

Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1995

Last year I made reference to the necessity of a more "professional" approach being made in the running of the Athletic Club. As a result of the generosity of a former player, Mr. Peter Thomas, an extremely successful businessman who had recognised this requirement, we were able to appoint a new Chief Executive and Gareth Davies joined the Club in August, 1994. A new position of Administration Manager was also created and a young Chartered Accountant, Nathan Roberts, was recruited.

Resulting from these appointments, the format of this report has now changed. The Chief Executive will refer in greater detail to the major issues which I mention whilst the accounts, together with explanatory notes, have been prepared by the Administration Manager for which I am very grateful.

In addition all staff moved into new offices in September, 1994. Although it was somewhat of an upheaval at the time, there is no doubt that the staff, being under one roof has proved extremely beneficial.

From the accounts, referred to above, it is pleasing to report a considerable increase of income over expenditure and it would appear that we have made considerable progress over the past twelve months. Financial wise there is a mood of optimism in the Club.

Whilst financial comments of the Lottery Fund appears elsewhere in this report, it would be remiss of me not to record our thanks once again to those who give their time voluntarily to service this aspect of our income. Without the oustanding efforts of Ken & Kath Jones, Brian Bennett and Roger Williams, the Lottery could not operate as successfully as it does. In addition, and together with David and Lynn Lewis, they also service the Souvenir Shop, the sales of which speak for themselves.

Even though certain adjustments have been made to the accounts, in respect of the Commercial Department, there has still been an upsurge in what were the historical figures. There is no question that this is due to the efforts of the Commercial Manager, Tina Tew, and her staff of Chris and Cathy. That the Junior Blue & Blacks continue to grow is also indicative of the thought and initiative which go into this new venture and is also a reflection of the work of Steve Cannon and his enthusiastic cohorts. Karl Williams and Richard Freeman.

Our Ground Manager, Bryan Walker, and staff have continued to provide excellent playing facilities particularly in view of the extremely wet winter which affected the rugby pitches in particular.

What can one say regarding Jeff, Betty, Darren and the Bar staff? Although it has all been said before, even more visitors and members appreciate the welcoming friendly atmosphere and service.

Finally out thanks go to Jackie, a newly married Julie and Vicky for their patience and co-operation. As I have said previously they are at the sharp-end of the Club's activities and it is they who initially listen to complaints, queries etc.

May I now pay thanks to all members of the Management Committee who have given their time so freely over the past twelve months—a period of considerable activity. Although the number of Committee Meetings has been reduced, there have been numerous additional meetings with outside bodies. My special thanks go to my fellow Trustees, Gerry Chugg, John Riches and the President, Haydn Wilkins, whilst the contribution of David Herbert and John Webb have been invaluable.

Still on the subject of individuals I send best wishes, on behalf of the Management and other Members of the Athletic Club, to Tony Rhys-Jones, the Chairman of Hockey, in his battle to make a full recovery.

It would be remiss of me not to congratulate the Rugby Club on their magnificent season. The Rugby Section's Chairman's report says it all. The older Members will recall Lord Callaghan's comments regarding Cardiff Rugby Football Club in Parliament in the late forties!

I have yet to refer to two major issues which have arisen over the past twelve months.

Firstly there is the sale — subject to contract — of Sophia Gardens to Glamorgan C.C.C. The financial position of the Athletic Club has not been helped by the £100,000 p.a. cost of running Sophia Gardens and the offer of £2.5 million provides a means of financial security for the Club. It is also a considerable boost for Welsh Sport in general and cricket in particular for Glamorgan to have a permanent home in the Capital City of Wales. Provision is being made for the re-location of the affected Sections and the Chief Executive will, no doubt, be commenting on this elsewhere in the Annual Report.

Secondly is the issue of the possible re-location of the Rugby Stadium and other Athletic Club Sections — the decision on this will be probably the most important in the history of the Athletic Club.

Members have now been made aware of as much information which is available. You may rest assured that as soon as details of the final offer are known, you will be informed. Again the Chief Executive will be enlarging on the foregoing in his report.

Whilst I have thanked both staff and Committee for their input and have referred to the very much improved financial position, I am certain that without the enthusiasm and expertise of Gareth Davies neither would have been possible.

I would personally like to pay a tribute to Gareth, not only for the time and effort which he has put in over the past twelve months but also to his positive approach which I feel has inspired those around him

Chief Executive's Report for 1995

The first year of marriage is celebrated with a paper anniversary – at the end of my first year at Cardiff Athletic Club, I have seen and digested enough paper to make serious inroads into the world's supply of the material.

Much has been written and said about various strategic aspects of the club's activities and the last 12 months have certainly proved exciting and challenging.

Prior to my appointment, I passed comment that the Club had become anonymous and lacked the profile it deserved. I believe that this aspect has now changed and the Club, especially the Rugby Section, is to the fore, instigating and heavily involved with the quickly changing face of the sport.

The Rugby team's success has obviously made my start at Cardiff a smoother passage, as any failings would, I am sure, have been attributed to my presence. Thank you Mike, Alex and the boys.

Certain important issues have been addressed and appraised responsibly for the future well-being of the Club. Sophia Gardens was an expensive overhead which, although providing excellent cricketing/hockey facilities and adequate tennis courts, was an ordinary second team rugby training campus. There is now, of course, the onerous task of securing alternative accommodation and this leads me on suitably to the proposed relocation to Cardiff Bay.

The proposed sporting facilities at the Bay will make the Athletic Club the envy of clubs in Europe and allow all sections of the Club to regroup together as one sporting club.

This emotive subject has aroused great debate and interest and the Arms Park is, I assure you, as close to my heart as to anyone else's. Cardiff Rugby Club has played on the present ground for 24 years, 12 of which I played for the Cardiff first team, therefore no-one has played on the stadium more than I have; but we must look to the future and prepare ourselves to be be positioned to lead the radical changes that Rugby Union will experience.

