the law a match is a historic the law the Cardiff Club meets, for the first time on record, the Rest of Wales in a friendly way it will be a grand challenge match. Yet more important it will be a Memorial Match to a really great player—one of the greatest players and gentlemen ever to play Rugby Football.

Down through the years the Cardiff Club have stood firm for the highest ideals in sport. This season's team, so ably led by Haydn Tanner, have endeavoured to follow in the spirit fostered by Gwyn Nicholls and his men in the four years that he was captain of the Club.

It is fitting that Haydn Tanner and his men should play an important part in to-day's game for they have brought new honours to the Club in the last two years. Gwyn Nicholls, had he lived, would have been the first to have showered praise upon them for their displays.

When Major L. C. Watters, the former Secretary of the Cardiff Athletic Club, prior to his being called to the Colours in 1939, reopened the Appeal Fund for the Gwyn Nicholls' Memorial, his committee decided to approach the Cardiff Rugby Club with the request that they might stage a match to raise a sum of money to bring the Fund up to the total required to purchase the Memorial Gates and set them up at the Quay-street/Westgate-street Entrance to the Arms Park.

The suggestion was readily agreed to, and Captain Geoffrey Crawshay was invited to select a team from the Rest of Wales to oppose Cardiff. The manner in which this great sportsman set himself to the task deserves the praise of all. The team representing the Rest of Wales to-day, is a true measure of the success attending his efforts.

The idea of producing a Souvenir Programme came rather late in the match arrangements and Mr. D. Morgan Rees and his printing staff came to our help most readily to complete to-day's effort to commemorate what should prove to be a great game.

The Cardiff side will be at full strength apart from Russell Burn and possibly Gwyn Evans. Haydn Tanner is fit again and he is joined by Jack Matthews, W. E. Tamplin and Terry Cook who have also been on the injured list. The Rest of Wales XV is a strong one and four players who were originally invited have had to decline for various reasons—they are Glyn Davies and John Gwilliam (Cambridge University), Ken Jones (Newport) and Roy Sutton (Swansea). Mr. Ivor David (Neath) is the referee, and thus the best in Wales will be on view and it should be a match worthy of the occasion to commemorate a great player. Finally, the Memorial Fund Committee wish to express their thanks to all followers who have supported the appeal.

Gwyn Nicholls

The younger generation might ask, "Why commemorate this old player out of all the old players who have distinguished themselves in Welsh football, and whose names have also been household words in Rugby homes?" The answer is, that Gwyn possessed that little extra something which put him on a pedestal above the others, and which made him, in my opinion, the best-ever centre threequarter that played for Wales. To me he was the Prince of Threequarters.

To know and appreciate fully his sterling qualities, one had to play along-side him. The onlooker saw a great deal, but only part of his activities. A colleague had the opportunity of seeing from the inside his true merit. I attribute the small measure of my early success directly to his acknowledged greatness, for he demanded such anxious watchfulness from his opponents that his colleagues were afforded much more scope and freedom. I found a difference when he was not at my side.

Off the field "G.N." was outstanding as a personality and a gentleman. To associate with him was indeed an honour and a tonic.

He was my hero long before I met him. As I came to know him more intimately—I played 12 times as his co-centre for Wales—my affection for him continued to increase, if that were possible.

"His life was gentle, and the elements

So mix'd in him that Nature might stand up

And say to all the world, This was a man'."

In repeating that quotation from Shakespeare's *Julius Caesar*, I can think of no better way to pay my tribute to his manliness, his football skill, his endearing temperament and his outstanding good nature.

Gwyn died in the Spring of 1939, and had the war not broken out, the memorial would have been erected that year. But the project had to be suspended because of other matters more pressing to be attended to. To-day the Gwyn Nicholls' Memorial Fund Committee hope to fulfil their ambition and notch the total required to purchase and erect the Gates at the Quay-street/Westgate-street Entrance to the famous Cardiff Arms Park.

Few contemporary Welsh sportsmen have done more for the cause of exiled rugby men than Captain Geoffrey Cartland Hugh Crawshay. Much of his good work was done whilst serving as an officer in the Welsh Guards, where he formed the Welsh Guards Rugby Football Team, the Household Brigade Team and the Guards' Depot Rugby Football Team.

He brought many teams to Wales and became a familiar figure in Welsh sport during the 1920's. Besides taking a very active part in the social and political life of Wales. he will always be remembered for his sponsoring of the famous "Crawshay Rugby Tours" in Devon and Cornwall. Welsh players who were fortunate enough to travel on one or more of these


still speak of them with great pride and affection.
