

Chairman's Report for the Year Ended 30th April, 1991

I introduce my report for the year ended 30th April, 1991 on a sad note as it was a year in which we experienced the demise of our President, Wyndham Lewis OBE JP after a comparatively short illness. We knew him as an entrepreneur, incorrigible raconteur, entertainer in his own right and a great and most popular character. He served the Club well as a Cricketer, Cricket Secretary, Trustee and latterly as President. He was a great stalwart in the Athletic Club.

It was a great honour for me when the Management Committee asked me to take on the role of President, an appointment which I accepted with humility.

The year was an historical one which witnessed the commencement of Phase 2 of the Hospitality Suite programme and at the time of preparation of my report, the erection of the well appointed suites are ahead of schedule and will be opened by the Lord Mayor prior to the World Cup.

The year's financial results are not unfavourable particularly in the context that we have engaged ourselves in a substantial commitment in the large developments on the Rugby ground.

I am grateful to the General Secretary, Mr Alfred Heffell ACIS JP for furnishing me with the information from which I am enabled to comment on the financial results of the year.

The accounts as contained on later pages of the report indicate that Income exceeded Expenditure by £6,138 but nevertheless, the donation of £40,709 from the Lottery Fund has to be set aside and earmarked for Cardiff Rugby Football Club, which has the net effect of Expenditure exceeding Income by £34,571.

A more detailed analysis is given as follows:

#### Income

Income totalled a record figure of £839,434 which is an increase over the previous year of £147.297.

A further breakdown reveals:

- 1. Rugby related income increased by more than £22,000 mainly due to:
  - (a) Gate receipts exceeded last year's figures by £19,405 following increased prices of admission and an improved run in the Cup.

- (b) Broadcasting fees increased by £3,000 as a result of extra League match coverages.
- (c) Against those increases, Programme Sales dropped back to normal levels in comparison with the previous season which included the New Zealand fixture; and Ground Earnings are slightly reduced due to the failure of one of the companies which normally hires a marquee.
- Members subscriptions increased by £43,000 due to enhanced rates
- 3. Bar Profits showed an increase of £4,543 following a reduction in overheads. Bar Takings despite price increases are down on last year.
- 4. Hospitality Suite Rents reflect a full year's rent of £144,480 as compared with last year's figures which were for the period only from September 1989 to April 1990.
- 5. Other income shows an increase of £10,000:
  - (a) Fruit machine takings increased by £5,609 44.3% over last year.
  - (b) Shop sales show a reduction on last year due to the writing off of old stock and revaluation of certain items.
     (Note: The Management Committee is looking at the system wherein a shopkeeper will need to be employed. We cannot continue to exploit the voluntary efforts of a hard working Supporters Club)
  - (c) Investment income is less than in the previous year as a consequence of using working capital to fund the interest on the bank loan.
  - (d) Sponsorship income is reduced due to the financial difficulties of a major sponsor.
  - (e) Donations include £40,000 from the Lottery Fund which is earmarked to the Cardiff Rugby Football Club.

## Expenditure

Totals £833,296 which shows an increase over last year of £125,128.

Sectional Expenses - Rugby Football

(a) Away Match Expenses – nearly a 50% reduction in the absence of a major tour.
 Players Out of Pocket Expenses – shows an increase of £13,443 (44.58%) following the policy of the Rugby Club to keep in line with the WRU rates, and in consequence of the fact that an increased number of players are living, or are in full time education outside the Cardiff area.

- (c) Youth XV expenses increased by £5,500 due in the main to the cost of the tour to Portugal.
- other Sections, Cricket, Tennis, Hockey and Bowls.
   The total cost of other Sections Expenses in the amount of £12,592 calls for little comment, but it is relevant to note that the increase in Hockey Section expenses is due to the increased use of the Sports Council's astro turf pitch for League matches.

