

FOOTBALL.—In view of the approaching football season, the members of the Glamorgan and Cardiff clubs met together on Friday evening, at the Swiss-hall, to discuss the advisability of effecting an amalgamation of the two clubs. Mr. Fry was voted to the chair. There was a large attendance, including Mr. Selby, the captain of the Glamorgan team; Mr. Thomas, the secretary; and Mr. Phillips, captain of the Cardiff team. There appeared to be a general desire that the two clubs should amalgamate, and so an amalgamation was declared. It was thought that unity of action and purpose would be better for the football players in many respects. Chiefly, it was believed there would be a larger number of members, and consequently of good players in the one club. This would have the effect of placing Cardiff more on a level with other towns. It was decided that the association be called the Cardiff Football Club. The Chairman said Mr. Selby had sent in his resignation as captain of the Glamorgan Club, and Mr. Thomas had resigned the secretaryship. It was proposed that these two gentlemen be asked to re-consider their decision, and Mr. Selby agreed to become the captain of the amalgamated club, as it seemed apparent that he would be supported properly with the increased number of members over whom he would preside. His reason for tendering his resignation was the fact that he had not been sufficiently well supported before — that is, insufficient numbers had responded when they were required for football purposes. Mr. Selby was then formally appointed captain, and Mr. Phillips vice-captain, with Mr. Fry as treasurer and secretary, Mr. Thomas feeling himself unable to withdraw his resignation. The committee was then balloted for. The result was the election of Messrs. J. G. Thomas (18 votes); S. C. Cory (14); F. S. Thomas (10); and G. Jones (10). The terms of membership were agreed on. The committee was empowered to select the club colours, and the first practice was decided to be held three weeks hence.
