleasing was our fine win over Canada 19-8. At the end of the month we had amassed 243 points for and 74 against.

Wednesday, October 3rd arrived and with it Bridgend — and in keeping with recent previous seasons we lost at home 9-17. Who can explain it or know the reason why? A very pleasing result was our away win at Pontypridd 13-10 a result which raised our game to give results over Northampton 45-4, Newport 21-12 and Cambridge University 27-12. Another Wednesday fixture under lights at Pontypool Park gave "Prosser's Boyo's" a resounding 28-10 win. Closing the month a strong Selected XV played at the Arms Park for the Don Pill Memorial Fund and although losing 15-27 the only result that mattered was the financial benefit to Don's wife and children — a fitting tribute to a fine sportsman whose work with the Cardiff Youth and Cardiff Committee will always be remembered.

Cardiff became "World Champions" in Cork on November 3rd beating Munster 15-13 — the previous season's conquerors of the All Blacks. The commitment of our W.R.U. Cup programme began with a first round draw at home to Waunarlwydd. They enjoyed the experience of playing at Cardiff as did Wrexham in the next round. We lost 14-18 at Stradey Park, but probably the outstanding game of 1979 was our much awaited game with Swansea — Cup favourites and front runners for the Western Mail Championship. We won well 21-17, the game being voted by the Press and supporters alike as the match of the season. Yet another Wednesday evening and another defeat at the hands of Maesteg 13-19. We closed 1979 with victories over London Welsh 50-12, Aberavon 36-8, Pontypridd 19-3 and Coventry 33-13. To date our playing record was Played 28, Won 21, Drawn 1, Lost 6.

January, 1980 provided success and defeat — recording victories over Bath and Moseley two of the most attractive English teams but we were knocked out of the W.R.U. Cup by Pontypridd 6-13. Their success must first and foremost belong

to Tommy David whose inspired leadership by personal example and dedication to Ponty's rugby led to our downfall — a dedication we must strive to emulate. The game at Aberavon was a tribute to Rugby Football — although losing 22-29 it was probably the most attractive game of the season.

February was our only completely successful month with five good wins over Ebbw Vale, Bristol, London Welsh, Heriots F.P. and Wasps — many thanks for their willingness to fill in at short notice. This month our new floodlighting system was switched on, which I know will be appreciated by players, supporters and Television Cameras.

March was a disaster, we lost to a strong San Isidro side 10-16, Pontypridd 4-10 and Bridgend 3-4 — by a Steve Fenwick try in extra time. Obviously, without our Welsh halfbacks, Cardiff's rugby was lacking somewhat.

The final month of the season appeared to sum up the whole campaign — very good in parts, disappointing in others. The Barbarians convincingly beat us 15-32 but we completed our Easter programme with a 26-18 victory over Harlequins. To defeat Swansea at St. Helen's is an achievement. Our 15-6 win was some consolation for several lack-lustre preformances. Defeat at Neath 19-25 completed our away fixtures, but who could possibly have imagined such a grandstand finish at the Arms Park, in defeating Llanelli 45-12 we scored nine sparkling tries and the final one by Derek Preece on time, gave the Cardiff XV a record points tally of 1,090 for the season — we put it together in the end!

Home International Honours were gained by Gareth, Terry, Alan and Stuart together with our English No. 8 and Vice-Captain John Scott — surely the most unfortunate not to be in South Africa.



CARDIFF R.F.C. YOUTH: SEASON 1979/80

The Cardiff Youth squad under the astute leadership of skipper Anthony Bartlett and coach Peter Davies wrote their names into the record books at the Arms Park when they beat St. Peters Youth 32-0 in the 40th and final game of the season on 22nd April, 1980.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

I welcome the opportunity of reporting to Members those club activities not covered by the Captain's reports.