**General Expenses** 

- (a) Salaries and Wages: The increase of £23,516 is due in the main to an increase of 7% and the employment of a cleaner in the Hospitality Suites. The full cost of the Commercial Department compares with the part year period last year from July 1989 to April 1990.
- (b) Upkeep of Ground a reduction of £24,950 with the restoration of normal levels following the expenditure on extraordinary items of £27,141 in the previous year's accounts.
- (c) Rates The increase of £38,828 follows the introduction of the new National Domestic Rate. Expert opinion advised the Management Committee that the increases were reasonable.
- (d) Light and Heat increased in line with inflation.
- (e) Laundry The reduction in expenditure resulted from the installation of our own equipment.
- (f) Professional Charges Further expenses in the maintenance of our interests in the Barrage Bill.
- (g) Interest on Loans includes the full year's interest on the Building Loan as compared with the previous past year.
- (h) Insurances increased by £6,380. Arising from the increased public liability and revaluation of assets.

Before I leave the subject of the Accounts, I must refer to the lottery Account, details of which are given later in the Financial Accounts.

It will be noted therefrom that from an income of £132,680, expenditure was incurred in the sum of £58,674 and £76,298 was transferred to the Appropriation Account. Donations made amounted to £55,346, leaving a balance of £20,952, which is earmarked to Cardiff Rugby Football Club.

One cannot praise too much the efforts of those who organise and maintain the Lottery Activities, and whilst we are very grateful for the efforts of Albert Francis, Commercial Manager and his Assistant, Miss Tina Nash, we must not overlook the voluntary efforts of Ken and Kath Jones, Ken and Lorna Jarrett and Brian Bennett. Without their outstanding commitment the Lottery Fund could not function. We are extremely grateful.

Thankfully there are always those persons who are prepared to give their time to serve the interests of the Athletic Club and I mention particularly Don Davies of the Bowls and Rugby Sections, who in one way or another has served voluntarily for many years. It was good to see Don Davies back on the Bowling Green and looking very healthy after his illness.

Of the voluntary assistants over the years, none could surpass Ted John, whose efforts were immeasurable. With great regret Ted passed away after an illness he bore with great fortitude and no complaint. We miss his substantial contribution and we say a humble Thank You to Nancy, his widow and to his family.

1990-91 was a year in which the Management Committee took a look at itself as there was a feeling that the numbers had become unwieldy. As a result it was finally decided to reduce the representation of each section and that is why the item appears on the agenda in which it is proposed, inter alia, that the Management Committee should comprise of four members instead of six from the Rugby Football Section, and two members from each of the other Sections, instead of three.

Following the appointment of Mr John D. H. Riches as a Trustee, Mr A. T. M. (Tony) Rhys-Jones became Chairman of the House Committee and he and his Committee are to be commended on the efforts they are making to introduce new life into the Club.

As to the future, our investment in Hospitality Suites promises a bright future for the Club but in the present economic climate of recession, sponsors understandably are not as eager as heretofore to use their funds for such purposes. The news feedback from Australia suggests possibly that we may need to look at schemes to further the interests of Rugby players, and of course, we still have a commitment under the Safety of Sports Ground Act. As in all things we will need to exercise a good housekeeping control on our income and expenditure.

I thank all Committee Members for their assistance and support once again during the year and in particular I am grateful for the support of John D. H. Riches, formerly Chairman of the House Committee and now a Trustee, A. T. M. Rhys-Jones, the new Chairman of the House Committee, Dr C. D. Williams, Chairman of the Ground Committee and now a Trustee, and Gerry Chugg, Vice Chairman, Chairman of the Finance Committee and a Trustee.

Finally, I say thank you to the administrative staff, Mr Alfred Heffell, A.C.I.S. J.P., Mrs Jackie Flynn, Lorraine Wright, Julie Thomas and Val Letton for their continued efforts and assistance, to the Bar Staff headed by Conrad Bartlett and to the Ground Staff, supervised by Mr Albert Francis.