These two commercial projects have certainly ruffled feathers but perhaps the following saying is rather poignant:

"It is not the critic who counts, nor the man who points out how the strong man stumbled, or where the doer of deeds could have done them better. The credit belongs to the man who is actually in the

arena, whose face is marred by the dust and sweat and blood, who strives valiantly, who errs and comes short again and again... who knows the great enthusiasm, the great devotions and spends himself in a worthy cause, who at the best, knows in the end the triumph of high achievement and who, at worst if he fails, at least fails while daring greatly, so that his place shall never be with those cold and timid souls who know neither victory nor defeat."

Enough of the sermons — an opportunity to thank staff who have coped admirably and enthusiastically with my foibles and who, I believe, have benefited from added responsibility.

I would also thank the entire management team chaired openly by C. D. Williams for the advice, support and encouragement that I have received during this period and although a greater commitment called for, I believe that they have secretly enjoyed the increased activity.

One thing is certain, my aim is to make Cardiff Athletic Club a stronger and viable organisation that will place the Club among the world's elite. Anything less should not be acceptable for Cardiff Athletic Club.

Cardiff Athletic Club Financial Report for the year ended 30th April 1995

Introduction

This is the first set of accounts that I have prepared for the Club, and before discussing the detail of the various balances, I would like to draw members' attention to the changes in the presentation of the accounts compared to earlier years.

The changes have been made in order to meet two objectives: firstly, to make the financial statements easier to read and to understand; and secondly, to bring the format of the accounts closer into line with statutory company accounts.

The Income and Expenditure account has been condensed so that similar items of income or expenditure are grouped together as single balances. Detailed breakdowns of these balances can be found in the notes, ensuring that the overall level of information contained in the accounts has not changed from previous years.

The Balance sheet has also undergone similar changes, so that all reserves other than members' funds are now shown as a single balance, with the detail contained in note 20. Long term liabilities are now disclosed beneath current liabilities, so that the top half of the Balance Sheet presents a clear picture of the Club's assets and liabilities.

Major movements in account balances are summarised and explained below.

1. Income

a. Rugby income

Income derived from rugby increased from £230k to £324k over the year. Gate receipts and season ticket sales were both increased, and cable coverage of the Heineken League First Division, together with the continuing BBC Wales coverage, led to an increase in television receipts from £19k to £50k. Due to the 1993/94 SWALEC Cup Final and the 1994/95 cup run both falling within this financial year, receipts from competitions increased substantially, and income from the Junior Blue and Blacks has risen, reflecting increased membership levels.

b. Membership income

This has increased in line with increased charges for both Club and ground members, although the overall level of activity has not changed significantly.

c. Clubhouse profits

(N.B. This balance now includes both bar and fruit machine profits.)

The increased usage of Club rooms for private functions has led to a substantial increase in bar takings, from £29k in 1993/94 to £346k in 1994/95, and whilst the profit margin has fallen slightly, the increase in net bar profits from £33k to £38k is an excellent result at a time when the licensing trade in general is still experiencing a slowdown in activity. The regular changeover of fruit machines in the Clubhouse has led to an increase in profits from £28k to £35k.

d. Commercial income

Overall commercial income has increased from £171k to £301k. Ground earnings and profit on sale of programmes have been included as commercial rather than rugby income, since they fall within the activities of the commercial department. The substantial rise in programme profits was achieved through lower printing costs and a successful Cardiff v South Africa programme. Ground earnings have risen as a result of the Club reaching agreement with the WRU on payments for right of access to club property during non-rugby events at the National Stadium. The substantial increase in commercial, catering and sponsorship income reflects an increase in sponsorship revenue, increased usage of club rooms, and higher catering income from the suites, both on matchdays and during the week. The South Africa tour matches involving Cardiff and Wales also helped to increase commercial and catering income.

2. Expenditure

a. Rugby expenditure

The fall in matchday and tour costs is due to the £70k cost of the Australian tour included in 1993/94 not being repeated in the year under review. The rise in development expenditure reflects the first full year of the development officers' employment (the 1993/94 accounts contain only 5-6 months of development expense).

b. Salaries and wages

The new staff structure at the Club has led to an increase in salaries and wages (although this has been partly offset by donations made by Mr. Peter Thomas under the terms of his agreement with the Club). A number of one-off factors have also come into play, namely redundancy costs of outgoing staff and a provision for possible future tax liabilities.

c. Maintenance and utilities

Ground maintenance expenditure increased due to the need to carry out substantial repairs and renewals to the ground prior to the start of the 1994/95 season, and increased water rate charges. Rates and other utility charges were largely unchanged.

d. Insurance and professional charges

The only significant movement was the increase in professional charges from £11k to £23k, reflecting work done on the employment of the Chief Executive, and the sale of Sophia Gardens.

e. Advertising

The fall in this balance was due to the Club no longer advertising individual matches in the local press. This did not appear to have any adverse effect on attendances.

f. Bad debts

The provision for bad debts increased during the year, reflecting firstly a more cautious view of the likelihood of old debtors paying, and secondly the need to make a specific provision against two debtors who have fallen into receivership. The Club's credit control procedures are currently being strengthened with a view to improving debt collection times.

g. Interest

The rise in interest charges was due to the need to pay two years interest on the Fairclough/AMEC loan, totalling £40k.

Cash flow statement

The cash flow statement acts as a reconciliation between the income and expenditure account, and the movement in cash balances over the year. Note 23 to the accounts starts with the excess of income over expenditure for the year, and then removes non-cash items from this figure (such as depreciation) to arrive at a figure for net cash inflow (or outflow) from operating activities, which is the figure at the top of the cash flow statement. Cash flows from other activities are then added in (in the Club's case interest paid, fixed assets purchased, and loans and HP balances repaid or written off), to arrive at the final increase or decrease in cash balances over the year.

