Cardiff v. Canada

WEDNESDAY, 19th SEPTEMBER, 1979 KICK OFF 7.15 p.m.

Tonight, the Cardiff Rugby Football Club is delighted to extend to the Canadian Rugby Union touring team a very warm and hospitable Welsh welcome. The occasion is also unique because for the first time a Welsh club is able to stage a game against the national side of another country outside International Board membership and advertise it as such. For instance, had tonight's game been played last year it would have been staged as 'Cardiff v. a Canadian XV'. This rule was altered at the last W.R.U. A.G.M. in June when the Cardiff club successfully proposed the change.

Rather strangely, however, this is not the first encounter we have had with a Canadian touring team. Shown in the records in "Danny's book" is the fact that in season 1902-03 we played Canadian tourists. There is no other reference to them except that Cardiff won the match by 29 pts. to 3. It was the 12th match of their tour and they had won five, lost five and drawn one of their previous games before they played in Cardiff on 7th January, 1903. It was their first visit to a Welsh ground and in their own words they had "come to learn".

Canadian rugby has come a long way since then and tours to England, France and Wales in 1965 and 1971 have greatly added to their experience. The game in Canada is making rapid progress and is now being played more and more in the high schools of the country. The present side will be particularly keen to make a success of this tour because it starts a period of great importance in Canadian rugby. At the end of this present season, Wales will be sending a touring team to Canada as a build-up to the W.R.U. Centenary Year. Then there is a tour to Argentina in the offing and also a possibility that the All Blacks will play in Vancouver on their way home from next season's short tour of Wales. So the Canadians will be pulling out all the stops to succeed at this stage.

This current tour is one of six games. The first against Somerset was won by 15-6 and then last Saturday Cornwall were defeated by 10-6. After tonight's game, Canada travel to Aylesbury to play Southern Counties and after that they visit France to play firstly the 'B' side and then the full French side. The side comes to Cardiff in good heart with two wins in two games and will be most anxious to continue on their winning way.

The touring party consists of manager Peter Clarke, assistant manager Dr. Bruce Howe, physiotherapist John Strong and 24 players. Details of the whole party can be seen in the pen pictures printed elsewhere in this programme. A quick glance at the list sees one name very familiar to us: Hans de Goede. Hans, of course, spent all last season with Cardiff when he won his first team cap. His all round endeavour on the field and his cheerfulness off it made him a firm favourite at Cardiff and it is great to see him back again, albeit his stay will be a rather short one. Welcome back Hans, may your reunion be a pleasant one. Another member of the party who has also played against Cardiff before is Spence McTavish. Spence was included in the Overseas International XV we played during our Centenary season so he too will have a happy few days renewing old friendships.

What then do we in Wales know of Canadian rugby? Looking at the composition of the touring party it appears that the strength of Canadian rugby is centred on British Columbia. Of the 24 players touring only four come from outside this province. So it appears that the West Coast is the stronghold of the game. Just recently, however, Ontario beat British Columbia at Under-19 level so this augurs well for the future. Of course, we also know that on our own Centenary Year tour of their beautiful country we were beaten in our first game by 29-17. We went on to win the remaining five however, but that initial defeat served as a reminder that we couldn't take things easy. Then again last month Canada had the satisfaction of beating the U.S.A. by 19 pts. to 12 at Toronto. So all in all our Canadian friends are progressing very nicely — but this tour is vital to them and I'm sure they will be making an extra

effort to achieve victory tonight. Win, lose or draw, however, the Cardiff club again welcomes you. To those of you who are renewing old friendships, may they be as enjoyable as you have anticipated, and to those of you on your first visit to Cardiff, may you make everlasting friends and memories.

KNOW THE LAWS

"Pile-ups pose problems still." Yes! But, give it a little longer and our referees — with the players' cooperation — will have it sorted out.

Did you see last Sunday's "Sports Line-Up" with Carwyn James and today's referee Corris Thomas discussing just this, immediately after the Neath v. Newport match, referee by Corris and shown in depth?

Trial by television can be damning, but use of the media in this way can only do good and must be applauded. I wish that more time could have been allotted to the spot. It did highlight a couple of important points and, as usual, I'll quote to emphasise those which I mentioned when the season started:

"Law 19 - Lying on or near the ball.

- *A player who has NOT been tackled but who is lying on the ground and holding the ball; and
 - *a player who has fallen on or over the ball emerging from a scrummage or ruck

must IMMEDIATELY play the ball or roll away from it or get up.

- 2. A player or players lying on the ground in close proximity to the ball must NOT prevent an opponent gaining possession of it.
- 3. A player or players from either team must not WILFULLY fall on or over a player who is lying on the ground with the ball between them."

The intention is to prevent players throwing themselves on a player who goes down on the ball or adopt similar spoiling tactics. The ball MUST be made available and players MUST do something POSITIVE about it.




ANDREW JOHN BIBBY (University of British Columbia and British Columbia) - Centre