## CARDIFF RUGBY FOOTBALL CLUB

#### **CHAIRMAN'S REPORT FOR SEASON 1990-91**

The debating finished, the long hours of discussion over and whether we wanted them or not, Season 1990-91 was to be the commencement of league rugby in Wales. For our Club, it was never going to be easy. The Welsh approach to the Amateur game was being changed, the tradition of 'Cardiff type' rugby was to be tempered with a steel determination to win. In preparation, the Committee had appointed the Club's first Manager, Mr. John Scott and he, together with the Club's coach, Mr. Alan Phillips and the Club's new Captain, David Evans started their preparations as soon as last year's Annual General Meeting was over. A pre-season training trip to Holland was planned and this resulted in the side competing in an international competition which included the Romanian National Squad, playing under the guise of a Club side, we managed to beat them in the Final.

The domestic season commenced with friendly home fixtures against English opposition and good wins were recorded over Bristol and Leicester before our first away game and our first real test, the English Champions, Bath. What a rude awakening we had, to simply state that we were beaten is something of an understatement, we were played off the park and it was obvious to all — the Committee, Coaches and Players that we lacked strength in certain vital positions and that in the coming league fixtures we were going to struggle against good solid scrummaging sides and it is a known fact that without good possession, a team cannot win its matches.

Our league programme before Christmas presented us with six home games and four away and it was thought that if we could win 5 of the home fixtures, and hopefully one of the away, by the turn of the year, we would be in a comfortable position. However, things have a habit of not going to plan and whilst we won two away games at Pontypridd, in a thriller and at Pontypool, where we won with style, we lost at home on 3 occasions to Bridgend, Neath and Newbridge. What we feared after the game at Bath had become reality, it was very evident that we needed to attract some newcomers to the Club to strengthen our Forwards, thus giving the talented Backs the opportunity to play with 'good' ball.

We had not been helped in the first half of the Season by the suspensions of Ian McKim, Mike Griffiths and newcomer, Paul Edwards and here I must mention that these suspensions on excuses 'cobbled' up by the Welsh Rugby Union Disciplinary Sub Committee did Cardiff and Welsh Rugby in my mind a disservice.

It was apparent that our fixture list had become one of 'competitive' and 'friendly' fixtures and that the latter were going to be used by all clubs as games where newcomers and promising players were to be introduced to gain experience and to rest other players, these games were losing their significance. If one considers the 2 fixtures against Newport, neither Club in either game fielded their best side, who ever would have thought that this would be the case in games between these famous old rivals?

With the coming of the New Year, it was apparent that to achieve our target of a comfortable league position, a tremendous amount of hard work by players and coaching staff, not to mention the Team Management Committee had to be embarked upon and much to their credit, all three units buckled down and we saw a marked improvement in our play. We achieved a very creditable draw at Bridgend and recorded victories at home over Pontypridd, Llanelli and Pontypool. In the Away fixtures, we beat Abertillery, Glamorgan Wanderers and finally Neath. This last result needs a special mention because of the significance of the achievement. What we had lacked in recent seasons going to the Gnoll was changed, the side went on to the field with a grim determination to win and to reverse the poor results of Cardiff sides in recent years. After losing there in the Schweppes Quarter Final by a narrow margin, the Players felt that with some luck they could win and they applied themselves both physically and mentally to the task, all credit must go to them and to the Coaches for the result. Thus we almost achieved the target we set for ourselves at the start of the League campaign and for this we must thank the Players, Coaches and Team Management for their dedication and hard work over a long and hard season. The target they have already set themselves for next season is to certainly improve on fourth position, hoping to win both League and Cup and I am sure we all wish them well in their endeavours.

Whilst our league programme ended satisfactorily, we again did not reach the final stages of the Welsh Rugby Union Schweppes Cup, although we registered victories over South Wales Police and Blackwood at home, we had the misfortune to be drawn at Neath in the Quarter Final and even the gods seemed to be against us, as it rained heavily before the game turning the Gnoll into a quagmire. Our pack turned in a magnificent display and despite outscoring Neath on the try count, it was the boot of Paul Thorburn that eventually beat us and we lost 16-13.