Finally, I would welcome suggestions from members as to any further improvements that can be made to the presentation of the financial statements. It is very important that the accounts are as straightforward and easy to understand as possible, so that all members can gain a clear understanding of the Club's overall financial situation.

Financial Statements For the Year Ended 30th April 1995

ACCOUNTING POLICIES

BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

The financial statements are prepared on the historical cost basis of accounting.

FIXED ASSETS

Freehold land and buildings are stated at cost.

Leasehold property, ground maintenance equipment, furniture, fittings and office furniture are stated at cost less depreciation.

DEPRECIATION

Depreciation is provided on a straight line basis at the following rates:

Leasehold property over the length of the lease Ground maintenance equipment ... 20%

Furniture and fittings 15% Office furniture 15%

No depreciation has been provided on freehold land and buildings. It is the Club's policy to maintain the properties in such condition that the value of the properties does not diminish with time. All expenditure on the maintenance of the properties is expensed. The Trustees are of the opinion that the market value of the land is greater than the value at which the land and buildings appears in the accounts.

STOCKS

Bar stocks have been professionally valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Other stocks have been valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Statement of the Management Committee's responsibilities

The management committee are required to prepare financial statements for each financial year that give a true and fair view of the state of the affairs of the club as at the end of the financial year and of the income and expenditure of the club for that period.

The management committee confirm that suitable accounting policies have been used and applied consistently and reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates have been made in the preparation of the financial statements for the year ended 30 April 1995. The management committee also confirm that applicable accounting standards have been followed and that the financial statements have been prepared on the going concern basis.

The management committee are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, for taking reasonable steps to safeguard the assets of the Club and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

Report of the Auditors to the Members of Cardiff Athletic Club

We have audited the financial statements on pages 14 to 25.

Respective responsibilities of directors and auditors

As described above, the management committee are responsible for the preparation of financial statements. It is our responsibility to form an independent opinion, based on our audit, on those statements and to report our opinion to you.

Basis of opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with Auditing Standards issued by the Auditing Practices Board. An audit includes examination, on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. It also includes an assessment of the significant estimates and judgements made by the management committee in the preparation of the financial statements, and of whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the club's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from material misstatement, whether caused by fraud or other irregularity or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of information in the financial statements.

Fundamental uncertainty

In forming our opinion, we have considered the adequacy of the disclosures in the financial statements concerning the liabilities for taxation which may arise as a result of a review of the club's taxation affairs. On the basis of the information presently available the management committee and their taxation advisers have been unable to ascertain the likely financial effects regarding the outcome of this review. Details of the circumstances relating to this fundamental uncertainty are described in note 21. Our opinion is not qualified in this respect.

Opinion

In our opinion the financial statements give a true and fair view of the state of the club's affairs at 30 April 1995 and of its excess of income over expenditure and cash flows for the year then ended.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR SEASON 1994-95

I was naturally delighted to be honoured by being asked to stand as Chairman for a third successive year. We had after all just concluded a reasonably successful season, culminating with victory in the SWALEC Cup Final against Llanelli. We had largely the same team, certainly the same Captain and Coach, could we go one better and win the league? I was certainly very pleased to be part of what could prove to be one of the most momentous seasons as the changing future of Rugby Union began to unfold.

This was highlighted with the appointment as Chief Executive of Gareth Davies, a very successful Cardiff Rugby man on and off the field, who would surely benefit the Club, with the vast experience that he has gained in his professions. We saw the club office move to the Westgate Street end of the ground, and this meant that sensibly everybody was under the same roof. Day to day decisions whether on rugby or commercial matters could now be taken much more quickly and efficiently.

Our preparation for the season commenced early in August, when we held a training camp in Jersey. Under the influence of Alex and his coaching team, and a keen on-looker Ian Woosnam, the rugby improved along with the golf. "Woosie" incidentally has become a firm Cardiff fan.

This World Cup season began early at the end of August. After reaching the Final of the Worthington Sevens, we were off to a flying start, all be it after a shaky first half at home to Bridgend, as 47 second half points put us in better fettle. We then won away at Pontypridd and at home to Neath before going down to Swansea.

A disappointing crowd of barely 7,000 people then saw us beat a strong Llanelli side at the Arms Park before sadly we lost popular Mike Rayer for the season when we won narrowly at Treorchy. The response to a special lunch for Mike at the Marriott Hotel fully illustrated the respect and affection with which he is held both inside and outside the club.

Having played against the last South African team that visited Cardiff in 1969, it was certainly tremendous to have them back at the Arms Park after 25 years, but on this occasion we were perhaps unlucky to have met them first. Possibly we gave them too much respect, did we freeze a little on the day, we could so easily have won. It was sad to see such a small crowd at the National Stadium, but probably this will not happen again. In future and hopefully

beginning with the Fijians this Autumn we will play tourists on our own ground. I am sure we all look forward to the atmosphere of a 14,000 full house at our Arms Park.

The season continued successfully and comfortable victories over Pontypool, Abertillery, Dunvant, Newbridge and Newport took us to the top of the table before, on December 19th we showed our full capabilities when we won 34-10 at Bridgend in difficult conditions. In my view this, along with the win at Llanelli on February 4th, were two of our best performances and very largely responsible for our ultimate title. It meant that the defeat at home by Pontypridd and away at Neath during the festive season could soon be forgotten. The Llanelli weekend was also memorable for the conribution made to the Stradey Park atmosphere by three coach loads of our Junior Blue and Blacks, whose support for the team throughout the season was thoroughly appreciated and who went on after Llanelli to have a very enjoyable weekend of rugby and fun in Broadhaven and Haverfordwest.

