Welcome

It is a great honour for me to hold the post of President of Cardiff Athletic Club. Fifty years ago when the club celebrated its 75th Anniversary I played in a very special match between Cardiff and the British Lions at the Arms Park. What an occasion that was. The arrangements had started on the 1950 Lions tour to New Zealand and Australia when Dr Jack Matthews and myself approached the manager, Surgeon-Capt Ginger Osborne, about the possibility of a full Lions team playing their first-ever game in the British Isles.



He agreed, and so did the Four Home Unions, and the arrangements were left in the inspiring hands of the club's chairman, Hubert Johnson, and a sub-committee. The result was that on 22 September 1951 over 40,000 people at the Arms Park witnessed an historic event. Cardiff outscored the Lions by four tries to three but lost narrowly 12-14. Three hours after the final whistle 350 guests toasted the club at a dinner at City Hall. This evening we return to the same venue to again celebrate this great club.

Our 125th anniversary season has been very different from the celebrations of half-acentury ago. That is understandable and inevitable. Rugby is now a professional sport and that brings with it advantages but also disadvantages. The age of club sides playing touring teams may unfortunately have passed forever but some things will never change. Cardiff Rugby Football Club is synonymous with setting standards, playing fair and promoting friendships. That is still the case and it is my privilege to welcome you all to our Gala Dinner this evening.

Famous Captains They Beat The Tourists

Percy Bush.

Percy Frank Bush was one of the greatest players in the history of Cardiff, Welsh and British rugby. Born in 1879, he went with his clubmate Rhys Gabe on the British tour of Australia and New Zealand in 1904. A year later he was a member of the famous Wales side that beat the All Blacks at Cardiff Arms Park. He then led Cardiff to unprecedented victories over the Springboks in 1907 and Australia in 1908. By the end of his career he had scored 66 tries and 35 dropped goals in 171 games for the club.

Haydn Tanner.

Haydn Tanner had the unique distinction of playing for Wales before and after World War 2. He was an 18-year-old scrum-half in both the Swansea and Wales sides that beat New Zealand in 1935, toured South Africa with the Lions three years later and, in 1946, joined Cardiff. He captained the club for two seasons, including the celebrated 1947-48 campaign when the side won 39 of its 41 fixtures. On 27 September 1947, Tanner's team beat the Wallabies 11-3 with tries by DH Jones and Cliff Davies and five points from the boot of Bill Tamplin.

Bleddyn Williams

With victories over the Springboks and the Wallabies already on Cardiff's honours board, the hat-trick was completed on 21 November 1953 when the club beat the All Blacks 8-3. It was one of the greatest days in Blue and Black history and the hero was captain Bleddyn Williams. He it was who had led his team out with his final plea of, "We have got to try things...if we fail, we fail, but we have got to be different" ringing in their ears. They did — Cardiff scored two thrilling tries in the first 20 minutes and held on in the dying moments as their line was under siege. Bleddyn was chaired off on the shoulders of his team-mates. A month later he completed a unique double by leading Wales to a test victory over New Zealand at Cardiff Arms Park.

Eddie Thomas

Back-row forward Eddie Thomas was one of the unsung heroes of the Cardiff team between 1952 and 1958. He played 217 games for the first team and in his final season was elected club captain. He was a successful leader with the team only losing seven of its 47 matches and winning the unofficial Club Championship. The highlight was yet another victory over the Wallabies on 14 December 1957. Thomas was from the Rhondda and it was another Rhondda Blue and Black, Gordon Wells, who stole the show with two tries in an outstanding individual performance. Cardiff won the game 14-11.

Keith Rowlands

History repeated itself when Keith Rowlands also captained the club for two seasons and included the touring Wallabies among his scalps in his final season. The giant lock from West Wales played 149 games in six seasons at the club and won his Wales cap and selection for the Lions tour to South Africa in 1962. His career was cut cruelly short when he broke a leg playing against London Welsh in December 1966 but earlier in the same month he had become the fourth Cardiff captain to lead his side to glory against the Wallabies. Later, Rowlands became a distinguished administrator in Welsh and world rugby.

Gerald Davies

Generally regarded among the greatest wings ever to play the game, Gerald Davies captained Cardiff for three consecutive seasons between September 1975 and his retirement in 1978. They were exciting times at the club with Davies instilling his beliefs and style into the side. Though he always claimed it would take at least two seasons, and possibly three, to achieve the success he was aiming for, yet another Cardiff victory over Australia came in his first months in office. The 1975 Wallabies were beaten 14-9, with the 20-year-old Gareth Davies kicking two penalties and scoring a try. Gerald went on to captain Cardiff in an auspicious Centenary Season.

Alan Phillips

Hooker Alan Phillips achieved a record in Cardiff colours that will probably never be beaten. Between 1973 and 1989 he played 470 games for the first team – and also scored an incredible 162 tries. He appeared in seven Welsh Cup Finals, winning five of them, and was club captain in 1985-86 and 1986-87. He also led the team, in Terry Holmes' absence through injury, in 1984 when the Wallabies were beaten yet again, this time 16-12.