As with any club, the 'Shop window' is the 1st XV but you must have a good back up and how grateful we are that we have the Athletic team. This year we had a very good side, containing many players who in a very short while, providing they continue to

progress, will be pushing for regular 1st XV positions. The results and the manner in which they were achieved were very good and it was something of a disappointment that the side lost in the Silverball Competition 'play offs' to Tondu. However, because of the high number of tries the side scored in the Silverball Competition, they shared a trophy with Abercynon, some consolation for the players and Coaches, who all put in a lot of hard work throughout the Season. Of course, one player who needs special mention is the Athletic Team Captain for the year, Robert Lakin, although through 1st XV calls, Robert did not play all that many games for the Rags. when he did, he was an outstanding leader and set a magnificent example to the young Athletic Team Players, what a superb Clubman Robert has proved to be over many years. Praise and thanks must go to the Athletic Team Coaches, Malcolm Childs and Dennis John for all their efforts. The one side in the Club that really did well and all that was asked of it was our Youth XV. Under the Captaincy of Martin Walsh, they achieved great success by winning not only the Cardiff & District Youth Cup, but also the Esso sponsored Youth Cup, beating Abertillery Youth on the National Stadium by a very large margin. We congratulate the Players, the Youth Committee and the very hard working Coaches, Jack Lewis and Gareth Jones on their outstanding success.

Summing up on the playing field, the 1st XV had a mixed Season, almost achieving what they had set out to do, the Athletic did particularly well and the Youth had magnificent results. Looking to the future, if we can continue to attract the odd player and develop our own youngsters right from their school days, we should be able to maintain our standing in the Rugby World and just as importantly in the top Division of the League. The Committee of the Club is very aware of the need to look after our existing players but it is also aware of the need to assist in the development of the youngsters of Cardiff and the surrounding area.

Off the field of play, a tremendous amount of work has been undertaken to ensure that the Club maintains its high standing in the Rugby World. This can be seen by the new development at the Westgate Street end of the Ground, where hopefully by the middle of September we will have completed Stage 2 of the Ground development scheme. The new structure will include seating accommodation, divided into 3 sections. The central section will be a glass enclosed area with more comfortable seating accommodation that is presently available in our 2 stands, this will be flanked on the one side by a seated area for family viewing and on the other by a seated area sponsored by local businesses to encourage the young of the City to come and watch rugby football. This last venture will be

carried out in close affiliation with local schools. Above the seated accommodation will be more hospitality suites and these together with the River End development should ensure the future financial stability of both the Athletic Club and of course, its Rugby Section. The Arms Park is already a superb Club Ground but with these developments, it will be, if it is not already, the best Rugby Club Ground in the World, the planning for all of this has taken place over a number of years, and it is only right and proper that I should thank all who have contributed many hours of their time on the Development and Lottery Sub Committee, especially Mr. Stan Thomas who was a co-opted Member and without whose help, Stage 2 would not be under construction — thanking one brother, makes me think of the other, and I would thank Peter for his sponsorship of the away fixture at Ayr on the eve of the Scottish International at Murrayfield. The Secretary of this Sub Committee is that inimitable genius, our own Ground and Commercial Manager, Albert Francis. Albert's contribution has been immense and the whole of Cardiff Rugby Club and indeed the Cardiff Athletic Club, both Committees and Members owe him a great deal, I do not know where we would be without Albert and his very able Assistant, Miss Tina Nash. My thanks are also due to the contributions made by Kath and Ken Jones, Lorna and Ken Jarrett and Brian Bennett for their help, not only on the Lottery, but also in the Club Shop. Mentioning the Club Shop brings sadness to my report because, who could forget the contribution over many years made by the late Ted John and his wife, Nancy. How we all will miss dear old Ted, indeed we miss them both.

Cardiff Rugby Football Club is now big business and it takes a great amount of time and effort to run it, much of this time is given freely but where would we be without our professional staff and I must thank the office staff, under the leadership of Alf Heffell, General Secretary for their invaluable contribution, to the Ground Staff who keep our pitches in such good condition, we owe our gratitude and to those who attend to our inner needs, we thank Conrad Bartlett and his Clubhouse Staff for their attention to our comfort. I thank the Supporters Club and all Club Members for their support throughout the Season.