It was a pity that such an enjoyable season should have ended in anti-climax. In the SWALEC Cup, perhaps we had too easy a run through with Merthyr, Pyle, Old Penarthians and Aberavon, or was it the fact that we had not played a top team since that Llanelli game on February 4th? A defeat by a highly competitive Swansea side was a sad blow with our team for once below par. While our celebration day against Newport fell flat perhaps because we had earlier anticipated a Cup Final appearance.

Between the league and crucial Cup games there had also been the tremendously entertaining match with the popular Barbarians. Our regular Easter visitors always bring out the best in Cardiff rugby.

Not only were we Heineken League First Division Champions, we were also voted at an award ceremony in London, Whitbread British Team of the Year where it was good to hear the guest speaker Ian Robertson say "Rugby was far better for having Cardiff back at the top". Mike Hall is to be congratulated for his leadership on and off the field and also for being appointed Captain of Wales in the World Cup, while the whole squad, in depth, deserve congratulations for their dedication, team spirit and fine performances throughout the season. I must give further praise to our coaching organiser Alex Evans and the coaching staff. New recruit this season Ian Bremner joining Terry Holmes, Charlie Faulkner, Alun Donovan, Gwynne Griffiths and with Committee men Peter Manning and Bobby Newman successfully nurturing the Rags and under 21's.

Alex Evans is also to be congratulated on being appointed Welsh

Coach and it was a tribute to the club that eleven players—Mike Hall, Mark Bennett, Adrian Davies, Steve Ford, Mike Griffiths, Jonathan Humphreys, Derwyn Jones, Emyr Lewis, Andy Moore, Stuart Roy and Hemi Taylor made the squad to South Africa, Well done lads. While earlier, wingers Nigel Walker and Simon Hill, and full back Mike Rayer played for Wales during the Home International season and World Cup qualifying matches. At under 21 level, Jason Hewlett, Owain Thomas and Paul Beard were capped and you can read elsewhere about the honours gained by members of the all conquering Cardiff Youth side. The future looks promising indeed.

Although success is measured by our performances on the field of play there are always many backroom boys who in one way or another play a vital part. To my Executive Committee, its thanks to John Evans, John Nelson, Ian Eidman and Terry Charles and to all the other Committee men and Vice Presidents who help in so many ways during the season. Thanks to Steve Cannon and his team, with Richard and Karl front runners, who successfully run the Junior Blue and Blacks. To Tina Tew in the Commercial Department and to her husband Chris who runs the Suite Catering. To Brian Walker and his ground staff, and to the old hand Jacquie and the long suffering office staff.

Jeff Ellerman and Betty continue to provide that special clubhouse atmosphere of food, drink and camaraderie. Our strong supporters club continue to assist in so many different ways and I would like to thank them for the Lottery work, operating the Souvenir Shop and for providing so many functions at the clubhouse.

In this physical game of rugby football we seem to see more attention being paid to the medical profession and we are very fortunate in having such a strong team. They must all be congratulated on their expertise and the swift attention that they pay to both our players and our visitors. We have seen a new face running on the field this year and I am pleased to welcome Jane Parker to our medical support team.

Many thanks to Duncan Gardiner our programme editor for writing and presenting a product which I believe is the equal in information and entertainment to any seen at Rugby Clubs throughout Great Britain. Our afternoon entertainment whatever the weather was once again splendidly provided by the young South Glamorgan Band. To our major sponsors, AT & T, who are continuing their association, and to all who have hospitality suites and advertising boards who use our programme to advertise and

those who provide match balls, you are a vital part of our continuing success.

The total face of Rugby Union is altering. Cardiff have for many vears openly supported the idea of an Anglo-Welsh/European Competition. We now hope to be a part of such an organisation when it should start in season 95/96. This will give all our members the opportunity to see exciting matches against fully represented sides from clubs from other countries. We must always continue to provide an interesting representative fixture list, and we need new strong teams to provide entertainment at the Arms Park.

One other regular talking point in the later part of the season has been the future of our ground within a Cardiff Bay Development. Since the first approach from South Glamorgan County Council the Committee view has been simply that we must liaise with the W.R.U. and South Glamorgan Council and see what proposals they have to offer. While there have been quite a number of meetings to date we have not had firm proposals. As the situation stands at present my personal view without these full details, is that I can not see any advantage in our moving from the City centre to the Bay. Yes, I would like to see 20,000 people in our stadium watching European Cup matches, but I feel we have the room to develop our own ground at the Cardiff Arms Park if the need arises. This is a personal view, it might not be a Committee view, but I can assure all members that any decision on moving away from our ground would not be a Committee decision. The membership of Cardiff Athletic Club will decide and, as the Rugby Section accounts for some 90% of the membership it is here where the vote from Rugby members will decide the future.

Finally I wish to extend my sincere appreciation to every Cardiff Rugby person who has made this a most enjoyable year that I will surely treasure for a very long time.

YOUTH REPORT

The players, under captain Gafyn Cooper, made the job easier, enjoying a most successful season, remaining unbeaten during the whole of the domestic season and in the process, winning the Welsh Youth Rugby Union Cup for the seventh time, the Cardiff & District Cup and the Cardiff & District Youth seven-a-side competition.

The Welsh Youth Cup was won with victories against Taibach (away) by 83-0, Felinfoel (away) by 34-0 and perhaps the closest game in the semi-final at Dunvant when we scored 12 points in the closing minutes of the game against Aberystwyth to win 21-15. In the final at the National Stadium, the team played remarkably well to triumph over Pontypool by 42-3.

The Cardiff & District Cup was won with victories over Glamorgan Wanderers (away) 67-0, Llanishen (home) 55-3, Rumney (semi-final) 34-11 and Dinas Powis in the final by 28-7.