Pride of place this year must go to our Youth XI who in the first year, won the "Western Cricket League Youth Competition". The magnificent trophy, presented to the League by Wilkinson Sword will be displayed at Sophia Gardens during the coming year. Several of them have already established themselves in the Club's Senior XI's, although the success was very much a team effort, the final against Stroud at Cheltenham will be remembered particularly for some fine batting by Hugh Morris, Hugh Jones, Huw Owen and Neil Slatter and excellent bowling by Gary Hibbert and Chris Day. We now look forward to defending the trophy but inevitably many of the players from the 1979 Team will no longer qualify as Youth Players.

CLUB CAPTAIN'S REPORT

The theme of my report last year revealed a Cardiff 1st XI which was half a team, lacked application and guts and which was largely immature. The same cannot be said for the summer of '79, when it was clear that the side had come of age. Apart from a bad run in the middle of the season we revealed as much talent on the field as any side we played against and no match was comprehensively lost. There were convincing victories against Bath, Malmesbury, Gloucester, Lansdown, Downend, Imperial and the eventual League champions Keynsham and we were not pleased when two matches against weak opposition were wiped out because of rain. Nevertheless, we finished ninth out of eighteen in the league table and could easily have finished higher.

Many of the players deserve a personal mention. Paul Good recovered much of his form and headed the averages with 491 runs at an average of 30.69. His innings against Chippenham when he scored 103 out of 154 was particularly brilliant. Ricky Lewis, who opened with him, played several invaluable innings—his ability is unquestioned in my mind and Cardiff can expect him to be a sheet anchor for many years to come. Chris Elward was perhaps the most improved cricketer of the year and impressed with some batting of real style. The mercurial Willie Jones must be congratulated firstly for his consistency of appearance, secondly for two matchwinning innings and lastly for his spirit on and off the field. Colin Toshack once again proved that he has as much ability as any player in the Club and it is only a matter of application for him to write himself into the record books.

On the bowling side we are beginning to find our feet and some members may be surprised to learn that the Captain bowled fewer overs in the league than one of his opening bowlers. Ian Holmes bowled exceptionally well for much of the season. He tries as hard as anyone and has learned to bowl line and length without tensing. Howard Slade is another natural athlete who can be a most frustrating defensive bowler and he should concentrate on this rather than his dream of being an off-spinner. Dave Cooper was, as always, tireless in effort and although not quite at his best took valuable wickets and just kept going when the pressure was on. Chris Day was a much better bowler this season but he has to control his volatile nature; too often he forgot the basics of bowling when attacked. In spite of this I believe he will succeed and bowl faster and better for Cardiff in the future.

The fielding this summer was a hundred per cent improvement on last year and the younger players particularly caught almost everything and chased every ball. Paul Good did an excellent job behind the sticks in the absence of Stephen Lang and Tim Littlewood for a large part of the season. For the future, careful consideration should be given to the slip positions as this is where we are rather weak.

The results of the 2nd XI were particularly heartening, and my congratulations go to Gerry Mills who took over from Nigel Rees in difficult circumstances and did a marvellous job. On behalf of the whole Club I would like to wish Nigel a rapid return to good health and I hope we will see him back in action soon.

In conclusion, it is my firm belief that if the 1st XI improves half as much next season as it did this season, we will win the league or come very close. My only concern for the Club now is that we maintain the aggression we have shown. We are playing in a league which has County or Minor County players in every side and an immature or lighthearted approach will ensure that we come last. I wish the advocates of nice, friendly cricket could have seen the determination on the faces of the side when we chased a Downend total of 160 against a Gloucester 1st XI bowler and got them with overs to spare and 6 wickets in hand only minutes before the rain came.

My thanks to all: players, groundsmen, Committee, Secretary/Scorer and Chairman for your support during the season.