It is with regret that we read in the Press of the misfortune that has befallen Mr. George Walker of Brent Walker, our main sponsor. We wish him and his wife, Jean well and we hope that the Brent Walker Organisation will soon overcome its present difficulties, we thank them for their sponsorship, especially Mr. John Lord, the Managing Director of Brent Walker Cardiff Division, indeed we thank all our sponsors for their support.

I thank our Stewards and Turnstile Operators for their work and also the South Glamorgan Youth Brass Band for their contribution to our match day entertainment.

I must thank the players for their efforts right throughout the Season, league rugby has required an added dedication, it has put extra pressure on them, it has made more demands on their time whether league rugby will put right the ills of Welsh Rugby, only time will tell but certainly Club Rugby will never again be the 'go out - enjoy it and express yourselves' game that we knew in the past. Whether or not this will be good for Cardiff Rugby Club in the long run remains to be seen but I know that the Players, Coaches, Committee Members will be endeavouring to maintain the high standards expected of Cardiff Rugby Football Club. I thank, of course, the Coaches under the leadership of Alan Phillips for their efforts right throughout the Season. Appreciation must also be shown to those who attend to the Players injuries and here I thank our Club Doctors, Surgeons, Dentist and Trainers for their work.

In conclusion, I would thank my Committee for its support throughout the Season, I know to some the many meetings seemed endless but a lot of work has been done and I congratulate them on this and thank them for the patience shown. Some Committee Members have a heavier burden than others and none more than my Vice Chairman, Brian Mark, whose contribution to the well being of the Club is second to none, for his loyalty, help and guidance I thank him. John Nelson is another who has assisted me greatly, I thank John for accepting the position of Honorary Secretary, only he and I know what a responsibility it is and he has contributed greatly to my enjoyment of the Chairmanship.

Ladies and Gentlemen, it has been an honour and a privilege to have been your Chairman. I never dreamt when I first entered the Ground in 1945 or when I first played in a Blue and Black jersey in 1949 for the Youth XV that I would have achieved the position. I will always look back on the last twelve months with pride.

Finally, I would leave you with my own adaptation of a part of John F. Kennedy's inauguration speech for your consideration:

"Not what can my Club do for me? Rather, what can I do for my Club"



## YOUTH REPORT

A dream end to a marvellous season with five trophies in two weeks. The Esso and Wyndham Group District Cups and the Cirencester, District and Mitre Sevens Titles.

It all began nine months ago with the first appointment of a Youth Team Manager in Jim O'Donnell and new coaches in Jack Lewis and Gareth Jones. Yours truly rejoined as Secretary and the task of rebuilding a Youth team began.

With only six of the previous seasons players available we looked to the successful under 16's side to form the nucleus of the squad. James Savastano led us to our first title at the pre-seasons Sevens at Cornelly. Chris John was awarded the Player of the Tournament trophy and scored 40 points.

September saw the appointment of the Club Captain in Martin Walsh and he lead the side to victories over Leicester (25-10), Newport (20-7) and Llaneli (44-13) and in the six games played we scored 238 points.

In early October a splendid victory against Nuneaton (24-3) when with ten players on District duty the remaining squad members were strong enough to defeat the powerful English visitors.

In November we were on the first step of the Esso ladder and we achieved the desired result at Pembroke (50-3). Fine wins against Glamorgan Wanderers (27-6) and at Porthcawl (40-9) were the order of the day. Just before Christmas in the second round of the Esso Cup came our greatest fright when New Tredegar with ten minutes to go were leading by nine points, but with great character and determination we fought back to score threee tries to win 14-9.

736 points on the board and still undefeated we entered 1991, but bad weather restricted the matches in January and February to four. The double over Llanelli (72-4) and a fine victory over a Paris Select (30-16) were particularly pleasing.

March saw further Esso success against Felinfoel and then on to the long awaited clash with Cardiff Harlequins in the District Cup. Victory was sweet with our forwards creating the platform for a well deserved triumph in appalling conditions at Sophia Gardens.