In the District Sevens, the team won the competition by beating Old Illtydians in the final by 38-7, having won the three previous games without a point being scored against them. At the Cornelly Tournament, we were defeated by Neath Athletic in the semi-final.

Other notable victories included those against Moseley (h) 58-0, Coventry (a) 46-6, Leicester (h) 45-22, Llanelli (h) 43-14, Otley (h) 68-6 and the annual fixture against Crawshays Youth 43-5.

Leading points scorers in the 1,452 scored at an average of 48 points and just over seven tries per game were Gafyn Cooper with 345, Lee Abdul with 143 and Robert Saddler with 110. Andrew Fowler was the leading points scorer among the forwards with 90 points from 18 tries.

Indeed, during the season, over 1,000 points were scored in tries. Every regular member of the squad scored at least one try,

thanks to the coaching and encouragement of coach Gareth Jones to play expansive, running rugby. To this end, he was ably assisted by Mike Mawn and Hugh Smith. Our thanks go to all three for their endeavours.

The team was awarded the accolade of Youth Team of the Month for April by the Rugby World magazine.

International honours went to Robert Saddler, the whole front row of Phil Booth, Jason Kemble and James Lewis, Steve Gardner and Jamie Ringer. Booth, Lewis and Ringer all played in Romania for the Welsh Youth team in an international tournament organised by F.I.R.A. Welsh Senior Schools caps were awarded to Richard Field, who captained the side, and Andrew Grabham and under 18 Youth caps were awarded to Andrew Driscoll and Mathew Davey. It was rather a special season for Saddler who had the distinction of playing for three different Cardiff sides within a week and scoring eight tries in the process. Having scored four tries against Bath for the Youth on Saturday, he was promoted to the Rags for a mid-week game when he crossed for two more and the following Saturday saw him playing for the first team, scoring two tries against Maesteg. Our congratulations go out to all these players on their achievements.

An end of season tour took the team to Barcelona where a very good 'Under 21' team from Santboiana, containing several players over even that age and some regular first team players, beat the Youth by 43-10 showing great speed, skill and strength and with the flair usually associated with the French. Two days later, Cardiff beat Mercabana, another team from Barcelona at under 19 age group by 41-5.

The season was overshadowed by the tragic and untimely death of John Griffiths who, with Dai Williams and Andy Moore, organised and coached the under 16 and under 17 age groups. He had been associated with these age groups for six years since the Club decided to organise rugby at this level. He will be very much missed.

The under 16's team, captained by Andrew Griffiths, supported by Gareth Hughes, recorded several good victories over Bristol, Bridgend, Newbridge, Clifton, Llanelli Wanderers and Machen although Abercynon scored two narrow victories to record a double over us. During the season, a total of 10 boys were involved with the Welsh Schools squad, four gaining full caps: Adam Harding, Ian McIntyre, Max Rice and Robert Lord.

Wayne O'Connor was on the replacements bench. 'A' caps were awarded to Andrew Griffiths, Dafydd Beasley, Stuart Burnett and Gareth Hughes with Richard Tully a replacement. The under 16's retained the Cirencester 7's title which the Club at under 16's or under 17's has won for the last five years. Andrew Griffiths won the Player of the Tournament award.

The under 17's team, captained by Sion Davies, had difficulty in fielding a settled side because of school commitments but nevertheless had notable victories over Bridgend at the Brewery Field by 45-21 and Clifton 26-0. Like the under 16's, one team, Crumlin, managed to do the double over us. Whilst Alwyn Powell was perhaps unlucky not to gain representative honours, he played for the Youth against Crawshays and Mathew Williams was capped at Schools under 18 level.

Yet again, Bill Woods has proved a wizard with the magic sponge, rarely missing a game and he has been ably supported by Tony Rowe. Colin Davies has been ever willing to assist when the occasion has demanded and on one occasion the former Secretary was press-ganged into service at Coventry.

Last season saw the departure to pastures new of Lorraine and her help was invaluable to me as a newcomer, as indeed has been that of all the office staff. Our thanks to all these good ladies and our good wishes to Lorraine in her new situation. As always, Brian Walker and his staff are due the thanks of all the Youth players and officials and we are ever grateful to Betty and Jeff Ellerman.

It would be remiss of me not to say a special thank you to the Supporters Club for their continued help, and to all those who fall into the category of parent, patron and sponsor for all their support, financial and otherwise, which has been so freely given.

SECRETARY'S REPORT 1994-95 SEASON

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

The 1994 season saw us BJ Welsh Cup Winners, runners-up in the Famous Grouse Western League First Division and the Welsh Cricket Championship, fourth-placed in the Western League Second Division, third-placed in the Glamorgan & Gwent Division 5 for first elevens and winners of the second XI league, Arthur Patterson Cup winners, Cardiff Midweek league winners and St. Fagans 6-a-side champions.

Such good results throughout the club in any one year represents a very successful season and it says much for the progress made over recent seasons that in addition we were able to celebrate in some style our 175th Anniversary. All players and members should take pride in what has been achieved this year although, whilst the results achieved by the respective teams have been excellent, we must reflect that in many cases they represent opportunities lost and we should strive for even better things in 1005

Pre-season nets at Llandaff Cathedral School provided an excellent facility and were well attended. An unexpected bonus was the appearance of Australian Phil Melville, unable to play for his local club in the Swansea area due to a change of league rules. By attending indoor nets fairly regularly despite an 80-mile round trip, he showed his great enthusiasm for the game, as well as considerable promise for the coming season.

Outdoor activity began with a new feature of the 'A' v. 'B' match. Noted for the dismissal in quick succession of both the club captain and Mike Cann by Ian Rouch, this match proved a great success and I am sure it will become a regular feature. Indeed, I believe we should consider a two-day match in 1995. In the evening, an 'Italian' night in the pavilion got the social side of the season off to a good start.