Last season, as a Club, we failed to make a significant impact on local hockey. It is true that we won the indoor league, and the 2nd XI Cup and that we were defeated finalists in the South Wales Cup. I hope that our indoor team add to this by retaining the Welsh Indoor Cup on Sunday at St. Athan. However, the Welsh Cup has now eluded us for three years and we have not won the First XI league during this period. Many have suggested that the reason for recent success by Whitchurch and Swansea lies in their appointment of a manager. This may have been a contributory factor as a non-playing manager might lead a club to better organisation, well-attended training sessions, systematic coaching, better on-field discipline and enhanced morale. In my view, it is possible, if difficult, to achieve these desirable aims without such an appointment. The real reason for the recent success of Whitchurch and Swansea lies in the steady stream of talented young players who have joined each club from local schools. As a club, we have relied on our reputation and our superb facilities to attract established players who come to the area.

Unfortunately, perhaps due to the state of the Welsh economy, there has recently been an out-flow of our established players with very little recruitment of new players to compensate. For this reason our 1st XI

has lacked reserves of the quality necessary to sustain standards in weeks where several players are on representative duty. This same problem lead to some poor teams representing us at 3rd, 4th and 5th XI standard. The long term answer to this problem is for members of this Club to take an active part in the organisation of hockey in boys' schools or alternatively that we establish our own coaching system to recruit 12 to 14 year old boys and develop our own potential stars. Failing either of those, we must make a powerful commitment to organised prayer "Please God! Just two midfield players and three strikers."

In this context it is good to acknowledge Shri Sharma's contribution in recruiting the "Fitzalan Flyers" and it is pleasing that Shri is now to seek a formal coaching qualification. If they also teach him how to hit an empty goal from 4 yards that will be a bonus. Terry Jones, another qualified coach, has joined the Club and I look forward to the contribution he will make in the coming seasons.

The season was made memorable by our dinner dance, ably organised in the Park Hotel by David Le Masurier and the dinner in the Arms Park organised by Drunken John. I hope that these will be a basis for many further such events.

Throughout the last two seasons Neil Pallot has been President of the W.H.D. and we congratulate him on the achievements of this time.

Our thanks are due to the various people who made the Club work last year.

Tony Rhys-Jones: Now retiring as Secretary after 10 years of hard work but still available to serve the club in another capacity.

Mike Chinn: Retiring as Team Secretary but not yet going off to meet the "Great Resigner in the Sky".

Henry Bland: An efficient Fixture Secretary.

Geoffrey Percival: Dragooned by his son into yet another job for C.H.C., very willingly done.

Paul Kelvin-Smith: The "custodian of the tin" for bringing the Tea and Travel Fund another wealthy surplus.

ist XI Report

No fewer than II players who had played quite frequently for the 1st XI in the previous season moved from the area, and the number of training weekends meant that we were often without our best players and found it difficult to field a settled side. What was not excusable was the number of occasions on which we were forced to play with only ten men as someone failed to turn up. The Astroturf pitch at the Sports Centre on which we played and trained and which suited our style of play was damaged in the winter floods and could not be used after Christmas. All these factors meant that we had a disappointing season

which was not alleviated by the personal success of Bryn Williams and Howard Williams in being selected for Great Britain since the Great Britain Hockey Board then decided to withdraw from the Olympics.

The season started well by our winning the Penarth Sixes and having our largest win of the season, 9-0 against Abergavenny. Our best result was undoubtedly our 1-1 draw against Beckenham, a game we might well have won. The next day we fielded a much weaker side and lost quite heavily to Old Kingstonians; however, those who had travelled back to South Wales, won the Bridgend Indoor Sixes for the second year running.

The Penarth and Bridgend trophies were the only ones we won. In the league we were never able to play our strongest side and often struggled against mediocre sides who were used to playing on poor pitches and were not handicapped by having their best players regularly unavailable. We did well in the early rounds of the Welsh Cup and many thought that this was to be our year again. We progressed much further in the Wales Ibrahim Cup but lost in the final in the best and most exciting game of the season 1-2 to Whitchurch.

In the so-called "friendlies" we lost a close match 2-3 to Marl-borough but with a weak side did very well to draw 3-3 with Bristol, although in the second match of the season we lost 0-4.

We won the Indoor League but in the Indoor Cup we were unfortunate to have 3 people at an Indoor training weekend on the same day and thus failed to again win the Cup we had so many times in the past.