Following the run of Cup matches it was decided, quite rightly to field those players who had not played for five weeks, and our record took a dent with our only defeat at Northampton. Neath in the semi-final of the Esso was billed as the game fit for the final. Cardiff were always in front; although Neath never gave up, and victory was ours, but only after some great defence.

Crawshays on Easter Saturday were the traditional visitors and in a splendid display of open Rugby we passed two milestones with the 1000th point and the 200th try of the season in a 33-20 success.

On Easter Monday the inaugural Youth Rugby Festival with three matches against Newport saw wins at under 15, 17 and 19 levels to take the Stan Bowes Memorial Cup. We are indebted to Stan's friends the Golden Oldies for donating the trophy.

Early April saw us off to sunny Portugal and victory over their National Champions Cascais, near Lisbon 44-17. The squad returned bronzed, fit and in fine spirit for the hectic last two weeks.

Victory at the National Stadium in the Esso Final saw us take the title for the record fifth time with nine tries to defeat Abertillery 45-12. The Double came within days with Old Illtydians going down 45-3 in the Wyndham Group District Cup to bring down the curtain on the fifteen-a-side season.

In Sevens, at Circumster, Bristol were defeated 20-14 in a first class final. With great character our lads fought back to clinch the title, having being behind 14-4 at half time. Jason Hewlett was Player of the Tournament with 41 points.

In the District event at Barry, Paul Cousins won the final and the Tournament award when we beat Llandaff North in extra time. In the prestigious Mitre competition at New Docks Stars, again in extra time. Chris John struck the vital penalty to win through against Cardiff Harlequins after seven gruelling games. The hero was Jason Hewlett with a record 104 points and he again took the personal award.

Congratulations to Chris John and Jason Hewlett, who represented the Welsh Schools under 18's Group and to Martyn Madden (three times) and Paul Douglas (once) on sitting it out on the Welsh youth bench. Their caps will surely come next year!



#### FIRST XI

The 1st XI had an anonymous sort of season punctuated by flashes of brilliance, but with too many mediocre performances. As a consequence we finished 13th in the Famous Grouse Western League, were knocked out of the Welsh Cup in the third round and didn't make the impact on the Peter Kippaz League that our stature as a Club demands. The low points came when we were badly beaten by St Fagans, and Gary Hibbert stood down from the captaincy for personal reasons. It is greatly to the credit of Michael Cann that he was able to raise morale sufficiently for the team to register 5 of their 8 Western League wins from the last 7 games, but the lesson is clear: you cannot develop a title-winning team when 30 different players turn out during the season—there is a great difference between a squad and a crowd of extras.

The season started with heavy losses to Cheltenham, the eventual League winners, by 8 wickets, and Newport (who finished 15th) by 7 wickets. There then followed a comfortable 9 wicket win at Malmesbury after Steve Kings and Steve Pearce had bowled them out for 122. The season opened in fine style with a win against Cheltenham when 97 from a jug-evading D Herbert helped us to 198-6 to which the visitors replied with 143-8, their downfall brought about by 5-55 from David Lewis. This start was improved upon with a 10 wicket defeat of Newport when 74 from Richard Meggit took us to 124-0 to overhaul the 123-9 which they had made thanks to 5-36 from N. Ronaldson.

A tight 1 wicket win against Malmesbury was followed by defeats at both Stroud and Gloucester after battling collapses and a further defeat by Weston in a close finish. The rot was stopped with an emphatic win by 9 wickets against Imperial with 69 from Ricky Lewis and 72 not out from Paul Good but there followed a defeat by Lansdown after we had made 215 for 4, and despite 6 for 92 from David Lewis.

Further reverses were suffered against Keynsham, Swindon and Midsomer Norton by what was effectively a rudderless ship, before the team reached its apogee by inflicting the first defeat of the season on a village team who had no answer to David Lewis' 7-25, and this was followed by a crushing win against Optimists with 63 from Danny O'Sullivan and 72 from Paul Good.