Undoubtedly, the highlight of the season was the Welsh Cup campaign, which culminated in our lifting the trophy at Swansea, where we defeated Brymbo somewhat comfortably in the final. The saga began with our surviving a very losable match at altitude at Ebbw Vale. Thereafter, we were fortunate with the draw, playing all our remaining matches at home other than the final. The matches against our greatest rivals St. Fagans and Swansea will live in the memory as two matches of great tension, where the team showed great character under pressure.

The early league campaign saw a narrow home win over Swindon and an even narrower home defeat by Lansdown after chasing a large score. Although we defeated the eventual winners Bath by a considerable margin on their own ground, losses at Bridlington, whom we allowed to recover from 81-7 after an insertion, and at Downend in a low scoring match on a wet wicket proved fatal. We had an outside chance of the league right to the last match but had to settle for second place, one league position short of emulating the double winning teams of 1983 and 1984.

The English National cup saw a marathon trip to Salisbury where we made our customary first round exit at the hands of South Wilts.

The Second XI had been highly fancied to go one better than their runners-up spot of 1993. In the event, they lost three matches and ended

fourth, although six more points would have seen them second placed again. Whilst this has been disappointing, the club has for so many years under-achieved at Second XI level and we should enjoy the success of the last two seasons and the strength of the current Second XI squad.

The Third XI managed third place in their league, a creditable effort after losing the first three matches before the team settled down. However, this meant that we did not secure promotion to a higher division and this must

represent a considerable disappointment.

The success story of the league teams was the Fourth XI. A team with some talented but very young players was fortunate to have Richard Haines and his lieutenant Ken Underhill not only to take the reins but also provide both experience and ability on the field. Their league title was richly deserved and the performance of the 14 year olds Ben Davies and Jeff Mitchell holds great promise for the future.

We had set our sights on winning every competition in our Anniversary year, and, although we were runners up in the Sunday League, we did manager to win the Arthur Patterson Cup for the first time for some seasons, and the St. Fagans 6-a-side. We also retained the Cardiff Midweek League title, which was particularly fortunate as we had lost the trophy!

Congratulations must go to Alistair Dalton, who made his first-class debut for Glamorgan against Oxford University and played several other first-team matches, including facing the touring South Africans against

whom he scored an undefeated half-century.

The Youth Section has been very productive this year. The under-15s record of 5 wins in 9 league matches may seem modest but they were playing opponents generally a year older. Jeff Mitchell, Huw Williams, Ben Davies and Gwyn Hobbs all represented South Glamorgan at Under-14 and Under-15 level, while Gwyn also played for Wales Under-14s.

The Under-11 'A' side won 8 out of 9 league matches, with four players

representing South Glamorgan Schools.

The most successful side was the Under-13s, who won all 9 league matches and also the Welsh Cup, going on to represent Wales in the National Ken Barrington Cup. Kurt Bettles, Neil Buttigeig, Adam Davies, Yasser Dani and Rhys Harrington all played for Wales. These five plus Tom Jenkins played for East Wales, while a further three, Paul Coleman, Huw Salmon and Leighton Cossins, turned out for South Glamorgan. When you consider that the Under-13s 'B' side won 6 out of 10 league matches despite being in general a year younger than their opponents, you will see that from 1997 onwards there will be considerable pressure for places in the higher senior sides.

Our thanks go to the various youth coaches — Ricky Lewis, Bernard Mullins, John Brown, Bob Way, Gerry Moreton, Wally Carter, Ron Ayres, Neil Salmon and Phil Harrington. Particular mention must be made of Gwyn Hobbs senior for his tireless efforts on and off the field. The club

must never overlook his great contribution.

This is an appropriate time to refer to the continuing and generous sponsorship of Heath Wales. We are very fortunate to have this backing and my thanks to Ian Brice and Brynmor Williams. Their contribution to the development of some very promising young cricketers has been immense. The 175th Anniversary season was marked by a Cricket Week with fixtures against Cardiff Wanderers, Wilfred Wooller's XI, St. Fagans, the Lord

Mayor's XI (played within the walls of Cardiff Castle), a Western League XI, the MCC and a Cardiff Past XI. The week was very well supported by the players, indeed we could probably have played twice as many fixtures.

On 9th September over 300 people sat down for a grand dinner at City Hall, Cardiff in the presence of the Lord Mayor or Cardiff. The guest speakers were Peter Parfitt, Tony Lewis and Hugh Morris, with responses on behalf of the club from David Herbert Junior and myself and with the ever-reliable Alan Wilkins acting as MC. My thanks to David Herbert Senior, Matt Phillips, Chris Fowler and Matt Longley for their part in the

arrangements of this splendid event.

The club was fortunate to find that Mike Cann had returned from living in South Africa and was able to act as club coach. Unfortunately for us, fairly early in the season Mike secured employment which took him to live in Gloucester. Although he continued to play first team cricket and attended all cup matches even though ineligible, his direct influence tended to be on the first team rather than throughout the club. However, I believe his effect on the success of the season, at all levels, has been most significant.

This season the teams have been taken over by Penny Pearce and have impressed both home players and visitors alike. All players would wish me

to formally thank Penny for her unstinting efforts.

The Pearce family will play a major role in the club next season, when Steve will be Club Captain. He showed considerable strength of character in overcoming a very nasty injury and not only regaining his place in the First XI but quickly becoming a major factor in its success. Who can say what could have been achieved had he been fit for the whole season.

Early in the season, it has decided to enter the Western League third XI league in 1995, the intention being to lessen the gap in standard between the Second and Third XI's. The late success of the Third XI and the number of players available from mid-season have persuaded us to run five teams in 1995. This will demand great effort from all but I believe it is an essential step, particularly with the number of young cricketers coming

through the youth ranks.

As I write, the sale of Sophia Gardens to Glamorgan is imminent and the Athletic Club are seeking alternative venues for the various sections. We must hope that a suitable new ground is found as early as possible to minimise the disruption for the cricket section and ideally any new ground should provide three independent cricket squares in view of the expansion now evident in the section. We should know much more in twelve months time and hope for a satisfactory outcome so that we can remain a premier cricket club in Wales and the West of England.

I must thank all members of the committee for their hard work this year, particularly the various captains, Matt Phillips and Dan O'Sullivan as Secretary and Assistant Secretary respectively, and to Ken Williams for his opinions which are always greatly appreciated. I must also thank David Herbert Senior as our management committee representative.

The usual thanks must go to Brian Walker and his groundstaff and Jeff Ellerman and his barstaff. We tend to take our facilities for granted but visits to other grounds can bring home how fortunate we are.

We have completed a major anniversary season in some style. Much has been written in the past of attitude and commitment but both have been excellent this year. The season has been very enjoyable for me as a spectator and I am sure that you the players will have enjoyed it even more.

There are some people in the club who I sometimes feel regard success as a dirty word. I hope that this year has shown that successful cricket can also be enjoyable. What is beyond doubt is that while the club is in a period of uncertainty, it is essential that we maintain a high profile and success on the field of play is the most effective way to achieve that end.

FIRST XI REPORT 1994

The bulk of the First XI squad was comprised of the under-achieving team of 1993. Two important additions boosted the playing strength; Michael Cann, former Glamorgan batsman/off spinner rejoined as club coach and Phil Melville, a fiery fast bowler from Sydney via Swansea, burst

onto the scene with his committed, 100 m.p.h. approach.

To provide a brief pen portrait of the team and the primary contributors, I would mention the following members: several of the younger players established themselves, including Ian Bridgman and Robbie Weston batting in the middle order, Grant McNamee, a competitive youngster and middle order batsman who came back from Australia for a second summer, whilst the wicket keeping duties were shared between veteran Paul Soulsby and young Glamorgan hopeful Richard Evans. Nick Wood provided the variety offspin in spells of flighty temptation and the back up seam bowling was shared between Alan Powell, the maverick swing bowler and a semi-fit Steve Pearce who made a big impact on the side from mid-June.

The captain and Michael Cann opened the innings, the combination yielding 1,100 league runs, the latters contribution being in excess of 750.

Mike Cann also took 32 wickets with his hard-nosed off spin.

In the Club's 175th anniversary season, the campaign was a highly successful one. Winning the Welsh Cup at St. Helens in mid August was the highpoint against the formidable Brymbo side of North Wales. St. Fagans and Swansea, in a memorable semi-final clash, were amongst those teams vanquished on the cup trail.

Cardiff made their customary first round exit from the National Knock-

out Cup, fielding a depleted side early season at Salisbury.

However, turning to the Western League, the First XI sustained a relentless chase of leaders and eventual champions Bath. The pursuit finally succumbed on the penultimate Saturday when we were rained off at Imperial. Indeed the gods did not shine on our cancellations, losing five Saturdays, all against opposition anchored in the lower half of the league. Consequently, several potential points bonanzas were wasted. Our championship hopes were really dashed in two disappointing performances, one at Brislington and perhaps, most significantly, against Downend in a display of suicidal batting against a turning ball on a slow wicket.

Our third loss was at home to Lansdown in a high scoring contest when Cardiff fell two runs short — Stuart Dyke failing to hit the final delivery for

six.

On a more positive note, there were excellent performances both collectively and individually, in our eleven league victories. The most

satisfying result came in mid June at North Parade, Bath. After losing the normally reliable Cann early on, Cardiff recovered with some style to score 245 for 7 against the much vaunted Bath bowling attack. Robbie Weston smashed 80 and David Herbert compiled 70. Phil Melville then ripped the heart out of the Bath batting in a tremendous spell of controlled fast bowling, aided and abetted by a superb fielding display. Bath eventually fell well short of the required total with Cann bowling occasional leg spin to emphasise our superiority.

Handsome victories were recorded against Keynsham, Optimists, St. Fagans, Newport and Gloucester. The final two games of the season were

cancelled, effectively sealing Bath's Western League title.

In other competitions, the XI won the Arthur Patterson trophy, were runners-up in the Welsh Sunday Championship and, as previously mentioned, made an early exit from the Abbott Ale Cup, the English National competition.

A highly successful and enjoyable campaign where a spirit and collective

will proved for the most part an unstoppable force.

My thanks go to Tony Edwards, the chairman, whose thorough and seasoned style brought order to the happy chaos, to Chris 'Stato' Fookes for intermittent brilliance with the pen and scoresheet, to Michael Cann, my vice-captain, for his no-nonsense approach to tactical appreciations and problems, to Penny Pearce for bringing a smile to everybody's face at tea time, and finally to the members of the cricket section, who were by and large enthusiastic and committed and made the club captaincy an enjoyable experience.

I would like to finish with the hope the attitude and collective will displayed in 1994 continues in 1995 and beyond in what will be a period of change of some uncertainty. I am sure that the members of Cardiff Athletic Club appreciate the honours brought to the club by the cricket section during the 1994 season and that, like the rugby section, we, in our own

particular amateur sport, are the best in Wales.

SECOND XI 1994

In 1994, the Second Eleven maintained its high standard of cricket, finishing third in the League, beating Brislington who came second and narrowly losing to eventual champions Optimists.

Our statistics for 1994 read – played 15, won 12, lost 3.

Individually, eight players appear in the league averages, which is an unconfirmed club record for one season.

Congratulations to David Ricketts for topping the batting averages with 411 runs at 68.50. Richard Meggitt and Edward Meggit also featured with 430 at 33.07 and 350 at 26.92 respectively.

With the ball, Andy Rutter, who joined Cardiff during 1994, performed

well once granted the opportunity.

I am proud to write that all four of the 2nd Eleven bowlers featured in the League as follows:

Andy Rutter 25 wickets at 15.72 Chris Fowler 31 wickets at 15.22 Matt Phillips 27 wickets at 21.00 Matt Longley 18 wickets at 29.94 Behind the stumps, the Captain is also noted in the League records with

13 victims from just 6 appearances as wicket keeper.

Retrospectively, 1994's cricket was always competitive and had we batted better against Bath and Optimists then the championship would have been ours. As I write 1995 is proving to be harder but I am again confident of a top three slot.

My customary thanks go to John Riches. 'J.D.H.' remains a willing servant to the club, umpiring throughout the season. John enjoyed a long playing career with Glamorgan and Cardiff and is now giving back to the club his invaluable experience. This is a service that the younger members

of the section should note and remember.

In conclusion, Cardiff Cricket Club remains strong at all levels facing the coming years of change. We must maintain our current high standards and disciplines and also ensure that our facilities are of premium quality, wherever our new home is. We have plenty of youthful talent coming through the ranks which must be kept within the club.

FOURTH XI 1994

The Fourths began the season inauspiciously with our only defeat. Only 105 was scored against Monkswood at home. Matthew Holst, in his first season of club cricket, had the best batting average, top scoring with 99 at Monkswood and had two other half centuries. Ken Underhill was consistent, scoring over 30 on no fewer than seven occasions. He also turned in excellent bowling performances (e.g. 2 for 5 and 3 for 28).

With the emphasis on youth, there were several youngsters who made outstanding contributions to the team. Gwyn Hobbs was always extremely economical and had figures of 4 for 5 and 4 for 12. Our two opening bowlers were just 14. Steve Davies was consistent in short spells and kept the scoring down, whilst taking one or two wickets. Jeff Mitchell bowled against openers and took 4 for 5 and 3 for 13 and was always accurate and dangerous. Our first change bowler, Ben Davies was always dangerous in short spells with best figures of 3 for 4. Phil Harrington, another of the few 'golden oldies' in the side, only played once for us, in the last match, a last minute replacement and turned in figures of 5 for 12. Ken Underhill and Ian Rouch beware!

One of the unsung heroes of the season was Alan Lang, who was always reliable and his spirit contributed to the camaraderie of the team. Ian Rouch proved a handful for the opposition with good figures, especially 4 for 34 against Tonyrefail and another spinner Tom Joy took 6 for 22 in the critical victory at Monkswood. Matthew Dunn and Rhys Harrington were other youngsters whose performances consistently belied their years.

The fielding was generally sound and Kurt Bettles showed tremendous

promise as wicket keeper.

Last, but not least, mention should be made of three stalwarts, whose contribution to the team as umpires was much appreciated, despite the difficulties which such a task entails these days, that is Geoff Davies, Phil Harrington and Eric Mitchell. The support of these parents was invaluable

throughout the season.

Though the 'golden oldies' made their contributions, esepcially vice-captain Ken Underhill with both bat and ball, most of the glory for our championship winning performances must go to the youngsters. The best bowler of the season award went to Jeff Mitchell. Ken Underhill, Jeff Mitchell and Ben Davies were all in contention for the best batsman of the year award, but in the end the award was won by Matthew Holst. The main contenders for the award of best all rounder were Ken Underhill, Jeff Mitchell and Ben Davies. It was a very difficult decision but for sheer reliability the award went to Ben Davies.

Our policy for the season was to bring on youngsters and to encourage an atmosphere of encouragement, rather than everybody shouting when mistakes are made. This paid dividends and resulted in players who were keen to play for the Fourths. We look forward to blooding more youngsters and to creating an atmosphere where players are eager to play in a

competitive but disciplined team.

I would like to thank my wife for putting up with the phone ringing all the time and my panic attacks on Friday night when I find out some of the team are unavailable.

I would like to thank Bryn Williams for turning up once. This season was supposed to be the start of a brave new world. The captains spent many hours working out systems and team objectives. The systems for selection broke down very early on and my pre-season objectives looked a bit gloomy too. The second XI were going to score 80 goals, well we scored 51 but if we include the Newport festival we got a bit closer (62). We were going to win the league, well we did not. We finished 6th actually the second best second XI. Whitchurch won the league. We were supposed to finish the seson with 3 under 21 players firmly established in the side. We sort of achieved this. Let me now go into more detail.

Scoring Goals

As the first XI found out, too late to do them any good at all, Andy Gowman is still the best goal scorer in our club. It was at the half way point in our season that I moved him to centre forward and our season turned around. We were unable to turn pressure into goals and points. Indeed we looked forward to playing away on Astro. On the whole, our away games on astro's were at sensible times so I must ask the question why our home games can't be as well? I think if the club was prepared to book several seasons in advance then we could also play on local astros at local times. If the club still thinks of itself as the best club in Wales then it must guarantee Astro hockey on Saturday afternoon to ALL ITS MEMBERS. Cardiff is the most expensive club in Wales to play for and this season it has not given value for money. It should not come as a surprise if many players move to other clubs who can provide astro hockey and pleasant after match surroundings at a cheaper price. Next season in the new league we will have to play our games on astro to survive.

Winning the league

It was the poor start to the season that did for us. On the plus side we had an excellent cup run and narrowly lost to Whitchurch in the semi-final. Indeed we had a chance to win it. Some of the umpiring has been good but a

lot of it is very poor. Our league was supposed to S. Wales division 1, not Mickey Mouse division 9. Our disciplinary record has been good with only 1 red for Dal from a certain Mr. Turton who has expressed his feelings about Dal on numerous occasions, and a smattering of yellow cards for innocuous challenges.
